

TNO Praises God for 100,000 Sacks!


This month marks the 100,000th Weekend Food Sack that has been distributed to hungry children in Topeka through Operation Backpack. Topeka North Outreach, Inc. (TNO) is giving God all the credit for the success of the Operation Backpack Ministry, according to Teresa Gartner, Vice President of TNO.

Weekend Food Sacks are filled with nutritional, single serving- sized, kid-



friendly food items that are easy for youth to prepare. Now in its 9th year, the Operation Backpack Ministry currently distributes food sacks to 500 children every Friday, at 9 area schools: Quincy, State Street, Elmont, Logan, Pleasant Hill, Rochester and West Indianola Elementary Schools, Lyman Learning Center and Seaman Middle School. The Weekend Food Sacks provided through Operation Backpack ensure that children have food EVERY day of the week, not just Monday through Friday when school-provided

Story Touches Hearts – Readers Make Christmas Wish Possible for Teen

The Christmas story to many teens can feel distant-like something that only happened 2,000 years ago. But for Grace, a resident of the Show-Me Christian Youth Home in central Missouri, the story of God's unconditional love through the gift of His son became very personal this year when three strangers entered her life, each bringing their humble gifts to honor God. Together they provided something extravagant and healing for one of His children. Grace's story, shared on the front page of the December 2014 edition of Metro Voice, united these individuals, who by their steps of faith each found their own powerful, personal joy and healing through the opportunity to share their best for Grace's future.

"Am I Worth Anything?"

Grace had every reason to have confidence in herself: she's intelligent,



athletic, pretty, and likeable. But she had a hard time seeing the good in herself because her past has distorted her understanding of her value and worth. "I grew up in a place where everyone cared about themselves: my biological parents only cared about

drugs and alcohol. They didn't care about their kids," Grace reflected. "When you hear most of your life that you are going to end up like your parents in jail, that you are not going to make it in life," said Grace. "You doubt everything about yourself and

think, "Am I worth anything?"

The Metro Voice story shared that, after her parents' incarceration when she was four, Grace and her sisters bounced around foster homes. When they finally found a family to adopt them, she thought her nightmare was over. Unfortunately, the years of hurt made it impossible for her trust these new parents; she was too angry to accept their love. She needed additional help.

At age 11, Grace went to Show-Me Children's Home. She was angry and didn't trust anyone, especially adults. "I was frustrated, mostly stuck on the question, 'Why did this happen? Why me?" As she was welcomed into a warm, loving family with layers of support, Grace started to heal. She rebuilt significant parts of life on a firm foundation. She accepted Christ and finally let her anger go, realizing that God redeems the hurts of our past.

WHICH COMPANIES MADE THE NAUGHTY LIST THIS CHRISTMAS?

Have you grown sick and tired of national retail chains bowing to the very small anti-Christmas minority?

If so, then take a good look at the list below, and use it to fight back when you do your Christmas shopping!

The American Family Association has released their annual "Naughty-or-Nice" list that categorizes retailers and how they approach the Christmas season.

Some of the names that made the "nice" list are well known companies such as Walmart, J.C. Penney, Kmart, and Lowe's, Others fell into a "marginal" list, meaning that they rarely or infrequently referred to Christmas, including Best Buy, CVS Pharmacy, Walgreens and Starbucks.

American Family Association reviewed up to four areas to determine if a company was "Christmasfriendly" in their advertising: print media (newspaper inserts), broadcast media (radio/television), website and/or personal visits to the store. If a company's ad has references to items associated with Christmas (trees, wreaths, lights, etc.), it was considered as an attempt to reach "Christmas" shoppers.

If a company has items associated

with Christmas, but did not use the word "Christmas," then the company is considered as censoring "Christmas."

AFA continually updates the list, so check afa.net for updates.

Want to report a company? Send detailed christmas@afa.net. Note: AFA does not list local or regional companies. Only nationally-recognized companies will be listed. This list only reflects a company's "Christmas" advertising and does not take into account other corporate policies AFA may not agree with.



Justice is rare for Christian women raped in Pakistan

(WNS)--Two Muslim men accused of raping Pakistani Christian sisters Sherish and Farzana were acquitted in October, an all too common outcome for rape trials in the Islamic nation. The teenage girls from the village of Jaranwala were abducted and raped in November 2014. They recognized their attackers as young Muslim men from the area and reported the assault, according to Morning Star News (MSN). Seeking punishment for their attackers meant danger for the entire family. Even before trial, they were threatened with death and attackers sprayed their home with gunfire. Now that the trial is over, their father thinks they're in greater danger, and the girls have been relocated for safety. "We didn't get justice," their father told the British Pakistani Christian Association.

meals are available.

TNO has been faithful to follow God's leading in developing the Operation Backpack program, Gartner said. This ministry has four goals: 1) Alleviate childhood hunger in Topeka, while heightening awareness of the problem. 2) Prevent health problems associated with childhood food insecurity (i.e., hunger). 3) Reduce financial and emotional stress on low-income parents. 4)

Show and share the love of God through hands-on service.

Many people in the community are not well-informed about childhood hunger. They may realize that it exists in Topeka, but don't begin to understand the magnitude of the problem.

Recent statistics from the Kansas Department of Education website, KSDE.org, are alarming. Over seventyseven percent (77.4%) of children in Topeka Public Schools USD# 501 fall into the economically disadvantaged category. Many of these children receive free or reduced-price meals during the school day, but every weekend they are at great risk for hunger. Kids Count Data (for 2015) from kac.org show 54.56% of children in Shawnee County, and 49.97% of children in Kansas participate in the federally funded Free and Reduced Price Lunch Programs.

Operation Backpack, part of TNO's Youth Program, was started because of these statistics. For more than 40 years, TNO has been committed to its mission of "Reaching Up To God, And Out To Our Neighbor In Need With The Love of Christ." Chartered in 1971 as a 501(c)3 non-profit, TNO is an all-volunteer

organization, consisting of 21 churches. TNO shares God's love with people who are struggling by helping to meet some of their basic needs. The organization offers a unique set of services that most other aid agencies do not offer. There are four main programs through which these services are provided: Christmas Adoption, Emergency Assistance, VIP Luncheon, and Youth Ministry — Operation Backpack, School Supplies, Hygiene Ministry.

There are many ways that you can help and get involved:

PRAYER: Pray for the people in the community who are in need of TNO's services, and for the organization's continued ability to help them.

TIME: Putting together food sacks or hygiene packs, or collecting food items takes just an hour or two a month, the 1st Thursday of every month at Lyman Learning Center, 2032 N. Kansas Ave. at 6 p.m. (You need not be a member of any church to volunteer with TNO.)

TALENT: If you have administrative or organizational skills, a strong back, or just a willing heart, you can help plan and administer programs, pick up food items at local grocers, deliver Operation Backpack food sacks to schools, or help with the Christmas adoption event. There are many other volunteer opportunities, none of which require a lifetime commit-

TREASURE: Just \$150 will provide a weekend food sack to an at-risk child for the entire school year! But monetary donations of any size are greatly appreciated and directly help those in need. TNO is an all-volunteer organization; 100% of the money received goes directly to its programs and to the people in need.

After years of being active in your church they are no longer part of the youth ministry, and not ready for adult ministries yet. So how can churches minister to their college students when they return for break?

Host a youth group reunion

Opportunities for young adults to be together are important during this time, and planning a youth group reunion or young adult Christmas party will give old friends time to reminisce and catch up.

Evy Nickerson, youth leader of Northside United Methodist Church in Brewster, Mass., held one for her former students during Thanksgiving break this year.

She invited all those who had graduated from the youth group in the last 10 years to a local restaurant for a night of memories. A slideshow of pictures from their youth group years was presented, some of their regular chaperones and Sunday school teachers were there, and each alumnus had an opportunity to talk about life after high school.

"Everyone had a great time," Nickerson reported, "and we planned to have another dinner."

Have a voung-adult service

A group service project is not only a great ministry to the community, but also provides opportunities for

the young adults in your church to spend time together. Arrange a time for them to serve together. They might volunteer with a local service organization or deliver gifts and meals to people in need. The young adults and the people they serve will be blessed.

Invite students to serve

While they are worshiping with you, invite your students to serve as guest musicians, liturgists, soloists, choir members, ushers, greeters, and the like. You will be giving them an opportunity to use their gifts again, something they might not have an opportunity to do at college. As a bonus, it also makes them visible to the largest number of congregants, who will then be more likely to greet them and welcome them

back to church.

Send them back with a gift and a prayer

Give the students a gift that lets them know their home church is thinking about them while they are away at school. For example, ask members of your congregation to crochet or knit prayer shawls or blankets for each of them. Then have your pastor, youth leaders, Sunday school teachers, and others, pray over the blankets before presenting them to the students. Not only will the shawls keep them warm, but they will also cover them with prayer — even when they are away.

Plan how to stay connected in spring

Many churches are good at staying connected to college students in the fall, but fewer continue those ministries in the spring. Plan now to send more "survival kits" in March or April and get ready to welcome the students back to church this summer!

States improve efforts to punish traffickers and rescue victims

WNS)--When the advocacy group Shared Hope released its first report card on efforts to combat sex trafficking of America's children, 26 states received a failing grade. This year's report card, was a surprise to Shared Hope founder, Linda Smith. "I was excited there were no Fs,"



Smith said. "In 2011, we had 26 states

with failing grades—so many places in the United States that could be scary places for our children."

In addition to no Fs, more than half the states earned either an A or a B. The Protected Innocence Challenge assigns A through F letter grades to all 50 states and the District of Columbia. It evaluates states on critical elements in the fight against sex trafficking of minors, including special criminal provisions for the men who buy children and legal and restorative services for their victims.

Former WWE Star Goes From Living in Sin to Kingdom Living

(Charisma News) — Taryn Terrell, aka World Wrestling Entertainment (WWE) ring girl/Diva Tiffany, has gone from shame to acceptance in her relationship with God.

Though Terrell had some belief in Jesus before signing on with WWE in 2010, she says she discarded her walk with God in favor of fame.

"I went on the road with WWE for a while and that want to be a Christian sort of went by the wayside," Terrell says in her tes-

timony video. "I lived in sin. I was not a good person. I can say that I am ashamed of who I was in a lot of ways and the decisions that I made, and it was because I wasn't a Christian. A lot of times I thought, 'How am I going to be a Christian? How can

I be accepted by God? I have done awful

things. I have not lived as a Christian.' I lived as a sinner."

But God stepped in and

But God stepped in and transformed her life.

"The heaviness of that came upon me and I went to church that next week and my pastor was talking about the same thing, the exact same thing. If God wasn't trying to talk to me,

then I don't know anything," she says.

story revealed that Grace hated to smile because of her teeth. More than just a cosmetic issue, for Grace, her teeth represented a deeper emotional wound, one that needed to be addressed.

Desperate, Grace asked her houseparents last year that instead of receiving Christmas gifts, could she get money so she could fix her teeth. But, it seemed only a dream because resources for orthodontic work simply isn't a luxury Show-Me can afford. The request was never verbalized to any supporters, but the Spirit was working in the hearts of some very caring contributors.

Three Angels Unite to Find a Smile

After hearing about Grace, Metro Voice ran the front-page story in the December edition. Unknown to each, three different families were touched by this story and compelled to take a step of faith to try to do something to get Grace braces. An unofficial "Braces for Grace" effort began.

The first to respond was Mike and Linda Thompson. They developed a deep connection with the children at Show-Me following the death of their son, Zach. Linda felt the Spirit tugging, "I related to her at that moment as a teenage girl. I saw her as beautiful, but she looks in the mirror and sees the flaws. And I thought, 'Let's fix it!"

The total cost fell beyond their budget, but Linda was determined. Around the same time, an anonymous family had read the same story and stepped forward wanting to help. The final piece was when a local orthodontist, Dr. Spencer, heard about the need and offered to significantly reduce the cost of services.

Linda commented, "I simply asked God what I could do, then God had things fall into place. Your own resources are going to fall short, God makes up the gap through the generosity of His people. It's not important that Grace remembers my name, but that there were people that cared about her and saw God's value in

her before she did. I hope the same for each of the kids at Show-Me."

The anonymous donors shared their thoughts as well:

"Last year, we had the opportunity to attend a promotion for Show-Me. Curious to learn more about this ministry we checked their Facebook page and found a link to a beautiful story 'Grace-

filled Christmas' from The Metro Voice."

They say their hearts were touched to read the story of Grace's life. "With tears falling down our cheeks, we read about her challenges and heart wounds," they shared. "Thrilled that she had found a loving home and was thriving with her family, school, and art, what really touched our hearts and compelled us to act was to read about her smile. We knew that God wanted us to take a step of faith and find a way to fund braces for Grace."

With a copy of the Metro Voice's article, they met at Dr. Spencer's office and shared how they wanted to be a part of operation "Braces for Grace."

"We felt our mission was to do some-

thing in a tangible way that would let Grace undoubtedly know that God knows the intricate details of our lives and that He has a plan and purpose for hers."

Not only did He rescue and restore her through the ministry of Show-Me, they said, but He saw the cry of her heart and did what God does best, used His people for His purposes.

"We hope that the message in this story is that first Grace knows how much God loves her and that she is an inspiration to many."

Grace doesn't hide her smile anymore. Grace's braces became a reality this past year.

When she looks at her teeth, she sees how her loving, heavenly Father coordinated His caring family to make sure she would have plenty of reasons to smile. She grows in confidence every day, thanks to layers of support and love received from Show-Me and from each contributor who makes her home there possible. Her smile is a reminder that she doesn't always have to know the "why" because she can trust that God is always working through His people, many of whom she will never know their name, to go above and beyond to invest in her life and future. As Grace put it, "when someone does something for you, like the braces, that's unconditional love. It means I am not in darkness where light can't shine. There is a purpose for everything. You just have to wait, gotta listen for God to tell us."

The Christmas Budget

ing. Take your number—let's say \$500—and think over your seasonal expenses. You'll need money for travel (\$50), tree and trimmings (\$50), a few potlucks and parties (\$50), and some extra giving (\$50). Then there's the Big Kahuna: Christmas gifts (\$300).

As long as you plan where you money will go before you spend it, there's no right or wrong way to split up your Christmas budget. Plus, if that Evergreen goes on sale, or you economize on your potluck groceries, that means more money to splurge on your loved ones.

3. Write down who you need to buy for

Now that you know exactly how much you can spend on gifts, decide who gets what. Make a list of everyone you'll buy for this year. And we mean everyone—coworkers, church friends, your parents, your kids, your grandkids. Next to each name (or category, if you're budgeting a treat for the office), write a specific dollar amount.

If you don't have enough money to cover everyone on your list, rethink how much you'll spend on each person. Maybe you can agree to only buy for the kids. Or perhaps you can draw names, instead of buying for multiple families. And then there are always baked goods or homemade crafts! Who doesn't love a gift that comes fresh out of the oven or straight from the heart?

You probably have a lot of great ideas on how to spend your money this season. When you start with a plan, you'll be in control of your Christmas budget long before setting foot into the mall. Your wake-up call

Dear Dave

My husband and I are both 50, and we make about \$50,000 a year. We have a little bit of debt, and recently my mother-in-law moved in with us due to health issues. We've always gotten by, but now we're struggling with the additional expense of having her with us. We love her, but we're unsure what to do financially. Do you have any suggestions?

Dear Jen,

Anytime things get tight and something like that happens, it's your wake-up call. It's the phone ringing, so I'm going to tell you to pick up the phone. It's telling you

that you've been kind of sloppy and disorganized with your finances in the past, but you've made just enough money to get away with it.

Her moving in tightened things up, and that's understandable to a point. But it has shone a spotlight on the fact that you're going to have to start doing a written plan and behaving. Chances are you're going to have to cut back on some stuff, because you've chosen to take care of her. This is an honorable choice and a wonderful thing you're doing, by the way.

With this added responsibility you've taken on — and many Americans are facing the same thing — you're going to find yourselves on one end of the Sandwich Generation. They're sandwiched between taking care of their parents and taking care of their grown kids. And the way you handle it is with a written budget.

The good news is that with a detailed plan, you can analyze whether you need extra income, if you need to cut some expenses or both. You've got to create a little margin to have a clear picture of your future. If you just wander along without a plan, you're going to make a mess out of this, and it's going to get bad fast.

What percentage?

Dear Dave,

What percentage of your total net worth should your personal residence be during retirement?

Dear Sue,

Honestly, I don't have a set percentage for this kind of thing. The larger your net worth, the smaller the percentage would be. Let's say you're worth \$5 million. In this scenario, you wouldn't want to have 50 percent in your home. But if you're worth \$150,000, you're probably going to have more than 50 percent in your home.

So, the smaller your net worth is, the larger the percentage your home will likely be. That's very reasonable, and it's one way you can look at. If you're in the million-dollar range of net worth, I don't think I'd want to have half or more of it in my house.

But I think you see how I'm looking at that. You want to try and have as small a portion as possible, but you also have to have a home that's suitable for your needs.

What would Jesus have us do about Syrian refugees?

Is there room for both compassion AND security?

If you have been on social media at all in recent weeks, you have likely seen the oftentimes heated debate of how to respond to the Syrian refugee crisis.

Especially as Christians, we face a tough dilemma: do we extend compassion or do we focus on protecting our own security--and are the two mutually exclusive?

These are questions that do not have easy answers. In fact, some of the articles out there on this issue are themselves meant to be thought-provoking pieces, rather than concrete opinions.

Bobby Ross Jr.'s article "Would Jesus Take in Syrian Refugees?': Washington Post Asks the Right Question," does not provide readers with an answer to the dilemma, but it does put us on the right track, which is first asking the right questions.

As Christians who live in America, we face perhaps a particular dilemma. Our patriotic and America-centric ideology is often so enmeshed with our Christian theology that we no longer



know how to extricate the two.

Therefore, in order to begin to offer an insightful and wise opinion on the Syrian refugees issue, we must first take the necessary time to research, ponder, and prayerfully consider what Jesus requires of us in such a situation.

Ross applauds the Washington Post article for asking what he has called "the right question."

"Would Jesus take in Syrian refugees?" asks author of the article, Michelle Boorstein.

"The question is particularly complicated for conservative Christians, who have become increasingly concerned in the last few years about the plight of Christians in the Middle East and simultaneously are often the most guarded about border security and increased immigration," she continues.

A good place (the best place) to start in seeking God's will in the Syrian refugee crisis is God's word itself. A Relevant article offers 12 Bible passages that speak to God's commanded response to refugees and foreigners.

Deuteronomy 10:18-19 sounds almost shockingly fitting to the present case: "He defends the cause of the fatherless and the widow, and loves the foreigner residing among you, giving them food and clothing. And you are to love those who are foreigners, for you yourselves were foreigners in Egypt."

If we substitute Egypt for wherever our ancestors came from, whether they arrived with the Pilgrims or came over on Ellis Island, or perhaps even as slaves from Africa, this verse will likely hit home.

In all of this discussion, as Christians we must seek to go beyond gut reactions and to reach for truth. We are unlikely to achieve a "lightbulb" moment of epiphany with a neatly presented answer, but we are still called to "not forsake wisdom, and she will pro-

tect you; love her, and she will watch over you. Wisdom is supreme; therefore get wisdom. Though it cost all you have, get understanding" (Proverbs 4:6-7).

Neither peripheral compassion or peripheral anger will put us on the path to making an informed decision in this crisis.

Ross says of prominent evangelical author Johnnie Moore, "Despite his focus on saving Christian refugees, he called it "entirely reasonable" to pause immigration from Syria to review the process of screening applicants."

Those like Ross and Moore suggest that there is room on this issue both for considering national security and for extending compassion. Our involved and strenuous task now is to determine the best course to maintain and achieve both.

Every Christmas we do the "Holiday Hustle and Bustle" two-step and may experience the "Christmas Blues" along with a good mix of some "Christmas Family Conflict." But there is one more feature to the "most wonderful time of the year", the war on Jesus. Some may say the war on Christmas, but if we are honest, it is really about Jesus.

"It's Beginning to Look a lot Like Christmas . . . Mythicism's in the Air" was the title of a column that caught my attention, written by Dr. John Dixon. He is a professor at the University of Sydney teaching a class on the historical Jesus.

Mythicism or the Jesus Myth is a

teaching that advocates Jesus never existed. The majority of religious scholars reject the legitimacy of their arguments since there is such widespread consensus for His existence.

However, this arena of thought is growing in influence and fighting for an academic spot at the table. During Christmas and Easter we often see these mythicist-driven attacks on Jesus.

When looking for evidence for the historical Jesus, eye witness accounts are the most valuable. They are prized above second-hand testimonies, of which there are several in and outside of the Biblical record. However, the only place that contains first-hand accounts of Jesus is the Bible itself.

Matthew wrote of meeting Jesus in third person saying, "As Jesus passed on from there, he saw a man called Matthew sitting at the tax booth, and he said to him, 'Follow me.' And he rose and followed him" (Matt. 9:9). Paul records his statement writing, "[Jesus] appeared to me also" (1 Cor. 15:8). And Peter recounts his experience saying he


was "a witness of the sufferings of Christ" (1 Pet. 5:1).

For centuries skeptics have put these eyewitness accounts on the anvil of doubt. Yet examination after examination has proven their testimonies were reliable.

Our eyewitness accounts I have left out. How do you explain millions of people over the last 2,000 years who have given testimony of being transformed by Jesus? Many have never met each other, lived in different centuries and on different continents and spoken different languages. How could they have conspired together? I argue that every soul who has been born again by the living Christ is a

legitimate and definitive source of evidence that proves Jesus is real and alive!

Come on, all doubters and skeptics! Come to the empty manger, cross and tomb. You will not find Him there but you can find Him on your knees when you cry out from the depths of your



soul to know Him. There you will see Him in all His glory and be able to give your own eye witness account.

An open letter to Churchless Christians

"I love Jesus, I just don't like going to church." So goes the common refrain of the Churchless Christian.

You believe Jesus Christ died for your sins and God raised Him from the dead. You've committed to following Jesus, believe the Bible is the Word of God and even enjoy reading it. But come Sunday morning, you will not be found in a pew; you'll be on a golf course, visiting family or sitting in a comfy chair at home.

Maybe you've had a bad past experience with the church, maybe you work long hours and just want a break. Whatever the reason, though you love Jesus, you don't feel like church is a necessary part of your Christian life.

If you are a Churchless Christian, allow me to challenge you with the following

1. If you've given your whole life to Christ, why are you keeping your Sundays for yourself?

I get it, Sunday morning is a nice time to relax. Though I personally find church attendance both refreshing and invigorating, let's concede that attending church on Sunday morning is a sacrifice. But let's keep it in perspective. Jesus told His followers, "If anyone would come after Me, let him deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow Me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for My sake will save it." (Luke 9:23-24).

To state the obvious, carrying your death-cross and giving up your special time on Sunday morning are not exactly comparable. Can someone really be willing to die for Jesus, but unwilling to give up their Sunday mornings for Him? Friend, when Jesus saved you He saved you to be in His service. Part of this service involves strengthening the other servants, which leads to our next question.

2. What do you do with the "one another" commands in the Bible?

The New Testament is full of "one another" commands — commands to bear with one another, honor one another, serve one another, teach one another, forgive one another, etc. All of these activities imply active, ongoing membership in a Christian community. The author of Hebrews tells us to "consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and

all the more as you see the Day drawing near" (Hebrews 10:24-25).

"Meet together" speaks of the assembly of the believers. Thus, if you are a Christian, you are directly commanded to continue attending a local assembly of believers in order to give and receive encouragement in the faith. In the verses that follow this passage, we are warned that those who neglect this assembly place their souls in danger, cutting themselves off from God's chosen means to keep us on pilgrim path. This brings us to our next question.

3. Who is shepherding your soul?

"The Lord is my Shepherd", you answer, "I shall not want!" True, but do you know how He shepherds us? He appoints qualified under-shepherds to keep watch over the souls of His sheep. "Obey your leaders and submit to them, for they are keeping watch over your souls, as those who will have to give an account. Let them do this with joy and not with groaning, for that would be of no advantage to you" (Hebrews 13:17).

Church leaders are God's means of feeding and protecting His flock, and they will answer to Him for the souls in their care. If you don't belong to a local assembly, how can a godly leader possibly oversee your soul? And if there is no one to oversee your soul, how can you possibly keep this command to submit to your leaders? Going to church is not optional, and if you are resistant to this idea, that says more about you than you know. This brings us to the final question.

4. Can a person truly love Christ without loving His bride?

In Acts 20:28 Paul commissions the leadership of a local congregation to "Pay careful attention to yourselves and to all the flock, in which the Holy Spirit has made you overseers, to care for the church of God, which he obtained with his own blood."

Each and every local fellowship of true believers has been obtained with the very blood of Jesus. Jesus gave His life and paid the ultimate price to purchase and create the church. Why? Because Jesus loves the church. The church is called the Bride of Christ, it is His treasure and joy. Friend, if you love Jesus, you will love what He loves.

Churchless Christian, if you love God and His Word, you should be convicted by these questions. But don't just be convicted. Sunday is a new day and a new opportunity to break a bad habit. Resolve right now to go to a faithful Bible teaching church, and start loving Jesus by loving His church.

And that's the great message of Christmas. It's not that Christ takes us away into His perfect, orderly world. It's that He comes to us wherever we are, enters our difficult circumstances,




Candles at Paris memorials will glitter along with Christmas lights this year

CHRISTMAS BEGINS WITH

DO YOU NEED A VISIT FROM THE GHOSTS OF CHRISTMAS?

Marley was dead.

That's an odd way to begin a Christmas story, but it's how Charles Dickens opens "A Christmas Carol." Written to pay off a debt, the story of Scrooge being haunted by three ghosts is one of the world's most enduring Christmas tales – perhaps second only to the original story of Christmas (the one with the wise men and shepherds).

The story is universally known, having been played out in dozens of movies and TV specials. (Some insist that the 1938 film with Reginald Owen is the definitive version, while purists like myself prefer the 1962 version with Mr. Magoo in the lead role.) Ebeneezer Scrooge, who cares more about money than people, is visited by three spirits – the Ghost of Christmas Past, the Ghost of Christmas Present, and the Ghost of Christmas Yet to Come – who show him the error of his ways.

You're almost certainly not a Scrooge – but a bit of the old "Bah Humbug" can creep into any Christian's life each year as the commercial and social demands of the Christmas season threaten to obscure the quiet birth of that special baby so long ago. Perhaps what's needed is a Christmas Carol of your own – an encounter with past, present and future that will bring you back to your very own point of "God bless us, every one."

Let's begin.

The Ghost of Christmas Past

In the Dickens tale, the Ghost of Christmas Past takes Scrooge on a tour of the happiest and saddest moment from his past life.

Even without a ghostly escort, you're likely to have plenty of memories – both happy and sad – associated with

Maybe your ghost of Christmas past is a particularly good memory that stands as an impossible standard toward which you strive, year after year, without success. The happiness of a childhood Christmas may seem forever elusive – if only because you just don't get that excited about Legos today.

On the flip side, the memory of a sad or

disappointing Christmas can push us into overdrive, making us spend too much, plan too much and take on too much in an effort to achieve a perfection that is not possible in this life

The challenge of trying to live up to your best Christmas memories – or avoid a repeat of your worst ones – can rob your current Christmas celebration of its joy.

One way to move past this kind of haunting based on years gone by is to take a good look at your ghosts in the light of day. Looking at you childhood memories with adult eyes can give you a new appreciation for your parents. And if you try to make a realistic appraisal you may find that the perfect Christmas of your childhood wasn't flawless, and that the disappointing Christmas wasn't a psyche-scarring horror.

In fact, those may have been fairly ordinary Christmases, and what set them apart was the way you and others reacted to them. No amount of gingerbread and eggnog can bring happiness to a person who is determined to cling to their "Bah, Humbug!" And no culinary or gift-related disaster can steal the contentment away from a person who has truly decided to bask in the simple joys of the season.

The Ghost of Christmas Present

Dickens has the Ghost of Christmas Present show Scrooge the meager celebrations of the Cratchitt family, including the plight of their crippled son, Tiny Tim. Despite their struggles, they're still happy—a truth that astonishes Scrooge. It's good to remember that we don't' have to be overwhelmed by our circumstances. God is faithful, and like then Apostle Paul we can learn to be content regardless of our situation.

The Ghost of Christmas Present also reminds us that being aware of the struggles faced by others and doing something about it -- perhaps by supporting the good work of an organization like the Salvation Army or World Vision – can bring a new depth to your Christmas joy.

But it's another kind of "Christmas present" that often trips us up – the Christmas presents we give to one another. The simple act of gift giving often isn't so simple after all. We wind up giving gifts

we can't afford, trying to prove our love or buy the love of others, or letting fear that our gift will somehow be inadequate steal the joy that is inherent in the act of giving to another.

To deal with this particular ghost, it's good to think a bit about what a gift is really for. Do we give somebody a gift to provide something they're not able to purchase themselves? Not usually. Do we give it to prove that we love them? Well, if they don't already know this it's unlikely that anything you can tie up with a bow will get the point across. Then how about to buy their love? Try this, and you'll soon learn what the Beatles already know: "Can't buy me love."

The most impersonal gift exchange imaginable would involve family members exchanging \$20 bills with one another. But even a personal hand-made gift can be a dud if, for instance, it reflects your Aunt Sally's love for knitting rather than your love for sweaters.

The very best gifts – large and small – all convey this important message: "I know you." A great gift lets the recipient know that you care enough to know something about their interests, their hobbies, their passions, their likes and dislikes. A great gift says, "I know you love this kind of music, so I think you'll enjoy this," or "I know you enjoy this hobby, so this might come in handy."

We were created for fellowship with God, and are designed to be completely known by our Creator. The hunger to be known is planted deep inside of us, and a thoughtful gift that meets that need has a value that goes far beyond its price tag.

The Ghost of Christmas Future

The third spirit to visit Scrooge shows him a frightening vision of the future. Modern Christmas shoppers can face their own "Ghost of Christmas Yet to Come" if they break out their credit cards to buy gifts they can't afford. If you want to avoid being haunted by the ghost of this Christmas for months to come, put away the plastic and focus on thoughtful gifts that you can afford.

Credit card spending isn't the only way we borrow trouble at Christmas time. Family gatherings can quickly move from joyful to wistful if you start playing the "This is probably the last Christmas that we'll ever..." game. Parents whose children are growing sooner or later have to face the fact that at some point it won't work to have the whole family together. Families with aging loved ones must cope with the knowledge that each Christmas might be the last for Grandma or Grandpa.

Change is a part of life, but particularly at Christmas time we like to cling to tradition. Don't let the cares of tomorrow rob the joys of today. Leave tomorrow's sorrows for tomorrow.



The real Christmas Carol

Of course, the best way to deal with these ghosts is to focus your attention on the real Christmas story – one that has a stable instead of a counting house, and wise men instead of spirits.

For the ghost of Christmas past, remember the tiny baby in the manger. Remember that God cared enough to send His very best – and to send Him in a package we could understand and relate to.

For the ghost of Christmas present, reflect on the role Jesus plays in your life today. Remember that the babe of

Bethlehem is alive today, and working through His people. Jesus was called "Immanuel," which means "God with us," and that's a truth that continues to this day.

And for the ghost of Christmas yet to come, realize that even as we're remembering Jesus quietly slipping into the world more than 2,000 years ago, we can also look forward to a significantly more noticeable return someday. Jesus came once, and He's coming again. That's more than enough reason to be merry this Christmas.







High court will hear nonprofit Obamacare cases

(WNS)--On Nov. 6 the U.S. Supreme Court surprised nonprofits challenging the contraceptive and abortifacient mandate by granting all seven of their petitions a hearing. The court will consolidate the seven cases into one argument, considering whether the mandate is an intolerable burden on nonprofits as it was for the forprofit companies in Burwell v. Hobby Lobby.

This is a remarkable turn of events, after nonprofits had a losing streak at the circuit level and fretted about getting their cases before the high court. Churches are fully exempt from the mandate, but the federal government has a special regulation for nonprofits who object to the mandate on religious grounds.

The regulation attempts to provide the objectionable drugs through indirect funding mechanisms: The nonprofit signs a form

for the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), stating its objection and naming its insurance provider. Then HHS arranges coverage of the objectionable drugs for the nonprofits' employees through the insurer or a third

Hulu refuses to run ads linking Planned Parenthood, abortion

(WNS)--Online streaming service Hulu has refused to air commercials produced by Students for Life of America (SFLA) that encourage women to seek health care somewhere other than Planned Parenthood. In an attempt to reach women who might not normally see pro-life material, SFLA created two ads that note Planned Parenthood's close association with abortion and refer women to a federally funded health care center, of which there are more than 13,000 across the country. The ads target women unsure about abortion but wary of



pro-life organizations. SFLA wanted the ads to function like a public service announcement, instead of a "pro-life vs. pro-choice" campaign. SFLA first discussed advertising with a Hulu representative in May. In early June, Hulu sent SFLA a proposal—including prices—to reach its target audience. But when SFLA submitted the ads in October, Hulu refused to accept them. "Unfortunately we can't accept ads that surround issues like this. We've run it past our ad standards team and it does not fit with the environment," a Hulu account executive told SFLA, adding Hulu doesn't accept ads related to guns, gambling, marijuana, or abortion.

Congo releases a small fraction of adopted children to families

(WNS)--Dozens of children stuck in halted adoptions in the Democratic Republic of Congo are now authorized to leave the country after two years of waiting, according to an announcement by Congolese officials Nov. 2. In September 2013, Congo's government suddenly froze all international adoptions by refusing to issue any exit permits for adopted children. The halt left hundreds of families in limbo, some with finalized adoptions whose children were unable to leave the country and others stuck in the middle of the adoption process. The exit permit is required to take the children through airport security as they leave the country. Last Monday's announcement is the first action by the Congolese government in months

Government officials announced they would grant exit permits to 72 adopted children, 69 with completed paperwork and three with serious medical conditions. The released children will travel to new homes in Italy, Belgium, Canada,



Germany, France, the Netherlands, Switzerland, and the United States.

Nearly 1,000 adoptive families, almost half of them American, remain stuck in the system, and there is little hope those cases will proceed quickly.


Let's face it, James Bond represents a fantasy for both men and women. While

The only album you need

Christmas songs in October? That's what I thought two months ago. Usually I'd be the first to complain. There's nothing worse than popping into a shop that's belting out seasonal

music weeks before
Advent even begins. But
in the case of Rend
Collective I made an
exception. Their
Christmas album was
initially released last year,
but gpt a re-release in
October, only a couple of
months after their fourth
album proper – As

Family We Go. But by getting it out there early, their fresh arrangements of classic carols and Christmas songs will be accessible to worship leaders around the world – who should welcome this wonderful collection.

Recorded mostly in their trademark upbeat folk style, the majority of songs here will be familiar. Some are designed to get a Christmas party started – such as the brilliantly frenetic Ding Dong Merrily on High or their jaunty take on Joy to the World.

There are calmer, more worshipful moments as well, though. O Come All Ye Faithful is replete with beautiful harmonies and O Holy Night (a tough track to cover well) is packed with sleigh bells and other nice touches. Their version of Joyful, Joyful is mashed up with the refrain from O Come, O Come Emmanuel – and it works well.

The surprising feature at the heart of the album is two covers of contempo-

rary secular songs that have been retold by Rend as Christmas anthems. And they pull it off perfectly. First, the cover of Shining Light by their fellow Northern Irish band Ash is a triumph. Already a brilliant pop song, Rend infuse it with a new lease of life via

some rewritten lyrics about the birth of Jesus.

A second surprising cover version comes in the form of the penultimate track on the album — Shakin' Stevens' 1985 classic Merry Christmas Everybody. Complete with banjo solo, the joy

spills out on this version – the fun the band is having is obvious and infectious. It's a radio staple at Christmas time and popular wisdom says you can't top the original – but they've given it a good go and made it their own – with the last line being "From Rend Collective, Merry Christmas Everyone!"

The final track of the album uses the melody to Auld Lang Syne with different lyrics — entitled For All That You Have Done.

This would work well as the sound-track of your Christmas party, in the run-up to a Carol service at church or indeed as the soundtrack to unwrapping presents with the family on the day itself. It's the perfect mix of seasonal spirit, without being cheesy or too close to a novelty Christmas record.

If you only buy one Christmas album this year – make sure it's this one. It's sure to be the best one out there.





With her life about to be forever changed, Peyton iournalist MacGruder (Genie Francis) sets out on an emotional journey determined to find the note's intended recipient and deliver







Create Google News alerts using industry-specific terms or organizations' names to receive relevant articles; identify major organizations associated with your cause and join them; and subscribe to industry-specific online newsletters, blogs and Twitter feeds.

SOCIAL SECURITY QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME

Question:

I just got a notice from Social Security that said my Supplemental Security Income (SSI) case is being reviewed. What does this mean?

Answer:

Social Security reviews every SSI case from time to time to make sure the individuals who are receiving payments should continue to get them. The review also determines whether individuals are receiving the correct amounts. You can learn more about SSI by visiting our website on the subject at www.socialsecurity.gov/ssi.

DISABILITY

Question:

What is the difference between the disability application and the disability report? Do I have to complete both?

Answer:

A disability application is a claim for Social Security disability benefits. A disability report provides information about your current physical or mental



condition that we need to process your disability application. To establish a claim for disability benefits, you need to file a disability application, submit a disability report, and provide an authorization to release medical records. The best place to start is at www.socialsecurity.gov/applyfordisability.

Question:

I've been turned down for disability benefits. How do I appeal?

Answer:

When we make a decision on your application, we will send you a letter explaining our decision. If you do not agree with our decision, you can appeal. Appealing means you can ask us to look at your case again. You must appeal within 60 days from the date

you got our decision letter. You can:

• File a disability appeal online at www.socialsecurity.gov/disability/appeal and provide documents to support your request electronically. You can file an appeal online even if you live outside of the United States; or

• Visit your local Social Security office.

MEDICARE

Question:

How do I apply for Extra Help with Medicare prescription drug plan costs?

Answer:

You have several options for applying. You can:

• Apply online by visiting www.socialsecurity.gov/medicare/prescriptionhelp;

• Call Social Security at 1-800-772-1213 (TTY 1-800-325-0778) to apply over the phone or request an application; or

• Apply at any local Social Security office.

Anyone who has Medicare can get Medicare Part D prescription drug coverage. Some people with limited resources and income are eligible for Extra Help to pay for the costs—monthly premiums, annual deductibles, and prescription co—payments—related to a Medicare prescription drug plan. Learn more at www.socialsecurity.gov/medicare.

GENERAL

Question:

I prefer reading by audio book. Does Social Security have audio publications?

Answer:

Yes, we have many helpful publications you can listen to. You can find them at www.socialsecurity.gov/pubs. Some of the publications available include What You Can Do Online, How Social Security Can Help You When a Family Member Dies, Apply Online for Social Security Benefits, and Your Social Security Card and Number. You can listen now at www.socialsecurity.gov/pubs.

Question:

I am receiving Social Security retirement benefits and I recently went back to work. Do I have to pay Social Security (FICA) taxes on my income?

Answer:

Yes. By law, your employer must withhold FICA taxes from your paycheck. Although you are retired, you do receive credit for those new earnings. Each year Social Security automatically credits the new earnings and, if your new earnings are higher than in any

earlier year used to calculate your current benefit, your monthly benefit could increase. For more information, visit www.socialsecurity.gov.

RETIREMENT

Question:

How are my retirement benefits calculated?

Answer:

Your Social Security benefits are based on earnings averaged over your lifetime. Your actual earnings are first adjusted or "indexed" to account for changes in average wages since the year the earnings were received. Then we calculate your average monthly indexed earnings during the 35 years in which you earned the most. We apply a formula to these earnings and arrive at your basic benefit. This is the amount you would receive at your full retirement age. You may be able to estimate your benefit by using our Retirement Estimator, which offers estimates based on your Social Security earnings. You can find the Retirement Estimator at www.socialsecurity.gov/estimator.

Question:

I know that Social Security's full retirement age is gradually rising to 67. But does this mean the "early" retirement age will also be going up by two years, from age 62 to 64?

Answer:

No. While it is true that under current law the full retirement age is gradually rising from 65 to 67, the "early" retirement age remains at 62. Keep in mind, however, that taking early retirement reduces your benefit amount. For more information about Social Security benefits, visit the website at www.socialsecurity.gov.

DISABILITY

Ouestion:

I've heard there is a way for my daughter to get her disability application on the "fast-track." How does this work?

Answer

If your daughter has one of the more than 200 impairments on the Compassionate Allowances list at www.socialsecurity.gov/compassionateallowances, her application might be "fast-tracked" for a decision. Compassionate Allowances make it possible for applicants to receive a decision on their disability applications within days instead of months or years as long as their medical conditions are so severe that they obviously meet Social Security's definition of disability. HALL OF FAMER TIM BROWN OPENS UP ABOUT FAITH AND STRUGGLES

As Tim Brown told the story of his journey during the Pro Football Hall of Fame induction ceremonies on Aug. 8, he mentioned a traumatic moment when he was six months old.



He had an infection, and had to go to the hospital. Doctors talked of doing surgery.

"My mom, my grandfather, and my uncle, they prayed," Brown said that day as thousands listened to his induction speech. "The doctor gave me medicine, two hours later I was doing fine. And my mom said from that day on that she thought that God had something special for me. I don't know if she thought it was this special, but she knew that God had something special for me."

Nearly all of Brown's football career, in high school, college and the pros, has been special.

In high school, he was recruited by major college football programs despite his team's 4-25-1 record in his three years as a starter. In college while at Notre Dame, he became the first wide receiver to win the Heisman Trophy. And in the NFL, he retired with the second-most receiving yards (14,934) in league history, was voted to nine Pro Bowls, and set Oakland Raiders records for receptions, receiving yards and punt return yards.

And, he earned his sport's biggest honor when he was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in August.

"I think God gives you a talent for a reason, and if He touches your life to live for Him and certainly to do it on the middle of a football field, it's an incredible opportunity to really get some heads turned," he told CBN recently.

And what comes with turning heads, he told CBN, is a platform that he takes seriously.

"Everytime I go to talk to kids, that's the one thing I leave them with—go to church, please go to church. You know, because in my opinion there is nothing more important you can do with your life. Education is great, but I tell them I know a lot of educated fools out there...but it's the Word of God, and the Spirit of God that can keep you from being crazy and doing the things that we shouldn't be doing.

"When I sung in the choir back in the



day, there was a song we used to sing, a song called 'God Is' and the song started out, 'God is the joy and strength of my life,' and the song ended up 'God is my all and all.' And I think that's what it all comes down to."

If you remember, Wilson threw four interceptions in the NFC Championship game in January, yet still managed to lead the Seahawks to a dramatic victory against

the Packers to advance to the Super Bowl. Wilson told the media after the game, "That's God setting it up, to make it so dramatic, so rewarding, so special."

When asked about Wilson's comments on a Wisconsin radio show in the coming days, Rodgers supposedly scoffed and commented, "I don't think God cares a whole lot about the outcome. He cares about the people involved, but I don't think He's a big football fan."

He stated his stance then, but now, in Week 2 of the 2015-16 season, perhaps Rodgers was sarcastically dishing one final blow to Wilson's logic and ideology.

Oh, the theological battleground of the NFL!

My intention in writing this column is not to pick sides or weigh in on another celebrity feud (I could care less about stuff like that, whether it's Rodgers and Russell or Nicki Minaj and Miley Cyrus); nor do I want to add more unnecessary noise in our over-sensitive society that seems to be outraged or offended over anything these days. I want to write about this, quite simply,

because I've always appreciated the avenue sports presents to talk about issues of faith and culture—real issues that shape how we see the world.

To begin, one thing I admire about Wilson, judging from Twitter and his interviews with the media, is how his faith seems to bleed into everything he does.

Sure, perhaps he becomes more of a polarizing figure whenever he uses phrases like "God told me..." in relation to sexual

purity with his girlfriend Ciara or "God planned this..." in relation to a football game, but how he expresses his faith is entirely up to him—that's not for me to judge. I believe that faith, no matter what it is, is a deeply personal thing, and is generally something that makes people better unless it inflicts harm on others. So I commend Wilson for seeming to see just about everything

through the lens of his faith—it's inspiring to see his unabashed willingness to be himself.

All this to say, I must also admit—if indeed Rodgers was being sarcastic in his recent comments, and it seems that he was—I found what he said to be comical, and, yes, witty.

Isn't it interesting that this same topic—whether or not God cares about who wins or loses—seems to come up each and every year? Just two years ago, Sports Illustrated ran a cover story featuring Ray Lewis with the headline: "Does God care who wins the Super Board?"

And now, here we are once more.

In a society where athletes make mainstream news for bringing God into winning and losing, what can we learn from all this? Primarily, I think we must be careful when we bring up God's name, particularly when it comes to matters of success and winning. We must consider our intentions. God is not a good-luck charm. He is the Almighty, the Creator of the heavens and the earth, the One who intricately knit us together in our mothers' wombs. The only response to a grace such as this is awe, and even fear perhaps because of its profundity.

In our last issue, I wrote a column that challenged readers to reflect a God that we can't explain more than a God that we can explain, to gain mystery and wonder in our approach to spirituality instead of playing the "God card." This column is sort of a Part II. Does God have the power to knock a football out of Dez Bryant's hands in the playoffs? Sure. But unless I see the incarnate Christ hit Bryant in the gut (not helmet to helmet) and knock the ball loose, I'd rather dwell on the fact that He created the stars or died for me. It's less complicated, or perhaps more complicated. And it's certainly more wondrous and mysterious.

I'm grateful Rodgers' comments brought this topic to light once more because I think it's an important question every Christian must answer: Does God care who experiences success or who wins in life?

What's interesting about this whole idea of success and winning is that Jesus shattered the mold for all of this. He was the exact opposite of what people expected the Messiah to be. He was not a king who overthrew the Roman government. He was a suffering Savior who came to save humanity from their sins. His victory was set into motion by a horrific death on a wooden cross. And yet, it is the greatest victory this world has ever seen.

Author and pastor Tim Keller puts it this way: "The gospel is the ultimate story that shows victory coming out of defeat, strength coming out of weakness, life coming out of death, rescue from abandonment. And because it is a true story, it gives us hope because we know that life is really like that."

Maybe if we allow ourselves to understand the depth and beauty of victory in its truest sense, then we will have a different perspective on what it truly means to win and experience success in this world.

And it will likely be a victory we never expected.




