Evangelicals vote in record numbers

Self-described evangelicals likely helped the GOP nominee to an upset victory

In a stunning rebuke of polls and pundits, Donald J. Trump has won the presidency of the United States with the most evangelical votes in this election than any election in polling history. Exit polls show he did it

with the support of 81 percent of white Evangelicals and 60 percent of white Catholics. But the

Christmas display reaches out to families of murder victims

Crosses represent every 2016 homicide victim in KC

Leawood Baptist Church is continuing a heart-wrenching acknowledgment and Christmas tradition that honors the metro's many murder victims.

"The Longest Night" service for the families of the murder victims in the Kansas City area will again be held at Leawood Baptist Church, 8200 State Line, Leawood, Kan. on Wednesday, December 21 at 6:00 pm. It is accompanied by the placement of crosses representing Kansas City's homicide victims.

The event started several years ago when John Mark Clifton, pastor at the time of Wornall Road Baptist Church, noticed an epidemic of murders across the Kansas City metro. Moved with compassion for the families who had lost loved ones, the church began placing crosses on their church lawn. Each cross bore the name of every Kansas City murder victim. The church also hosted a memorial service for the families.

Last year, Clifton reached out to a former resident intern and asked if he might take over the monumental task. That intern, Adam Carter, is now the pastor of Leawood

Carter and Leawood Baptist agreed to host the display and last Christmas posted crosses with the names of each murder victim in the

Metro teens experience one homeless night

Event supports homeless teens served by Synergy

On any given night in Greater Kansas City 2,000 "unattached" teens are living on the streets, sleeping in cars or "couch surfing" with friends because they do not have a safe place to live. Many are abused and neglected kids who have run away from home or been thrown out by their family.

Last month, young people throughout the metro staged sleep-outs to raise awareness and money for services that support the area's homeless youth. Speakers and activities at the sleep-outs focused on helping participants understand what it is like to be homeless and on your own as a young person.

"As I shivered through the cold and rain in my collapsed tent, I wanted to quit and go home," said participant Jennifer Morris. "Then I thought about the kids who can't quit and have no home and decided to stick it out."

The One Homeless Night initiative is sponsored by Synergy Services. Synergy House, the homeless youth shelter operated by Synergy Services, provides one of the few youth-focused shelters in the area. Synergy's Youth Resiliency Center offers a full range of youth services including mental health counseling, medical and dental care, life-skills training, a computer lab, showers, lockers, an interactive learning center and the opportunity for leadership development and community service. Additionally, the center provides a broad variety of youth-focused programs including music, poetry, dance, exercise, art and academic advancement.

ISIS taking newborns, young children in rampage to annihilate Christians, says Catholic priest

A Roman Catholic priest who has been helping Christians, Yazidis and other religious minorities facing genocide in Iraq and Syria said Islamic State militants separate families who live in terrorist occupied land by taking newborn babies and virgin girls while killing fathers and forcing young boys to plant bombs on the streets.

Father Patrick Desbois, a Paris-based priest who for decades has been researching the Holocaust and fighting anti-Semitism through his Yahad—In Unum global humanitarian organization, has in recent years turned to helping minority victims of the ISIS genocide in Iraq and Syria, specifically the Yazidi people.

Desbois said in a phone interview with a Christian news organization that ISIS, which he noted has also killed thousands of Shia Muslims and Christians, uses a "very special" strategy to carry out its decimation of entire people

group

"They dislocate the families, they take the newborn babies, and they put them in Islamist families," Desbois said, noting that elementary-age children are trained as terrorists, and "forced to put bombs" on streets.

"The young girls who are virgins are selected by doctors and sold," he added, referring to the terror group's human trafficking and sex trade, which has seen many thousands of women and children sold to jihadists.

The men, on the other hand, are often shot in pits, he said, evidence for which are the many mass graves being discovered in territory newly liberated from ISIS' grasp.

The priest, who is a professor at Georgetown University in Washington D.C., explained that ISIS "dislocates families according to age, sexuality," and said that "every member of the family" is used "in a special way."

"I've never seen that, it's very organized, there is no improvisation," he

added.

Desbois and his organization have interviewed hundreds of Yazidi survivors who have escaped ISIS captivity, including some who have managed to flee the besieged city of Mosul, currently the target of a coalition military campaign seeking to liberate it from ISIS control.

Many of these interviews are shared in Action Yazidis, an initiative of Yahad-In Unum, which as it explains on its website, does not seek to advocate for "political, economic or military action," but serves to uncover "facts of genocidal practices wherever they are found and provide a voice of protest on behalf of all victims and potential victims of genocide."

Desbois, who recently released his book The Fabric of Terrorists: Into the Secrets of Daesh, based on his investigations into ISIS, shared eye-witness accounts that confirm reports that the terrorist organization is using human shields in its attempts to hold on to Mosul — including civilians.

He shared that the jihadists "use prisoners as human shields," and that his organization has "many testimonies of girls who say they have been used as human shields."

These eye-witness accounts have been crossed-referenced with other sources, the priest explained, in order to paint an accurate picture of the atrocities that people are being subjected to.

The plight of Christians under the extremists has also been a heavy one —

Sixty kids find their 'forever homes' in November

Families across Kansas finalized their adoptions on National Adoption Day, Nov. 19. Following tradition, many judges opened their courthouse to complete adoptions and bring smiles to the faces of children and adults alike. hundreds of thousands of believers have left their ancestral homelands across Iraq and Syria, with Desbois noting that "there are nearly no more Christians under ISIS," except those held as prisoners in captured territory.

He said that all signs of Christianity are actively being destroyed, explaining, "any Christian symbol is being erased," with Christians also losing their houses, their belongings, and everything that ISIS demands, which is leading to a "total destruction" of the faith group.

Comparing the ongoing genocide to those of the past, like the Holocaust, Desbois said ISIS is using "very modern" methods, such as their heavy reliance on social media, where the jihadists spread propaganda messages, including graphic images and videos of human rights abuses.

Desbois suggested that Christians "have a responsibility to help" refugee families that are fleeing the war zones, and called on the government to help victims find work, and help those that have been traumatized by forced conversions to Islam.

The priest emphasized that today

people can help in many different ways, with one option being donating to organizations that are working hard to assist people suffering as a result of ISIS' actions.

"We try to help concretely," he said, and pointed out that in the Bible, God asks people to help their brothers and

Transgender bathroom policy leads to 10 crimes targeting girls

As the year's busiest shopping season begins, the American Family Association has compiled a list of 10 cases to showcase why Target's bathroom policies that allow male customers who identify as female to go into women's bathrooms and dressing rooms is a threat to women and children.

The overwhelming evidence continues to pile up against Target's policy to allow men into women's restrooms and dressing rooms in its stores," AFA President Tim Wildmon wrote in No-

Target has defended its decision by stating: "We welcome transgender team members and guests to use the restroom or fitting room facility that corresponds with their gender identity. ... Everyone deserves to feel like they belong."

But Wildmon argued that what this means is that a man can simply state that he feels like a woman on any given day, and go in to use the women's restroom.

'Target's policy is exactly how sexual predators get access to their victims. And the proof keeps mounting," he said.

"Clearly, Target's dangerous policy poses a threat to wives and daughters. Over 1.4 million people have pledged to boycott Target stores until protecting women and children is a priority."

AFA then listed 10 headlines this past year of men found recording, taking photos, or peering into women's restrooms at Target stores nationwide:

Canadian court: Law Society must accept Christians

(WNS)--The Law Society of British Columbia must recognize Trinity Western University's (TWU) future law school graduates, according to a unanimous opinion the British Columbia (B.C.) Court of Appeals issued Nov. 1. "The TWU community has a right to hold and act on its beliefs, absent evidence of actual harm," a five-judge panel wrote. "To do so is an expression of its right to freedom of religion." The decision is the latest chapter in TWU's years-long battle to open Canada's first Christian law school. In December 2013 the provincial law society approved the university's plans, but a 2014 members referendum revoked it over concerns that the TWU community covenant—which holds students to orthodox Christian behavioral standards, including heterosexual marriage—is discriminatory. The B.C. appeals court ruled Law Society that discriminated.

Danger follows Christian refugees to Germany

(WNS)--The situation of Christian refugees in German shelters is "unbearable" according to an updated report released in October and co-authored by Open Doors Germany. The report documents 743 cases of discrimination, death threats, and physical assaults against


Christians by Muslim refugees between February and May of this year and claims the findings are only "the tip of the iceberg." The study also highlights the challenges of reporting about religiously motivated attacks. European politicians have cultivated a climate with two extremes: Much of the political and media establishment ignores or whitewashes attacks carried out by



Muslim refugees under the guise of political correctness, while the far-right wants to exploit the statistics for its own political gain. Open Doors said those risks should not lead to silence: "The human right of religious freedom and protection of victims in a country like Germany—that is a constant admonisher of human rights abuses on an international scale—should not be sacrificed for political objectives or the interests of individual groups."

Euthanasia advocates celebrate victory in Colorado


(WNS)--Coloradans voted to legalize physician-assisted suicide on Nov. 8, a decision critics call a "dangerous step for Colorado's medically and socially vulnerable citizens." Nearly 65 percent of voters said "yes" to the measure with almost all votes counted the next morning. The controversial initiative will allow terminally ill adults with six months or less to live the right to access a physician-prescribed lethal drug. Colorado joins Oregon, California, Montana, Vermont, and Washington in legalizing assisted suicide. All six states modeled their measures after Oregon's Death with Dignity Act, passed in 1997.

Nigeria appoints women to police refugee camps

(WNS)--Nigeria's police force has deployed 100 female officers to camps for internally displaced people across the northeastern Borno state after Human Rights Watch reported camp officials sexually abused some residents. Damian Chukwu, Borno's commissioner of police, said 100 policewomen will now handle daily interactions with displaced people in the camps, while male officers will only deal with territorial coverage and patrol. A separate committee will handle the camp's security, Chukwu said. Human Rights Watch in its report last month documented rape and abuse cases of 43 women and girls in camps across the state. Some of the women said government



Study: The more we lie, the easier it gets

(WNS)--Every time Pinocchio lied, his nose grew longer. Of course, a real boy's nose does not change when he lies, but his brain might, according to a new research study published in Nature Neuroscience. Researchers at the University College London (UCL) have discovered the

brain actually changes the way it responds when someone continues to lie. For the vast majority of people, the brain area known as the amygdala begins a rapid-fire response when a person is dishonest, producing uncomfortable emotions and unpleasant physical reactions. Our heart beats faster, blood pressure escalates, and we begin to perspire. A polygraph machine is designed to detect these physiological changes and alert an investigator that a person may be lying. It is these unpleasant sensations that discourage someone from continuing to lie. But the UCL researchers



found when people lie repeatedly, the amygdala settles down and decreases its response, making it easier to lie again and initiating a slippery slope of dishonesty.

Study: Celebrities influence out-of-wedlock births

(WNS)--Fifty years ago, only about 8 percent of babies in the United States were born to single women. Today that figure is over 40 percent. Although sociologists point to many reasons for the disturbing trend, a new study just presented at the annual meeting of the American

Sociological Association, indicates the huge increase of babies born out-of-wedlock may, at least in part, be due to the way in which mainstream media portrays the lifestyles of the rich and famous. According to the study, celebrity lifestyles have had a huge impact on social norms and the makeup of the traditional American family. Hanna Grol-Prokopczyk, the study's author and a sociologist at the University at Buffalo, analyzed nearly 400 cover stories from People magazine between the premier issue in 1974 and the present to learn when interest in celebrity pregnancies began and how the magazine changed

the way it presented the family over time. Grol-Prokopczyk found that in the earlier years, although unmarried celebrities usually did not apologize for getting pregnant, the family model still encouraged couples to marry by the time the baby was born

Which companies made the naughty list this Christmas?

Have you grown sick and tired of national retail chains bowing to the very small anti-Christmas minority?

If so, then take a good look at the list below, and use it to fight back when Christmas shopping!

The American Family Association and Liberty Council have each released their annual "Naughty-or-Nice" list that categorizes retailers and how they approach the Christmas season.

Some of the names that made the "nice" list are well known companies such as Walmart, JCPenney, Kmart, and Lowe's. Others fell into a "marginal" list, meaning that they rarely or infrequently referred to Christmas.

The two organizations reviewed up to four areas to determine if a company was "Christmas-friendly" in their advertising: print media (newspaper inserts), broadcast media (radio/television), website and/or personal visits to the store. If a company's ad has references to items associated with Christmas (trees, wreaths, lights, etc.), it was considered as an attempt to reach "Christmas" shoppers.

If a company has items associated with Christmas, but did not use the word "Christmas," then the company is considered as censoring "Christmas."

AFA has also begun its "Keep Christ in Christmas" campaign. AFA President Tim Wildmon announced that his group is offering wristbands with messages about the battle against "secular liberals." There are also yard signs and buttons featuring the "Merry Christmas" message available at



www.afa.net

"You might ask why we think this is an important battle. Well, secular liberals in our nation are bent on minimizing and even removing any mention of Christianity from the public square. And no other time of the year reminds people of Jesus Christ and America's Christian heritage more than the Christmas season," Wildmon explained.

Liberty Counsel also monitors cases across the U.S. where there is intimidation by officials and groups to remove the celebration of Christmas in public and private spaces.

These threats include atheist groups seeking to ban nativity scenes from public property, senior living centers that prohibit residents from singing Christmas carols, public schools that ban students from wearing the Christmas colors of red and green, school officials who censor religious words from Christmas carols, and retailers which profit from Christmas while pretending it does not exist, according to the group's statement.

Liberty Counsel provides a memorandum to offer guidance regarding publicly and privately sponsored religious holiday displays, religious holidays in public schools and the rights of public school students in the context of religious holidays. For example, publicly sponsored nativity scenes on public property are constitutional so long as there is a secular symbol of the holiday in the general context. Privately sponsored nativity scenes or religious symbols are also permissible on public property that has been opened to the general public for expressive activity. No secular symbol is

"Celebrating Christmas is legal in public schools and in public venues. In the private retail market, consumers can choose to patronize stores that recognize Christmas and refuse to buy from those that pretend it does not exist," said Mat Staver, founder and chairman of Liberty Counsel.



Evangelical turn-out seen as key to election victories across nation

formed better among other faiths, beating every Republican nominee since 2000. The lone exception is Muslim voters.

Despite those predictions that Democrat Hillary Clinton held an Electoral College advantage heading into Election Day, the Republican nominee swept a bevy of key swing states with the unofficial count (Trump leads in Michigan which has not been called) now at 306 electoral votes-more than John F. Kennedy received in 1960, Nixon in 1968, Carter in 1976 and the 2000 and 2004 elections of President George W. Bush. In fact, Trump's electoral count is just 24 shy of President Obama's 2012 rout of Mitt Romney.

In the Kansas City metro, Hillary Clinton carried Jackson and Wyandotte counties, with Trump winning Clay, Platte, Cass, Johnson (KS), Clinton, Lafayette, and Miami counties.

Another group that supported Trump: rural voters. In Missouri, Clinton won just three counties: Jackson, Boone (Columbia, Mo.) and St. Louis county plus the City of St. Louis. In Kansas she won just two counties.

Trump's triumph was an emphatic exclamation point at the end of nearly 600 days of a brutal presidential campaign that divided family, friends, and countrymen, and upended every notion of a traditional political cam-

There have been questions about how pollsters define "evangelical." In this case, it appears they allowed voters simply to self-identify as evangelicals or say they'd been born again. now say Trump supporters kept their support private until they voted.

Still, it's likely that plenty of true evangelicals joined the Trump constituency, whether reluctantly or enthusiastically. It's an issue that has deeply divided many evangelicals grappling with whether they should support a candidate with a deeply compromised moral character (see our story on Christian leaders reacting to the election). Even as Trump considers how to build coalitions in a fractured Republican Party, many Christians face breaches to repair among themselves.

For those wondering whether the thousands of Trump supporters showing up at rallies would show up at polls, the answer appeared to be a resounding yes.

Among Trump's many challenges

now: balancing his populist vision that captured many blue-collar workers with the more traditionally conservative approach of some Republican lawmakers-including those who distanced themselves from him during his campaign.

In an acceptance speech, Trump struck a conciliatory note, even with Clinton, saying, "We owe her a major debt of gratitude to our country." He appealed to voters who hadn't supported him in the past: "I am reaching out to you for your guidance and help so we can work together and unify our great country."

And he ended his speech with the kind of lofty promise he began his presidential bid with last year: "America will no longer settle for anything less than the best."

Christmas evening that year, I arrived home weary after our multiple family Christmas celebrations. We had a wonderful day, but we were all "Christmased out." Then I sat down at the computer and read these words from my sister-inlaw's mother. They are words I will never, ever forget.

She wrote:

"Our family Christmases have always been filled with traditions. That is not a bad thing. It helps bind families together.

This year all the traditions that were so important have been set aside. Nothing is the same. And yet, Christmas came. Quoting from Dr. Seuss, How the Grinch Stole Christmas, "It came without ribbons. It came without tags! It came without packages, boxes or bags! He hadn't stopped Christmas from coming. It came! Somehow or other it came just the same."

We know the reason it came is because of God's indescribable gift to us. Jesus left the glory of heaven to come as a baby in a manger. His every physical need had to be cared for by another. What humility! He came to go through the ugliness of death on the cross so that we can have life everlasting.

Christmas is so much more than we usually make of it.


We make it about presents and lights and amazing Pinterest creations.


But it is about Jesus, God's indescribable gift to each of us.



told me it was the lingering flu. The phone can hide the truth when you live a thousand miles apart. A September 25th call from her neighbor revealed she was gone.



(Recipe makes 80 cookies) Ingredients

1-1/2 cups brown sugar

2 tablespoons water

2 cups (12 ounces) semisweet chocolate chips

2 eggs

2-1/2 cups flour

1-1/4 teaspoon baking soda ½ teaspoon salt

Cook butter, sugar and water in a large pan over low heat until butter is melted. Add chocolate chips and stir until partially melted. Remove from heat until completely melted. Pour into mixing howl. Let stand 10 minutes to cool slightly. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Reduce speed to add dry ingredients. Chill dough.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line cookie sheet with foil. Roll dough into teaspoon-sized balls. Place 2 inches apart on cookie sheet. Bake for 12 to 13 minutes. Place mint and sprinkles on hot cookies and cool completely.

Pinch salt

1/2 cup black walnuts, chopped 1/2 cup raisins 1 c blackberry jam, room temp

1/2 cup butter, salted, softened 1 cup dark brown sugar, packed 1 cup buttermilk, room temp

Preheat the oven to 325 degrees. Butter and flour tube pan.

Separate the eggs, putting the yolks and whites in different mixing bowls. In another large bowl, mix together the flour, baking soda, salt, cinnamon, and nutmeg. In a small bowl, mix 1/4 cup of the flour mixture with the black walnuts and raisins.

Add the brown sugar, butter, and blackberry jam to the egg yolks, and stir together thoroughly. Stir in the buttermilk. Add the flour mixture.

Beat the egg whites until they turn white but are loose and runny. Fold the egg whites into the batter. Fold in the nuts and raisins.

Pour the batter into tube pan and bake for 1 hour. Remove and cool for 10 minutes. Invert a cake and turn into plate. Ice with powder sugar glaze if desired.

months and then went back to her own home.

The birth of Jesus

At that time the Roman emperor, Augustus, decreed that a census should be taken throughout the Roman Empire. (This was the first census taken when Quirinius was governor of Syria.) All returned to their own towns to register for this census. And because Joseph was a descendant of King David, he had to go to Bethlehem in Judea, David's ancient home. He traveled there from the village of Nazareth in Galilee. He took with him Mary, his fiance, who was obviously pregnant by this time.

And while they were there, the time came for her baby to be born. She gave birth to her first child, a son. She wrapped him snugly in strips of cloth and laid him in a manger, because there was no room for them in the village inn.

The Shepherds and Angels

That night some shepherds were in the fields outside the village, guarding their flocks of sheep. Suddenly, an angel of the Lord appeared among them, and the radiance of the Lord's glory surrounded them. They were terribly frightened, but the angel reassured them. "Don't be afraid!" he said. "I bring you good news of great joy for everyone! The Savior — yes, the Messiah, the Lord — has been born tonight in Bethlehem, the city of David! And this is how you will recognize him: You will find a baby lying in a manger, wrapped snugly in strips of cloth!"

Suddenly, the angel was joined by a vast host of others praising God:

"Glory to God in the highest

heaven, And peace on earth to all whom God favors."

When the angels had returned to heaven, the shepherds said to each other, "Come on, let's go to Bethlehem!" Let's see this wonderful thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us about."

They ran to the village and found Mary and Joseph. And there was the baby, lying in the manger. Then the shepherds told everyone what had happened and what the angel had said to them about this child. All who heard the shepherds' story were astonished, but Mary quietly treasured these things in her heart and thought about them often. The shepherds went back to their fields and flocks, glorifying and praising God for what the angels had told them, and because they had seen the child, just as the angel had said.

Jesus presented in the temple

Eight days later, when the baby was circumcised, he was named Jesus, the name given him by the angel even before he was conceived.

Then it was time for the purification offering, as required by the law of Moses after the birth of a child; so his parents took him to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord. The law of the Lord says, "If a woman's first child is a boy, he must be dedicated to the Lord." So they offered a sacrifice according to what was required in the law of the Lord.

When Jesus' parents had fulfilled all the requirements of the law of the Lord, they returned home to Nazareth in Galilee. There the child grew up healthy and strong. He was filled with wisdom beyond his years, and God placed his special favor upon him.

Hacksaw Ridge makes us confront the brutality of war, and the redeeming work of God

[Editor's Note: Metro Voice does not make it a habit to review R-rated films. At times, though, a film is important enough to review because of its portrayal of historical events in which the atrocities and violence of the subject manner cannot be ignored. It is part of a story that must be told. We realize that if accurately told on film, most of the Old Testament would also receive a similar rating. It is rare that an A-lister Hollywood director presents faith and sacrifice in such an

minute ovation and cheer at its premiere. Such was the case with Mel Gibson's "Hacksaw Ridge". This is not a film for the faint of heart nor for children. It is a

story that shows the brutal sacrifice that our fathers (my own father Ellery Widaman served in the Pacific in WWII Korea) and grandfathers gave in preserving our freedoms. For that reason, a film like this cannot be judged solely by its film rating. –Dwight Widaman]

The Bible calls it a burning lake, a blazing furnace. Dante imagined it as nine circles of Sisyphean torture. Bosch colored it with our darkest nightmares. It's been called Abaddon, Gehenna, Tophet, Hades.

Perhaps those who took part in the Battle of Okinawa have another name for hell: Hacksaw Ridge.

It's the waning months of World War II. Germany has surrendered but Japan fights on, contesting every inch of land with ferocious tenacity. And as the United States military pushes ever closer to the Japanese homeland, the fighting grows more desperate, more

The U.S. turns its guns on Okinawa, just 340 miles from Japan. It pounds the island with fire as soldiers and marines scurry ashore. Japanese soldiers hide underground, determined to push the Americans into the ocean. Hacksaw Ridge is one of the island's most contested points, and soon the ground lies smoking. Bodies litter it like autumn leaves; blood pools in foxholes



and footprints; sounds of agony fill the sky. Countries may fight for this patch of land, but it's Death that rules here. Death that wins.

But into that black, blasted game board scurries one slight, skinny man. He carries no gun: Indeed, he fought the U.S. Army for the right not to. Bandages, not bullets, fill his pockets. He alone seems to walk upright in this land of crawling, screaming flesh. He alone dares all in this doomscape of the

"Please Lord," he prays, his clothes

soaked in the blood of others, his hands ripped open from the burn of rope. "Let me get one more.'

Desmond Doss finds another man, almost dead—skin torn away, muscles ripped open, bone exposed. He gives the man a shot of morphine—American, Japanese, doesn't matter-and hoists him to his back, returning to the face of a cliff where, below, lies sanctuary. There, at the top of the ridge, he secures the man to a rope and slowly

lowers him down, the rope cutting deeper into his hands as he does. Once the man is down, Desmond breathes deep and turns his head again to the smoking ruins of Hacksaw Ridge.

"Please Lord," he says again. "Let me get one more."

And into hell he goes again.

Hacksaw Ridge is based on the true story of Desmond Doss, the first conscientious objector to receive the Medal of Honor. The character that we meet here is pure, unalloyed hero.

Like many young men of the day, Desmond took the bombing of Pearl Harbor "personal" and was on fire to volunteer. Even though he could've stayed home if he wanted to, Desmond didn't think it was right to stay behind while others fought in his place.

But Desmond also promised God that he'd never carry a weapon or kill another human being. And as you might expect, that creates a few problems once he and his squad move to the shooting range, preparing for war. Desmond explains to his superiors that he volunteered to save lives as a medic, not take them

And even under threat of a court martial, and despite the pleas of those closest to him, Desmond refuses to violate those personal convictions.

"With the world so set on tearing itself apart, it don't seem like such a bad thing to me to put a little bit of it back together," he says.

Desmond's commander, sergeant and the rest of his company find the pacifist soldier's stance to be peculiar at best, cowardly at worst. But Desmond proves, through his actions at Hacksaw Ridge, that he is no coward.

Desmond's stance on killing people stems from his deep religious convictions. As a fervent Seventh Day Adventist, he keeps his Saturday Sabbath. He reads his Bible constantly, even asking someone to retrieve it for him from a battlefield. His fellow soldiers sometimes mock him for his piety—sometimes.

times it's friendly teasing, sometimes more serious—but he never wavers. The closest Desmond comes to a spiritual crisis is amid the battle on Hacksaw Ridge after seeing a close friend die.

"What is it You want from me?" he asks of God. "I don't understand. I can't hear You."

And then he hears the cry of "Medic!" and Desmond knows what he has to do.

Desmond's convictions took root early. A poster featuring the Lord's Prayer and the Ten Commandments adorns the family home. And as a boy, Desmond is particularly drawn to the commandment "Thou shalt not kill," which his mother tells him is the worst sin.

But it's also clear that other deeply faithful people have come to different conclusions about that commandment. One tells Desmond, "I believe in [the Bible] as much as any man."

Desmond's brother volunteers for the Army and, apparently, has no such anti-weaponry qualms. Dorothy, his love interest back home, cautions Desmond about his stubborn streak: "Don't confuse your will with the Lord's," she says.

Desmond's mother sings in a church choir. Desmond compares the choir to angels ... though not necessarily musical ones. A bombed-out church stands on a bleached battlefield. Someone wears a cross, putting it in his mouth during battle. Desmond recites a portion of Isaiah 40.

And then there's the gore. Hacksaw Ridge features some of the most brutal depictions of war ever put to screen. It's impossible to overstate the level to which we see men turned to meat.

Okinawa's battlefield provides a fitting stage for director Mel Gibson, given his proclivity for violence in his movies. From Braveheart to The Passion of the Christ to Apocalypto, Gibson bathes the screen in blood, often using pain and destruction as a catalyst for stories about freedom and redemption. Gibson, a longtime Catholic, seems to believe quite literally in the saving power of blood

Which makes Gibson's selection of his newest on-screen hero—the conscientious objector Desmond Doss—an interesting one.

A director long fascinated by violence tells the story of a man who eschews it. Instead of giving us a hero who would die for his people, he gives us a hero who lives—and lives to save others.

Hacksaw Ridge is riveting cinema. But it's also bloody—as bloody as we've seen on screen for a long, long time. And while the horror and gore we see may impress upon us the depth Desmond's heroism, these images nevertheless assault us with their unblinking depiction of this hellish battle's carnage.

[From the editor: There is a strong and undeniable Christian message of sacrifice here. If one can make it past the graphic depiction of the brutality of war, it is worth seeking that message and remembering those that sacrificed for it. ¬—Dwight Widaman]

Lecrae suggests books for white Americans to read in effort to heal racial divide

Since the killings of Philando Castile and Alton Sterling by police officers, Lecrae has openly become an advocate for racial reconciliation and has used his voice and gifts to spread awareness. Despite his efforts, the Texas native says he's often misunderstood for his position even by fellow Christians, as can be seen by responses to his book suggestions.

"Not sure why as a Christian, you continue to let race define you," one Facebook user wrote on his post.

Another defended Lecrae and responded, "It impacts him, his children and brothers and sisters in Christ in very practical ways....race defines him partially because others including the system have defined him by race...being a Christian doesn't automatically take that away".

In a recent open letter to Huffington Post, he talked about seeing "so much fakeness" in his brothers and sisters as he traveled on tour.

He also shared about where he cur-



rently is in this season of his life, and confessed that he has been battling depression because of the loss of black lives.

LeCRAE "I can't even read comments on social media anymore. All the slander is too much for any one person to digest. They don't get me," he penned.

The Anomaly emcee went on to clarify his stance on police and white people despite what his critics might think. He shared that his mother and others in his family work in law enforcement.

"Just as I don't hate cops, I'm not mad at white people. But I am disturbed at the supremacy and disparities that still exist. Cliff Barrows led music and emceed six decades of Graham crusa

Gospel Music Hall of Fame member dies at 93 years old

Cliff Barrows, the man who brought the melody to Billy Graham's worldwide crusades for six decades, died Nov. 15. He was 93.

Graham's music and program director was there for the first crusade in Grand Rapids, Mich., in 1947 and continued serving until the last crusade in New York, 11 years ago. Barrows was the youngest member of the iconic trio comprised of himself, Graham, and George Beverly Shea, who died in 2013 at age 104. Together they formed the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association (BGEA), which has shared the gospel with millions around the world.

Barrows was an instrumental part of Graham's ministry, serving as a song leader, choir director, and the emcee for a ministry that evangelized to stadiums packed to capacity.

"Cliff Barrows was the voice behind my father for 60 years, emceeing the platform for his crusades and The Hour of Decision radio program," said Billy

Graham's son, Franklin, who now leads the BGEA. "Not only was he one of my father's closest friends, but he was a friend to all of us on the team and in the family. Growing up, and until the day of his death, I called him Uncle Cliff."

Graham first met Barrows in Asheville, N.C., while Barrows was on his honeymoon in 1945. The two quickly became inseparable.

Despite his declining health, Barrows joined his best friend in the city where they first met to celebrate Graham's 95th birthday in 2013. In a room of 800 wellwishers, including celebrities and politicians, Graham spotlighted his family

and Barrows, rather than the big names who showed up to honor him.

"Cliff, I want to thank you," Graham

said, according to the Charlotte Observer. "This celebration is partly for you as well. And I want to thank you for all that you have others is in community meant to me through all the years."

Ceres, Calif., Barrows started in ministry at an early age. He learned to read music and play the piano from his Aunt Helen and with her help, convinced his pastor to let him lead the church choir on Sunday nights.

Barrows became an ordained Baptist minister in 1944 and served as an assistant pastor at Temple Baptist Church in St. Paul, Minn., before he met Graham a year later. Barros always believed that corporate singing was one of the most

profound ways to build com-"The Christian faith is munity, stating: "The Christian faith is a singing good way to express it faith, and a good way to express it and share it with others is in community singing.'

Barrows' mu-

sical talent left a profound impression on the millions who heard him perform. For his musical contributions, Barrows joined the Nashville Gospel Music Hall of Fame in 1988.

If you are like me, there's relief that the election is over, if only for the lack of television commercials or robo calls. For some there was jubilation Wednesday morning, Nov. 9, as the news networks called it for Trump. For others there was sadness and trepidation. Trepidation that continues on the streets as young people protest the outcome of a time-tested democratic process.

A lot of the focus seems to be on America's college campuses where "snowflakes" (a term describing young people who, for the first time in their lives, didn't get their way and can't cope) are being offered "crying rooms", counseling or comfort dogs as was the case at the University of Kansas in Lawrence. Other universities cancelled classes and provided rooms where college students could play with children's building blocks or fill in coloring books featuring Barney, My Little Pony and other comforting images from their childhood.

But the response of many of these spoiled, self-centered offspring is in contrast to their contemporaries in other parts of the world–areas of our globe where tears are shed by young people not for an election loss but for the loss of family members at the hands



of ISIS, hunger, disease or bombs raining from the sky.

For me that's what is most embarrassing about this election. While the media tells us a world of "haves" is aghast at a Trump victory, I see a world of suffering masses, the "have-nots", looking with confusion as entitled and naive American protesters riot only to return to homes that are NOT burnedout, with Chipotle carry-out in hand, to lay in a warm bed for an evening of Netflix binging.

Yeah, these American youth have it so bad.

So how has the election result been received in some of these areas that many college students cannot find on a map?

The New York Times reports that Iraqis, who endured years of Islam being used to justify mass killing, publicly voiced optimism in "Mr. Trump as a truth-teller in calling out Islam — or a certain brand of it — as the problem."

The Times shares how Iraqi Shiites believe Trump will take a harder line on Saudi Arabia, which is seen as fomenting an extreme form of Islam-Wah-habism.

"The victory of Trump is the beginning of the end of extremist Islam and Wahhabism," said Mouwafak al-Rubaie, an Iraqi lawmaker and the country's former national security adviser.

"We have no concerns about the policy of Trump because he is against extremism," said Saad al-Hadithi, the spokesman for Prime Minister Haider al-Abadi of Iraq. "We think we are facing one enemy, and that is fighting ISIS. Therefore, I do not think there are fears



or concerns about a new American policy."

Mr. Abadi made it a point to call President-elect Trump and affirmed their cooperation against the Islamic

Then there are the regular folks on the front line and pay with their lives.

According to the Haym Salomon Center, a Yazidi couple in Iraq whose family suffered at the hands of the Islamic State named their newborn child "Trump" within minutes after Republican nominee became the U.S. President-elect. The new mother was reportedly in labor as the U.S. presidential election vote count rolled in. An hour before Trump officially won, she gave birth to a baby boy.

"We have been going through a neverending genocide over the last two years at the hands of ISIS, and Obama failed to take out ISIS or help liberate the thousands of Yazidi women and children that are still enslaved by ISIS," said the father of the new baby boy Trump. "I hope President Trump will at last take out ISIS so we can return home and rebuild our lives."

And in India, also suffering from a wave of terrorism at the hands of Islamic insurgents, President-elect Trump has become somewhat of a hero. So much so that Hindus declared Trump the winner even before the voting ended.

A news report says that "with drums banging and speakers blaring, the Hindu Sena, or Hindu Army, gathered at Jantar Mantar - New Delhi's answer to London's Speakers' Corner - to proclaim to a knot of TV crews that Trump had 'already won' the Nov. 8 vote."

due to his thoughts against Islamic terrorism and love for India and Hindus," said Vishnu Gupta, the Hindu Sena's national president.

In October, Trump had uttered the memorable phrase "I love Hindu", a kind of Two Corinthians moment, at an event organized by Indian supporters of his candidacy. While awkward, his sincere meaning was understood by Hindus.

As far as Hindu Sena is concerned, the feeling is mutual.

Its celebration featured posters bearing the slogans, "India Loves Trump" and "Trump Our Only Hope".

'One supporter held up a portrait of Trump with a tilak, or religious mark, on his forehead and held a sweet to his mouth," the news story reported, along with photos of birthday cakes with Trump's name on them.

So why do the worlds most oppressed see hope in Donald Trump? Just as he ran a campaign on representing America's forgotten middle-class, the world's most vulnerable also see him as representing them¬-listening to them. Strange, I know. Or maybe not so strange.

Perhaps America's privileged college liberals can stop crying for a moment long enough to listen themselves.

Kansas City area on the front lawn, where everyone passing by on the busy street in front could see. Next, the church planned and hosted a service called, "The Longest Night" to honor the victims and their families. The name seemed very appropriate since the families are going through a long night of loss and despair. The members of Leawood Baptist Church invited the families of the victims to attend, and wept with them, shared the gospel with them, and prayed with them.

"It's a meaningful way for us to show

love and support for families touched by violence," Leawood Baptist pastor Adam Carter told Metro Voice.

The FBI in September included Kansas City as one of seven cities singled out in the FBI's report on crime statistics. For cities with at least 400,000 residents, Kansas City's murder rate was the fifth highest. The homicide rate increased from 78 deaths in 2014 to 109 in 2015 with over 150 across the metro. As of late Nov. 2016 Kansas City's rate was 112 with the 176 murders across the metro.

The report said that Kansas City, along with Chicago, Houston, Washington D.C., Milwaukee, Philadelphia, and Baltimore, were largely responsible for the national increase in crime.

The news infuriates Kansas City's police chief, Darryl Forte. "Seven of this vear's homicide victims have been 16 or younger," Forte wrote on his blog Nov. 15. 'Several of them were young children – innocent bystanders who were victims of adults unable to resolve conflicts in a civil manner. Their loss should outrage us all."

Many murder victims are just in the wrong place at the wrong time, and are not involved in any crimes themselves. Charles Bradshaw was shot and killed near 57th and Michigan in the early morning hours on Sunday, Oct. 23.

His sister, Bobbie Bradford, told a local TV station how beloved her brother was and echoed the pain families who have lost loved ones this year.

"He loved me. He loved my kids. He went to church every Sunday," she said. "He has two children, a boy and a girl, so we just need justice for them also.

Damon Daniel, Director with Adhoc Group Against Crime agreed, "This is a reoccurring nightmare and we've gotta do better," he said.

Some of that pain may be more bearable by the effort of Leawood Baptist as they prepare their display and invite families of victims to the special service.

"As believers in Jesus Christ," says Carter, "we can share that there is hope in the Gospel, that there will be a day when there will truly be peace on Earth.


