Once in crisis, former group home resident grows up to change lives

In 1985, Jon's family faced a crisis. When his father walked out on the family, his mother and two siblings were left



in chaos. Through a church in Columbia, Mo., she found out about a place that could care for her children while she got back on her feet. Jon's

mother made the toughest decision of her life: to place her young children at Show-Me Christian Youth Home.

The chance to be just a child

At Show-Me, Jon came alive. For the first time ever, he didn't have to worry about the burdens of life - he could be a boy. "I remember having the freedom to just run across a field and kick a ball and just be free, "Jon recalls. His first and happiest childhood memories revolve around his time at Show-Me.

Jon found a good mix of responsibility and the freedom to enjoy childhood. Show-Me provided him with the foundation for good life principles: a strong work ethic, good stewardship, appreci-

The numbers are in and unemployment is up in both Missouri and Kansas-including Kansas City. The situation reflects many areas of the country, and some economists say it's a warning sign the weak recovery begun after the 2008 recession is faltering-or worse yet-reversing. For most it means belt-tightening, with less dinners out and postponement of a new purchase. For Kansas City's at-risk families and individuals it may mean a night on the street or a day without food.

Increased need means that food pantries, soup kitchens and other services offered to our needy neighbors continue to stretch the resources of local

organizations. The problem seems most critical as Thanksgiving and Christmas approach and Kansas City prepares for what forecasters are calling a possibly bone-chilling winter...

This year, Metro Voice readers can again do their part by answering the call to assist with food and warm clothing donations, finances or volunteer.

Here are several of the major organizations that serve Kansas City's poor and homeless but there are countless others across the metro. Check with your church or area lay clergy organization to see if there is one that serves your community. Plus, don't forget the smaller rural towns that surround

France plans ban on pro-life websites

(WNS)--The French government announced in September that it plans to ban pro-life websites found guilty of "deliberately deceiving" women with the appearance of neutrality. Under an amendment to a current "Equality and Citizenship" law, owners of pro-life sites could face a 30,000 euro fine (about \$33,600) and two years in prison, the same penalties that currently apply to "the offense of obstruc-



tion to abortion,' which has been illegal since 1993. "Being hostile to abortion is an opinion protected by the civil liberties in

Massachusetts churches sue over 'anti-bias' law

(WNS)--Four Massachusetts churches and their pastors filed a pre-emptive lawsuit in October in an attempt to halt application of a newly amended state law requiring pastors to temper their speech and churches to allow transgender persons to use the bathroom of their choice. In July, Massachusetts legislators amended General Law 272, known as "Crimes against Chastity, Morality, Decency and Good Order," to add gender identity to the list of protected classes. Neither the law nor the amendment offer religious exemptions from compliance or name religious institutions as places of public accommodation. But in their interpretation of the law, the Massachusetts Commission against Discrimination (MCAD) and Attorney General Maura Healey declared "houses of worship" can be subject to the rule and its penalties if they host a "secular" event. The law also prohibits speech that "discriminates" or "incites" discrimination, which could apply to church staff offering biblical teaching about God's design for men, women, and human sexuality. Violators could be fined up to \$2,500 and face up to one year in prison-or both.

Missouri unemployment rates continues to climb

Missouri's unemployment rate has increased for the fourth straight month. Missouri's September unemployment figure was 5.2%. That's up a full percentage point since the March low of 4.2%. The figure is also above the national unemployment rate of 5%.

Archaeologists uncover city gate destroyed by Hezekiah





King Hezekiah's seal

(WNS)--King Hezekiah abhorred the idol worship rampant in Judah. When he began his reign as the nation's 12th king, Hezekiah "removed the high places and broke the pillars and cut down the Asherah ...," according to the biblical narrative in 2 Kings 18:4. Now, the Israel Antiquities Authority reports archaeologists have uncovered a city gate-shrine they believe Hezekiah's men demolished at the city of Lachish in the eighth century B.C. "Before our very eyes these new finds become the biblical verses themselves and speak in their voice," said Ze'ev Elkin, minister of Jerusalem and Heritage and Environmental Protection. Lachish, a walled city that guarded a main road between Jerusalem and Egypt, was the second most important fortified city in the kingdom of Judah, second only to Jerusalem. It fell to Assyria during King Sennacherib's siege in 701 B.C. The siege is documented in several sources, including the Bible, Assyrian documents, and in a series of reliefs that once decorated King Sennacherib's palace at Nineveh.

Kansas woman's lawsuit says police stopped her from praying in her own home

A former nurse who claims she was threatened with arrest after a complaint about her noisy radio also says she was told by police officers she could not pray in her own home before going to jail.

Now, Mary Anne Sause - who is Catholic – has filed a lawsuit with the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Tenth Circuit, alleging Louisburg, Kan. police violated her First Amendment rights.

The case is on appeal because the district court dismissed her first filing, executed without the aid of an attorney, with prejudice. That means Sause could not amend her original complaint and refile it with the aid of legal counsel. The district court also said the case contained "allegations far from stating a plausible claim."

The appellate court will have to decide if Sause can move forward with the claim.

In the suit, which stems from an encounter in 2013, Sause alleges two police manded to know why they were not let

officers arrived at her home late. at night and demanded entry. According to her account, the officers continued Stephanie Taub, First Liberty Institute to knock, but

she refused to let them enter because the U.S. Constitution, and one of them they did not identify themselves.

When they returned later, Sause did admit them to the home and they de-



in before. She replied that they had not identified themselves.

Sause then claims she showed the officers a copy of

replied that it was "just a piece of paper" which "doesn't work here." Once in the home, the officers also told her to prepare to go to jail and searched for an offense with which they could charge

Sause, who is on permanent disability and lives in government housing, claims she then asked an officer if she could pray. He said she could and she got on her knees to pray. When the other officer came back into the room, Sause alleges she was ordered to stop praying.

The two officers named in the complaint are Jason Lindsey and Lee Stevens.

"The police are supposed to make you feel safe, but I was terrified that night. It was one of the worst nights of my life," Sause said in a statement from First Liberty Institute and Gibson Dunn, the law firms representing her.

"No American should ever be told that they cannot pray in their own home," Stephanie Taub, associate counsel for First Liberty Institute, said. "The right to pray in the privacy of one's own home is clearly protected by the First Amendment."

Sause's attorneys claim she "seeks a meaningful day in court" to vindicate her rights and the lower court was wrong to dismiss her first lawsuit.

Sause was eventually ticketed for "Interference with Law Enforcement" and "Disorderly Conduct."

The Louisburg Police Department and the city have not responded publicly to the complaint.

Churches continue outreach to Muslims despite bomb plot



GARDEN CITY, Kan. - Garden City is still reeling after the news broke about the planned attack that targeted Somali refugees, but local churches are coming out to support their Muslim neighbors saying an attack on one religion is an attack on all

"We were helping refugees before this happened, and this hasn't stopped it," said Kevin Larson, a youth minister at Garden Valley Church.

For two years now, he's been helping the International Rescue Committee to resettle refugees in Garden by collecting donations, mostly household goods.

"Linens and Tupperware and clocks and kitchen appliances," he said.

Larson says the attempted attack has only strengthened his church's willingness to help, even after hearing that court documents revealed the group was considering targeting churches that reached out to Muslim communities.

"I'm a little surprised," said Larson, "I'm a little shocked, but I guess we're doing what we need to be doing if the world hates us."

"No, I'm not frightened at all," said Pastor Denise Pass with the Presbyterian Church. "I have no fear of any harm that might come to me."

Want to live to 100? Don't bet on it

New research shows truth of what God told us in Genesis

(WNS)--Scientists are just beginning to believe what the Bible tells us in Genesis 6:3. "Then the Lord said, 'My Spirit shall not abide in man forever, for he is flesh: his days shall be 120 years." With that, God declared there would be no more Methuselahs, and new research published in the journal Nature is bearing that out.

Researchers from the Albert Einstein College of Medicine have concluded the maximum human life span has a ceiling of about 115 years—and we've already reached it.

The researchers analyzed data from the International Database on Longevity and the Human Mortality Database, which compiles mortality and population statistics from more than 40 countries. Since the 19th century, average life expectancy has continued to rise. Those born in America in 1900 could only expect to live a short 47 years. Today that figure has risen to nearly 79 years. Since the 1970s, the age to which the oldest people live also has risen.

Demographers and biologists traditionally believed the increase in maximum life span would not end



soon.

"But our data strongly suggest that it has already been attained and that this happened in the 1990s," Jan Vijg, senior author of the new research, said in a statement.

According to the study, the percentage of people who survive to old age, defined as 70 and older, increases with their calendar year of birth, suggesting a continuing increase in average life expectancy. But when the researchers analyzed data from 1900 on, they found the life span of people who live beyond one century peaks at about 100 and then declines rapidly no matter the year of birth. In other words, for people who managed to collect 100 candles on their birthday cakes, the average life expectancy peaked right around that birthday, whether they were born in 1800 or

"This finding indicates diminish-

ing gains in reducing late-life mortality, and a possible limit to human lifespan," Vijg said.

Next the researchers analyzed data for people who have lived to be 110 or older in the four countries with the largest number of people who have attained that age—the United States, France, Japan, and the United Kingdom. Between 1968 and 2006, the average age at death for these people increased rapidly between the 1970s and early 1990s but plateaued around 1995, further evidence of a lifespan limit. The researchers also calculated the chance of any one person anywhere in the world living to age 125 is less than 1 in 10,000.

To date, the oldest living person in modern recorded history, other than in early Biblical accounts, was Jeanne Calment, a 122-year-old French woman who died in 1997. The oldest man was Jiroemon Kimura of Japan, who died in 2013 at the age of 116.

Although medical advances against infectious and chronic diseases may continue to boost average life expectancy, the researchers do not believe the maximum life span will increase.

"Such advances would need to overwhelm the many genetic variants that appear to collectively determine the human life span," Vijg said.

Largest sex trafficking sting shows MO, KS not immune to crimes



The largest international sex trafficking and prostitution operation in the FBI's history has led to the recovery of five trafficking victims and the arrests of 13 people in Missouri. Law enforcement rescued 123 children and arrested more than 200 traffickers and their associates as part of the international sting. Kansas City FBI division spokesperson Bridget Patton says no state is immune to this type of crime.

"Especially in the Midwest, people think we are in the heartland, we are in the middle of America. This type of crime doesn't happen here," says Patton. "That is one of the reasons why we do this across the nation in a concentrated effort."

Eight cities across Kansas and Missouri were targeted including the cities of St. Louis, Kansas City, North Kansas City and Independence, MO and Kansas City, Kan, Wichita, Topeka and Junction City. Locations like hotels and trucks stops were targeted. The child victims rescued in both states range from 15 to 17 years old. In Kansas arrests also included 12 pimps and 14 johns.

"Every year the operation grows in size and support for this program," says Patton. "The more bodies, the more we can do."

The initiative included 55 FBI field offices and 74 Child Exploitation Task Forces representing more than 400 law enforcement organizations. Dozens of operations also occurred in Canada, Cambodia, Thailand and the Philippines.

Two of the men arrested have been charged in the U.S. District Court in Kansas City with sex trafficking of three of the victims. Calvin Anthony Miller, 34, and Henry Dailey, 36, are in federal custody. One of their victims told law enforcement that she did not believe the police could provide enough security to protect her from "these guys." She stated, "If I tell you anything he will kill me" and started crying.

This is the 10th operation of this nature that the FBI has led. The initiative, pegged as Operation Cross Country, began in 2003. Since its inception, there have been more than 6,100 rescues of children from sex trafficking across the United States.

ation for what you have, and a personal faith to draw strength.

At Show-Me, Jon made the most important decision of his life: to follow Christ. He remembers standing in the house discussing with his houseparents what Christ meant to him, and receiving Christ in baptism soon after. Although he grew up in church, he never had a faith before Show-Me. A variety of activities and experiences nurtured his young faith. "This is where I made the decision that this is what I am going to live for...grounded in Christ...follow Christ – that is my hope."

A boy forced to be an adult

After a year at Show-Me, Jon's mother reunited the family. Jon reflects, "Honestly, my childhood would have probably been better if I had stayed here longer." The family continued to struggle back in Columbia. As the oldest, Jon was thrown into an adult role to help. While in middle and high school, he worked part time to pay bills and watched his siblings when his Mom was

Metro Voice & National Adoption Month

This is National Adoption Month. In Kansas and Missouri there are more than 1,000 15-18 year olds in foster care. Many of these youth are seeking adoption and permanent, lifelong connections, which are critical to helping them prepare and succeed as they enter adulthood.

National Adoption Month is an initiative sponsored by the Children's Bureau, in partnership with AdoptUSKids and Child Welfare Information Gateway. Each November, National Adoption Month brings awareness to the needs of children and youth seeking and waiting a "forever family." This year, specific attention is being paid to the needs of the thousands of these older youth, ages 15-18, who face the challenges of aging out of foster care and beginning their independent, young adult lives.

The National Adoption Month website, https://www.childwelfare.gov/topics/adoption/nam/, contains an entire section dedicated to providing adoption and permanency-related resources and tips for families, including families considering adoption and families that have adopted. It also supports child welfare professionals in preparing families for adoption and talking with older youth, who may feel they are too old to be adopted.

Metro Voice is proud to partner in this effort as we bring the issue to the public's attention. This partnership would not be possible without the many sponsors of our special October, November and January editons of the paper. gone. He recounted days the power was shut off, opening the fridge to find no food, and knowing the family was continually on the verge of homelessness. "Somedays, I wish that I had a better childhood, but I'm grateful for going through those struggles because they prepared me for the challenges I would face later in life." Although this time of his life was unstructured and chaotic, Jon credits Show-Me with laying a foundation of confidence for him to overcome any challenge.

An Overcomer finds a way

"My guiding compass is that I've got to be seeking God," Jon says. "Through trials and tribulations, sometimes it was a matter of just putting my head down and keep moving forward. I learned resiliency going through challenges as a child."

With that attitude of determination and fortitude, Jon worked construction




jobs while going through college. He learned new skills on the job and his attitude to always find a way gained him the reputation as the "git 'er done" guy. He earned a Master's Degree in Business Management and started his own construction company in Columbia, Mo.

In 2014, Jon accepted a position on the Board of Directors at Show-Me Christian Youth Home. "I never dreamed I would be on the Show-Me Board, able to help kids in the same shoes I was in."

In 2015, he received Show-Me's firstever Overcomers Award, presented to a former Show-Me child who has reached beyond childhood challenges to become a successful adult. He stands as a testimony of what a place and family like Show-Me can do for a young life. He is an inspiration to the young people who currently call Show-Me "home." 

'We determined to start our family differently than most. As far as we know we can have children biologically, but we decided we'd rather adopt instead,"

One evening while watching television, the couple started casually discussing adding children to their home. At that moment, an image came across their screen – it was a picture of babies everywhere to accompany a story about babies abandoned in China. After watching a bit, the couple agreed they wouldn't mind doing an international

We knew that was God's call on our lives. So, we put in our application to adopt via referral from China," Teresa

Their daughter, Meyana, was a year old when they adopted her from China. "It was a dream come true," Teresa said.

Their son, Braxten, joined their family in very similar fashion. Teresa, a writer, was researching a story about adoption when she saw his picture and knew God was intervening.

"I saw my son (Braxten) and fell in love with him instantly. He was in Kazakhstan and we didn't even know where

that was, but we were all in." Teresa said "He was about 16 months old when we first visited him. We were in Kazakhstan for a month in the dead of winter (19 below zero), but we were happy and content just to be with our son.

Teresa is the co-founder and advisor of Families For Adoption, a community-wide support group at the Pleasant Valley Baptist Church in Liberty. Founded in 2005, the group helps anyone interested in adoption, foster or or-

The group organizes various activities and meetings through out the year and has leaders to help in various aspects of adoption and foster care.

Some of the areas include domestic adoption and foster care, international adoption as well and general adoption and orphan care.

Teresa first got involved with the organization when her friends were talking about starting an adoption support group. Their dream was to start a region-wide support group.

"We agreed to work with them on the founding of the group from the ground up. We first surveyed the church and found there were over 100 families who had been touched by adoption in some way," Teresa said. "We knew it was a mission from God."


For Herbic, the most important thing Families for Adoption does is serve God





Tony Perkins: 'This is not a time to stand on the sidelines'

Tony Perkins gets indignant when he thinks about Christians refusing to vote for either of the two major party presidential candidates because they believe both are undesirable.

"I want to go into some of our churches and overturn a few tables because we probably had the best selection of primary candidates in the history of presidential politics," said Perkins, president of the Family Research Council. "Half of them were born-again, Biblebelieving, evangelical Christians.

"But many people didn't get involved in those primaries and sat back to see what would happen, so the conservative vote got chopped up and split in many different directions. I don't think they have a lot of room to complain when the choices for the general election are not the best ones. I'm not sympathetic, and it doesn't absolve us from the obligation we have to vote. It's part of being salt and light"

Voting for a third-party candidate, or writing in someone not on the ballot, does nothing to address the dire state of the nation, according to Perkins.

"We're a two-party system in this country," he said. "We may not like it, but that's a reality. A third-party candidate is not going to win. The reality is that one of the candidates representing the two major parties is going to be elected president—period."

Perkins said electing Democratic nominee Hillary Clinton will result in "four more years of liberal anti-family, anti-faith policies that we've seen under [President] Barack Obama." At the same time, he acknowledged that there are many unknowns with Republican nominee Donald Trump.

Trump, a career businessman and entrepreneur, "has not spent his adult life thinking about public policy or any kind of ideologically driven agenda," Perkins said.

"He's just not been engaged. But I can say firsthand from my interaction with him that he's not hostile to conservative ideas. He is open, even though he hasn't thought through these things, so if you can help him connect the dots, I think

he's willing to learn and listen."

Perkins can relate to believers who are unsettled about character issues with Clinton and Trump. "Both have significant problems," he said.

In his years as a Louisiana state representative, Perkins fought diligently against legalized gambling, yet Trump is a casino owner who has made millions from that industry.

"Pretty much everything I have stood for is in contrast to what Donald Trump has done in the past," Perkins said. "Now the question is: What would he do going forward?"

Perkins was among more than 900 evangelical leaders who attended a June 21 meeting with Trump in New York City. There has been skepticism about the gathering, partly due to questions about whether Trump was merely trying to charm a major voting bloc.

"Nobody can know another man's heart," Perkins said. "But he was willing to meet with us."

Perkins said a more important question about the meeting is what was—and is—the motive of the church leaders.

"Our role is not to get a seat at the table," Perkins said. "We're not a special interest group that simply wants our boxes checked. We are a prophetic voice

to those in power reminding them that they, like us, are held to a higher standard of accountability. We present transcendent truth that no vote can overturn, that no man can avoid."

Perkins believes it's time for the church, for all believers, to take a brutally honest self-inventory and repent for years of apathy and compromise.

"In many ways, the reason we're where we are as a nation—and the reason we have the candidate choices that we have—is because we have failed," he said. "The church in America has been in retreat. If we do not stand up and exercise our freedom to protect our freedom, I see a spiritual dark age descending upon us."

Though only God can turn America around, Perkins said this election will have a major impact on whether or not the country can regain its moral standing.

"Our problem is not political, it's spiritual," he said. "We've got to get our spiritual state in order. But part of that is making a political choice in this election that will either give us the breathing room to get it right or it will make it even more difficult for Christians to collectively be a faithful public witness in this country.

Where do the two major candidates stand on life issues?

Abortion on Demand

The 1973 Roe v. Wade and Doe v. Bolton Supreme Court decisions legalized abortion on demand throughout the United States. There have been more than 59 million abortions since then.

Donald Trump has said, "Let me be clear -- I am pro-life... I did not always hold this position, but I had a significant personal experience that brought the precious gift of life into perspective for me."

In 2003, Hillary Clinton voted to endorse Roe v. Wade, which allows abor-

tion for any reason. In 2016, Clinton said, "The unborn person doesn't have constitutional rights," later adding she believed this to be true even on the unborn child's due date.

Partial-Birth Abortion

The partial-birth abortion procedure -- used from the fifth month on -- involves pulling a living baby feet-first out of the womb, except for the head, puncturing the skull and suctioning out the brain. The Partial-Birth Abortion Ban

was upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court in 2007, in a 5-4 decision.

In 2000, in his book *The America We Deserve*, Donald Trump wrote that after consulting with doctors about the partial-birth abortion procedure, he concluded that he would support a ban on that method.

In 2003, Hillary Clinton voted against the Partial-Birth Abortion Ban Act (voted to allow partial-birth abortions to continue) every chance she got.



Nominations to the U.S. Supreme Court

The next president may have the opportunity to appoint three or four justices to the U.S. Supreme Court.

In May 2016, Donald Trump released a list of eleven conservative judges whom he would consider for a Supreme Court vacancy, saying, "By the way, these judges are all pro-life."

Hillary Clinton has said that she would only nominate Supreme Court justices who would uphold the decision that legalized abortion on demand. "I would not appoint someone who didn't think Roe v. Wade is settled law."

Mike Pence

Mike Pence had a solid pro-life voting record on abortion during 12 years in the U.S. House, including votes for passage of the Partial-Birth Abortion Ban Act. As governor of Indiana, Mike Pence championed many pro-life measures.

Tim Kaine

Tim Kaine voted against the pro-life

position in the U.S. Senate every chance he got. He voted against the Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act. Tim Kaine co-sponsored a bill (S. 217) that would nullify virtually all state limits on abortion, including late abortions.

The Party Platforms

The Republican Party Platform affirms "that the unborn child has a fundamental right to life," opposes using government funds to perform or promote abortion or to fund abortion providers, and supports legislation to assist babies who survive abortion.

The Democratic Party Platform supports abortion on demand, and calls for repeal of the Hyde Amendment (which restricts the use of federal funds for abortion). The platform also supports government funding of abortion providers, including Planned Parenthood, the nation's largest abortion provider.

Missouri voters to decide on 6 proposed amendments to state constitution

Six ballot measures have been certified by the office of the Missouri Secretary of State (SOS) to appear on the ballot statewide in Missouri on Novem-

AMENDMENT 1: According to the SOS website at sos.mo.gov, Constitutional Amendment 1 will ask, "Shall Missouri continue for 10 years the onetenth of one percent sales/use tax that is used for soil and water conservation and for state parks and historic sites, and resubmit this tax to the voters for approval

The measure continues and does not increase the existing sales and use tax of one-tenth of one percent for 10 years. The measure would continue to generate approximately \$90 million annually for soil and water conservation and operation of the state park system.

The tax has done what it was suppose to do: decrease soil erosion. It is an important tax that helps all Missourians enjoy the outdoors and represents 75% of the parks division's entire budget. Consider supporting it.

AMENDMENT 2: Amendment 2 would establish limits on campaign contributions to candidates for state or judicial offices. Missouri is the only state in the nation with no limit on campaign

contributions or lobbyist gifts. During this year's primary and election cycles, statewide candidates have received tens of millions of dollars cumulatively in contributions to their campaigns, with millions coming from out of state and Political Action Committees, which can conceal the source of contributions.

Question 2 states, "Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to establish limits on campaign contributions by individuals or entities to political parties, political committees, or committees to elect candidates for state or judicial office; prohibit individuals and entities from intentionally concealing the source of such contributions; require corporations or labor organizations to meet certain requirements in order to make such contributions; and provide a complaint process and penalties for any violations of this amendment?

Recent primary election results show that buying elections rarely happens as many big money candidates lost. Amendment 2 wants to play on emotions and media perceptions that it is money, and not the

actual candidate that dirties elections. Not being allowed to donate to one's candidate may mean in the future that only rich candidates will run. Think carefully before you decide to limit how elections are funded.

AMENDMENT 3: Constitutional Amendment 3 proposes to increase taxes on cigarettes each year through 2020, at which point this additional tax will total 60 cents per pack of 20; create a fee paid by cigarette wholesalers of 67 cents per pack of 20 on certain cigarettes, which fee shall increase annually; and deposit funds generated by these taxes and fees into a newly established Early Childhood Health and Education Trust Fund.

If approved by voters, when cigarette tax increases are fully implemented, estimated additional revenue to state government is \$263 million to \$374 million annually, with limited estimated implementation costs. The revenue will fund only programs and services allowed by the proposal.

Many observers see Amendment 3 as one of the most deceitful measures ever to be put before the public. Big tobacco is actually FOR this amendment because it increases taxes by 400% on their competitors. Furthermore, as Missourians have seen, funding for schools is a bait and switch. Sure, the taxes supposedly go to schools but on the other end, the state has decreased money from schools from other sources. The funding of something as important as education should not depend on how many and how much people smoke.

AMENDMENT 4: A "yes" on Amendment 4 would amend the Missouri Constitution to prohibit a new state or local sales/use or other similar tax on any service or transaction. This amendment only applies to any service or transaction that was not subject to a sales/use or similar tax as of January 1, 2015. Potential costs to state and local governmental entities are unknown, but could be significant. The proposal's passage would impact governmental entity's ability to revise their tax structures. State and local governments expect no savings from this proposal.

The truth? It sounds good but is another example of special interests trying to fix a problem that doesn't exist. This amendment hopes to prevent a future vote of the people to eliminate the state income tax.

AMENDMENT 6: Photo ID for voters is the basis of the hotly contested Constitutional Amendment 6, which ask, "Shall the Constitution of Missouri be amended to state that voters may be required by law, which may be subject



to exception, to verify one's identity, citizenship, and residence by presenting identification that may include valid government-issued photo identifica-

Democrats contend that voter fraud does not exist, but multiple cases of voter fraud have been documented in Missouri and around the nation. While Voter Photo ID has passed in other states, liberal courts have repeatedly struck down those measures passed by voters under the guise of being called unconstitutional.

Confidence in the election process is central to democracy. Photo ID is required for many basic actions in the country from boarding a plane, buying alcohol and tobacco, opening a bank account, applying for food stamps, Social Security benefits and welfare, students taking the ACT for college, getting a mortgage, renting or buying a car, adopting a pet, getting married, renting a hotel room, get a fishing or hunting license, buying a cell phone, blood donations and purchasing certain cold medicines. Why would something as important and central to democracy as voting be an exception?

PROPOSITION A: Proposition A would amend the Missouri Constitution to increase taxes on cigarettes in 2017, 2019, and 2021, at which point this additional tax will total 23 cents per pack of 20; increase the tax paid by sellers on other tobacco products by 5 percent of manufacturer's invoice price; use funds generated by these taxes exclusively to fund transportation infrastructure projects; and repeal these taxes if a measure to increase any tax or fee on cigarettes or other tobacco products is certified to appear on any local or statewide ballot.

If voters approved Prop A, state government revenue would increase by approximately \$95 million to \$103 million annually when cigarette and tobacco tax increases are fully implemented, with the new revenue earmarked for transportation infrastructure. Local government revenues could decrease approximately \$3 million annually due to decreased cigarette and tobacco sales.

Proposition A is a counterproposal to Amendment 3. But this time the proposed tax increase is smaller and does not give Big Tobacco a competitive advantage as they seek in Amendment 3. The proceeds of the increased tax on tobacco products would be dedicated to transportation infrastructure but as with any tax we must always ask "How is the money we currently spend being used." The only way our roads will ever improve will be to invest in them. Until the legislature adequately funds them this may be the only answer.

I'm Not Ashamed movie: Columbine victim's inspiring story hits big screen

The 1999 Columbine High School massacre became etched in a nation's collective consciousness. Shooters Eric Harris and Dylan Klebold murdered twelve fellow students and one teacher. Rachel Joy Scott was their first victim. This new film tells her inspiring story.

And what a touching and powerful story. A young woman with typical middle-class teenage struggles morphs into a beacon of caring, faith, and – eventually – international impact for good.

I'm Not Ashamed opened last month to priase. Stars include Masey McLain as Rachel, Ben Davies (Courageous), Sadie Robertson and Korie Robertson (both of TV's Duck Dynasty; Sadie of Dancing with the Stars), singer Jaci Velasquez, and Jennifer O'Neill (Summer of '42).

Love, hormones

(Spoilers ahead.)

At first, boys and dating consume Rachel's conversations with her girl-friends. Will she win her idol's heart? Well, yes, sort of. Err, at least she wins his hormones.

Can she sneak out at night without

her parents knowing? Yes...and nope. She escapes through her bedroom window, but guess who's waiting when she returns.

Will she ever adjust to her parents' divorce and mom's new husband? This one's going to take some time.

Why do some of her classmates bully a disabled teen? What's her purpose in life? How does faith fit in?

Compassion chain reaction

Rachel's personal journals inform much of the film. "If one person could go out of their way to show compassion, it could start a chain reaction," read one entry. She's especially kind to the marginalized at school and beyond, befriending a homeless teen who becomes her "big brother."

Her journals authentically portray her struggle with personal faith. One entry reads, "I don't understand why having a walk with God is so hard for me. I'm so weak. At school, with friends, at work."

A cousin helped clarify for her something that many – myself included – have confused. Genuine faith involves a personal relationship with God. Rachel establishes this, and becomes known at school for her faith and compassion. Her dedication echoes a New Testament statement: "I am not ashamed of this Good News about Christ. It is God's powerful method of bringing all who believe it to heaven."

Diabolical plot

During all this, Eric Harris and Dylan Klebold developed their diabolical plot. According to some reports and research, Harris was a brazen psychopath with global infamy dreams, while Klebold was hotheaded, depressive and suicidal. They placed homemade bombs in the school cafeteria, to be ignited by timers.

When the bombs didn't ignite, the two approached the cafeteria, first shooting Rachel and a male friend (who survived) as they sat outside. The film depicts what became an iconic scene. Harris asks the not-yet-dead Rachel if she still believes in God. When she responds, "You know I do," he replies, "Then go be with Him." He shoots her in the temple.

Questions exist about whether the

encounter really happened that way. For instance, the Denver Post reported that the closest witness to her murder later expressed uncertainty about what had been said. Yet evidence exists of that witness shortly after the shooting recounting a story similar to the film's. (So far as I know, no one alleges Rachel denied her beliefs; concerns focus on items like whether Harris mentioned faith when he killed her.)

I Am Hope

I won't attempt to resolve that debate. Rachel's life impact doesn't hinge on this point. She had prayed, "Father, use my life to touch the world

and let your light shine through me." Through her life, plus postmortem publications, family speaking and media appearances, millions have been pointed toward faith and compassion. Now, with this movie, millions more will be.

The film's related "I Am Hope" movement aims to mobilize students for outreach and service.

Blessings in disguise

Have you ever looked at the bud of a magnolia flower? It's a tight little pod that stays closed up for a long time on



the end of its branch until one day, out of nowhere, it finally bursts open into this gigantic, gorgeous, fragrant flower that's 10 times bigger than the bud itself. It's

impossible to imagine that such a big beautiful thing could pop out of that tiny little bud. But it does. And that's sort of what getting "discovered" and sharing our lives on Fixer Upper feels like to us.

We never could have imagined

being on TV together, touching the lives of so many people, especially back when we were two broke newlyweds sleeping on the floor of our eight-hundred- square- foot house while we renovated it, or when I first opened and then had to close my little Magnolia shop on Bosque Boulevard. Tim Tebow's 'Shaken': Top 5 shocking revelations in new book

In the first chapter of Tim Tebow's new book, Shaken: Discovering Your True Identity in the Midst of Life's Storms, the athlete reveals the raw emotions that have been buried behind his trademark smile for years.

after being cut from New England Patriots

In 2013, Tebow didn't make it past the preseason to play for the New England Patriots. Before his former Denver Broncos coach Joshua McDaniels — who later became the offensive coordinator for the Pats — sat down with him and head Coach Bill Belichick to let him know that he didn't make the cut,

the team's owner made him think otherwise.

"Sometime earlier, Robert Kraft, the owner of the Patriots and a man I respect and really like, had told me he was looking forward to seeing me at his gettogether the next day," an excerpt from Tebow's book reads. "He was hosting a barbecue for the team and the staff at his home. Thinking about his words, I

felt like it was a good sign."

Tebow, however, was subsequently cut from the team. He describes that moment as a "sucker punch."

"I didn't see it coming," he said.

2. Tim Tebow passed up a \$1 million endorsement deal to impress Bill Belichick





The former Heisman Trophy winner has a knack for attracting media attention and corporate sponsors that are interested in endorsing him. Around the time he expressed interest in being a part of the Patriots team, one company offered him \$1 million for one day's worth of work by appearing in a commercial.

"I remembered when I had signed with the team in June. Then I'd had an offer on the table to make a one-day

appearance endorsing a product for a million dollar paycheck," Tebow reveals in the book. "I'm sure you'd agree that a million bucks is a lot to make in just twenty-four hours. But I wasn't quick to say yes."

It is widely known that Belichick is not a fan of the media circus that takes place off of the football field and advised Tebow to pass up on the opportunity.

"He thought for a moment and then shook his head. 'Timmy, I would really appreciate it if you didn't," Tebow re-

called the coach saying. "Highly respecting the man, I turned down the deal. I didn't even think twice about it."

While some may question why, Tebow believed he had a chance to live his NFL quarterback dream with one of the most respected coaches in the game. However, he later came very close to regretting his decision after Belichick cut him with little explanation.

"I thought of the endorsement deal I had turned down two months earlier, questioning and maybe even regretting my decision," Tebow said. "Was it the wrong choice? If I had said yes, would that have put me in a better situation than where I am right now — sitting in front of two coaches who are firing me without telling me exactly why?"

3. Tebow felt betrayed after the Denver Broncos traded him to the New York

After being drafted by the Broncos in 2010, Tebow became a starting quarterback who led the Broncos to a playoff run in 2012. Later that year, he was traded to the New York Jets before things got rocky and he bounced from preseason teams like the New England Patriots in 2013, followed by the Philadelphia Eagles in 2015.

However, being traded by the Broncos seemed to hurt Tebow the most.

"In the spring of 2012, I was traded from the Broncos to the New York Jets, a move that felt like a betrayal of sorts," he said. "A year later, the Jets let me go. This was a pattern I did not like."

4. Tim questioned God's plan after Patriots cut him

Although Tebow has been a major voice for Christian athletes, even he questioned God's plans after the pain of being cut first hit him.

"I shifted my thoughts toward God, the One I believed had led me to New England. I thought this was going somewhere special," he recalled telling God. "I thought this was a plan You designed for me. If that was true, then why, God, why is this thing crashing and burning?'

But Tebow soon realized that God was still with him.

"I knew God hadn't left me. I knew He still had a plan for my life," he said. "I knew He still had a purpose. And though my foundation in Him was solid, much of what rested on top of that was shaken."

5. Tebow refused offers from NFL teams that wanted him to play other po-

After he was cut by the Patriots, offers poured in for Tebow to play for other teams. The only problem was, none of them were interested in him as a quar-

'Timmy, a bunch of teams are calling and hoping you'll play for them," Tebow recalled his agent telling him. "So this one wants you to play tight end. That one wants you as an HB ...'

Although Tebow acknowledged there were some "really big selling points," he

had no passion for those offers and insists his decision wasn't made out of ar-

"I wanted to continue to fight for what I was passionate about, for what I believed in. Since I was 6 years old, I didn't just want to play football; I wanted to be a quarterback," he said. "I didn't want to be in the NFL for the sake of being in it, or to make a lot of money, or to get famous. I wanted to pursue my passion of playing as a quarterback."





"My shoebox had every shade of pink I could think of," Elena said.

Yet what caught her attention most was not anything inside the box. With her box, she received a booklet in her native language called The Greatest Gift. The booklet told her about the love of God, the problem of sin and the good news of God's plan of salvation through Jesus Christ. It all seemed too wonderful to be true.

"I thought that was the biggest fairy tale I'd ever read," Elena said. "But I was hopeful this fairy tale was actually true."

She held onto that hope and began praying for a forever family. Through a series of events only God could have orchestrated, Elena and her sister were adopted twelve years ago into a family from Wentzville, Missouri.

After growing up in a poor, abusive and alcoholic home, Elena's adoptive father began to show her the love of God, which helped her to see her Heavenly Father in a different light. The first time she ever heard the words "I love you" said to her was at the age of twelve when her father learned how to say the simple but powerful phrase in her native language.

As Elena began realizing the story in the booklet she received with her shoebox was no fairy tale and her new family showed her God's love, and she began her personal relationship with God.

For her, it has been a faith journey that began with a shoebox, and opening that shoebox took some courage.

"I was afraid to open my shoebox because I had been so disappointed so many times in my life I was afraid the inside wouldn't be as beautiful as the outside," Elena said.

When she saw her sister, who loves art. open her box to find it filled with art supplies, Elena was able to gather the

courage to open her box and see that each box has special meaning for the child who receives it.

That courage has taken root and today Elena is a college graduate with plans of going to the mission field one day to bring the love of Christ to others. She also spent time recently touring the Kansas City area sharing her story at various local churches.

In the years since Elena received her

shoebox, Operation Christmas Child has also begun a 12-week discipleship course called The Greatest Journey that teaches children how to grow in their faith and share their faith with others. To date, about 7.4 million children have completed the program.

Getting involved

For those interested in making a difference in the life of a child like Elena, November marks shoebox packing season with national collection week this year being November 14 to 21.

Additionally, Operation Christmas Child has teams of year-round volunteers in communities throughout the United States to make the ministry possible. Tracy Brander of Blue Springs, Missouri, is such a vear-round volunteer with a heart for the ministry. Her church, Faith Covenant Church in Blue Springs, participates in the ministry, and she is a network coordinator for collection sites in Jackson and Layfette counties. That means she coordinates with all project leaders at participating churches and drop-off locations to ensure all boxes are collected and shipped out to processing centers.

"There is a real sense of community," Tracy said of her friendships with other OCC volunteers. "These people love the kids, love the ministry and do what they need to make sure the kids know that Jesus loves them."

Volunteers have other roles as well, including coordinating participation in community groups, mobilizing prayer efforts, media relations and more.



WHY THANKSGIVING MATTERS

The holiday police are at it again; looking for violations of the nation's new policy of separating faith and civic celebrations. The same folks who will soon be trolling courthouse squares looking for manger scenes are now calling on Americans to have a happy Thanksgiving . . . but leave God out of

School textbooks filled with revisionist history tell children that the first Thanksgiving was a celebration at which the Pilgrims thanked the Indians for teaching them how to survive the harsh New England climate and plant successful crops. God is simply not part of the picture.

Some educators, worried that even the word "thanksgiving" might be too controversial, have renamed the holiday "Turkey Day." Of course, this implies that the central thrust of the celebration comes down to poultry.

The revisionist historians want to have it both ways. They present the Pilgrims as wild-eyed religious fanatics-precursors to the Religious Right--and then suggest that the first Thanksgiving was essentially a secular holiday.

The historical basis for the Thanksgiving observance is clear. In 1621, the Pilgrims celebrated "the goodness of

God" as they feasted with friendly local Indians. In reality, the Pilgrims had faced far greater adversity than had been expected. The climate was harsh, the crops were sparse, the native peoples were often hostile, and their ranks were thinning. Hunger, disease, discomfort, and discouragement were ever close at hand.

Aiming for Virginia, these Christians--dissenting from the Church of England and determined to establish a truly Christian community--actually landed in New England. That miscalculation meant that disaster was almost certain. Nevertheless, they "fell upon their knees and blessed the God of heaven who had brought them over this vast and furious ocean," recorded Governor William Bradford.

In 1789, President George Washington George Washington declared the first national day of Thanksgiving by asking Americans to "unite in most humbly offering our prayer and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of na- humbly offering our tions.'

Later presidents followed Washington's example. Abraham Lincoln issued mov-Thanksgiving

proclamations during the Civil War. Franklin Roosevelt, who regularized the holiday on the national calendar, called the nation to thankfulness in the middle of World War II: "The Almighty God has blessed our nation in many ways. He has given our people stout hearts

and strong arms with which to strike mighty blows for freedom and truth.... So we pray to Him now for a vision to see our way clearly--to see the way that leads to a better life for ourselves and for our fellow men--to the achievement of

His will, to peace on earth." Is all this just a demonstration of civil religion? Do most Americans really follow the example of the Pilgrims in expressing thankfulness to God, or is it just another holiday with emotional overtones--and an orgy of overeating?

Millions of Americans will, no doubt, celebrate an essentially secular festival. For them, it might as well

be "Turkey Day" or something equally vacuous. This reveals the most important contrast between the Pilgrims and the current generation. The Pilgrims were driven by a worldview that was centered in the worship of the one true and living God, the Creator of the universe, the Father of the Lord Jesus Christ. They understood His providential rule over the universe to explain everything that happened to them--and everything that blessed them. They did not attribute their survival in New England to their own fortitude--nor to the help of the Indians--but to God.

Secularized Americans are driven by no impulse to give thanks, and wouldn't know to whom thanks should be addressed. They think of themselves as self-sufficient, self-directed, and self-reliant. Their horizon of thankfulness is, to say the least, rather low.

The civic holiday may not mean a great deal to many moderns--but that doesn't mean that it is meaningless. At the very least, it implies that we cannot really take care of ourselves. That is just as true today as it was in Pilgrim New England.

The Pilgrims knew to whom they were praying--and why. Let's follow their example and remember that their dependence upon God was no greater than our own!


