

Many will miss humor, witness of retiring Senate chaplain

TOPEKA, Kan. (BP) -- Humor, poetry, God and state legislatures don't seem like a match made in heaven, unless you've been anywhere near the Kansas State Senate for the past three decades.

That's thanks to Fred Hollomon, the Georgia native who served 31 years as chaplain of Kansas' upper house. After kicking off state senate sessions for most of the past three decades with his poetic and humorous prayers, Holloman retired at the end of the last legislative session.

Hollomon, 88, started his now famous tradition of mixing humor and rhyme with his prayers soon after getting flak for his first prayer. Two people complained it was too long.

"I've found that people will read or fol-

low you when you're rhyming, because they want to see how it ends," said Hollomon, who was a North American Mission Board-endorsed chaplain.

Born in Georgia and raised in Alabama during the Great Depression, Hollomon's call to ministry didn't come until after he had begun a career in banking. Unfulfilled in that role, he talked to his pastor, who pointed him toward ministry. After graduating from seminary and serving as a pastor in Oklahoma, Missouri and Kansas, he was asked to serve as an aide in the Kansas State House and later in the state senate.

In 1979, as the small church he pastored in Kansas grew large enough to ask him to serve full time, the state senate president asked him to be the institution's

Billy Graham chaplains return to Ferguson

As unrest continues in Ferguson, Mo., the Billy Graham Rapid Response Team has returned to the area at the request of the community.

Tension heated up again in Ferguson after two police officers were shot at a rally in March.

New waves of protests took place last month after the Justice Department released a report claiming the Ferguson Police Department had a history of racial profiling.

Many top city officials resigned in response, including the police chief and city manager.

With the latest round of protests and riots, members of the Ferguson community reached out to the Billy Graham Rapid Response Team. They asked for crisis-trained chaplains to help quell the disorder.

Since then, at least four chaplains from the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association have returned to Ferguson,

and more may follow. This is the team's second deployment to Ferguson in four months.

The chaplain team first went to the

city in November as protests heated up

over the grand jury's decison not to

convict the officer who shot 18-yearold Michael Brown.

The team stayed there though the start of the new year.

During that six weeks, 81 chaplains from the team talked and prayed with more than 1,200 people in all parts of the Ferguson community.

Some of those counseled included law enforcement officers and members of Brown's family.

Tensions appeared to cool until the Justice Department released their report on racial bias in the police department.

The situation escalated in March when two police officers were shot during an anti-police demonstration outside the police department.

As tensions grew, uniformed BGEA chaplains walked out into the protests to calm people down by praying and sharing the love of Jesus with them.

Since then, the chaplains have not gone far from the protestors and continue to minister to the community.



Local family helps revitalize church and the history behind it

A local family is helping a church that was more than 100 years old rebuild after being leveled by a tornado a year ago this month.

'It was cold and rainy, and we couldn't see a whole lot until the next morning, until we could see all the damage it had done...but there wasn't any part of it left," Ola May Earnest said.

Earnest said when the Pleasanton, Kan. church was destroyed in the tornado on April 27, 2014, it left a hole in the community. Earnest has lived in Linn County for 65 years and said the loss of the original church is devastating. A remodel of the church was completed in 2011 using all of the funds they

"It was just landmark there, you know, we expected to see it there," Earnest said.

Earnest is one of the individuals who helped create the Fairmount Community Association in January and organized the meeting to help build support in rebuilding the church, and Earnest said that although the church was no longer active, it served as a gathering place for the community.

"So it was really more than a

Springfield citizens to vote on ordinance repeal

After fallout from community, citizens responded to city council's actions

Citizens of Springfield, Mo. will vote "yes" April 7 to restore religious liberty protections or "no" to keep an "equal rights" ordinance that extends nondiscrimination protection to include sexual orientation and "gender identity." Critics of the ordinance say Missouri already has laws on the books offering protections, and that the ordinance goes too far at the expense of religious

The city's council voted 6 to 3 Oct. 13, 2014, to approve Ordinance 6141, which codifies protection in housing, employment and public accommodations. It went into effect immediately. Council members Doug Burlison,

Mike Carroll, Craig "The mayor Hosmer, Ian Fisk, Cindy Rushefsky and 'shall' have Jeff Seifried voted for the bill. Council memaccess to your bers Jerry Compton, business and Craig Fishel and Bob Stephens voted against /or house..." it. There is a church **Ordinance** wording exemption, but there is no accommodation

for Christians who own a business or otherwise want to exercise their faith outside a church setting.

Those against the ordinance, including many in the religious community, immediately began gathering signatures to put the issue to a vote of the people. They needed 1,144 valid signatures and submitted 2,550 to be verified two weeks later. The approved language for the ballot question has been called confusing by both sides of the debate, but voters will vote "ves" to repeal the measure, and "no" to retain it.



The timing is noteworthy as various battles between religious liberty and so-called gay rights flare up around the country. New stories of florists and bakers accused of illegal discrimination against homosexual couples pop up weekly as state judges in Alabama uphold traditional marriage and the U.S. Supreme Court takes up the issue this summer. The Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals is expected to begin hearing arguments in May on cases involving Missouri, Arkansas and South Dakota

> couples. Two Kansas City couples who were denied marriage licenses are included in that case. A federal judge sided with the Kansas City couples, striking down the constitutional amendment excluding gay and les-

bian couples from marriage. But the judge also said that his decision would be stayed until judgment is final.

The possible intrusive implications of an equal rights bill became clear in a dramatic fashion last fall when the openly gay mayor of Houston, Texas, and the city's attorneys demanded pastors turn into authorities sermons that may be critical of the Houston Equal Rights Ordinance (HERO) or behavior the Bible calls sinful.

The city is fighting efforts to repeal the law, and subpoenaed "all speeches, presentations, or sermons related to HERO, the Petition [to repeal the law], Mayor Annise Parker, homosexuality, or gender identity prepared by, delivered by, revised by, or approved by you or in your possession." In Houston, the legal battle over the validity of signatures on a ballot petition there wages on. A repeal question may appear on the ballot in November.

Springfield Attorney Dee Wampler, wrote before the issue came to a vote that the ordinance gives Springfield's mayor power similar to that just used in Houston, powers that go beyond violations of the first amendment.

"The mayor 'shall' (not 'may') have access to your business and/or house to seize records and documents and to question or search an individual for 'possible sources of evidence,' he wrote in an op-ed in the Community Free Press. "Forget about your protections under the Fourth Amendment to our Constitution."

Wampler called the religious exemption very narrow, saying it is limited to churches in hiring and firing staff.

"Missouri law already prohibits unfair treatment in employment, housing and public accommodations based on age, gender, race, color and national origin, as does strict federal law," he continued.

The equal rights ordinance has been bubbling in Springfield since at least 2012. In August of that year the city council voted 7-2 to table a proposed ordinance when Christians made their voices heard at city council meetings. At the time, Mayor Bob Stephens complained to the Springfield News-Leader of "unrelenting harping" from the probiblical marriage advocates and silence - at the time - from ordinance proponents.

Parents win fight to end teen sex conference

(WNS)--Families in Oregon scored a victory when the controversial Teen Sexuality Conference in Seaside, Ore., was canceled. The conference. which has been held for more than



20 years, faced a firestorm of public outcry after local news station KOIN 6 released a series of investigative pieces on the sexually explicit material being supplied to students as young as 11.

Activists say this is only the beginning of a

growing awareness of systemic problems in the way healthcare and sex education are handled in Oregon's school system. "We understand that this is really just the tip of the iceberg as far as the kind of K-12 education that is being promoted in schools across the district and across the state," Lori Porter, director of Parents' Rights in Education,




Pastor stops seeking donations for private iet

NEW YORK - The ministry of evangelist and megachurch pastor Creflo Dollar is no longer seeking donations to buy a luxury jet valued at more than \$65 million.

A video on the website of Creflo Dollar Ministries asked people to help the ministry buy a Gulfstream G650 airplane. In the video, Project G650 manager Rick Hayes said, "If all of our existing partners were to sow \$300 each, from all over the world, we'd be able to acquire this jet in a very, very short period of time."

That video has since been taken down, and Dollar's publicist, Juda Engelmayer, now says "there is no campaign for a jet." He says the evangelist is taking commercial flights.

What do Americans ask for in prayer

their prayer life, asking God for personal desires more often than people in crisis or the unsaved, according to a recent survey from Nashville-based LifeWay Research.

"Most people pray when they need the red phone for help," says Ed Stetzer, executive director of LifeWay Research. "But their prayer life isn't a habit rooted in a relationship with

John Maempa, director of the AG Office of Prayer and Spiritual Care, says, "While for many people praying tends to be a pragmatic means to an end, according to Scripture we are invited to ask for things we need and perhaps even want (Psalm 37:4; Matthew 6:33; 7:7; etc.). However, the key to effective prayer is relationship — drawing close to God so He can

In the online survey, Americans spend the most time focusing on friends and family (82 percent of all respondents) as well as their own problems (74 percent).

Just more than half (54 percent) pray for good things to happen in their life, while more than one third (36 percent) ask God to bless them with future prosperity.

"James Nicodem, in his book 'Prayer Coach,' states that Iesus readily responds to our prayers when we 'start to value our relationship more than our requests; until we want more of Him than we want from Him," Maempa observes.

"When we're in proper alignment with God's relationally, we are more inclined to pray His will than focus on things we want."

But not all prayers are self-centered. Americans say they also spend time petitioning God about their own sin (42 percent), those in natural disasters (38 percent), people of other religions or no faith (20 percent), and government leaders (12 percent).

And as Jesus' taught, 41 percent say they have prayed for those who mistreat them while 37 percent acknowledge praying for enemies.

On the other hand, 21 percent admit to asking God to win a lottery, 13 percent have sought the Almighty's help for their favorite team to win a game, and 7 percent have wanted God's favor in finding a good parking

About half of Americans surve (48 percent) say they pray at least every day, while a third (31 percent) say they pray repeatedly during the day.

Ambassador offers broader take on religious freedom

Saperstein believes protections should extend beyond freedom of worship

WNS)--The new State Department ambassador-at-large for international religious freedom articulated a robust view of religious liberty in his first testimony before Congress.

Rabbi David Saperstein's comments came at a U.S. Senate Appropriations subcommittee hearing convened to discuss his office's budget and role in combating religious persecution. Saperstein's predecessor, Suzan Johnson Cook, served twoand-a-half ineffective years in the role and often only defended freedom of worship—limiting religious practice to what happens inside a place of worship or at

Saperstein denounced that limited view, noting freedom of worship leaves out a person's right to religious education, proselytizing, and generally live out one's faith in the public square: "It is important that that be the message going out to the

Much of the hearing focused on the Islamic State's ongoing destruction in the Middle East. Jay Sekulow, president of the American Center for Law and Justice and a witness at the hearing, called the Islamic State's ideology "as toxic as the Nazis," and said the violence in the Middle East alone is producing the equivalent of a 9/11 every

Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., chairman of the State, Foreign Operations Subcommittee, said the ongoing conflict is "clearly a religious war" and called the hearing one of the most compelling he has attended in 20 years in office.

"It laid out the case of basically religious genocide," he told me afterward. "This is a national security problem, it is a moral problem, it is an under-resource problem. You just can't kill terrorists to



make us safe. You have to build up other

Graham voiced support for increasing the State Department Office of International Religious Freedom budget, which is currently \$3.5 million but will decrease with the next round of sequestration cuts. According to Saperstein, the office has 20 employees operating in 16 countries.

Several lawmakers assailed the Obama administration's failure to create a special envoy for religious freedom in the Middle East, even though Congress overwhelmingly approved the position last year. The position remains unfilled, but the State Department last month created a new position Congress didn't ask for: the first special envoy for homosexual rights.

Saperstein indicated the State Department doesn't have funding for the religious freedom special envoy. Sen. James Lankford, R-Okla., told me he finds that hard to believe: "They have the resources. The administration has even recently invented new envoys and found money for them in other areas, so it's interesting to hear the implication today that we just don't have enough money to do a religious liberty envoy."

Lankford said he would also like to see Saperstein's office play an enhanced role in administration negotiations, particularly in trade talks with countries that infringe on religious freedom: "When we are actually negotiating with Vietnam to do international trade and we're not discussing religious liberty issues, we're leaving out one of the levers we have to actually be an influence."

U.S. support of Palestinians questioned

JERUSALEM, Israel -- Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has drawn fire for saying on election day that foreignbacked leftist groups were busing Arabs to the polls to defeat him.

Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas called that charge "racist" and suggested that a two-state solution in the Middle East is impossible.

Since Netanyahu's solid victory in the election, the Obama administration has threatened to pull U.S. support from Israel at the United Nations because of the prime minister's pledge that a Palestinian state wouldn't happen on his watch.

In an interview with MSNBC, Netanyahu said his backing of a Palestinian state hasn't changed since 2009 and has always been dependent upon several conditions:

- Palestinian recognition of Israel as a Jewish state,
- Defensible borders,
- And a united Jerusalem as Israel's capital.

Abbas has rejected all of those conditions.

Meanwhile, the Gatestone Institute's Khaled Abu Toameh reported in The Jerusalem Post that the PLO leadership in the West Bank (biblical Judea and Samaria) is making detailed plans to end economic and security cooperation with Israel.

The Palestinians will also proceed with efforts to charge Israel with war crimes before the International Criminal Court in The Hague, The Netherlands.

"Halting security cooperation with Israel means that Abbas and the PLO will be paving the way for Hamas to extend its control from the Gaza Strip to the West Bank. With that, the Palestinians would have another Islamist state that seeks to eliminate Israel," Toameh wrote.

In a speech on the Senate floor, Sen. Marco Rubio, R-Fla., delivered a scorching attack on the administration's treatment of Israel and Netanyahu.

Calling the decision to consider withdrawing support for Israel at the U.N. "a historic and tragic mistake," Rubio cited a list of incidents in which President Barack Obama and his administration slighted, berated, or spoke ill of the Israeli prime minister.

"I think Netanyahu is right," Rubio said about the security concerns Israel faces.

"The conditions do not exist for a peace deal with people who teach their children that killing Jews is a glorious thing."

Rubio also claimed the alliance with Israel is not a Republican or Democratic issue.

All this comes as Abbas presses the United Nations to create a Palestinian state in Israel's biblical heartland. While some see him as the best partner for peace, Palestinian insiders say his regime is riddled with corruption paid for by Western tax dollars.

Abbas has led the fight for Palestinians since the 2004 death of PLO chairman Yasser Arafat. In addition to leaving a leadership opening, Arafat left behind secret bank accounts filled with a billion or more in public funds and international aid taken from his own people.

As Abbas, also known as Abu Mazen, took over, Palestinians hoped for a change.

"When Abu Mazen came to power, he spoke about reforming the security services and the judiciary. It means that he recognized there is corruption," said "Ahmed," a resident of P.A.-controlled city in the West Bank. CBN News hid his identity to protect his life.

"But what happened [was] that they created ways to cover up corruption when complaints were made," he said.

More than 2 million people live in the West Bank (biblical Judea and Samaria) under Palestinian Authority rule. And while the world blames Israel for oppressing Palestinians, some say the Palestinians themselves are most often the oppressors of their own people.

"Most of the Palestinians know about the corruption. But the normal citizens are afraid because ... they know that they cannot do anything, and they and their families and children could be subjected to dangers and sexual abuse. They know that the [Palestinian] Authority is a terrorist authority. So they are afraid of it," Ahmed explained.

Human rights attorney Calev Myers said he's concerned both about Israel and

also for Palestinians living under Abbas.

"If somebody in the Palestinian Authority was to stand in the public square and criticize Mahmoud Abbas... they'll be arrested, many times tortured and sometimes just disappear...There's a huge fear factor," Myers told CBN News.

To make things worse, this corruption and oppression is financially supported by taxpayers in the West.

According to a 2014 congressional report, the U.S. government has committed more than \$5 billion to the Palestinian Authority since the mid-1990s. Yet the average Palestinian is still living in abject poverty.

In a video interview, obtained courtesy

of Palestinian Media Watch, Palestinian Authority Chairman Abbas indicates where the money may have gone.

"Since [Hamas'] coup against the P.A. [in 2007] and until today, we've been transferring more than 50 percent of our [P.A.] budget to Gaza, including salaries to 60,000 to 70,000 [P.A.] civil servants who aren't working," Abbas says in the video.

"They are [in Gaza] and are receiving salaries. We pay them because they stopped working, and so Hamas appointed other people in their place," he added.

According to those figures, those "60,000 P.A. workers receive \$47 million a month -- not to work," PMW said.



Tips for finding the perfect spot for your children

When I was a kid, you went to camp where your parents wanted to send you, and their choices were somewhat limited. But these days, the camp consumer is much more discerning, and that shift has helped create many new breeds of camps.

There are so many different types of camp experiences, in fact, that selecting one can be a little overwhelming. What do you need to do to pick the right camp for your child so he or she doesn't end up singing, "Kumbackhere" after the first night?

Ask Your Child

First, involve your son or daughter. What you think your child will enjoy and benefit from is not necessarily what they would choose if given the opportunity. So, the oft-repeated advice is still wise: Bring your child into the camp selection process.

Some pertinent questions to discuss with your camper include: What do you hope to gain from going to camp? How rustic do you want your camp experience to be? What types of activities sound fun and interesting? Would you like to go with a church group? How long do you want to stay at camp?

Know Your Thoughts

As important as your child's expectations are, your feelings about the camp experience can of course not be overlooked.

Consider how far away you're comfortable with your child staying. Does your child have special needs with which the camp should be familiar? Do you prefer that your child be able to interact with the opposite gender at camp? What's your family's budget for camp?

And to what perspectives, doctrines, and values do you want your child exposed? Even camps that identify themselves as Christian can vary widely in their teachings and practices.

Begin the Hunt

Armed with information about your child's preferences and with a greater understanding of your own inclinations, start searching for camps that meet these criteria.

An excellent source to help you develop a list of candidates is Christian Camp and Conference Association's online search tool. www.findachristiancamp.com The site contains information about more than 800 Christian camps that are members of CCCA, which means these organizations have access to ongoing training and other resources that can help them serve children better. In addition, great camps are included in this issue of Metro Voice and in May.

Also, check with your church leaders to see if they have recommendations. They may already be planning to take the youth group to camp. Other parents can often provide camp references, as well.

Below are some other ways you can glean additional information to help

■ Look online: Most camps today have websites, and you can usually find a wealth of information there. (Many camp websites are listed at www.ccca.org.) Pay attention to the overall feel of the site, in addition to

viewing photos and reading descriptions.

What adjectives come to mind when you visit the site? Is it high-energy, modern, and youthful, or perhaps peaceful, inviting, woodsy, and warm? These impressions can be important. If the camp's leaders have put any thought into the site's design, the spirit of the camp should be evident. Be aware, however, that basing your decision solely on the website or lack thereof could cause you to miss out on a gem of a camp that just isn't very technically savvy.

Peruse the camp brochure: The same principles apply to the camp brochure, but if it's a printed piece—as opposed to electronic media—camp leaders have much less marketing real estate to convey their message. In other words, what's included is what they think is essential for you to understand about their camp. What are they really trying to

drive home in the brochure, and are these ideas and visuals appealing to you and your child?


Check staff credentials: Many camps' websites provide a listing of and some biographical information about staff members, as well as a list of board members. The staff members' education, experience, and the like may be important factors as you consider the camp that would best serve your child.

■ Visit the camp: Nothing will give you and your camper a better sense for a camp than seeing it. Be sure to call the camp beforehand so they can give you any necessary instructions or tips on maximizing your time at the camp.

During your visit, remember that the camp may not be having a session, or it may be hosting adult retreats. This may affect the atmosphere and even your perceptions of the camp, so be sure to ask questions to get the most accurate picture. For instance, ask to see the fa-

National Volunteer Week, a program of Points of Light, was established in 1974 and has grown exponentially each year, with thousands of volunteer projects and special events scheduled throughout the week. In fact, volunteering has become so important during this week that it has spread to fill the other three weeks of the

A federal study shows that one in four

Americans volunteered through an organization and two-thirds helped their neighbors in 2014.

The annual Volunteering and Civic Life in America research, released last December by the Corporation for National and Community Service (CNCS) and the National Conference on Citizenship (NCoC), shows that service to others continues to be a priority for millions of Americans.

"We are calling on Americans to volunteer in their communities, and to invite

their friends and families to join them," said Wendy Spencer, CEO of the Corporation for National and Community Service. "Volunteers enrich our communities and keep our nation strong. Service also connects us with our neighbors and provides a chance to use our skills for the common good. There are so many ways we can make a difference for those in need, during the holiday season and throughout the entire year."

This year's report found that 62.6 million adults (25.4 percent) volunteered through an organization in 2013. Altogether, Americans volunteered nearly 7.7 billion hours last year. The estimated value of this volunteer service is nearly \$173 billion, based on the independent sector's estimate of the average value of a volunteer hour.



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Should Christians support a Palestinian state?

Disparity of democratic opportunity lost on foreign powers negotiating settlement

Israeli elections are over and the big story is Benjamin Netanyahu's stunning come-from-behind win to secure his fourth term as prime minister. Exit polls showed Netanyahu's center-right Likud party just one seat ahead of the main challenger, the Zionist Union, and pundits and pollsters were forecasting his imminent demise all the way to the end. At last count, however, he and the Likud gained a decisive victory with 29 parliamentary seats compared to Zionist Union's 24. The Joint Arab List, a slate of Arab-Israeli candidates, came in third.

But as Netanyahu begins the difficult task of building a governing coalition, he remains haunted, both now and for years to come, by remarks that he made during the final days of his campaign. In most nations, campaign chatter is chalked up to politicking and gamesmanship; but Israel is not like most nations. Seen by some as evidence of God's faithfulness and by others as the source of all that is wrong in the world, Israel lives in a media spotlight that is truly unique.

Thus, it was not surprising when

speech at Bar Ilan University in which he accepted the idea of a two-state solution.

To be fair, Netanyahu was not making an unequivocal declaration so much as he was answering a question posed by a journalist and using the answer to undermine swered, "Indeed." Expounding, he said, "I think anyone who is going to establish a Palestinian State and to evacuate the territory is giving radical Islam a staging ground against the State of Israel."

Netanyahu then reminded the audi-

ence of the last two prime ministers from the left who offered land-for-peace deals. "The left is doing this, burying its head in the sand time after time."

To anyone who follows the conflict closely and spends time with actual Palestinians and Israelis, this statement will come as no surprise. I rarely find anyone, either in Israel or the territories, who still supports a two-state solution to the conflict.

Last year, when Jerusalem Post editor Caroline Glick was promoting her book on why Israel should annex Judea and Samaria to reach a one-state solution, I asked several prominent Palestinian Christian activists for their take. To my great surprise, most of them agreed with her. It is a rare moment indeed when Jewish and Palestinian nationalists agree, and although both sides disagree on the de-

Sadly, this disparity of democratic opportunity will be lost on foreign powers. The US and EU are committed to a twostate solution come hell or high water. The

Obama administration, having worked hard to unseat Netanyahu, will now use his statements as an opportunity to further antagonize Israel and coddle the Palestinian leadership. Many more European states will be emboldened to recognize the legal fiction of a Palestinian state even as Jews in their midst suffer from rising and increasingly violent anti-Semi-

International NGOs will be even worse. Organizations like Amnesty International and Human Rights Watch will double down on their historic condemnation of Israel's behavior. They will ignore incessant cries for Israel's destruction echoing from various quarters and instead use Netanyahu's statement to paint Israel as an unwilling partner for peace.

Journalists who try to document abuse of Palestinians by the Palestinian Authority are attacked. It is a capital offense for an Arab to sell land to a Jew. The PA has pledged that a future Palestinian state will be free of all Jews.

It is outrageous on the basis of human rights to advocate for a state that has promised, and proven, it will trample on human rights without apology.

Christians must also reject the recognition of a state that is committed to the obliteration of the Jewish people. Hamas, a terrorist organization that regularly proclaims its desire to destroy Israel, is currently ruling the Gaza Strip and is in a power-sharing arrangement with the PA government of Mahmoud Abbas. Christians should see this as detestable. For too long Christians have participated in the killing of Jews either actively, as in the Crusades, or passively, as in the Holocaust. It is an abhorrent part of our history that must not become part of our future.

Christians should support the idea of a Palestinian state, but only if that state commits to promoting liberty and justice for everyone and living peacefully beside the Jewish state of Israel.

Netanyahu's victory will be difficult for those who believe that trading land for peace will work. But his reluctance to participate in the establishment of an unjust state next-door is wholly appropriate and in line with what many Israelis and Palestinians actually think.

The sooner the US and the EU recognize this, the sooner real peace will be

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



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

The other day, she told me she has \$15,000 in credit card debt and has financed an expensive car she's upside down on. Her apartment in Omaha costs \$600 a month, and she is asking for help to get out of the hole. We tried to teach her how to handle money, but apparently it didn't work. How do you think I should handle this situation?

Dear Cindy,

Here's what I would tell her if she were my kid in that situation. First, I'm not paying for your problem to go away. I'd tell her to sell the car and get a cheap little beater. She'll have to get a small loan to cover the difference, but it will rid her of a car payment. And hey, a little bit of debt is better than a whole lot of debt — especially when the debt is on something that's going down in value. After that, she can get a part-time job and work her tail off until she cleans up the mess she made.

I know all this sounds harsh, but this girl had a good thing going and she screwed it up by being impulsive and immature. Think about it;

Then, if she's willing to accept responsibility for her actions, and she starts working hard toward handling her money wisely, you might help her out once in a while. 

Donors will receive appropriate receipts and should consult their tax advisor and/or the IRS to determine benefits.

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CINDERELLA RETURNS DISNEY TO ROOTS OF VIRTUOUS STORIES

Many a fairy tale concludes with, "And they lived happily ever after." Fewer begin from such a place. But for Ella, life was indeed enchanted.

Growing up in a sprawling country mansion, her days consist of communicating with her animal friends (especially four mice living in the house) and basking in the delight of her doting parents. But then Ella's mother falls mortally ill. On her death bed, she beckons Ella close to tell her "a great secret that will see you through all the trials life has to offer: Have courage and be kind."

As the years roll by, Ella and her father, a merchant, make a good effort to enjoy life together. But melancholy fills his heart, a longing for companionship. And so, when he meets a beautiful widow with two daughters about Ella's age, it seems a perfect opportunity for a second chapter of familial bliss.

Except that it isn't.

You already know that Lady Tremaine is as cruel as her daughters are vain. And when Ella's father dies on a journey, the teen girl is left with little more in this world than the concepts of courage and kindness her mother bequeathed to her.

And the previously unhoped-for love of a charming prince, of course!

Ella's girlhood home is as happy as it could possibly be. She enjoys the love of two parents who cherish her completely. It's a beautiful picture of familial affirmation and affection, and it's an environment in which Ella's soul flourishes.

After Ella's father meets Lady Tremaine and admits to his daughter that he's considering marrying her, he asks Ella, "Do you think I might be allowed a second chance at happiness?" Ella bravely encourages her father to pursue that chance.

A servant delivers Ella's father's last tender message to his daughter, saying, "To the end, he spoke only of you, miss.

And your mother." Ella then turns her attention to dutifully serving her stepmother, paying little heed to her own wishes and desires as she fervently tries to live up to her mother's dying wish for her.

On that fateful day when Ella meets the prince, he is hunting a massive stag. Ella—who's been "talking" to his target—convinces



him that the glorious beast has more living to do. It's not the anti-hunting message that's the big positive here, I should note. Rather, it's Ella's overarching urging that "we must simply have courage and be kind, mustn't we?" And her further insistence that "just because it's done doesn't mean it should be done" gets extrapolated, later, to the subject of forced marriages for the sake of financial and political enrichment

Indeed, the prince gradually reveals his noble character in part by his unshakeable willingness to marry Ella, a commoner with no dowry or royal influence to offer him. And he shares a strong, loving relationship with his father, too, one that improves as the movie goes on.

If Walt Disney were he still around, would be proud of what the caretakers of his fabled legacy have done with the 2015 live-action, version of Cinderella, It's



largely true to the original 1950 animated movie's mood and story. And where it deviates and expands upon it, it does so in ways that add nuance and depth.

In other words, this is not a fractured fairy tale as so many are in this new century. The film repeatedly emphasizes kindness and courage, which culminate in Ella graciously forgiving her wicked stepmother. It's something that gives this version of a story that's been around for several centuries an unexpectedly virtuous resonance.

Certainly Downton Abbey star Lily James is a vision of radiant beauty as Ella. But her outward beauty is poignantly augmented by an inner kindness and courage, things she manages to hold on to despite the abuses heaped upon her by her stepmother and stepsisters. The result is a thoroughly delightful engagement with a time-worn tale we all know so well.

The magical fairy godmother is still a central part of this story, of course. And parents of would-be princesses should calculate the body-image and modesty issues raised by the quite low-cut costumes and painfully corseted torsos. (What does this say about the female form and girls' intrinsic worth, after all?) But given this more mindfully mature take on Ella's romance with the prince, there are fewer issues with starry-eyed love-at-first-sight romance than in some other fairy tales.


Christ's freedom shines in Mike Farris' Grammy-winning album

(WNS)--Mike Farris' Grammy-winning album Shine For All The People is the answer to those who view God as a cosmic Grinch (and Christians as His fun-squelching minions). With horns galore, a monster groove, and unbridled jubilance, the album is basically one giant celebration—and a well-earned one at that.

Farris wrestled with serious drug addiction for much of his adult life, including a cocaine overdose, according to an interview with CBN. After rededicating his life to God, he experienced powerful deliverance from the drug addiction, but then a back injury and subsequent surgery led to an addiction to pain medication. Finally, after much soul searching, three and half years ago Farris found himself truly sober for the first time since he was a kid. Little wonder, then, that freedom shines from every corner of this album.

Sometimes it's the general call for men to "break all the chains," such as in the rousing '60s anthem, "How It Feels To Be Free." Sometimes it's the spiritual freedom conveyed by a hymn such as "Sparrow," in which Farris manages to be both reverent and joyous with the help of a ragtime piano and a Dixieland motif.

But freedom isn't just a lyrical theme. It oozes from the album's every pore, implicit in the luxurious horn arrangements




and the fuel-injected attack of outstanding musicianship. Most of all, freedom reigns in the passion and power of Farris' soulful singing, which is a cross of Van Morrison, Aaron Neville, and a coyote howling in the bayou.

"River Jordan" is the album's opening powerhouse, featuring extravagant horn arrangements that yank the listener in by the collar. Funky drums keep the song grounded while a bass digs down to solemnize the lonely, bitter-sweet moment of our final pilgrimage to that better land.

"Jonah And The Whale" recalls the high stepping, keyboard grooves of Booker T. and the MG's with some humor thrown in. Most folks will identify with Farris' conclusion regarding Jonah's adventure: "Sometimes I get that old funny feeling / I feel that same old whale swallowed me." Swinging horn blasts and






vocal call and responses stir excitement, but the real inspiration is Farris' gritty, experience-driven goal to "walk with the Father in glory / go on and tell my story / tell the whole world \dots about my victory."

Farris won this year's Grammy for Best Roots Gospel Album and it's no wonder. Chock full of hand-clapping, finger-snapping goodness, Shine For All The People is like something that popped right out of the Tennessee hills—a natural and inevitable force from what Flannery O'Connor called the "Christ-haunted South." Yet Farris (who is from Tennessee) ensures the album is less Christ haunted than Christ embodied. Unlike so many rock-oriented artists who mine the gospel heritage, Farris obviously believes the lyrics he sings. This makes the album far more satisfying and spares believers the labor of parsing out a great performance from a lackluster spiritual commitment.

Farris ends well with an almost Beatnik rendition of "This Little Light." Bongos and a stand-up bass prove marvelously suited to the song's simple faith message, and a full band eventually joins in for a hearty jam session. The song is also an apt metaphor for Farris's musical approach. He lets the beauty of these songs shine through, adding jazz, rock, and blues layers to accentuate their strengths rather than distract from them. The result is a feast for the ears and a feast for the spiritat once shiny and new yet as comfortable as an old shoe.









Rosenberg's Third Target: Is it fiction or non-fiction?

What would happen if the terrorist group, ISIS, acquired weapons of mass destruction?

That's the premise of The Third Target, a new novel by Middle East analyst and bestselling author Joel Rosen-

In it Rosenberg weaves the fictitious tale of J.B. Collins, a New York Times correspondent who risks everything by slipping into Syria to interview the commander of the brutal jihadist army.

Ultimately, Collins finds himself faced with a decision that could cost him his career - or his life.

Rosenberg cautions that his latest book is meant to be more than entertaining, but should serve as a warning to U.S. leaders against the dangers of complacency.

"Too many political leaders in Washington are becoming complacent about how serious a threat ISIS really is, and the stakes," he told Fox News.

"A year ago the president told us that ISIS was not a threat, that they were a 'JV' team," he continued.

"Last summer, he said ISIS was engaged in genocide." 'Well

okay, if they are engaged in genocide, why is this such a slowmoving process of defeating them?"

'What The Third Target does - fictionally — is take us into a world in which they are not defeated, in which they capture chemical weapons, and then all hell breaks loose, far worse than what we currently see," he said.

cilities where those activities that interest your child take place, and inquire about how the activities are supervised and by whom. Determine what the camp's philosophies are. Is there an emphasis on competition? Is the program highly structured or freer flowing with more choices? Also ask how close medical facilities are, and what security measures are in place to help ensure the safety of your child.

Finally, you'll certainly want to take a look at the sleeping quarters and dining facilities that your child would be using. Your camper will not likely require the comfort level you desire in accommodations or the class of food your palette prefers. However, you do want to make sure the facilities are clean, safe, and in good repair, and that your child would find adequate nutrition and pleasing meal choices.

Rate the Camps

After vou've learned much more about each camp candidate on your short list, a fun way to engage your child in picking the one might be to create a simple chart with the names of the camps intersecting with categories such as activities, location, and price. Your child can assign a certain number of stars to camps for some categories and you can rate camps in other areas. This exercise can bring clarity to the tangle of information you collect.

Eniov the Journey

The camp experience will leave a lasting impression on your child—and on you. Doing a little homework and including your camper in the process

will go a long way toward making the time successful and the memories as wonderful as mine are.

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

the conversation and examine the lessons from this film," Faraci continued.

"Unbroken" was adapted from Laura Hillenbrand's best-selling book which chronicles Zamperini's life, including competing in the 1936 Olympics as a long-distance runner and becoming a solider during World War II. After surviving 47 days lost at sea, as well as two years in a Japanese POW camp, Zamperini ultimately found peace, forgiveness and redemption through God.

"Unbroken" earned over \$15.5 million at the box office as well as a nomination at the Academy Awards, and the film is available in stores on March 24. Available along with the Blu-ray and DVD, the "Unbroken" bonus disc highlights interviews and documentary footage of Zamperini with Billy Graham, who were introduced in 1949 when the war veteran met the then-little-known evangelist in Los Angeles. Before long, Zamperini knew the Holy Spirit was working within him, and the veteran was led to reconcile with his Japanese captors, offering them forgiveness as well as the gospel of Jesus Christ.

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

chaplain. Except for a three-year absence in the early 1980s when he stepped aside to pastor a church near Kansas City, he served faithfully as the senate's chaplain ever since.

Officially, Hollomon's chaplain duties included only the opening prayer of the senate each day it was in session. While he could leave after that prayer, he saw what he did as a ministry and many days spent time with legislators and senate staff getting to know them and counseling them when needed.

In past years Holloman held weekly prayer meetings at the senate and performed weddings and funerals for senators. Yet his ministry touched far more than just the senators. For three decades he ministered to senate secretaries, doormen, lobbyists and security personnel, among others.

Various state senates around the nation do chaplaincy differently. Some have a dif-

ferent chaplain come in each session to deliver the opening prayer.

"I don't like that near as well," Hollomon said. "You don't get acquainted that way. I

think it's a mistake to have different guys pop in all the time. I think if you get someone who enjoys it and does a fairly good job of it, you should keep him or her." Yet it's the creative prayers Hollomon became known for around the state. Newspapers began quoting him and interviewing him about the prayers soon after he began using them during the 1979 legislative session. He became a regular column for the Metro Voice's Topeka edition with guest columns in the Kansas City Metro Voice.

"Reporters started interviewing me soon after I started doing it," Hollomon said. "They did it for two reasons. First, I was doing it differently than anyone else they'd ever heard pray, and second, I prayed rhymes. I reminded them that David prayed in rhyme, too."

Since his prayers were printed in the senate journal, he wrote them out every day -- a practice he had not done before becoming a chaplain. In 2005, he published a collection of the prayers in a book titled "Uncommon Prayers."

One of the most famous of the prayers got national radio exposure during his first month in the senate. A reporter heard the prayer and asked if he could get a copy of it. Hollomon thought little of the prayer until a neighbor heard it on the radio. The prayer was read on the Paul Harvey Show.

Hollomon's humor was part of all aspects of his ministry. A few years ago, the Nebraska state legislature made news because some were questioning the constitutionality of paying chaplains.

He said, "Before I prayed one day, I said, 'I understand our sister state to the north is having trouble paying a chaplain...I just held up an offering plate. Of course, I got a pretty good response."

Despite the objections of many throughout the years, Hollomon remained committed to ending his prayers by invoking the name of Jesus. A quick Internet search of Hollomon's name turns up a variety of mentions of this practice by groups urging a more strict separation of church and state.

"I never quit doing that even though I got a lot of criticism about it," Hollomon said. "I did it as a witness."

the Lord at the young age of 12, it would be years later before she really experienced the freedom from bondage that only God could give. Music became a way out of pain and heartache for Randle and as a result of this God-given gift, many doors of opportunity have opened up for her.

One of those opportunities was to serve



other women through this conference and she's brought several other well-known sisters in Christ along for the journey.

Joining Randle will be legendary gospel singer Delores 'Mom' Winans, known also as the Matriarch of the first family of gospel music. She is a Grammy nominated singer and is recognized for her wit and wisdom. As a mother of ten and grandmother of 24, she inspires women across the nation who hear her testimony.

Get ready to move in your seat or on your feet because taking the stage on Saturday is Babbie Mason, daughter of a Baptist preacher and an award-winning singer, songwriter, teacher and TV talk show host.

Her contributions to Gospel music earned her a place in The Christian Music Hall of Fame

Motivational speaker Anne Beiler founder of Auntie Anne's Pretzels (located in 23 countries) delivers her testimony of trials and triumphs. Hear her story "Twist of Faith" as she shares the joys, heartaches, successes and failures in her life.

Randle noted that she hasn't read the book yet, in order to make sure that ideas and activities for the conference stay origi-




nal. She said she would be very interested in teaming up with George for a collaborative event in the future.


