U.S. senator gives trio of powerful speeches on race



Tim Scott shares his solutions to racial strife, urges families to sit down over dinner to hear each other's experiences

The U.S. Senate's only black Republican said that ending racial discord starts with breaking bread together.

"I have experienced what's possible when the family talks," Sen. Tim Scott,

R-S.C., said July 14. "I think this is incredibly important while our problems appear in within one black and white, our solutions are black and white."

Plane crash survivor's miraculous tale of faith

On July 19, 1989, Helen Young Hayes boarded United Airlines flight 232 in Denver, bound for Chicago. That flight never made it. It suffered catastrophic failure of its tail-

mounted engine "I remember every Sioux City, Iowa.

Miraculously, Hayes survived.

Now she's publically sharing her remarkable story of faith.

"I remember every minute of it as vividly as if it were last week!" Hayes told CBN News.

The harrowing experience tested the faith of the successful money manager seated in row 9, seat B.

Armed with faith, she prayed the impossible: that God literally guide the pilots' hands as they attempted to land a DC-10 with no hydraulic assistance - something that had never been done before.

"Just as I figured out that something was wrong, the captain came on again and he said, 'Ladies and gentlemen, we will not be making it to Chicago after all. We have sustained tail damage to our plane. We are going to attempt an emergency landing in Sioux City, Iowa, in 35 minutes and I'm not gonna kid you folks -- it's gonna be rough," she recalled.

"The plane was just careening about. I looked up and as I was being thrown around in my seat I saw myself surrounded with flames and for that moment, for the first time, I was afraid," she continued.

"And I thought, 'Dear God, don't let me be burned,' and then the flames passed and

she said. Hayes, one of 185 people who survived, said she knew she was on that flight for a reason.

"I was on the plane because, unbeknownst to me, the pilot's hands needed guidance and so a prayer was put in me that I just prayed," she told CBN News.

So, what exactly did she pray?

"The first thing that came to mind was the pilots' hands," she said. "I closed my eyes and I just prayed for pilots and I asked the Lord to give them guidance and wisdom and show them what to do. And I believe my prayer was answered that day."

"For the first time in aviation history the plane -- a plane that was not steerable and had no elevators, so it doesn't have the ability to go up and down and it does not have breaks and landing gear -- a completely unsteerable plane was brought to the runway," she continued.

And while they expected that no one would survive, 185 people lived! I know that's why I was on the plane," she concluded.

So, where did Hayes get her faith?

"I had grown up believing in the salvation of Jesus through my mother and attending our local Catholic church," Hayes told CBN News.

"But there's part of me that always wondered ever since I was a little girl will what I believe in prove to be real to me when I needed (it) the most," she said. "And when I am sitting at the edge of eternity, will I be afraid and will God be real to me?"

The July, 1989 crash of United Airlines flight 232 in Sioux City, la claimed the lives of many and haunts the memories of survivor Helen Young Hayes.

"And so what was decided for me on July 19, 1989, was, yes, all of that is more real than anything else," Hayes

It was her relationship with Jesus that really helped her through life's storms – to live a life bigger than she ever could have imagined.

"I think it's really from knowing who the person of Jesus Christ is and we learn about Him through Scripture, through what He said to what He did." Haves explained.

"We learn about Him in community. We learn about Him through the lives and experiences of other people and then by just spending time with

Undaunted by her brush with death 17 years earlier, Hayes has since racked up a million airline miles.

"I have hit the million-mile mark!" she exclaimed. "I have looked death in the eye and sat and glanced over the edge of eternity and I have to say, I believe that death is nothing to fear because I know that this life will just usher in the next life... the real life. It's graduation day. Yes, it's graduation

Christian dating site agrees to play gay matchmaker

(WNS)--Christian Mingle, a dating website targeting Christian singles, has agreed to open its matchmaking service to clients seeking samesex relationships. The agreement came as part of a settlement in a lawsuit filed by two gay men who claimed the company's focus on heterosexual relationships discriminated against them. Conservatives denounced the decision as a strike against religious liberty and an unnecessary interference in private business. "Early on in their quest to legalize homosexual marriage, advocates assured us that it would not infringe on the rights of others, especially people of faith," Carrie Gordon Earll, vice president of public policy at Focus on the Family, said. "From dating sites and adoption agencies to small businesses, it's clear today that people of faith are being forced to compromise or risk financial ruin."

CDC: African-American teens are embracing

(WNS)--African-American teens are having less sex, according to recent analysis of data collected by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The percentage of African-American teens who report they have never had sex rose from 18.5 in 1991 to 51.5 percent in



2015. The jump was even steeper for males. In 1991, barely 1 in 10 were not sexually active; in 2015 it was more than 4 in 10. The results are "astounding," according to experts. While the overall number of American teens who report they have never had sex also

increased in the last 25 years, the increase for African-American male teens is nearly 10 times greater—a 28 percent increase for American teens and a 246 percent increase for African-American male teens since 1991. "The increase is both unprecedented and enormously greater than any other ethnicity," said the abstinence advocacy group Ascend, formerly known as the National Abstinence Education Association.

DOE refuses to talk about transgender school restroom rules

(WNS)--The Obama administration is refusing to cooperate with lawmakers who want Department of Education (DOE) officials to answer questions about its recent transgender restroom directive. DOE rep-



resentatives testified before a Senate subcommittee on July 6 to explain the controversial "guidance" issued to all public schools. A joint letter from DOE and the Department of Justice directed schools to allow students to use the restroom of their choice-regard-

less of their biological sex—or risk losing federal funding. This week DOE officials told Sen. James Lankford, R-Okla., chairman of the Senate Subcommittee on Regulatory Affairs and Federal Management, they will not be able to make the hearing and offered no explanation or alternative dates.

Complaints against Dallas police at a low

((WNS)--In the hours before at least one sniper shot and killed five Dallas police officers during a stunning ambush the night of July 7, demonstrators marched peacefully and mingled cordially with officers patrolling the downtown streets. It was one of several demonstrations in cities across the country, where hundreds gathered to protest the recent shooting deaths of two black men by white police officers in Louisiana and Minnesota. Earlier in the evening, the Dallas Police De-



partment tweeted a photo of a demonstrator smiling with police in a crowded park. The protester carried a sign reading: "No Justice, No Peace," but he looked at ease with the officers on duty. It was one of the tragic ironies of the horror that followed: Shootings by police officers in Dallas have dropped by 40 per-

cent in the last year. And complaints of excessive force dropped to a nearly 20-year low. (In 2009, the department recorded 147 complaints. Near the end of last year, it reported 13.)

Missouri lawmaker predicts legislature will override governor's veto of ID bill

The sponsor of a bill requiring Missourians to submit a photo ID before voting predicts the legislature will override Gov. Jay Nixon's veto in September. State Sen. Will Kraus (R-Lee's Summit) notes the Missouri Senate passed his bill 24-8 in May. The Missouri House approved Kraus' bill 112-38 in May. An override requires a two-thirds vote in both chambers, which means at least 23 votes in the Senate and 109 in the House.



It's a "spiritual battle," says KC Police chief

Hundreds gather at KCPD East Patrol for prayer after police shootings

Pastors pray for KC Police Chief Forté

On Sunday, July 10, hundreds of people of different races, denominations and economic status, came together and filled the Kansas City East

Patrol Campus gymnasium at 26th and Paseo Boulevard. The standing-roomonly crowd was unified in passionate and heartfelt prayer.

The prayer event was or-


ganized by the Citywide Prayer Movement, Elevate KC, Concerned Clergy Coalition and Baptist Ministers Union. The gathering was one of several grassroots events across the area and joined hundreds nationwide coming just days after the tragic deaths of five police officers in Dallas.

A week later-on Sunday, July 17-three police officers were tragically shot in Baton Rouge, LA. The gunman, Gavin Long, was a former Marine and shot the officer in an ambush-style shooting before he was shot in a gun battle with police. Long was resident of Kansas City.

After weeks of violence across the county, from the June 12 ISIS-inspired night club shooting in Orlando that left 49 dead to police shootings throughout the nation, many have sought opportunities to pray for victims and call for unity and an end to the violence.



"It is a spiritual battle we are fighting," Forté said to a roar of approval from the hundreds of faithful in the audience. It may have been the first time that the head of a major U.S. city police force acknowledged that the struggle is beyond guns and racism.

Forté also said changes need to be made in the KCPD. "We've done a lot of things wrong," Forté said adding there's a need to recognize threats accurately, versus someone reaching for a wallet or phone—things that can cause officers to respond with force.

"So we have to train better, we're not bad people, but we have to train better," Forté said.

He also touted the implementation of the department's tactical disengagement program, which teaches ofEstimates are that upwards of 600 people filled the gymnasium of the East Patrol Campus. The crowd sang, prayed and cried over recent violence.

ficers to create a protective distance up to 30 feet from a threatening suspect and communicate with that suspect and think about the proper way to proceed.

After Forté spoke, he joined the audience to pray for the victims of violence, their families and for the officers in the Kansas City Police Depart-

The police and faith communities are looking at all options to help stem the tide of violence and distrust between various communities and the police. Consequently, it was announced that the KCPD would be

seeking pastors for ride-alongs on patrols. The goal would be to allow pastors a perspective from that of the police officer but also make the pastors and their considerable clout visible in some of the city's most dangerous and at-risk areas.

David Freeman said "young black man fear what happened to Alton Sterling and Philando Castile and that it could happen to them."

"It makes me angry what has happened and I want to channel that anger into something positive." Freeman said he was looking to find some inspiration at the prayer meeting.

Kansas Board of Education opposes directive

The Kansas State Board of Education is refusing to enact the transgender directive issued in May by the U.S. Dept. of Education and the U.S. Dept. of Jus-

The action follows the Kansas Senate passing, by 30-to-8, a resolution opposing the Obama administration's guidance on transgender students' bathroom use. The resolution said state and local officials, and not federal officials, should decide school policy and that the directive threatens students' privacy and safety.

Steve Brunk of Family Alliance Policy of Kansas says the state board's belief is that local public school districts have better insight into students' needs.

"And can respect the dignity and privacy of all students and not have them mandated from the federal level," he

In a letter sent nationwide to public schools, the federal government claimed that requiring transgender students to use a same-sex restroom and locker room violates Title IX. That is the 1972 law that bans discrimination against women on school campuses.

A month after that letter went out, the Kansas state board is faced with the threat of losing \$479 million in federal aid, a tactic that federal officials have used against other states and local school districts.

Brunk predicts that threat is just that a threat – and won't happen.

"While it's been threatened, we think that money is intact," he says. "No school organization has lost Title IX

funding over something like this."



While the state school board pushes back, Kansas Attorney General Derek Schmidt is also suing the federal government over the direc-

Officials from 11 U.S. states - Alabama, Arizona, Georgia, Louisiana, Maine, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, West Virginia, Wisconsin - sued the Obama administration, calling its directive "a massive social experiment." Mississippi's Republican governor said.

"In our federal system of government, not every decision needs to be handed down from Washington, and this is a matter best left to state or local authorities, including school boards, as it traditionally has been - and as the law requires," Schmidt said in a press release.

7 STEPS TO A GREAT SCHOOL YEAR

Before any big event, wise people make thorough preparations. Whether it's a wedding, a vacation or a new career, we want to be prepared for whatever comes our way.

In the same way, wise parents plan ahead for their child's success. Instead of playing defense and taking on each battle as it comes, it is mandatory to plan ahead. Here are seven steps to help your child's school year get off to a great start

also help your family get along when the stress of school hits.

STEP NUMBER 7:

Decide the bedtime routine. Pick a bedtime for each child and the routine that needs to take place. This is a great time to sit on the side of each child's bed and spend 15 minutes downloading their day. Send them off to sleep know-

If you have a morning dawdler, require him or her to pack their backpack the night before. Avoid morning arguments by having your child set out tomorrow's school clothes before they go to bed. For those attending schools that do not use uniforms, this is also the time for the parents to decide what kinds of clothes are unacceptable for school. These are discussions and decisions better dealt with the night before.

STEP NUMBER 5:

Begin the school year with a predetermined homework plan. Choose the time and location for homework. Your students can earn more independence as the year progresses, but for now start them in one location and pick the time they must be at the table. This is also the time to pick the consequence for not being on time at that pre-determined location. Sound unreasonable? Their boss will expect them to arrive at meetings on time. This discipline might save their future job.

STEP NUMBER 4:

Establish a month-at-a-glance family calendar, as well as a one month calendar for each child. This will help the child begin to learn time management. It will also help the family realize just how many activities they are committing to. Put the due dates for long-term assignments, such as science projects and book reports, on both calendars. Then count back an appropriate amount of days from those due dates so

adequate time can be set aside to read the required books and work on the projects. Rushing to finish a project at the last minute doesn't teach a child anything but stress management. A calendar will show the family and child that you really don't have time to say "yes" to everything.

STEP NUMBER 3:

With everything else there is to do,

decide ahead of time that each week will include a family Night. Make this a night where an hour or two is set aside for games. Obviously this time is for more than games. Give your children the opportunity to feel like they're part of something special: a family.

STEP NUMBER 2:

Decide ahead of time what your priority activities are going to be. On Wednesday night, is church a priority over other activities?

If you make these decisions at the beginning of the year it will prepare your children to say no to other unimportant activities. It will also teach the child that time management decisions are all part of bigger priorities. Your children will still ask if they can do extracurricular activities on previously planned nights, but in their hearts they will already know your answer.

STEP NUMBER 1:

Use breakfast time to set a mood: don't just use it for eating. There are

three kinds of nourishment your child needs every morning. The most significant is spiritual nourishment.

Second is family enrichment and the last is actual food. If it was just about food, you could hand them a health bar as they go out the door. Breakfast is a time for the family to sit for 20 minutes and eat together. This is the perfect time for a parent to read a short passage from the Bible, discuss it and then pray before


everyone goes off to fight the battle. Setting aside time to read a Bible passage is the most important investment a parent can make. Why else do you think it's so hard to actually do?

Minutes spent together reading the Bible and praying helps send the children out the door with the realization they actually belong to something even bigger than their family. They belong to God. This will go a long ways

when they have those moments of feeling alone and without value.

This is the time to jump out front and decide that you will take control of your family time rather than spend another school year racing to catch up.



Back-to-school made simple

When my daughter first started daycare, she was terrified of being cared for by someone who wasn't family. It was a rough transition. Our family turned to prayer to help her feel safe. And now, almost three years later, I say a prayer every morning in the car with my nowfirst grader. We ask God to watch out for her — to give her confidence in the tasks presented, to help her to be nice to her friends and listen to her teachers.

I'm happy this is a tradition we continue as she's growing. Not just because prayer is such a vital part to our Christian walk, but I think it's a daily reminder to her - as she prepares for first grade and all the years to come - that God is with us every minute of every day.

Too bad a prayer alone isn't enough to get her ready for school. Getting a child ready to go back to school, though,



doesn't have to be stressful. It just takes a little advanced planning.

I'm far from an expert and I probably have a lot more back-to-school shopping seasons before I can become a seasoned veteran. But I have some experience between shopping for my own child and helping my niece get ready for the new school year.

Here's a quick list of what I've learned, and remember it's not just about filling lists and closets.

Don't be married to one store. Sure, you may find the perfect tennis shoes at one store, but "buy one get one half off" means very different things between

stores. We learned that the hard way this year. After buying socks and underwear at one store, we realized the third store had the same items for a fraction of the cost. We also learned that the store with the best deal on pencils doesn't have a great selection of backpacks and lunchboxes (and another tip, those metal water bottles that match the lunch boxes leak. You can get a better, plastic version for about \$5 at a dollar store).

Brands don't really matter when you're talking about supplies. You can buy the exact same markers from a generic brand as you can the name brand. I will ammend this to say I don't think there is a better







CONSIDER THE MANY ADVANTAGES OF DISTANCE LEARNING

Most Christian universities have opportunities for distance learning. Distance learning is gaining prominence among students eager to upgrade themselves for better career prospects. According to the U.S. Department of Education's National Forum on Education Statistics, virtual education is now part of the planning agenda of most organizations concerned with education and training.

The quality of distance learning has greatly improved in the past few years, as both students and educators have become more comfortable with the technology and as stories of best practices have been shared and duplicated.

While quality has increased substantially (and while many inferior programs have failed), it is still prudent to verify that the distance learning organization is fully accredited by the appropriate agencies. One valuable resource is AccreditedOnlineColleges.org. The goal



of accreditation is to ensure that education provided by institutions of higher education meets acceptable levels of quality

Accreditation in the United States involves non-governmental entities as well as governmental agencies.

Distance learning features a number of advantages. Perhaps the most relevant benefit involves the flexibility of when and where you participate. Other advantages include:

■ Accessibility for those living away from the training center

■ No waste of time or other resources in transport, commuting to a central location for each class

■ Flexibility to study in any convenient location with an Internet connection

■ Self-paced learning:

• Quickly browse materials you have already mastered, and concentrate time and effort in areas containing new information and / or skills

• Study materials at a personal speed and intensity, without having to wait for slower pace of the average classroom

- Flexibility to join conversations in the bulletin board areas at any hour, and to review your classmates' comments since the previous visit
- Just-in-time learning; more opportunities to study the most current material available
- Flexibility for those with irregular work schedules

Accessibility for those with restricted mobility (e.g., handicapped, in-

jured, elderly)

■ Accessibility for those with family responsibilities (e.g., parents with young children at home)

Recent research has shown that the most significant factor helping students to succeed -- or not -- in Web-based classes has been their ability to manage time

The more successful students reported spending 2 to 3 hours regularly each week for each hour of credit for a class. For example, a 4-hour credit class required a minimum of at least 8 to 12 hours of work each week of the semester to complete all requirements.

Without class lectures to spur a quick burst of activity to complete a project, for example, some students procrastinated through weeks of the semester, only to find themselves so far behind that they could never recover. Experts strongly recommend that you devise a typical weekly schedule so that you will have a general guide for allocating appropriate time to study.

Students share experiences

Getting started and pursuing a college education can seem like a daunting task, particularly if your job, location, time, and home responsibilities make attending a classroom challenging. However, when you take a step beyond the traditional classroom environment and consider distance education, the possibilities expand dramatically.

When several students who chose the online path to professional development shared their insights and experiences, they dispelled a few myths about distance learning. As you read their views, your ideas about trying distance learning may change, too.

We asked Gwen Ridley Robertson, a family child care provider, why she chose online [education] and her answer was simple, "I'm in my home all day and work from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. and online is so convenient. If I tried to get to class, by the time I drove and found a place to park, I would always be late."

Other students had different reasons for choosing distance learning. As a military spouse, Donna Britt travels with her husband and was not able to complete a degree at any one location. Jean Wright and Kathy Rogers both work fulltime and have families, one with high school age children and one with small children. Jean also lives in a rural location.

The Student Experience

These four people pursued degrees and expectations about what the courses would be like varied.

Gwen, who received her A.A., is now starting a B.A. degree. She did not expect the level of involvement she found. "I expected only e-mail communication, but the teachers helped me network beyond my own course with others and instructors were available to talk by phone."

Donna Britt, who received her Ed.D in Management of Programs in Child and Youth Services said what she discovered exceeded her expectations. "I realized that I can develop strong relationships with my fellow students without seeing them," she said. "Online courses opened up a whole new world of learning."

Jean Wright expected to be self-directed and to stay on schedule. She was pleasantly surprised that her expectations were easy to meet.

Online classes take dedication, planning, discipline

In general, successful online learners

- Good independent learners
- Disciplined about finishing class work
- Comfortable with technology
- Proficient readers with good comprehension
- Comfortable communicating online with professors and peers

Getting ready for class

Review the Honor Code, attendance policies, inclement weather guidelines, and other policies.

Technical planning

Make sure your computer is ready for online classes. Test your audio and video using the tools provided by technical support.

About a week before the semester starts, log into school's student management system with your ID and password to make sure you can access it. Your professor may upload your class before the semester starts, so you can explore the class space as well.

Set up your study space

Create a comfortable and quiet space where you can study regularly. Keep distractions and noise to a minimum. Put all your supplies--textbooks, notepaper, pens, etc.--in one place that's easy to access. If you don't have a good place to study at home, consider studying at a nearby library or in a quiet place at work.

Plan on spending 8-10 hours per week for each online class you're tak-

Locate online resources

Online schools have a lot of tools and resources to help you succeed in your studies, from tutoring to writing help and library services. Check out these resources before classes begin.

During the Semester

Check your syllabus for details about the class schedule, assignments and exams, textbooks, grading criteria, and contact details for your professor. If you're not sure about something, contact your professor right away.

Online class behavior

Schools want all students to have an opportunity to listen, learn, and participate in classes. To make this happen, they ask students certain guidelines and codes of conduct.

Tips for emailing your professor

In online courses, it's more important than ever to stay in contact with your professor. If you have technical difficulty, a family emergency, or any other issues that interfere with your ability to attend class or meet assignment deadlines, contact your professor as soon as possible to let the know.

Always use your school email account to contact your professor or any other school office.

Include the course ID in your email



subject line, like "ACCT 301 assignment question".

Use your time well

Make a schedule on a calendar or planner that includes due dates for assignments and exams. Schedule specific times to complete class work or study before exams. Don't wait to the last minute to submit your assign-

Study and homework tips

It helps to have a regular study time each day. Try to study in the same place, too. If you study for long periods, take a break each hour.

Don't procrastinate! Stick to your schedule. If you run into any trouble, contact your instructor as soon as pos-

Create a folder on your computer and name it with your course ID, like ACCT 301. Save all your assignments in that folder. If your professor does not have a specific file naming convention for assignments, use file names that will be clear to you. If you have to email a file to your professor, include your course ID and last name in the file

Kathy Rogers, who also is earning her degree in Early Childhood Education, said the video lectures that were part of her class enhanced the readings. "While watching the videos, I felt like I was a live participant in the class," she said, "because the readings and assignments fit together perfectly on the video."

Each student learned new computer skills including new software, like spreadsheets and how to download and upload assignments to the Web site. "I learned to adapt to the way each professor distributed materials and returned papers just like a student in a face-to-face class does," she said. In addition to learning new computer skills, Donna also became a more focused writer. "I had to be precise when I wrote, she said "because there are no visual clues or opportunities to clarify ideas through speech."

Time management became a family activity in Gwen's house. "Sometimes I did my homework with my children after supper," she said. This practice validated what she told them about their need to develop good study habits. "I have to study and so do you is the message," she continued, "and my children saw the pay-off when I received my degree."

Challenges Faced By Students

There were two primary challenges faced by these students:

Time management—Kathy remarked, "It is important to stick to your plan and not good to fall behind. The professors give you a realistic timeline and the class Web sites have all the assignments and discussion topics listed."

Participating in the student teaching process online differed from traditional classrooms—Jean said: "My mentor, who also worked in my agency, videotaped me in the classroom doing a specific activity. I sent the videotape to my professor who posted it on the Web site. Then I watched it with my mentor and professor and they offered feedback."



Insights

Students reflected about their distance learning experience. They realized that they have learned that:

They have the ability to succeed in an online environment.

Some people are independent learners—"In a traditional classroom, I probably would have been quiet and participated less in the discussion. But online there is no pressure to be called on, or worry that you will not be heard. I can participate in a different way—there is no time limit and I have access to the discussion all the time." (Gwen)

Advice for Potential Students

All the students agreed that distance learning was an enriching experience. They recommended:

- Trying an online course to see if you like it. Take a moment and review the selfassessment for online learning. This is one tool to help you decide if you want to try a course or earn a degree online.
- Asking for help with technology. The staff at school and people in technical support will be available to offer help with the online system.
- Being disciplined and carrying out assignments.
- Budgeting your time and asking your family to respect your time.

There are an ever-growing number of students nationwide who are taking online courses and reporting that the experience has enabled them to learn and also taught them something even more valuable—a better understanding about their own ability to succeed in the changing educational arena of higher education.

Greitens' past questioned

service, violating their Navy SEAL ethos and oath as "Silent Professionals"

- Missouri Right to Life endorsed his three Republican opponents—John Brunner, Catherine Hanaway and Peter Kinder—but did not endorse Greitens and is urging their supporters to not vote for him.
- Greitens opposed a Religious Freedom Amendment that all of his Republican opponents supported.

If you've been listening to radio, watching TV or surfing the Internet, you may have heard or seen his commercials and videos projecting a show of power and strength as a former Navy SEAL. From TV commercial showing him working out in a gym and beating a punching bag to blowing up Tannerite with an M4 rifle to pictures and footage of his two years during which he served as a Navy SEAL, Eric Greitens is everywhere.

As a St. Louis resident and former Rhodes Scholar, Navy SEAL, White House Fellow, author and founder of the non-profit, The Mission Continues—serving returning vcterans—Greitens is a newcomer to the Missouri political scene and a fundraising juggernaut. He calls himself a "conservative outsider" on a mission to challenge career politicians, fight corruption and root out political insiders and lobbyists whom, he says, have been controlling Jefferson City for decades.

"I Was Raised as a Democrat"

Greitens, by his own admission, grew up a Democrat. In 2010, Greitens was courted by the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee (DCCC) to run against U.S. Senator Roy Blunt (R) for the open seat that was being vacated by retiring former Senator Kit Bond. Greitens also attended the 2008 Democratic National

Convention. He drove to Denver with former Missouri Governor Bob Holden (D). Patriots for America contends that in their Navy SEAL community there are many who see Greitens as a political opportunist. They quote Holden, Greiten's friend, as saying he thought Greiten's party switch was driven by Koster's lock on the Democratic gubernatorial nomination in 2016. "To me, an Eric Greitens and a Donald Trump aren't in the same party," Holden said. "I think Eric made the calculation that the best way to become governor is to be the Republican nominee."

In an op-ed published July 13th of last year at foxnew.com, Greitens wrote, "I am a conservative Republican, but I didn't start out that way. I was raised as a Democrat." While many conservative Republicans in Missouri have accepted Greiten's party switch as sincere, others are wary of his recent history espousing liberal ideals.

According to the Patriots for America website at ericgrietens.com, quoting Politico, "Democrats remember Greitens supporting a House majority that was developing Obamacare." New York Congressman Steve Israel, who was the DCCC's recruiting chairman for the 2010 election cycle, said of Greitens, "He was totally in line with Democratic values."

In his 2009 book, The Heart and the Fist: The Education of a Humanitarian, the Making of a Navy SEAL, Greitens—who is Jewish—compares the Palestinian cause to the U.S. civil rights movement. Some observers think Greitens sees the Missouri governorship as a potential stepping stone to higher office. His positions on Israel—given his questionable comparison of the Palestinians' plight to the U.S. civil rights movement—might become an issue, if he wins the primary, especially given the strong support of

the Republican Party for Israel.

Big Money from Out-of-State Donors

Ten days out from the Republican primary, Greitens has raised about \$9 million. On July 18th, the Greiten's campaign reported to the MEC at mec.mo.gov the single largest campaign contribution in Missouri state political history. A Washington, DC based federal Super PAC gave the Greitens for Missouri candidate committee a \$1,975,000 contribution.

Kevin McDermott of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch reported on stltoday.com June 20th that the "SEALs for Truth, which was registered as a federal Super PAC in mid June, reported having no money on hand as of June 30th...Any money the committee receives after June 30th doesn't have to be reported until the third-quarter report, due Oct. 15th," long after the primary on August 2nd.

McDermott continues by saying, "In other words, the group received the \$1.975 million during roughly two weeks between July 1 and Monday [July 18th] when it donated the cash to Greitens."

The Post-Dispatch reported that "federal records list the name of the Treasurer, Nicholas Britt, for SEALs for Truth, with a Washington, D.C. post-office box, but a Creve Coeur phone number."

Dirty Money from Alleged Sex Offender

Greitens received a \$1 million campaign contribution from Silicon Valley California-based venture capitalist, Michael Goguen. He is accused in a \$40 million lawsuit of allegedly sexually abusing a woman which the lawsuit contends he held as a sex-slave for 13 years, beginning from when she was in her early 20s. Far from appearing as a frivolous lawsuit, numerous

news reports claim she has already been paid \$10 million by Goguen as alleged hush money.

Former presidential candidate, John Kasich, who received a \$250,000 contribution from Goguen in March, returned the contribution within hours of the story breaking. Greitens, however, has refused to return his \$1 million contribution he received from Goguen, saying he did not want to "pre-judge the outcome of the lawsuit."

During a gubernatorial debate televised throughout the State on July 12th, Greitens accused Brunner of being behind the Patriots for America website at ericgrietens.com. Greitens told Brunner "take responsibility for what you did." The developer of the Patriots for America website is a contractor for the Brunner campaign, which his campaign has admitted. Brunner, a former Marine, fired back during the debate by saying, "I had nothing to do with that Navy SEAL video."

Brunner also ended his closing statement at the debate by responding to Greitens, saying, "I refuse to be lectured by a guy who took one-million-dollars from the owner of a teenage sex slave. Eric, is there anyone you won't take money from? Have you no shame?"

Navy SEALs Oppose Greitens Candidacy

A group of 16 former Navy SEALs—made up of some who claimed to have served with Greitens—developed and reportedly contributed to a website named Patriots for America. Its Internet address is ericgrietens.com, a misspell of Greiten's last name with the "i" before the "e." Greiten's official campaign website is ericgreitens.com with the "e" before the "i"

The Patriots for America's mobile website homepage states "THIS AUGUST, ANYONE BUT GREITENS" and features a YouTube video titled, Eric Greitens: The Heart and the Myth. The video questions the veracity and truthfulness of some portions of Greiten's accounts of his military service. Greitens countered by releasing a video of his own posted on his campaign website at ericgreitens.com.

"Patriots for America is comprised of veterans from three different branches of service and was shocked to discover that the web of lies told by Eric Greitens reaches beyond his flip flopping political positions to a falsified and exaggerated military past."

Navy SEALs within the group say they oppose Greiten's candidacy, in part, because he violated their oath as "silent professionals." They explain that their ethos or creed is to not exploit their service for personal or political gain.

Missouri Right to Life Says "NO!" to Greitens

Greiten's campaign has issued a statement that Missouri should "promote life, protect innocent life and defend life." He also said, "I am opposed to embryonic stem cell research."

Yet, on July 13th, Greiten's received a

Missouri voters to fill 5 seats

Missouri voters will go to polls in the Aug. 2 primary to choose their party's nominees for the general election on Nov. 8. Five open seats – governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, attorney general and treasurer are up for grabs.


With two-term Gov. Jay Nixon (D) term limited, Attorney General Chris Koster (D) is the front-runner for the



Democratic nomination, with no serious competition. Koster is a former county prosecutor and state senator from Cass County who switched

parties before running for attorney general.

On the Republican side, four candidates are vying for gubernatorial nomination - two candidates with political experience and two outsiders. Three-term Lieutenant Governor Peter Kinder and former House Speaker Catherine Hanaway bring political experience and solid conservative records to the race.



ens. Brunner is a businessman and former Marine who narrowly lost the Republican pri-

mary for the U.S. Senate in 2012 to former Congressman Todd Akin, who was later defeated by Sen. Claire Mc-

Eric Greitens, a lifelong Democrat until recently, is a former Rhodes Scholar, White House Fellow, author and Navy SEAL. He later founded The Mission Continues, a non-profit organization that serves returning veterans. After attending the Democratic National Convention in 2008, he considered a Senate run in 2010 as a Democrat against Sen. Roy Blunt. Greitens says he became a conservative in recent years. He calls himself a "conservative outsider" on a mission to challenge career politicians and lobbyists whom he says have controlled Jefferson City for decades.

Bob Holden, a former Missouri

governor, is friends with Greitens, and it is reported they drove to the 2008 Democratic National Convention together. Patriots for America, a group of Navy SEALs, opposes Greiten's candidacy on its website at ericgrietens.com, according to a Politico report. Holden believed Greiten's party switch was driven by Koster's lock on the Democratic gubernatorial nomination in 2016. "I think Eric made the calculation that the best way to become governor is to be the Republican nominee," he said.

Despite his newcomer status as an outsider and his Democrat pedigree, Greitens leads all gubernatorial candi-



dates in fundraising, having amassed almost \$9 million leading up the primary. Most contributions have come from out of state, including a \$1 million donation from

California-based venture capitalist, Michael Goguen. According to multiple media reports, he is being sued for allegedly holding a former stripper as a sex-slave for 13 years. Former presidential candidate John Kasich returned a \$250,000 contribution to Goguen, but Greitens has refused to return his \$1 million, saying he "didn't want to pre-judge the outcome of the lawsuit.'

Penny Pritzker, President Obama's secretary of commerce, contributed \$25,000 to Greiten's campaign. Her cousin, Jenny Pritzker, who is called the world's first transgender billionaire, contributed \$50,000 to Greitens Sheldon Adelson, Las Vegas casino and hotelier billionaire, contributed \$200,000 to the campaign. Greitens says he is "opposed to embryonic stem cell research" but accepted a \$100,000 campaign contribution from Julian Robertson, a New York-based hedge fund manager who has been a major supporter of embryonic stem cell re-



itens did not receive their endorsement. The open seat for lieutenant governor is contested in the Democratic primary by former Missouri Congressman, Russ

Carnahan and State Rep-

resentative and Minister Tommie Pierson, Sr. Mike Parson, a former state representative and county sheriff faces conservative Republican Bev Randles. If elected, she would be the first African-American elected to statewide office in Missouri. Both Parson and Randles are endorsed by Missouri Right to Life.

Secretary of state is an open seat being vacated by Jason Kander, who is running for the U.S. Senate against incumbent Sen. Roy Blunt. Will Kraus of Lee's Summit, faces political newcomer Jay Ashcroft. Kraus is state senator for eastern Jackson and an officer in the Missouri National Guard. He also is a former state representative. Ashcroft lost a state senate race in 2014. He is the son of John Ashcroft, former governor, U.S. senator and attorney general. Both Kraus and Ashcroft are endorsed by Missouri Right to Life. On the Democratic side. Robin Smith, former news anchor

and reporter in St. Louis, is running against Bill Clinton Young and MD

Rabbi Alam, both of Kansas City.



The Republican primary for attorney general is one of the most fiercely contested in the state.

State Sen. Kurt Schaefer, a lawyer and former prosecutor who worked in the Missouri attorney general's office, faces Josh Hawley. He is a law professor at the University of Missouri and a lawyer who was a part of the team that prepared and argued the winning



Hobby Lobby case before the U.S. Supreme Court. Both Schaefer and Hawley are endorsed by Missouri Right to Life.

On the Democrat side, former Cass County Prosecutor Teresa Hensley faces St. Louis County Assessor Jake Zimmerman. He is a former state representative and worked as deputy chief counsel to Holden, as well as having served as a deputy attorney general.

In the race for State Treasurer, state Sen. Eric Schmitt is unopposed in the Republican primary. On the Democratic side, former state Rep. Judy Baker of Columbia faces Kansas Citian, Pat Contreras. He is a former diplomat in the U.S. State Department and has worked under Presidents George W. Bush and Obama. Baker is a former regional director for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services in the Obama administration. Schmitt is endorsed by Missouri Right to Life.

\$100,000 campaign contribution from Julian Robertson, a New Yorkbased hedge fund manager who has been a major supporter of embryonic stem cell research.

On July 22nd Missouri Right to Life sent their ad appearing in this issue of the Metro Voice to their supporters, emphatically urging those on their statewide distribution list to not vote for Greitens. MRL's Legislative Liaison, Susan Klein, told the Metro Voice that Greitens did not respond to their candidate survey or repeated requests to meet before MRL's deadline for their PAC to make endorsements. Brunner, Hanaway and Kinder all received endorsements from the Missouri Right to Life PAC. Greitens did

Opposed Religious Freedom Amendment

Greitens was also the only Republican candidate for governor to come out in opposition to Senate Joint Resolution (SJR) 39, a proposed amendment to the State Constitution. Kinder, Hanaway and Brunner all went on the record in support of it. The amendment passed the Senate after a 39-hour filibuster by Democrats, but failed in a House committee. It would have prohibited the state from imposing penalties on a religious organization whose officials act in accordance with a sincerely held religious belief concerning same sex marriage, which includes the refusal to perform a same sex marriage cere-

The measure would have also protected businesses from penalty that decline to provide goods of expressional or artistic creation for a wedding ceremony. Supporters of HJR 39 cited businesses that have been fined by state agencies in other states in excess of \$100,000 for refusing to provide services for same sex marriages. Opponents feared HJR 39, if enacted, would become a license for discrimination against the LGBT community.

Republican Rambo or Democrat Imposter?

One longtime conservative Republican, speaking on condition of anonymity, labeled Greitens a "fake" and "fraud" in his candidacy. "Greitens is politically ambitious imposter, exploiting his honorable military service and is falsely masquerading as a conservative to try and steal the Republican primary from real conservative candidates."

With 10 days left before the primary, Greitens has come from behind to take the lead, according to the most recent poll by Remington Research Group conducted on July 7th and 8th. He will be hard pressed to hold that lead among Republican primary voters without the endorsement of Missouri Right to Life. He also has liberal baggage to carry from his recent political past, including being the lone Republican candidate for governor to oppose the proposed Religious Freedom Amendment. Some of the liberals and litigated in his donor base may also dissuade Republican primary voters from supporting his candidacy on August 2nd.

An astute and longtime insider in Missouri politics wryly observed the irony-that "if Greitens wins the primary, the race for governor will be a Republican who used to be a Democrat (Greitens) facing a Democrat who used to be a Republican (Koster)."

Souza's "Hillary's America", the History Channel's "Breaking History" allows both sides of the man to be explored. Those who know him most personally share their view of him as a knowledgeable and loveable personality. Trump, they say, is the only man who can get the country back on track. For them, all you have to do is look at his children to determine his character.

Even the mainstream media covering the Republican convention in late July, exploded with accolades about how pleasant, hard-working, successful-and yes, normal-Trump's children are. For however people see Trump as flamboyant and excessive, his family is NOT the selfie-crazed, media obsessed Kardashian family. As for Trump's personal habits, viewers will be surprised to learn that Trump has never smoked or drank-a personal trait that would make many Christians blush.

"Breaking History" was filmed at the height of Trump's rise to the political stratosphere.

And while giving the viewer insight on his most controversial statements and detractors, it investigates the good

and the bad of the family business and how his own father's empire came to be. The documentary explores Trumps three marriages, business dealings and media run-ins—all the while giving you a sense of "Oh, yeah, I remember that," type of feeling when seeing old clips.

Trump may be the first reality TV star having been in the media for four decades with appearances on Letterman long before Trump headed up his own reality show "The Apprentice". From Oprah to every major news show, Trump has made his mark on America's media culture.

The film documents that rise. You see a Donald Trump that, amazingly isn't much changed from that of the late 1980s. You get a sense that Trump believes what he says, doesn't put on heirs to make vou believe he is someone other than he is.

He is still as brash today as in 1988. Same hair, same smile. Those clips from 30 and 40 years ago are amazingly prescient to his speeches today.

Surprisingly, "Breaking History" is not a hit job on Trump. Neither does it gloss over Trumps many failures. It is an honest assessment of who recent polls show may be the next leader of the free

through it.

Plan ahead. Sure, my daughter's shoe size grew overnight, but I discovered some of the shoes we bought last year still fit well enough for now. It's the same with a lot of her clothes. She's an in-between size, so I can keep her in a lot of the items she had last year. Be sure to go through last year's clothes before heading to the stores. Do some cost comparisons online to see which stores have the best deals.

Don't focus on personalized supplies. When our daughter started kindergarten, we wanted her to have the best of everything. The coolest pencils and the best markers. Then we realized they're not just for her. Many school districts will share supplies with the entire classroom. So those amazing My Little Pony tissues you bought are going to

go in a pile that the entire classroom can use.

■ Don't forget the consignment sales. Sure every store will start having end of summer sales and you can get cute T-shirts for \$6 on sale, but with consignment sales you can often find an entire outfit for that price. There are children's consignment sales twice a vear in Kansas City. and there are several different ones all over the metro. Parents can find great deals on shoes and clothes. We hit all of the sales each time they come around – in the spring and the fall. It takes some digging because some of the items are still priced high, but almost every sale also has a 50 percent off day. My daughter is probably 85 percent clothed by these sales.

Remember the daycare rules too. We're in a situation that requires us to have before-and after-school care for our daughter. We take her to daycare, and they drive her to school and pick her up. Daycare

rules say that she has to have her feet completely covered to play on the playground. While it's not realistic to assume my daughter – who may just be the next big fashionista – will wear tennis shoes every day of the year, I had to make sure she had a pair of shoes at daycare that would allow her to play outside with her friends.

Consider sending a sack lunch. I had no idea how much hot lunches cost when I was in school. Mom just gave me lunch money and I could eat lunch. What I learned last year is I can send my daughter a sack lunch every day for two weeks for less than paying the hot lunch every day for one week. Now, we did decide to put some money in her lunch account so we have that option on mornings that we just can't get our act together, but a lunchable, an apple sauce and a juice box (or one of the aforementioned water bottles) comes out to less than \$10 a week. We alternate between lunchables and PB&J for a little variety.

Get ready for the fundraisers. I had no idea how many times ✓ I'd have to hit up my friends and co-workers in kindergarten. While it's not part of back to school shopping, it's an important part of the school year. And if you have a child in sports, those fundraisers hit back to back to back all year. It's OK to not do all of them. Our school asks families who don't want to participate to donate a certain amount and opt out of them for the entire year. Just remember all those PTA activities that makes school so much fun have to be funded somehow.

Start a dialogue early with the teachers. As soon as I knew who my daughter's teacher was last year, I immediately looked her up on Facebook. I googled her. I wanted to know as much about the person who would be molding her mind for the next year. I did the same for her summer school teacher. I also

sent emails as soon as she was assigned a teacher. My daughter has been through a lot of heartbreak and it's important to me that her teachers know what she's faced in six short years. Every teacher has been thankful for the upfront information. As she gets more inolved in her school, and we know more of the teachers, I won't have to tell her story so much, and I'll have more knowledge of the teachers as we spend more time at the school.

BONUS:

Several organizations around Kansas City collect school supplies for families who can't afford it. Don't forget those families in need as you're school shopping. Consider filling an extra school supply list and donating it. It's a great way to teach children the importance of giving back.

ing racism not only requires preaching biblical truths, but further actions like making changes to some of the nation's structures and to the powers that be.

"True faith stands up for the oppressed and the broken," he wrote. "Obviously, many can't see the systemic

effects of racism and abused authority. Many can't see that racism has stained this country because they are privileged to not see it"

Lecrae was blunt when he

wrote, "They [some members of the white community] project blame on themselves when they see these kinds of posts. You assume my anger is at white people and not white supremacy."

The Grammy Award-winner im-

plored fans and followers to heed his point that racism is operating within many of the nation's infrastructures and that it must be killed at the root.

In a seemingly two-pronged approach the Texas native also published an op-ed in Billboard magazine in which he asserted that humility is a path toward racial harmony.

Still, in his Instagram post, the rapper

urged followers to strongly consider his position.

"If you ever trusted in anything I've said, if you've used my words to stir your hope or joy, then trust that same voice now. This [racism] is an

epidemic that school books or church services haven't taught you."

Lecrae concluded his post with the defiant message, "And listen if you really, really hate this post you are always free to unfollow me. I'll still love you."

dream of turning the vacant Park Lane Hospital into transitional housing for the homeless, many of whom had been living in pay-by-the-week motels. The hospital had been vacant for 10 years.

Wiley's dream recently became a reality when the first families moved in.

"It feels surreal, you know seven years of believing it was possible," he said. "We've helped hundreds and hundreds of families over seven years but we couldn't bring them here and give them a transitional place. But now we can so here we are in a former 150,000-squarefoot hospital dedicated to families living in homeless."

Wiley said the journey of transforming the abandoned building into apartments for needy families was long and hard but worth it.

There were many nights where halfway through this project I'd wake up in the middle of the night thinking what have I done because we had so many obstacles that seemed to be in the way. But over seven years I've watched obstacle after obstacle become removed," he

recalled.

"And so what it's done for me personally, it's changed my faith. And love compelled me to not talk way, to not give up, and to persevere so I say that it was love that caused me to push on," he

Families at River of Refuge live rent and utility free during their entire stay as a team of case workers provide them financial counseling.

While learning to break the cycle of homelessness, they can also save money and pay off debts.

An on-site pantry allows families to restock their kitchens with non-perishable food and there's a used clothing store where they can shop for clothing.

Program Director Stephanie Keck said rising unemployment and utility costs have forced many families out of their own homes, creating demand for programs like River of Refuge.

She said after opening in May, there is already a waiting list to get into the program.

'Within the first 24 hours I had close to 30 people calling for help," Keck said. 'Just in that first 24 hours and we still get on average probably 20 people a



week asking for help. This morning I had six people asking, 'Can I apply for your program?"

Michelle Robinson moved to Kansas City from Florida with her husband and two small children. Shortly after arriving, her husband's job fell through and River of Refuge gave was able to give them a lifeline.

"We were living in a hotel before here and the length of time just drained our savings and it was a matter of a week we were going to be in our van," Robinson said. "So it was by the grace of God that I found this place and were able to move in here and have a roof over our head."

Miraculous Giving

Wiley makes it very clear that the

massive project was completed by a host of volunteers, generous donors, and

"So much has happened where I had the idea of doing this but really it's not about me but all the people that have donated and believed in it," he said. "We had one company donate \$1.2 million for a new roof, all the materials, all the labor. Another company came and did \$300,000 to build out the 11 units."

"We had the UMKC, University of Missouri - Kansas City, gave us over 200 bunk beds, donated the first week we opened the hospital," Wiley added.

The Christian Broadcasting Network

(CBN) also played a huge role in the project. When CBN's Gordon Robertson saw Wiley's story on The 700 Club he invited him to CBN to learn more about the project.

Wiley left the meeting

with encouragement and the largest donation River of Refuge had received at that time.

"That gift that CBN gave grew and grew and grew and it's grown to be worth millions now of other contributions," Wiley said. "I think about the CBN partners that the families that are living here now and the hundreds of children and the families that will come here for decades to come will all be touched because of the generosity of CBN and its donors."

Meanwhile, Glynn admitted that he initially felt skeptical about the organization.

"I didn't even believe it was real," Glynn said. "When I got in here I was sitting here waiting on like, 'What's the catch? Are we gonna have to stand on the corner and sell candy or something

"But it wasn't a catch here they just genuinely want to see people do better," she said.

A Thankful Family

River of Refuge

For that reason Glynn's children expressed heartfelt gratitude for Wiley and all those who made it possible for their family to live at River of Refuge.

"Most of all it's not a lot of weight on my daddy because when we had to keep moving around, he had to pay the rent. And now here you don't have to pay

> rent but you have to save up money for your next house," 12-year-old My'Angel Glynn said.




for what they have helped us with and done for us," Dakota Glynn explained.

For now, 11 apartment units are complete and River of Refuge needs more financial help before it can bring in more families.

In the meantime, Wiley wants other pastors across the country to know that it doesn't take a lot of money to love a community in need.

What you have is the most incredible gift -- love attracts a crowd," Wiley explained. "I challenge my friends who love Jesus: Go find a motel family and don't try to fix all their problems. Just become their friends. Ask them what they need. Open your living room, open your checkbook. Love the people you

one another is a good start.

On July 11, Scott spoke on the importance of supporting police officers during this time. And on July 13, Scott shared his own encounters with police in a deeply personal and painful account of how he's been profiled because of the color of his skin, even as a U.S. senator.

Scott revealed law enforcement officers have pulled him over seven times during the span of one year as an elected member of Congress: "Was I speeding sometimes? Sure. But the vast majority of the time, I was pulled over for nothing more than driving a new car in the wrong neighborhood or some other reason just as trivial."

He later told of a time when a U.S. Capitol Police officer stopped him, assuming Scott was impersonating a member of Congress. Scott said a guard told him, "The pin, I know. You, I don't. Show me your ID."

"Later that evening, I received a phone call from his supervisor apologizing for that behavior," Scott said. "That is at least the third phone call that I've received from a supervisor or the chief of police since

I've been in the Senate."

Scott added he does not know many African-American men who do not have a similar story to tell, regardless of income level or profession.

His speeches stem from the recent police killings of two black men in Louisiana and Minnesota, both caught on video. During a peaceful protest in Dallas the following week, a gunman opened fire on police, killing five officers and wounding seven others. The shooter also wounded two civilians.

Scott's colleagues praised his messages. Senate Majority Leader Mitch Mc-Connell, R-Ky. said that Scott is an outstanding speaker. "We've all been listening."

McConnell's counterpart agreed. Senate Minority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., remarked after Scott's speech that he is tremendously impressed with his positive outlook despite troubling experiences, and praised his empathy as Americans grieve.

Scott proposed several ideas to help restore the trust between the African-American community and police officers. He said more officers need to wear body cameras so the American people can see the whole story. But he also advocated a police

shooting tracking system and said officers need better de-escalation training.

But Scott said real healing starts when families join together over a meal to have hard conversations.

"I'll continue to reach out to all my colleagues and my friends who may not look like me, who may have a different philosophy than I do, so that I can understand their hopes, their dreams, and their frustrations," Scott said. "Because listening is

important and as we look around at our nation, it appears to me that we haven't done nearly enough listening to each other."

One of Scott's best friends in the Senate, Sen. James Lankford, R-Okla., said he's been asking people all week if their family has ever had a family of a different race over to their house for dinner: "I was shocked by how many said no."

Together, Scott and Lankford are issu-

ing a new challenge they call "Sunday Solutions," asking families of different races to share a meal together and hear each other's stories

"We need one family from one race with another family from another race together. Not at a restaurant, but at somebody's house having conversations around the dinner table," Lankford told me. "That's where we start to make repairs."
