# Teen girl's brain death divides pro-life community

Medical experts disagree whether Jahi McMath is still alive

(WNS)--The sad case of a brain-dead girl in Oakland, Calif., took a new turn recently, when an ambulance transferred 13-year-old Jahi McMath to a long-term care facility. Although Mc-Math's family would not disclose the name of the facility, they say the girl will receive a tracheostomy and feeding tube. The move marks an end to a battle between the family and Children's Hospital and Research Center Oakland, which had been attempting to remove life support from an unresponsive patient they consider to be dead.

"Jahi is free! Jahi is free! She is safely out of Children's," tweeted Christopher Dolan, the family's lawyer.

The McMath case grabbed headlines and roused emotions from Americans, who either defended the hospital's attempt to remove the girl's ventilator or defended the family's effort keep her organs alive. Pro-life advocates, too, are divided: Some compare the case to that of Terri Schiavo, who was dehydrated and starved to death in 2005 after a lengthy court battle. Others say the key difference for McMath is that she has irreversible brain death.

'Someone who's truly brain-dead, barring a miracle, is not going to walk

# Homeless ministry celebrates 10 years helping needy

Hope Faith Ministries (HFM), an equipping day center that serves the needs of the homeless and less fortunate in Kansas City, is celebrating its 10-year anniversary in 2014.

Founded by a small group of individuals from Church of the Resurrection, the organization started by serving meals to as many as 800 homeless individuals each week. Ten years later, HFM serves 3,000 - 4,000 people weekly that have spent the night at a nearby shelter, out on the streets or at a neighborhood campground.

"Everyone involved with Hope Faith Ministries is marking 2014 as a year of celebration and gratitude.

"Those that have blazed the trail to get us to where we are today are to be commended for their valiant hard work and dedication to be a positive force in the community for the homeless," said Duane Skjervem, executive director of Hope Faith Ministries.

Over the years, HFM has expanded the services they offer so that today, not only do they provide the essentials of food,

shelter and clothing but they collaborate with dozens of agencies throughout Kansas City, assisting the homeless to find jobs, housing and needed government assistance. A free medical clinic and life skills classes enable the homeless to receive desperately needed medical attention and improve their skills so that they can more easily find a path from homelessness to self-sufficiency, from dependence to independence. Other services include showers, laundry services, haircuts and a shave at the barber shop, transportation, storage of belongings and personal mail and phone services.

Community donations of furnishings and household items allow HFM to help families move into an apartment, furnished with the essentials.

The premier program at HFM is their "Transitional Internship Program" where at any given time, over 40 individuals receive transitional housing and a personal mentor to help them navigate their way from the streets to employment and then on to independent living.

The 10-year grand milestone will be formally celebrated on Saturday, March 29 at their "Moonlight Masquerade Benefit Gala" to be held at the Overland Park Convention Center.

The Apartment Association of Kansas City is co-sponsoring this event. KMBC's anchor, Len Jennings will serve as master of ceremonies for the evening that includes an auction, dinner and dancing. For info visit www.hopefaithministries.org or call 816.471.4673, ext. 100.

# Nixon caps state of the state address with push to meet health, mental health needs, expand Medicaid

Missouri Gov. Jay Nixon is pushing ahead with Medicaid expansion in the state. The Missouri Legislature in 2013 refused the federal government's attempts to expand Medicaid to cover more people, creating a showdown with Nixon. The confrontation painted Republicans as heartless and Nixon as a big spender but did little to educate the public on the costs.

"Each day we don't act," Nixon said in his January state of the state address, "nearly 300,000 working Missourians go another day without the treatment they desperately need, for no other reason than they live in Branson instead of Bentonville, in Cape Girardeau instead of Cairo, in Maryville instead of Muscatine."


Missouri is one of over 25 states that are pushing back against what will become a nearly unfunded mandate. Nixon, who has supported the federal funding of the program, has not responded to requests for how he will pay for the billions in additional expense once the federal funding runs out. As it stands, the Obama administration is luring states into expanding the program with hundreds of billions in additional funding the first year, but that funding is reduced each year until only 5 percent is federally funded. Eventually, if

Missouri accepts the expansion, in future years historic tax increases would be necessary to replace the lost federal funding. This is an aspect that Nixon, and the media, have failed to share with Missourians.

But Nixon doesn't talk about future tax increases, rather implying the legislature is trying to punish Washington for Obamacare.

"The people who are suffering now as



a result of our failure to act don't work in the White House — they work the night shift in our factories," he said. "They wait tables and scrub floors. They drive snow plows and look after our kids."

Nixon even brought the Bible into the argument referencing Isaiah saying, "If you satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness and your night will become like the noonday."

The Republican controlled legislature doesn't seem likely to budge in 2014. The governor is responsible for the state budget and, as of yet, he has not spelled out who will ultimately pay for the expansion once the federal dollars dry up.

# Olympians for Christ

### Several of this winter's athletes find their true strength in the Lord

(WNS)—The Sochi Winter Olympics take center stage this month, complete with political intrigue, security concerns, and storylines about athletes going

for Olympic glory but, even more so, God's glory.

Speed skater Jilleanne Rookard says she came to faith in Christ while training for competition in 2006. Her faith is a source of strength and inspiration for the times when she feels like giving up: "I've just kept growing since then, and it's not anything sudden. I realize now that I'm never going to stop learning."

Bobsledder Brock Kreitzburg placed his faith in God at age 13, after losing his father to cancer. "God used the worst experience in my life—losing my father—to bring forth the best experience in my lifeknowing my Heavenly Father. God is the Father I can never Brock Kreitzburg says God used lose, who will be with me forever, and truly, unconditionally

loves me," Kreitzburg said. Kreitzburg, who earned a master's of divinity from Gordon Conwell Theological Seminary in 2003, competed in the 2006 Turin Olympics but missed the 2010 Vancouver Olympics with an injury. He is hoping to make the final cut on the 2014 men's Olympic bobsledding team.


Lolo Jones, a multisport athlete, will likely make the U.S. women's bobsledding squad after winning a gold medal at the 2013 World Championships. Jones, 31, competed in the 100 meter hurdles at the 2008 Beijing and 2012 London Olympics, but gained more than 20 pounds to qualify for bobsledding competition. She made headlines in 2012 when she

told HBO's Real Sports with Bryant Gumbel that she is a virgin and plans on keeping her virginity until marriage.

"This journey has been hard," she said at that time. "It's the hardest thing I've ever done in my life. Harder than training for the Olympics. Harder than studying for college has been staying a virgin before marriage." Iones often uses her Twitter account to share Bible passages and words of encouragement with her more than 370,000 followers.

Meanwhile, security concerns are growing in the wake of late-December suicide bombings in Volgograd, 400 miles from the Olympic facilities in Sochi. The second deadly terrorist attack of the month pushed the Russians to tighten

security by creating a 60-mile "security zone" around Sochi, All spectators wishing to attend the Games must provide passports and contacts for security

### **Congress Strengthens Religious Freedom for the Military**

(WNS)--The Senate passed a defense bill with strong bipartisan support last week that includes important language to strengthen and protect the religious freedom of military members and chaplains. The 2014 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) includes the standard provisions for funding the military as well as amendments that expand the protection of military members' religious freedoms, including their personal beliefs, actions, and speech. Specific language in the NDAA protects the freedom of military chaplains to "close a prayer outside of a re-




ligious service according to the traditions, expressions, and religious exercises of the endorsing faith group."

### **Government Tightens Reins on Nonprofits**

(WNS)--The Obama administration has proposed rules to curb political campaigning by nonprofit groups. The rules would prohibit certain nonprofit groups from campaign activities such as running ads, registering voters, or distributing campaign literature. The Department of the Treasury says the rules are designed to create "clearcut definitions" for nonprofit organizations that engage in political activity. Critics say the change would give the Internal Revenue Service broader leeway to target the White House's political opponents. The changes would affect groups with a 501(c)4 "social welfare" designation. Coincidentally, the new regulations would affect conservative groups in disproportionate numbers to liberal organizations by a margin of 9 to 1.

The White House responded by saying they are not targeting anyone in unequal numbers.




### Marriage must be part of poverty/income inequality debate

The organization behind National Marriage Week USA (February 7-14) makes the case that marriage must be part of the current political debate about income inequality and how to reduce poverty.

"Today 53 percent of all babies born to women under age 30, are born outside of marriage," said Sheila Weber, executive director of National Marriage Week USA. "If we had the marriage rates today that we had in 1970, we'd have 25 percent less poverty."


"The decline of marriage is our most neglected national emergency," says Weber. "Yet the wealthy are doing a better job at keeping marriages intact and their children are benefitting from the influence of both male and female parenting influence and from enriching educational habits in those homes.

"We must find ways to help impoverished single mothers learn more about how to enrich their own home life; and despite their current circumstances, to give their own children a vision that marriage can be in their future aspirations, because marriage brings greater financial stability,



better health, and brings the greatest advantageous way to in turn raise their own children."

"We need for ministries, non-profits, schools and churches to find ways to serve fatherless boys, who may not be getting any messages that marriage can even be an attainable goal for them. The pendulum has swung too far away from the historical cultural norm of dutiful manhood; we



need a radical change of message, thinking and habits to raise the next generation of young men. Of course, women also need some new messages -- that forestalling sexual intimacy and childbearing until marriage provides them a healthier future and is best for their children," said Weber.

National Marriage Week USA (Feb. 7-14) is a campaign to increase marriage education nationwide and provides the only

# Apple approves gay social app for ages 12 and up

Apple has approved a gay social networking app that claims to be safe for children as young as 12, and aims to lead adults, teens and tweens to places that are "clean, social and fun."

In the iTunes store, Distinc.tt is described as "an LGBT app that you can bring home to Mom!" But although it's supposedly safe for children as young as

12, it specifically states that it was created for "gay dating and chat" for LGBT or "curious adults" who are 18 and older.

The app reportedly works by using

The app reportedly works by using "real-time collective knowledge to connect trendsetting crowds and travelers to the places and people that best reflect their distinct interests."

CEO Michael Belkin told CNET that he launched Distinc.tt because he's "disgusted by the tasteless torsos and imagery on gay social sites and apps." And he wants "the good-taste part of the gay stereotype to gain traction with advertisers and cross the mainstream divide."

Belkin launched what is being billed as "the only gay social app approved by the iTunes store for 12-year-olds and older," with other investors that include PayPal cofounder Peter Thiel and Keith Rabois, a former executive at PayPal and LinkedIn, among others.

"Think of it as the ultimate gay accessory. Using an advanced recommendation engine, Distinc.tt helps you be spontaneous—to get out there and start something," reads the description.

"Distinc.tt takes gay apps to the next level by showing you more than just guys with phones. Use it to find places to go, meet people at those places, coordinate with friends while you're out, you name it. It's about doing, not chatting."

Apple, meanwhile, has been chided by conservative Christians over its censorship of religious material – namely apps that affirm marriage is between a man and a woman. In recent years, Apple has pulled the Manhattan Declaration, Setting Captives Free, and Exodus International apps.

### Thrivent Financial for Lutherans in hot water

### Lutherans react to firm's abortion funding

With the revelation that Thrivent Financial for Lutherans has provided funding to at least four Planned Parenthood affiliates as well as to the NARAL Pro-Choice Minnesota Foundation, The St. Louis-based Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) has told their members they are very concerned.

The statement acknowledged that Thrivent not only has suspended funding for pro-life, nonprofit organizations serving women and children in need, but now also directly supports organizations providing abortion services and pro-abortion

On Dec. 19, after learning that a Planned Parenthood affiliate was eligible to receive funding through its Choice Dollars program, Thrivent "temporarily suspended" one pro-choice and more than 50 pro-life organizations from receiving Choice Dollars funding while it conducts "a comprehensive review" of the program.

The latest allegations relate to a sister funding program known as "Gift Multiplier" that's available to Thrivent employees through the Thrivent Financial for Lutherans Foundation.

Details about the Gift Multiplier program were brought to light by Rev. Michael Schuermann, senior pastor of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Sherman, Ill., who said he "was contacted by some people associated with Thrivent who were familiar with the fact that this was going on."

The informants shared documentation of the Gift Multiplier funding that

Schuermann posted to his website, daringlutheran.net.

The documentation lists five Planned Parenthood affiliates in Columbus, Ohio; Des Moines, Iowa; Milwaukee; New York; and St. Paul, Minn., as well as the NARAL Foundation in St. Paul as Thrivent Gift Multiplier charities.

After Schuermann posted the information online and alerted LCMS leaders to the news Jan. 15, it was picked up and shared by other websites as well as numerous Facebook and Twitter users.

Schuermann said it's disappointing, sad and "frustrating to see Thrivent — an organization that puts itself forward as Christian and Lutheran — engaging and giving money to organizations that really, as Christians, we just cannot support."

Many LCMS congregation members are among the 2.5 million members of Thrivent Financial for Lutherans, a Minneapolis-based, Fortune 500 fraternalbenefits organization with more than \$75 billion in assets derived primarily from Lutherans over the past 100 years. Thrivent members voted last year to open the organization's membership to all Christians, which took place in June.

According to its website, Thrivent is "faith-based" and its "common bond" is

In a statement on Jan. 15 Thrivent responded: "We are aware of the issue that has been raised, and we will address it as we review this program."

Maggie Karner, director of LCMS Life Ministries, said all of the suspended prolife organizations "already do wonderful mercy work, with limited resources, to serve women, children and families in need. They include LCMS Recognized Service Organizations, maternity homes, pregnancy resource centers, pro-life educational organizations, ultrasound services for pregnant women and organizations providing free resources."

The Rev. Dr. James Lamb, executive director of the national pro-life organization Lutherans For Life (LFL), noted that "Thrivent claims to be 'neutral' on 'controversial issues' and yet they have once again closed the door to Lutherans For Life and other life-affirming ministries to receive Choice Dollars."

In a statement, LCMS said they are in a conversation with Thrivent regarding the controversial donations and have a goal to resolve the issue in a way that upholds the sacred value of human life.

'We urge them to follow those words with action by restoring funding to the pro-life organizations that lost funding in December and by developing a policy that denies all funding for Planned Parenthood and NARAL Pro-Choice Minnesota Foundation."

The statement also encourages Thrivent members to "voice their concerns and opinions directly to Thrivent," and provides contact information to help them do just that.

### **Christianity's Worst Enemies**

(WNS)--A U.S.-based group tracking persecution around the globe has named North Korea the worst country in the world for Christians. Open Doors USA on Jan. 8 gave the hermetic country the dubious designation for the 12th straight year-as many years as it has compiled the annual World Watch List of top 50 offenders. The organization estimates North Korea's communist regime has between 50,000 and 70,000 Christians imprisoned in labor camps for their faith. Open Doors unveiled its World Watch List (WWL) during a press conference at the National Press Club in Washington, D.C. The group measures how much Christians are able to live out their faith to determine what countries land on the list. It considers spheres of private, family. community, national, and church life, plus a sixth An escaped North Korean sphere counting violent incidents.

### **More Publishers Investigate Mark Driscoll**



(WNS)--At least two more Christian publishers are investigating concerns of plagiarism regarding Mark Driscoll, pastor of Mars Hill Church in Seattle. Crossway, which published Driscoll's Death by Love, issued a statement saying, "We are in touch with Mars Hill and are conducting an internal review to ensure that our books published by Mark Driscoll have proper citation and documentation." Crossway publicist Janni Firestone added, "As of right now, we're not sure when the internal review will be complete." Driscoll has published nine books with Crossway.

### **Amarillo College Nixes Intelligent Design Class**

(WNS)--Is intelligent design too controversial to teach at a public college? It is, apparently, in Amarillo, Texas. In fall 2013, Amarillo College planned to offer a class entitled "Evolution vs. Intelligent Design" as one of its continuing education courses. The class was not part of the school's degree programs, but a not-for-credit elective course. It was advertised under the heading of "Philosophy." Dozens of eager students signed up. Yet when the president of an Amarillo-based group of atheists and agnostics complained, the college reversed course. Top school officials canceled "Evolution vs. Intelligent Design," saying the topic was too "emotionally charged" and could invite a "disruption" in the classroom.

# Suit alleges the will of Missouri voters ignored

### Citizens sue over same-sex couples filing together

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. (BP) -- Four Missouri taxpayers filed a lawsuit on Jan. 8 challenging Gov. Jay Nixon's executive order to permit some same-sex couples to file a Missouri combined income tax return as "husband" and "wife" for 2013 in spite of a 2004 state constitutional amendment which defines marriage as between one man and one woman.

The lawsuit challenges Executive Order 13-14 as being unconstitutional and alleges



that the governor is trying to thwart the will of the people of Missouri, with 71 percent of the voters having adopted "Amendment 2" in 2004. The amendment, now codified as Article 1, Section 33 of the Mis-

souri constitution, says simply, "That to be valid and recognized in this state, a marriage shall exist only between a man and a

Nixon's executive order was issued last November and directed the Department of Revenue to accept combined returns from same-sex couples who properly filed a federal joint return with the IRS. The IRS has decided to permit same-sex couples to file a joint federal return if the parties were married in a state that permits same-sex

The IRS decision did not bind state governments and did not mandate that states like Missouri, where same-sex marriage is unlawful, permit joint returns under state

"The governor took an oath to uphold the Missouri constitution, which includes our marriage definition," said Michael Whitehead, a Kansas City attorney for the plaintiffs. "When he issued this order, he said he hoped the people of Missouri would take another look at recognizing same-sex 'marriage.' That is putting his thumb on the scales of justice. His job is to enforce the constitution as it is, not as he wishes it to be.

"If the governor wants to launch a campaign to repeal this section of our state Bill of Rights, he is welcome to try. But for now, the people of Missouri have spoken, with landslide clarity," Whitehead said. "Until the people speak otherwise, the gov-

ernor should respect the rule of law and respect Missouri voters.'

The plaintiffs ask the trial judge to declare the executive order unconstitutional and to declare that, in view of the state constitution, the Department of Revenue must not interpret tax laws to permit Missouri combined income tax returns from same-sex couples who were "married" elsewhere.

The plaintiffs are: Justin Mosher, pastor of Fifth Street Baptist Church in Hannibal, Mo.; Don Hinkle, director of public policy for the Missouri Baptist Convention and editor of The Pathway; Kerry Messer, Festus, Mo., founder of the Missouri Family Network; and Joe Ortwerth, executive director of the Missouri Family Policy Coun-

At the time of Nixon's executive order, no other state where same-sex marriage is unlawful had adopted a similar policy of accepting joint state returns from same-sex couples who were "married" elsewhere. In Kansas, a same-sex couple recently filed a lawsuit demanding that the state accept their joint state tax return as a matter of "equal protection of the laws."

# **Californians petition against coed bathroom bill**

(WNS)-The coalition working to overturn a law forcing boys and girls in California's public schools to share school bathrooms, showers and locker rooms is gaining momentum.

Opponents of a law forcing boys and girls in California's public schools to share school bathrooms, showers and locker rooms have reached the 95 percent validity rate needed to achieve a random sampling for a full signature count.

Privacy for All Students (PFAS) predicted that a full check would result in many more signatures being validated than were projected in the sampling and lead to qualification of the referendum for the ballot. Many critics had predicted that PFAS would not be able to collect sufficient signatures in the short period allowed to qualify a referendum and that not enough of the signatures presented in November would be validated to allow for a full count.

"The people of California are entitled to have every valid signature on this referendum counted by elections officials," says Gina Gleason, the referendum proponent and a member of the PFAS ex-

ecutive committee. "We're pleased that the sampling of signatures conducted thus far has triggered a full count of every signature, and we believe this full check will show we have enough signatures to qualify the referendum to the ballot.

# Kennedy says concerned groups must 'come together' to oppose legalziation of marijuana

(WNS)-President Obama admits smoking marijuana as a young person and his memoirs alude to smoking crack but recently stated he considers it no worse than smoking cigarettes or using alcohol. Eight-term former Congressman Patrick Kennedy disagrees.

He said the president ought to consult with the National Institutes of Health. Kennedy formed a group called Smart Approaches to Marijuana and his executive director is Kevin Sabet, who says the president gave "mixed signals."

"The media is running with it to try and interpret it as saying that this is more momentum for the legalization of movement, and unfortunately the big money interests that want to legalize," Sabet tells OneNewsNow.

He also advises there are new corporate conglomerates that have formed since legalization has started "because they want to make money off of this. They are running with it."

Patrick Kennedy, youngest son of late Sen. Ted Kennedy, has said he is a recovering alcoholic and struggled with addiction to prescription pdrugs. He served in Congress from 1995 until 2011 in Rhode Island's 1st District.

Sabet says Kennedy feels that it is a shame, and the President's

wording is unfortunate, because young people are now more encouraged to use the drug, which is much more potent than when Obama was a young man.

"The "game plan" is that Smart Approaches and other parents groups, and coaches and parents, "come together and defeat these initiatives in these states."

Oregon and Alaska will be voting on marijuana use while Washington and Colorado have already legalized it. In Missouri a petition is under way to get it on the ballot in 2014.

### Holy Land draws visitors despite media portrayals

Many of the hundreds of thousands of Christians who visited Israel in 2013 described the experience as an incredible way to enhance their faith. However, many may never make a Holy Land pilgrimage due to how the mainstream media portrays Israel.

"Unfortunately, the state changed the sampling process a few years ago to save money, resulting in many more signatures being improperly invalidated," says Karen England, a member of the PFAS executive

"With a full check, every signature is verified by elections officials, and we expect that process will result in thousands of more signatures being found to be valid. When all the signatures are examined, we believe that we will have enough valid signatures to qualify for the ballot."

'We want to make sure that every signature is properly examined and that no signature is invalidated for trivial or bureaucratic reasons," Gleason says. "We will continue to carefully monitor the process."

PFAS also notes that many proponents of the new law are acting as if the law has gone into effect. The law was suspended with the submission of signatures by PFAS in November.

I think there are three key factors when it comes to teaching children of any age about these conceptshumility, gratitude and contentment. In my mind, humility is where gratitude comes from, and gratitude leads to contentment.

I'm generous to my adult children, but they have no sense of entitlement. That's due to their personal humility. They don't feel that I owe them anything, and they already know that anyone who cops an entitlement attitude gets cut off. You're no longer qualified for my generosity when you lose your gratitude.

You've got to spend time talking to kids about these things. Otherwise, you run the risk of them counting on the income. Here's an example. We coach some family businesses at my company, and the best

family businesses are the ones that teach non-employee family members who receive money from the business—dividends from the profits—never to live on those dividends. I've seen lots of cases where someone will start living on the business they don't work in, and they immediately start feeling entitled to the

The same principle applies in your situation. If someone starts saying, "Well, since mom and dad are paying for our daycare, we can use that money we would have spent to buy a car." That means they've started counting on mom and dad's generosity to live, and that's a form of entitlement mentality.

None of our kids receive any kind of financial help from us at all, unless they're already carrying their weight in their own lives. That's not being cold. It's teaching responsibility and self-reliance. Now it would be different if one of them developed a serious medical issue or something like that. But the whole idea that mommy and daddy have lots of money, and I can just get some from them? That doesn't fly in our fam-

You have to teach them character and giving in order for them to be valid recipients. Plus. it's all about the kids' attitude. But you've got to talk about it often and communicate the value system out loud. The gifting and generosity are contingent upon the humility that leads to gratitude that leads to content-

Managing personal finances isn't always learned in school, and unfortunately, isn't always learned at home either. Perhaps it is because it seems too simple, beneath us to even have to talk about. Yet, managing personal finances well seems to elude many

people. They may find themselves making bad financial decisions. getting into debt and falling further behind each month. Here are some simple suggestions for getting off to good start in life financially:

1. Have a budget and live within it. While having a budget may seem restrictive, it actually gives you freedom - freedom to control your money rather than your money controlling you. There are lots of great budgeting resources available on-line and many are free. Here is a link to a review of seven such budgeting sites: http://www.kiplinger.com/slideshow/BudgetingSites2010/1.html

2. Make generosity a priority in your budget. As counterintuitive as this may seem from a secular perspective, there is a Biblical principal at work here that holds true. Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously. The rewards reaped from a generous life extend far beyond just financial returns.

3. Make savings a priority in your budget. Savings doesn't usually just happen - it needs to be planned. Save for specific goals (car. down-payment on a home. college, vacations, retirement, etc.) as well as for unforeseen expenses. For retirement savings, take advantage of employer sponsored retirement plans and Individual Retirement Accounts. Start as early as possible to take advantage of the power of compound-

4. Avoid consumer debt, especially credit cards. You will almost certainly spend more if routinely using credit cards rather than only spending money you already have. Instead of borrowing for things you want, save ahead and buy only what you can afford in cash. Instead of borrowing for college, actively seek out scholarships, and combined with any assistance you get from your family, work your way through.

5. If or when you own a home, consider a 15-year mortgage instead of 30-years. The payment on a 15vear mortgage will of course be quite a bit higher than on a 30-year mortgage, but you will pay significantly

> less in interest over the life of the loan.

6. Develop daily disciplines like Bible study, healthy eating, and exercise. You may ask what does this have to do with finances. Actu-

ally, quite a bit. Disciplines in one area tend to spill over into other areas of life, plus the Bible is loaded with financial wisdom.

7. As you get established, make sure you have a will and have adequate insurance coverage in place.

8. Have written goals - You are far more likely to be successful if you have a plan to get there.

9. Invest in yourself - learning should be a lifetime endeavor and doesn't always have to be in a formal classroom setting. It can be as simple as reading several books each year. By investing in yourself, you become more valuable to the marketplace increasing your earning power.

10. Strive for balance in life, realizing that life is not just about possessions. Keep 1 Timothy 6:17 in mind which instructs us not to put our hope in wealth, but to put our hope in God, who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment.

The recent Phil Robertson Duck Dynasty controversy brought it up again. Bill O'Reilly quoted it on Fox News; Don Lemon quoted it on CNN. The favorite

verse of the Bible referenced in the public sphere is Matthew 7:1, "Judge not, lest you be judged." The Bible's most misinterpreted, misused and misunderstood scripture verse is once again in the forefront of our public discourse.

What makes the verse so important is it teaches a crucial truth about human relationships. If this verse is used incorrectly much damage can occur and people can get unnecessarily hurt. Jesus teaches a very important and helpful principle which is there is a crucial balance between harmful judgmentalism and necessary judging.

Judgmentalism is when we condemn others. Jesus uses the imagery of a speck of wood in your friend's eye versus a log in your own eye (v. 3-5). The message is vivid, shocking and ludicrous. Before you judge someone else for their small imperfection make sure you first have dealt with your own big imperfection. While condemning others we don't see our own shortcomings. We can judge visible sins like adultery or cheating but minimize less visible sins like envy or gossip. We may even point out the faults of others to shift the focus from our

own sin.

Judging and condemning are always easy to do but they are not our job. It is hypocritical to see the sins of others but not our own judgmental attitude. When we have such an attitude we have forced out love. Judgmentalism invites retaliation and hin-

ders fellowship. Many times we may know only part of the story and we certainly do not know a person's motives. The non-Christian will bristle at a condemning attitude almost every time. Love has won



over many people, condemnation has won over very few.

The opposite extreme of judgmentalism is naïve acceptance of anything. Right after Jesus talks about specks and logs he talks about dogs and pigs (v. 6). His point is animals can't discern what is of value. The early church used this verse to teach judgment in whether someone was in fact a true believer. There is a place for necessary judging. Judging is the exercise of critical thinking and it is needed on occasion. In fact Jesus said in John 7:24, "Don't judge by appearances, judge by what is right." Jesus is telling us we should express our opinion on right and wrong, truth and lies, good and evil.

Judging is using wise discernment. Some quote Matthew 7:1 to denounce anyone who would expose the sins, shortcomings or error of others. If in the public realm a Christian leader speaks out about moral behavior or even simply answers a media question he or she may be charged with judging. It is ironic in judging someone for judging, you are in fact judging him or her!

We are not to judge on appearances or hearsay. In order to properly judge, correct or discipline all the facts must be available and evaluated. With proper discernment we can make appropriate judgments. We cannot fail to make essential distinctions between right and wrong simply because we fear the accusation of judging.

People make judgments every single day. The idea we should not judge is simply unrealistic. The better question is what is the standard for judging. For a Christ-fol-



Senior advisor to President Obama, Valerie Jarrett, wrote for the White House blog and The Huffington Post that, "A Woman's Health Care Decisions Should Be in Her Own Hands, Not Her Boss's." I couldn't agree more.

Odd then that the administration is trying to insert bosses, many of them against their deeply held religious beliefs, into the private health care decisions of women. Jarrett writes that, "The ACA (Affordable Care Act) was designed to ensure that health care decisions are made between a woman and her doctor, and not by her boss, or Washington politicians."

In fact, the administration has done the opposite. It has forced employers to act as middlemen between women and their doctors by forcing them to participate in providing four potentially life ter-

minating drugs and the whole gamut of FDA-approved contraceptives, even when they object on religious grounds. And then it thrust the issue right into the portfolio of Washington politicians by making it an election wedge issue, by using it to stoke partisan bickering, and by peddling lies about a "war on women."

Look no further than the Little Sisters of the Poor, the first of the non-profit plaintiffs to reach the Supreme Court to know that the Health and Human Services (HHS) mandate hurts women. Their complaint is proof that women are not some monolithic block robotically reacing affirmatively anytime the administration tacks the word "reproduction" onto a controversy.

Jarrett went on to write:

"A group of for-profit companies are currently suing to gain the right to deny employees access to coverage for birth control and contraceptive care, which are used by the overwhelming majority of American women in their lifetimes. Among the first cases to reach the Supreme Court is one filed by Hobby Lobby, an arts and crafts chain whose owners want to be able to take the option for birth control benefits away from their employees."

The fact is, however, Hobby Lobby, which employs 25,000 people, already covers and will continue to cover 16 out of the 20-FDA approved contraceptives mandated by HHS. The only four forms of contraception not covered are the four, which the government itself concedes can act to prevent implantation.

The owners of Hobby Lobby, the Green family, are Christians who cannot violate their religious beliefs by being complicit in the destruction of humanlife, at any stage. The government has already exempted--for commercial and other reasons--over 100 million Americans from having to comply.

Imagine the gall of asking the government to be exempt from a policy that requires employers to facilitate those drugs because of religious objections. But according to Jarrett, that's not gall, that's trying to "seize a controlling interest over the health care choices of women."

Hobby Lobby doesn't strike me as a company trying to seize anything. On the contrary. Its owners pay full-time employees 80 percent above the minimum wage, they close all stores on Sundays, and they offer medical benefits such as an on-site free clinic at its headquarters.

For the same reasons the Greens can-

# Black History: State of affairs and state of mind

# A challenge to renew our focus

It's impossible to listen to commentary about the state of affairs concerning black America and not form an opinion. This will not be your typical article on black history. I'm going to take a different approach, one that attempts to point out an empirical thing that we can remedy as a people still striving to fulfill the promise of the God we serve in Christ and the dreams our ancestors had for us. By using the definition above I'll attempt to provide some clarity by defining institution as a state of mind, and I'll call for an exodus away from the mindset. We cannot continue to look to institutions, no matter how evolved, for answers

The primary function of any type of institution is to govern in some form. People

look to the authorities and seek guidance, counsel, permission and ultimately favor from the leaders. We were brought here as powerless people, and we were liberated by the bold actions of abolitionists, a president of conviction and the blood of countless soldiers. During the Civil Rights Movement, we compelled the government to give us equal treatment. In short we were reformers of the status quo, not dependent on it. In our battle to secure rights and privileges from the institution of government, we, especially as Christians, must ask ourselves if we have become dependent on it. The institution has helped us, but it is not our liberator.

I was once privileged to sit in on a training by Tom Pomeranz who once said, "An institution is not a place; it's a state of mind." During the training he spoke of institutions in a profound way -- as a way of thinking and acting by the people who depend on it and those who provide services and instruction to those they are entrusted with. These three characteristics were evident:

- 1. Belief in segregation (Certain people should be kept away from others.)
- 2. Belief in limiting choice (Certain people can't handle decision making.)
  - 3. Belief in limiting privacy (A mindset

that encourages and tolerates intrusion.)

I cringed when I heard these words. I knew it to be true. In some ways we were all institutionalized in regards to our thinking regardless of race. But slavery had a profound impact on blacks traumatizing generations to come. It scarred the soul of the oppressor and oppressed. Martin

Luther King attacked the institutions of the day that promoted the belief in segregation, limiting choice and violating the most

basic private rights of our people. The government upheld and codified these approaches into law and enforced them with vicious brutality.

I am thankful this is no longer the case, but I lament the current state of affairs so many Black are disproportionately ensared in poverty, fatherlessness, addiction and skyrocketing incarceration rates. The statistics stagger the mind and stoke the compassion and anger of any person with character. I'm thankful that many good people are working to remedy these things, but we have a long way to go.

One final note for all believers, the institution of government is asserting itself by limiting choice, violating privacy and segregating people along political lines, creed and dividing by race (covertly). This approach has accelerated since 9/11 and after the financial crisis of 2008, it went to another level. There seems to be no end in sight. However, I am looking to a kingdom not fashioned by the hands of men to empower me. How about you? I invite you to renew your focus.

lower the Bible is the authority for right and wrong. We judge not based on our own opinions but rather based on God's opinion.

It does the cause of Christ no good if people feel condemned by those who should love them. On the other hand truth must be proclaimed. A Christ follower cannot be fearful to speak about right and wrong. To be intimidated, to be marginalized, to be silenced for speaking the truth can never be tolerated. Properly interpreting Matthew 7:1, understanding its balanced message and applying it consistently is needed in the church, communities and culture.

an on-site free clinic at its headquarters.

For the same reasons the Greens cannot be party to four life-terminating drugs, they cannot deprive their workers of a decent wage, a day of rest, and access to good health care. And that reason would be their Christian faith The government should be ashamed of its treatment of Hobby Lobby. The Obama administration has dragged a respectable company owned by principled people into the town square for a verbal and legal tar and feathering, solely because of their religious beliefs.

Right now, the legal opposition to the HHS mandate--led by the lawyers at the Becket Fund for Religious Liberty--is the

largest class-action religious liberty lawsuit in American history. The number of plaintiffs is 300 and growing by the day.

In trying to legally squeeze out those family businesses owned by people who conduct their affairs according to moral and religious principles, the government's behavior begs the question: What controlling interest are they after?

# Planning for success month-by-month guide

In any endeavor of life, failure to plan is planning to fail. This is especially true when it comes to a group retreat. The timeline for retreat promotion and registration may be several months. Below is a sample timeline:

**Four months:** Church establishes a "Camp Coordinator." The coordinator will want to ask for volunteers to be responsible for the areas of finances, registration, promotion, program, site selection, food, etc. There is truth to the sentence: Many hands make light work. Leaders need to remember when asking people to serve that the benefit to serving is the personal relationships that develop within the church.

Three months: Retreat centers website such as Tall Oaks has a promotional kit on line for their groups to use for newsletter articles and bulletin inserts. Coordinator needs to publish dates early so families can schedule their vacations around the retreat. The youth coordinator needs to host a meeting with parents to provide financial deadlines and early bird discounts, camp schedule, travel details, etc. and provide time for parents to ask questions. A youth coordinator needs to be sure that financial guidelines are clear and offer incentives to register early. Leaders need to promote retreats on social media such as facebook and twitter.



Promotion needs to be unpredictable and colorful!

**Two months:** On a Sunday morning or in Sunday school class, have past attendees share their personal testimonies concerning retreat experience from previous year. This will increase interest and increase the possibility of donations of scholarship money. Pictures are worth a million words. The promotion leader may ask past attendees to email pictures of the previous retreat or camp to the coordinator to organize a power point slide presentation for viewing before, during or after the service. The coordinator needs to make a special effort to personally invite stu-

dents or adults. This can make all the difference in their decision to come.

**One month:** The registration leader may organize a "Retreat/Camp Sunday" including a church member who is a notary on hand to finalize registrations. The leader may also organize a pancake breakfast or a bakede potato luncheon on that day to provide awareness for others to pray for the students who are to attend camp.

**One Week After:** Ask students to share about their experience at camp. Fellow members and parents will be much more willing the following year to support you in your efforts when seeing students' lives changed and enthusiasm!



spond. In return, they may even invite their friends to the event as well.


Social media can keep your event alive

# How to plan a retreat of silence

One of my favorite things to do during the summer, besides lie by the pool, is to go on a Retreat of Silence (ROS). Before all of the extroverts quit reading because I used the words "retreat" and "silence," relax and keep reading because I, myself, am an extrovert. In extrovert language, I prefer to call it "Spending the Day with God," but InterVarsity refers to it as an ROS. It's an extremely helpful way to reflect on the year and see how God has been present and what things he has taught you.

I call mine "Spending the Day with God" because I'm not always silent during mine. And you don't have to be either. The point of an ROS is to set aside an extended period of time to engage with God and rest in him. It does not mean that you have to check yourself into a monastery and take a vow of silence all day (although you can if you'd like and I bet that'd be fabulous). But it is an experience that you plan in order to intentionally connect with God in a more intimate and private way than you normally might.


it. Campfires are fun, but have something planned (like a good storyteller with a meaningful story who can lead a discussion) or you run the risk of extroverts dominating in ways that are unproduc-

Other activities you might consider for the retreat include action-oriented ones such as hiking and playing team sports. Following these, you might want to discuss the issue of competition among men. Quieter workshops might include journaling, goal-setting, or discussions related to being a father, husband or son. Retreats are also good times to reflect on the men's programming at your church, or to plan a men-oriented worship service at your congregation.

I always prefer to have a cook who is not participating in the program so all of the participants can concentrate on the workshops and activities. Then again, cooking together can also be good programming as long as it doesn't take the whole time or adversely affect the group unity by continually pulling some

guys away. I prefer to find a retreat center or camp with nice indoor space as well as a good outdoor environment.

If you have guys younger than 30, it's important to be very intentional about making sure they feel included. It's common for older, more experienced participants to steer the programs or discussions toward mid-life issues; just remember that younger men have different struggles, and they're probably looking to older men for guidance and wisdom. Share your wisdom!



Father/son attendees can be very powerful, unless they start to dominate with their fierce, unexamined issues and turn the retreat into a therapy group. Young sons can be both very welcome and a distraction, depending on many factors, so they are really a wild card.

Leave some time at the end of the retreat to evaluate the whole thing and set in motion a planning team for the next one. Don't be discouraged if only a few come to the first one; some guys need to hear good reports before they'll take the step of committing a whole weekend. So if you've had a good experience, sing it from the mountaintop when you get back to your congregation.

# **APPLAUD HOLLYWOOD DISCOVERING THE BIBLE**

### Son of God hits theaters Feb. 28

Building upon a growing interest in faith-based productions, the creators of the successful television miniseries "The Bible" will take the message of Christian faith to moviegoers with a full-length feature film Feb. 28. The film is being released by 20th Century Fox.

The movie portends a revival of Hollywood turning to the scripture for inspiration, as other Biblical accounts are being readied for the big screen.

Combining previously aired and unused footage from the 10-part "The Bible" miniseries, "Son of God" will run more than two hours. The studio is banking on its TV popularity, which shocked many

when its two-hour finale, broadcast in March on the History Channel, earned blockbuster ratings.

About 13 million viewers tuned in to the show's finale, which portrayed the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus. It marked the History Channel's highestwatched show and garnered three Emmy nominations, later selling close to 1 million units on DVD, Blu-ray, and DigitalHD platforms.

Columbia Pictures executive DeVon Franklin says the marketplace for faithbased films always has been vibrant, but Biblical epics likely are the next wave of that genre that Hollywood will produce. Several more major film releases are planned for 2014.

For Easter 2014, his studio is releasing "Heaven is for Real," a T.D. Jakes and Joe Roth-produced film adaption of the bestselling 2010 book and starring Academy Award-nominee Greg Kinnear.

"It is an audience that is underserved," Franklin said. "We are continually trying

to provide great content and quality films to what I believe is an exciting audience but also a growing one."

Veteran film critic and Breitbart News assistant editor Christian Toto agrees that "there is an untapped audience" for such programming.

There are people out there who are deeply religious and they look at the Cineplex and say there is nothing there for me, whether it's too violent, there are too many anti-heroes, or a general suspicion of Hollywood that has not catered to that audience for a long time," Toto told News-

"Faith-based films, up until recently, have been on a small scale with no big star, and yet they have been doing quite well at the box office," he said. "I think Hollywood is awakening to the fact that this is profitable. I think 'The Bible's' showing made that clear."

The TV series was produced by Mark Burnett and his wife, actress Roma Downey, for Hearst Entertainment & Syndication. Burnett also has made a name for himself in Hollywood, producing such popular reality shows as "Survivor," "The Apprentice," "Shark Tank," and most recently, the singing competition,"The

"We are very excited to be working with 20th Century Fox to release 'Son of God' as a major motion picture," Burnett and Downey, the movie's producers, said in a statement. "We responded to an overwhelming demand for 'The Greatest Story Ever Told' to be seen as a shared experience on the big screen. The result is a beautiful stand-alone movie. It's the story of Jesus for a whole new generation."

Phil Cooke, a Burbank, Calif., filmmaker, media consultant and author, says Christians are perfect target group for the film industry.

"Hollywood bends over backward all the time to court very small interest groups — feminists, environmentalists, people who are gay — but there are more than 91 million evangelical Christians in the U.S., which makes us the largest special-interest group of all," Cooke said. "What baffles me is why Hollywood doesn't take that audience more seriously. We are the mainstream audience."

Cooke, author of "Unique: Telling Your Story in the Age of Brand and Social Media," advises churches, ministers, and other Christian groups about how best to get their messages across. He said he was

amused that soon after "The Bible" TV series aired, he received calls from three major news organizations whose reporters were "baffled" that anyone would want to watch such programming.

"They come from such a secular worldview that it had never crossed their minds that someone would be interested in TV series about the Bible," he said. "There are a lot of Christian folks out there. Forget ideology. It's just good business. When you have that many potential customers and you're not trying to reach them with a product specifically for them . . . Hollywood, I think, needs to understand the business potential of that."

Also scheduled for a March release is blockbuster Old Testament story "Noah," directed by "Black Swan's" Darren Aronofsky and starring such big names as Russell Crowe in the title role, Emma Watson, Anthony Hopkins, and Jennifer Con-

Its budget is \$125 million, and, by some reports, growing, making it a massive gamble on a well-known Biblical story.

Cooke points to other series in the works, including one from Burnett and Downey chronicling the New Testament book of Acts. Others in the entertainment business would be wise to take note of the trend, he said.

But as Hollywood reaches to Christianity for its storytelling, Cooke believes Christians must "lighten up" and not dismiss its message-spreading power to spark

"We need to suck it up a little bit and realize the value of these creating cultural conversations about the Bible. It's so incredibly remarkable, I'm willing to give them a little slack," he said. "We try our

best. We don't want them to cross dangerous theological boundaries, but I'm willing to give them enormous slack just to get that out there.

Cooke adds: "I've never met people who got saved watching a movie, but it's caused them to reconsider what they think about God. We need to be mature enough to understand that no, Hollywood isn't going to make Bible stories the


way we grew up with them. But I think that if they are willing to spend that much alone on a story like Noah, count me in."

"Anything that allows me to start a conversation with a friend or coworker about God, that works for me," Cooke said. "The Passion of the Christ" got millions of people talking about Christ's death and resurrection."

### Frequently Asked Questions About Cars for Homes

The online Donation Wizard will tell you what documents are required in your state. Most states require that you have a clear title to the vehicle; some states also require a notorized signature to transfer a vehicle.

What are the tax benefits of donating my car? Habiat for Humanity is a 501c3 nonprofit. If you itemize your deductions on your income tax return, you may be entitled to deduct the gross sales value of your donated vehicle. Donors will receive appropriate receipts and should consult their tax advisor and/or the IRS to determine benefits.

# **GIMME SHELTER A BRUTAL REALITY**

### Vanessa Hudgens shines in breakout performance with pro-life message

In Gimme Shelter, a pregnant teenager flees her abusive mother in search of her father, only to be rejected by her dad and forced to survive on the streets until a compassionate stranger offers a hopeful alternative.

In recent years films like Juno have addressed the subject of an unexpected child, utilizing humor in order to make the subject matter of abortion palatable for Friday-night moviegoers. Therein lies the difference with Gimme Shelter. It's not an after-school TV special. It's not lightweight. Nor does it give us a spoonful of sugar to make the medicine go down. Rather, Gimme Shelter slaps us in the face with brutal realities.

While the film doesn't beat the viewer over the head with a proselytizing message, it does score points by suggesting a need for spiritual intervention. A person in the film who does pray for direction and help ultimately finds a positive resolve. Sadder examples indicate that those who don't turn to God continue to stum-

Suddenly, she turned to her husband and said, "I can't do this." Years later, the husband says to his moviemaking daughter, "Amazing how close we were to you never existing. Almost enough to make you an anti-abor-

### Local film company screens WWII feature film made in KC

Out of 1.6 million Jewish children living in Europe at the start of World War II, only 11 percent survived. A new film attempts to chronicle the plight of these children, many of whom were left to survive on their own during the war. In the film "Adira",

a young Jewish girl flees from the grasp of the Gestapo and finds herself stranded on an abandoned farm. Adira, played by Lee's Summit's Andrea Fantauzzi, has to learn to survive with only her faith and basic instincts keeping her alive, as she awaits her rescue. The film chronicles the war and its struggles through the eyes of a lost child.

This film was shot in part at the 1855 Harris-Kearney House Museum, located in Westport, as well as in various

# Kansas City's connection to the Nazi's stolen loot

With the upcoming release of the Sony film The Monuments Men, Kansas City's Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art is recognizing six real-life Monuments Men who either worked in or closely with the museum. Monuments men and women, commissioned by Franklin D. Roosevelt during World War II, were tasked with the protection, recovery and preservation of millions of Europe's masterpieces during the Nazi occupation.

"The men and women involved in this selfless effort to keep art objects safe during a dangerous time in history showed immense courage," said Julián Zugazagoitia, CEO & Director of the Nelson-Atkins. "We are deeply in their debt for preserving these treasures for humanity."

A display of archival materials will be on view in Bloch Lobby that includes postcards, manuscripts, newspaper clippings and biographies of the Nelson-Atkins' Monuments Men.

"My research has shown that these six men brought to their military duties the same passion for art and culture that made them so valuable to the Nelson-Atkins," said MacKenzie Mallon, a researcher in the European Painting & Sculpture Department who has been working on this project for many months. "They took their responsibilities as pro-

tectors of these monuments very seri-

The museum employed four of the Monuments Men and maintained strong ties with two others. Paul Gardner, the first director of the Nelson-Atkins, served as Director of the Fine Arts Section of the Allied Military Government in Italy. Another former director, Laurence Sickman, was assigned to General Douglas MacArthur's Tokyo headquarters after the Japanese surrender and served as a technical advisor on collections and monuments, making trips to China and Korea to assess the level of damage to monuments in those countries. He was awarded the Legion of Merit.

The first curator of European Art at the museum, Patrick J. Kelleher, served as the head of the Greater Hesse Division of the Monuments, Fine Arts and Archives section. Otto Wittmann, Jr., the first curator of Prints for the museum, was part of

the OSS Art Looting and Investigation Unit (ALIU).

Langdon Warner served as the Asian art advisor to the Trustees of the Nelson-Atkins in 1930, and was a close colleague of Sickman. He helped found the American Defense – Harvard Group, a precursor of the Roberts Commission, Roosevelt's task force. James A. Reeds served with the Monuments, Fine Arts and Archives section in France in 1944. He taught linguistics at University of Missouri at Kansas City and served as a docent for the Nelson-Atkins.

One of the finest examples of 18th century portraiture at the Nelson-Atkins, Nicolas de Largillière's Augustus the Strong, Elector of Saxony and King of Poland, was found by the Monuments Men in a bomb-rigged salt mine in Alt Aussee, Austria, and returned to Clarice de Rothschild, whose family owned the painting. It was purchased by the Nelson-Atkins in 1954 after Rothschild sold it to an art dealer in New York.

During World War II, the Nelson-Atkins also served as a safe house for more than 150 paintings and tapestries from collections on the East and West coasts.

The Monuments Men, starring George Clooney and Matt Damon, will be released February 7. Visit monumentsmenfoundation.org.

### Call of A Coward: The God of Moses and the Middle-Class Housewife

This memoir of an unlikely missionary is an exciting, humorous and heartwarming tale that anyone interested in missions should read.

Moses never wanted to be a leader. Jonah ran away from his missions call. And when Marcia Moston's (2010 winner of Women of Faith Writing Contest) husband came home with a call to foreign missions, she was sure God had the wrong number. His call conflicted with her own dreams, demanded credentials she didn't have, and required courage she couldn't seem to find. Here are 3 tips for planning a great ROS:

1. Set aside time. It doesn't have to be a whole day. When I do an ROS, I plan for 3 to 6 hours. If this is your first time doing an ROS, start with 2 to 3 hours.

2. Figure out what the best atmosphere is for you to connect with God. When I do an ROS, I like to start the morning by going to my favorite coffee shop. I eat breakfast, sip some delicious coffee and journal about any thoughts, concerns, anticipations, etc., that could distract from my experience with God.

I tell those things to God, set them aside, and ask him to help me to focus on him and what he wants to teach me.

3. Choose activities that help you connect with God. After breakfast, if the weather is good, I head to my favorite park and grab a spot in the shade. Sometimes I like to read a Christian book; other times I like to create something artistic with chalk pastels. I also like to engage with the Bible during that time. I read a story from one of the gospels and meditate on that. Sometimes I go for a long

hike, praying and worshipping God through nature. If you don't naturally connect to God with nature, you can head to a public library or a favorite spot in your city. The point is to put yourself in places that help you connect with God and hear from him.

Here are some journaling questions to start off your ROS.

- What has this summer been like for you so far?

- · How has it been for you spiri-
- · How do you feel about where you are spiritually right now?
- · In what ways have you experienced God lately?

University of Connecticut and author of Christians Are Hate-Filled Hypocrites ... and Other Lies You've Been Told.

Wright looked at marriage statistics from the General Social Survey (GSS), a national random survey of Americans, taken since the 1970s. Half of the "Nones"—people who claim no religious identity—were divorced. Only 42 percent of self-identified Christians—and members of other faiths—were divorced.

Catholics (35 percent) were least likely to divorce, followed by Mainline Protestants (41 percent) and evangelicals (46 percent). Believers who show up to church every week were even less likely to divorce.

Wright, who has been writing about faith and divorce rates since 2006, found that only about a third of evangelicals (34 percent) and Mainline Protestants (32 percent) and a quarter of Catholics (23 percent) who go to church are divorced. Still the myth that churchgoers divorce at the same rate as everyone else persists. Wright thinks we pay more attention to bad news than to good news.

"We pay a lot more attention to things that are dangerous," he said. "If I'm driving down the road, I can pass 200 parked cars and not notice them. But if I see an accident—I will stop and look"

Mark Regnerus, a sociologist at the University of Texas in Austin, said something called "confirmation bias" might be at work. In other words, people like statistics that reinforce their beliefs. If people are fearful that marriages are in trouble, he said, they'll tend to believe statistics that confirm those fears.

Even if those statistics aren't exactly right.

Regnerus said using bad statistics about marriage is appealing—because bad news can motivate people to action.

But it can also undermine the credibility of a pastor's message.

"I am glad pastors want to strengthen marriages," he said. "And bad news can be galvanizing... But we trust our pastors to tell us the truth."

### Are Christians really bad tippers?

Marriage isn't the only subject where perceptions about Christians don't match with statistics. It's also the case with tips believers leave servers.

Earlier this year, a trip out to eat turned into a nightmare for the Rev. Alois Bell of the World Deliverance Ministries Church in Granite City, Ill. Bell and a group of friends went to Applebees. Following company policy, their server, Chelsea Welch, added an automatic tip to the bills.

Bell was not pleased.

"I give God 10%," Bell wrote on the bill. "Why do you get 18?"

Welch posted the check on Facebook, and it went viral. She eventually was fired, while Bell apologized (indicating she'd left a cash tip) after her note made headlines.

Turns out Welsh isn't the only server to have a bad run in with church folks.

Karen Swallow Prior, an English professor at Liberty University, worked her way through college as a waitress. Christians were notorious for being bad tippers, she wrote in a piece for Christianity Today's website.

"My fellow servers called them the 'Holy Rollers," she wrote. "Knowing there would be little, if any, tip left at the end of their meal, the servers saw the Christians' robust attempts at 'friendliness' instead as pushy and arrogant. The memories still pain me now."

But a study from Michael Lynn of Cornell University and Benjamin Katz of HCD Research, showed that, overall, Christians are pretty good tippers. Their online survey of 1,068 Americans found that the average Christian tipped 17 percent for good service. Only about one in eight Christians left a smaller tip for good service. The national average is just under 15 percent for all tippers.

Statistics about the future of the church also give pastors and other church leaders a hard time. Like this one: "94 percent of Christian young people leave the church never to return," which was used to promote a major Christian conference several years ago. It's partly true -- young people do tend to drop out of church.

A 2009 LifeWay Research study of 1,000 young Protestants found that seven out of 10 stopped attending church for a time after high school.

A few more details: the students surveyed had all attended church for at least a year in high school. Most dropped out because of a life change—such as going to college—and just over a third had

come back to church by age 30.

The idea of anyone dropping out of church is a concern, but there's no sign young people are forsaking the church in droves.

### Left-handed people, Texans, cats

Another bad statistics was used recently by a megachurch pastor to promote a Christian conference: "There are more left-handed people, more Texans, and more pet cats than evangelicals in America." Actually, one-third of the claim is true.

There are more cats (and dogs) than evangelicals in the U.S. But not Texans or southpaws.

While there are about 95 million cats in the U.S., according to the Humane Society, there are between 50 million (Religious Congregations & Membership Study, 2010) and 75 million evangelicals (Pew Research).

That's more than the estimated number of southpaws—between 30 and 45 million Americans—and Texans (26.6 million, according to the U.S. Census).

Going one for three might be good in baseball, but it's bad for preachers.

Bad statistics persist because they work—at least in the short term. They help sell books and tickets to conferences, make good sermon illustrations, and get people in church fired up. The problem, said Ed Stetzer, president of LifeWay Research, is that bad statistics don't solve real problems.

It's difficult to solve a problem when you don't understand it, said Stetzer.

Too many bad statistics can also undermine a leader's credibility. Get too many facts wrong, and it's harder for people to trust you.

### **Setting the record straight**

Perhaps it's time for Christians, including preachers and conference speakers, to be more discerning when it comes to statistics. Pigs can't fly.

Stetzer said Christians should view all

statistics with healthy skepticism. That's especially true if a statistic is found in an advertisement. Ads, said Stetzer, are used to sell things. They're not particularly concerned with getting the facts right. Also, beware any statistic that can't be verified.

"Ask, how do you know that?" said Stezter. "If you can't think of a way to verify a statistic, it's probably not true." He also said to be wary of stats that don't match reality.

"It's okay to apply your own censor, to say this doesn't make sense," Stetzer said.

It's important to realize all research is imperfect and context matters. Researchers don't have unlimited resources. They can't interview or poll everyone. Instead they interview a representative sample of people, asking a few questions.

So go to the source. Find out who did the research, how many people they interviewed and what specific questions were asked, before assuming the research is valid.

For example, a poll from professional researchers using a large sample will likely be more reliable than an informal poll taken by a professor of the students in class.

Finally, look at more than one study.

"To understand the whole picture, responsible researchers look at various studies, their methodologies, and their results," Stetzer wrote in a 2010 story about bad statistics for Christianity Today. "We reach bad conclusions when we latch onto one finding of one study, drag it out of context, and proclaim it from the rooftops without knowing whether our interpretation is justified."

Facts are our friends, as Stetzer often says. Just make sure the facts are true.

out of the hospital," David Stevens, a doctor and CEO of the Christian Medical & Dental Associations, told me. "They're not going to get better. The brain has ceased to function even though their body functions otherwise are being sustained by respirator" and other medical tools.

Doctors declared McMath braindead Dec. 11, two days after she suffered complications from a tonsillectomy and other surgical procedures to treat sleep apnea. Since brain death is the legal standard for death, the hospital sought to remove McMath's ventilator, even though her heart was still beating. The girl's family objected, and asked a judge to block the hospital's action.

Judge Evelio Grillo of Alameda County Superior Court forced the hospital to keep the ventilator in place long enough to allow McMath's mother, Nailah Winkfield, to transfer the girl elsewhere.

Pro-life groups that have come to the family's aid include the California-based Life Legal Defense Foundation and the Terri Schiavo Life & Hope Network, run

by Bobby Schindler, Terri Schiavo's brother.

"Families and individuals must make themselves aware of what so-called 'brain death' is and what it is not," said Schindler in a statement. "Additionally, families and individuals must educate themselves regarding their rights as patients, [and regarding] the advance documentation that must be completed prior to any medical procedure."

A GoFundMe.com fundraiser page set up for McMath had raised more than \$50,000 from hundreds of donors, many anonymous.

But Stevens and some other pro-life advocates believe the battle over Mc-Math's life support is poorly chosen. Both the medical community and federal law recognize brain death as the most conclusive definition of death. Doctors verify it by performing a series of tests, such as by shining a light into a patient's eye to see if the pupil dilates, and by checking if facial muscles respond to stimuli.

Stevens pointed out that McMath's situation is not identical to that of Terri Schiavo, who could breathe on her own: "Nobody denied [Schiavo's] brain was functioning, Damaged, but functioning,

at a much lower level."


In addition, in rare cases and with some medications, brain-damaged patients in a "persistent vegetative state" are known to awaken to consciousness. By contrast, Stevens said he knew of no case recognized by the medical community in which a brain-dead patient returned to life.

The American Academy of Neurology released new guidelines on determining brain death in 2010. "A brain death diagnosis is final and cannot be reversed. The person will never awaken," the academy states in a fact sheet for families.

In McMath's case, multiple doctors have conducted tests to ensure the girl is indeed brain-dead. Since her brain stem is no longer controlling automatic body functions, the ventilator and other medical support are all that keep her organs functioning.

"Our technology brings great benefit, but also great burdens," Stevens said. "This is one of them."

Wesley J. Smith, a pro-life bioethics commentator who blogs at National Review Online, has also weighed in on the case. "Under the law, brain-dead is 'dead' when it connotes death by neurological



criteria," he wrote last month. "In such circumstances, if accurately determined, there is no legal right to continue life support of what is, essentially, a cadaver."

Smith's comments prompted a sharp response from Paul A. Byrne, a neonatologist, pediatrician, and the former president of the Catholic Medical Association. Byrne is the co-editor of Beyond Brain Death, a book arguing against a brain-based definition of death. "The

ventilator won't work on a corpse," Byrne told an AP reporter. "In a corpse, the ventilator pushes the air in, but it won't come out. Just the living person pushes the air out."


The opponents of brain death are part of an "important conversation," wrote Smith in response to Byrne. "But I am not convinced by their presentations. I'm just not."
