

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
Shoe Drive to benefit Central Americans

Evangelicals Vote in Record Numbers in 2016 Election

Self-described evangelicals likely helped the GOP nominee to an upset victory

In a stunning rebuke of polls and pundits, Donald J. Trump has won the presidency of the United States with the most evangelical votes in this election; more than any election in polling history. Exit polls show he did it with the support of 81 percent of white Evangelicals and 60 percent of white Catholics.

But the victory was also fueled by evangelicals and Catholics of color. Trump saw a 20 percent increase in support from Hispanic Catholics over Mitt Romney in 2012 and out-performed other previous Republicans. Surprisingly, Trump out-per-



formed Bush and McCain among Jewish voters. Exit polls also show that Trump out-performed Mitt Romney among black voters and earned almost 30 percent of all Hispanic votes cast in sharp contrast to media predictions. In addition to Christian and Jewish voters, Trump also performed better among other faiths, beating every Republican nominee since 2000. The lone exception is Muslim voters.

Despite those predictions that Democrat Hillary Clinton held an Electoral College advantage heading into Election Day, the Republican nominee swept a bevy of key swing states with 306 Electoral votes — more than John F. Kennedy received in 1960, Nixon in 1968, Carter in 1976 and the 2000 and 2004 elections of President George W. Bush. In fact, Trump's electoral count is just 24 shy of President Obama's 2012 rout of Mitt Romney.

Another group that supported Trump: rural voters. In Missouri, Clinton won just three counties, and in Kansas she won

/hich companies made the naughty list this Christmas?

Have you grown sick and tired of national retail chains bowing to the very small anti-Christmas minority?

If so, then take a good look at the list below, and use it to fight back when you do your Christmas shopping!

The American Family Association and Liberty Council have each released their annual "Naughty-or-Nice" list that categorizes retailers and how they approach the Christmas season.

Some of the names that made the "nice" list are well known companies such as Walmart, JCPenney, Kmart, and Lowe's. Others fell into a "marginal" list, meaning that they rarely or infrequently referred to Christmas.

The two organizations reviewed up to four areas to determine if a company was "Christmas-friendly" in their advertising: print media (newspaper inserts), broadcast media (radio/television), website and/or personal visits to the store. If a company's ad has references to items associated with Christmas (trees, wreaths, lights, etc.), it was considered as an attempt to reach "Christmas" shop-

If a company has items associated with Christmas, but did not use the word "Christmas," then the company is considered as censoring "Christmas.

AFA continually updates the list, so check afa.net for updates. Want to report a company? Send your detailed report to christmas@afa.net.

AFA has also begun its "Keep Christ in Christmas" campaign. AFA President Tim Wildmon announced that his group is offering wristbands with messages about the battle against "secular liberals." There are also yard signs and buttons featuring the "Merry Christmas" message



"You might ask why we think this is an important battle. Well, secular liberals in our nation are bent on minimizing and even removing any mention of Christianity from the public square. And no other time of the year reminds people of Jesus Christ and America's Christian heritage more than the Christmas season," Wildmon explained.

Liberty Counsel also monitors cases across the U.S. where there is intimidation by officials and groups to remove the celebration of Christmas in public and private spaces.

These threats include atheist groups seeking to ban nativity scenes from public property, senior living centers that prohibit residents from singing

Christmas carols, public schools that ban students from wearing the Christmas colors of red and green, school officials who censor religious words from Christmas carols, and retailers which profit from Christmas while pretending it does not exist, according to the group's

Liberty Counsel provides a memorandum to offer guidance regarding publicly and privately sponsored religious holiday displays, religious holidays in public schools and the rights of public school students in the context of religious holidays. For example, publicly sponsored nativity scenes on public property are constitutional so long as there is a secular symbol of the holiday in the general context. Privately sponsored nativity scenes or religious symbols are also permissible on public property that has been opened to the general public for expressive activity. No secular symbol is necessary.

"Celebrating Christmas is legal in public schools and in public venues. In the private retail market, consumers can choose to patronize stores that recognize Christmas and refuse to buy from those that pretend it does not exist," said Mat Staver, founder and chairman of Liberty Counsel.



ISIS taking newborns, young children in rampage to annihilate Christians, says Catholic priest

A Roman Catholic priest who has been helping Christians, Yazidis and other religious minorities facing genocide in Iraq and Syria said Islamic State militants separate families who live in terrorist occupied land by taking newborn babies and virgin girls while killing fathers and forcing young boys to plant bombs on the streets.

Father Patrick Desbois, a Parisbased priest who for decades has been researching the Holocaust and fighting anti-Semitism through his Yahad–In Unum global humanitarian organization, has in recent years turned to helping minority victims of the ISIS genocide in Iraq and Syria, specifically the Yazidi people.

Desbois said in a phone interview with a Christian news organization that ISIS, which he noted has also killed thousands of Shia Muslims and Christians, uses a "very special" strategy to carry out its decimation of entire people groups.

'They dislocate the families, they take the newborn babies, and they put them in Islamist families," Desbois said, noting that elementaryage children are trained as terrorists, and "forced to put bombs" on streets.

"The young girls who are virgins are selected by doctors and sold," he added, referring to the terror group's human trafficking and sex trade, which has seen many thousands of



youngsters, terror on their faces, huddle in a camp near the Iraq-Syrian border as ISIS terrorists advance. It is not known what happened to these children after the photo was taken.

women and children sold to jihadists.

The men, on the other hand, are often shot in pits, he said, evidence for which are the many mass graves being discovered in territory newly liberated from ISIS' grasp.

The priest, who is a professor at Georgetown University Washington D.C., explained that ISIS "dislocates families according to age, sexuality," and said that "every member of the family" is used "in a special

"I've never seen that, it's very organized, there is no improvisation," he added.

Desbois and his organization have interviewed hundreds of Yazidi survivors who have escaped ISIS captivity, including some who have managed to flee the besieged city of Mosul, currently the target of a coalition military campaign seeking to liberate it from ISIS control.

Many of these interviews are shared in Action Yazidis, an initiative of Yahad-In Unum, which as it explains on its website, does not seek to advocate for "political, economic or military action," but serves to uncover "facts of genocidal practices wherever they are found and provide

a voice of protest on behalf of all victims and potential victims of genocide.'

Desbois, who recently released his book The Fabric of Terrorists: Into the Secrets of Daesh, based on his investigations into ISIS, shared eyewitness accounts that confirm reports that the terrorist organization is using human shields in its attempts to hold on to Mosul including civilians.

He shared that the jihadists "use prisoners as human shields," and that his organization has "many testimonies of girls who say they have been used as human shields.'

These eye-witness accounts have been crossed-referenced with other sources, the priest explained, in order to paint an accurate picture of the atrocities that people are being subiected to.

The plight of Christians under the extremists has also been a heavy one - hundreds of thousands of believers have left their ancestral homelands across Iraq and Syria, with Desbois noting that "there are nearly no more Christians under ISIS," except those held as prisoners in cap-

He said that all signs of Christianity are actively being destroyed, explaining, "any Christian symbol is being erased," with Christians also losing their houses, their belongings, and everything that ISIS demands, which is leading to a "total destruction" of the faith group.

Comparing the ongoing genocide to those of the past, like the Holocaust, Desbois said ISIS is using "very modern" methods, such as their heavy reliance on social media, where the jihadists spread propaganda messages, including graphic images and videos of human rights abuses.

Desbois suggested that Christians "have a responsibility to help" refugee families that are fleeing the war zones, and called on the government to help victims find work, and help those that have been traumatized by forced conversions to Islam.

The priest emphasized that today people can help in many different ways, with one option being donating to organizations that are working hard to assist people suffering as a result of ISIS' actions.

"We try to help concretely," he said, and pointed out that in the Bible, God asks people to help their brothers and sisters.





Some Tax Refunds to be Delayed in 2017

Beginning in 2017, a new law approved by Congress requires the IRS to hold refunds on tax returns claiming the EITC or the ACTC until mid-February. The IRS



must hold the entire refund - even the portion not associated with the EITC and ACTC -- until at least Feb. 15. This change helps ensure that taxpayers get the refund they are owed by giving the agency more time to help detect and prevent fraud.

"This is an important change as some of these taxpayers are used to getting an early refund," IRS Commissioner John Koskinen said. "We want people to be aware of the change for their planning purposes during the holidays. We don't want anyone caught by surprise if they get their refund a few weeks later than in previous years."

As in past years, the IRS will begin accepting and processing tax returns

once the filing season begins. All taxpayers should file as usual, and tax return preparers should submit returns as they normally do. Even though the IRS cannot issue refunds for some early filers until at least Feb. 15, the IRS reminds taxpayers that most refunds will be issued within the normal timeframe, less than 21 days, after being accepted for processing by the IRS. The "Where's My Refund?" tool on IRS.gov and the IRS2Go phone app remains the best way to get this status of a refund.

If you cannot wait for your refund or are just looking to start the year off with some cash flow, then look to a Taxpayer Refund Advance from Peggy's Tax & Accounting. (300 SE 29th, Suite C, Topeka, KS 66605) There are three tiers you can qualify for: \$500, \$800 or \$1,200.

If you are like me, there's relief that the election is over, if only for the lack of television commercials or robo calls. For some there was jubilation Wednesday morning, Nov. 9, as the news networks called it for Trump. For others there was sadness and trepidation. Trepidation that continues on the streets as young people protest the outcome of a time-tested democratic process.

A lot of the focus seems to be on America's college campuses where "snowflakes" (a term describing young people who, for the first time in their lives, didn't get their way and can't cope) are being offered "crying rooms", counseling or comfort dogs as was the case at the University of Kansas in Lawrence. Other universities cancelled classes and provided rooms where college students could play with children's building blocks or fill in coloring books featuring Barney, My Little Pony and other comforting images from their childhood.

But the response of many of these spoiled, self-centered offspring is in contrast to their contemporaries in other parts of the world-areas of our globe where tears are shed by young people not for an election loss but for the loss of family members at the hands of ISIS, hunger, disease or bombs raining from the sky.

While the media tells us a world of "haves" is aghast at a Trump victory, I see a world of suffering masses, the "have-nots", looking with confusion as entitled and naive American protesters riot only to return to homes that are NOT burned-out, with Chipotle carry-out in hand, to lay in a warm bed for an evening of Netflix binging.

So how has the election result been received in some of these areas that many college students cannot find on a map?

The New York Times reports that Iraqis, who endured years of Islam being used to justify mass killing, publicly voiced optimism in "Mr. Trump as a truth-teller in calling out Islam — or a certain brand of it — as the problem."

The Times shares how Iraqi Shiites believe Trump will take a harder line on Saudi Arabia, which is seen as fomenting an extreme form of Islam-Wahhabism.

"The victory of Trump is the beginning of the end of extremist Islam and Wahhabism," said Mouwafak al-Rubaie, an Iraqi lawmaker and the country's former national security adviser.

"We have no concerns about the policy of Trump because he is against extremism," said Saad al-Hadithi, the spokesman for Prime Minister Haider al-Abadi of Iraq. "We think we are facing one enemy, and that is fighting ISIS. Therefore, I do not think there are fears or concerns about a new American policy."

Mr. Abadi made it a point to call President-elect Trump and affirmed their cooperation against the Islamic State.

Then there are the regular folks on the front line and pay with their lives.

According to the Haym Salomon



Center, a Yazidi couple in Iraq whose family suffered at the hands of the Islamic State named their newborn child "Trump" within minutes after Republican nominee became the U.S. President-elect. The new mother was reportedly in labor as the U.S. presidential election vote count rolled in. An hour before Trump officially won, she gave birth to a baby boy.

"We have been going through a neverending genocide over the last two years at the hands of ISIS, and Obama failed to take out ISIS or help liberate the thousands of Yazidi women and children that are still enslaved by ISIS," said the father of the new baby boy Trump. "I hope President Trump will at last take out ISIS so we can return home and rebuild our lives."

And in India, also suffering from a wave of terrorism at the hands of Islamic insurgents, President-elect Trump has become somewhat of a hero. So much so that Hindus declared Trump the winner even before the voting ended.

A news report says that "with drums banging and speakers blaring, the Hindu Sena, or Hindu Army, gathered at Jantar Mantar - New Delhi's answer to London's Speakers' Corner - to proclaim to a knot of TV crews that Trump had 'already won' the Nov. 8 vote."

"Trump's victory is confirmed early, due to his thoughts against Islamic terrorism and love for India and Hindus," said Vishnu Gupta, the Hindu Sena's national

In October, Trump had uttered the memorable phrase "I love Hindu", a kind of Two Corinthians moment, at an event organized by Indian supporters of his candidacy. While awkward, his sincere

Rep. Mike Pompeo, Wichita Republican, is Trump's pick for director of the CIA

Rep. Mike Pompeo, Wichita Republican, chosen by Trump to head

President-elect Donald Trump announced on Nov. 17 his nomination of U.S. Rep. Mike Pompeo, a Wichita Republican, for the position of Central Intelligence Agency director.

"He has served our country with honor and spent his life fighting for the security of our citizens," Trump said in a statement, calling Pompeo "a brilliant and unrelenting leader" for the intelligence community.

Pompeo said, "I am honored and humbled to accept the Presidentelect's nomination to lead the Central Intelligence Agency. This was a difficult decision. I have genuinely loved representing the people of Kansas in Congress—working to make our community stronger and more prosperous. But ultimately the opportunity to lead the world's finest intelligence warriors, who labor tirelessly to keep this nation and Kansas safe, is a call to service I cannot ignore.

Pompeo has a reputation as a hardline conservative with hawkish views on Iran, and opposition to the closure of a prison at Guantanamo Bay in Cuba. During an interview with The Topeka Capital-Journal in April, Pompeo stressed the importance of keeping Guantanamo Bay open for intelligence gathering.

Pompeo must be confirmed by the U.S. Senate before taking office. Kansas' senior senator. Pat Roberts, a former chairman of the Senate Intelligence Committee, said he supports Pompeo, calling his nomination a "good and wise selection" by Trump.

'Kansans can be proud Mike Pompeo will lead the Central Intelligence Agency and will be in a



position to protect our national security at a time of increasing and varying global threats," Roberts said.

U.S. Rep. Lynn Jenkins, a Kansas Republican, said Pompeo's "experience and Kansas roots will serve him well as the director of the CIA." Former U.S. Sen. Bob Dole said Trump "couldn't have made a better pick."

Gov. Sam Brownback, a Republican and former senator, called Pompeo "a wonderful pick" and predicted he will likely be confirmed by the Senate.

"I think so, but nothing's easy anymore," Brownback said. "Mike was number one in his class at West Point. He was number one in his class at Harvard. He's been a congressman. He's been on the Intelligence Committee. He's smart and tough. I think it's a tremendous pick by the incoming Trump administration."

Pompeo is a stalwart defender of the Patriot Act and bulk surveillance who considers National Security Agency whistleblower Edward Snowden a traitor deserving of the death penalty. He has opposed efforts to reform the nation's surveillance gathering in the wake of Snowden's revelations.

The American Civil Liberties Union said Pompeo's positions on surveil-

lance and Guantanamo Bay raise civil liberty concerns.

"These positions and others merit serious public scrutiny through a confirmation process," said ACLU executive director Anthony Romero. "His positions on mass surveillance have been rejected by federal courts and have been the subject of several lawsuits filed by the ACLU."

Pompeo, as a member of the House Select Benghazi Committee, co-wrote a report, which accused the Obama administration of misleading the public and failing to protect Americans. He called former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton's behavior "morally reprehensible."

Pompeo is an Army veteran who graduated first in his class from West Point in 1986. He later graduated from Harvard Law School, where he was editor of the Harvard Law Review. After returning to his roots in South Central Kansas and founded Thayer Aerospace, where he served as CEO for more than a decade providing components for commercial and military aircraft. He then became President of Sentry International, an oilfield equipment manufacturing, distribution and service company.

Pompeo's past comments about Islam may draw questions during Senate confirmation hearings. He has said Muslim religious leaders can be considered "potentially complicit" in terrorist attacks for failing to denounce

Pompeo, 52, was elected to Congress in 2010 and has been re-elected by sizable margins every two years since. A special election will be held to choose his successor.

Under state law, the governor must announce the date of a special election five days after a congressional seat becomes vacant. The Republican and Democratic parties in Kansas will each choose a candidate.

Other Kansas politicians rumored to be in contention for positions in the Trump administration include Brownback, Sen. Jerry Moran and former Reg. Tim Huelskamp for Secretary of Agriculture; and Kansas Secretary of State Kris Kobach for an unknown position. Kobach was an adviser to the Trump campaign on immigration issues. Brownback would name Kobach's replacement if Kobach joins the Trump administra-

Canadian court: Law Society must accept Christians

(WNS)--The Law Society of British Columbia must recognize Trinity Western University's (TWU) future law school graduates, according to a unanimous opinion the British Columbia (B.C.) Court of Appeals issued Nov. 1. "The TWU community has a right to hold and act on its beliefs, absent evidence of actual harm," a five-judge panel wrote. "To do so is an expression of its right to freedom of religion." The decision is the latest chapter in TWU's years-long battle to open Canada's first Christian law school. In December 2013 the provincial law society approved the university's plans, but a 2014 members referendum revoked it over concerns that the TWU community covenant—which holds students to orthodox Christian behavioral standards, including heterosexual marriage—is discriminatory. The B.C. appeals court ruled Law Society that discriminated.

Danger follows Christian refugees to Germany

(WNS)--The situation of Christian refugees in German shelters is "unbearable" according to an updated report released in October and co-authored by Open Doors Germany. The report documents 743 cases of discrimination, death threats, and physical



assaults against Christians by Muslim refugees between February and May of this year and claims the findings are only "the tip of the iceberg." The study also highlights the challenges of reporting about religiously motivated attacks. European politicians have cultivated a climate with two extremes: Much of the political and media establishment ignores or whitewashes attacks carried out by Muslim refugees under the guise of political correctness, while the far-right wants to exploit the statistics for its own political gain. Open Doors said those risks should not lead to silence: "The human right of religious freedom and protection of victims in a country like Germany—that is a constant admonisher of human rights abuses on an international scale—should not be sacrificed for political objectives or the interests of individual groups.'

Euthanasia advocates celebrate victory in Colorado

(WNS)--Coloradans voted to legalize physician-assisted suicide on Nov. 8, a decision critics call a "dangerous step for Colorado's medically and socially vulnerable citizens." Nearly 65 percent of voters said "yes" to the measure with almost all votes counted the next morning. The controversial initiative will allow terminally ill adults with six months or less to live the right to access a physician-prescribed lethal drug. Colorado joins Oregon, California, Montana, Vermont, and Washington in legalizing assisted suicide. All six states modeled their measures after Oregon's Death with Dignity Act, passed in 1997.

I am a girl who loves Christmas. I love the day, I love the season, I love reveling in the wonder that God's Son came to earth to save us as a tiny baby. My third child was born on December 17, and when I cuddled him as a newborn, it made Christmas extra-special. I tried to imagine Mary cuddling and nursing her newborn child and trying to wrap her mind around the fact that this tiny baby whose life for nine months had totally depended on her would now be saving her. And all of us. The Messiah as a swaddled babe! Incredible.

I have never had a Christmas season that was not filled with joy. But I know, as life twists and turns, that one day there may come a December when I don't feel like celebrating. Where life will be hard. Where I will be in such turmoil that Christmas lights and tinsel might seem like an assault to my very being.

I've never celebrated such a Christmas. But I know someone who has.

Seven years ago, my sister-in-law's father was diagnosed with leukemia on December 5. It was a "do-not-pass-go, head directly to the hospital to start chemotherapy" deal. By the time Christmas came along, he had been close to death several times. His family had said their goodbyes once even ... but he hung on. For our whole extended family, it was hard to feel exultant joy that Christmas. My niece who was nine at the time, wrote "Please, Jesus Please" on the chalkboard in my parents' home. My mother left it there for years, that sweet plea of a child to her Savior. It was a Christmas of intercession more than anything else.

Christmas evening that year, I arrived home weary after our multiple family Christmas celebrations. We had a wonderful day, but we were all "Christmased out."

these words from my sister-in-law's mother. They are words I will never, ever forget. She wrote:

"Our family Christmases have always been filled with traditions. That is not a bad thing. It helps bind families together.

This year all the traditions that were so important have been set aside. Nothing is the same. And yet, Christmas came. Quoting from Dr. Seuss, How the Grinch Stole Christmas, "It came without ribbons. It came without tags! It came without packages, boxes or bags! He hadn't stopped Christmas from coming. It came! Somehow or other it came just the same."

We know the reason it came is because of God's indescribable gift to us. Jesus left the glory of heaven to come as a baby in a manger. His every physical need had to be cared for by another. What humility! He came to go through the ugliness of death on the cross so that we can have life everlasting.

We understand a little more this year about what Jesus did for us. Jerry's physical needs have to be met by others. It is

My friends, what I learned from my sister-in-law's courageous family is this: It is the trying and devastating times in our lives that make Christmas all the more joyful, beautiful and wondrous.

Because of Christmas, all those trials



will work together for good. Because of Christmas, we will one day be in a place where none of earth's ill can befall us. Because of Christmas, what's broken can be made whole.

Because of Christmas, we are blessed when we mourn! This is the good news we can cling to in the midst of trials ... even when we are covered in tears at the foot of our Christmas tree.

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



resources into giving him a chance. To her, she had no option but to sacrifice the free life of a single-woman and focus every waking hour on caring for her son's wellbeing and potential.

She taught Davey the difference between a need and a want; buying the warm coat he needed – not the more expensive leather jacket he wanted.

She made sure he never missed a sports event; cheering with him for prowrestlers, racecar drivers and demolition derbies. If a boy should be there, Nellie Mae made sure Davey was there. She was both Mom and Dad to her son.

So, it only figures that Davey's lasting Christmas memory involves Nellie Mae...my mom.

Mom was getting weaker and weaker. She told me it was the lingering flu. The phone can hide the truth when you live a thousand miles apart. A September 25th call from her neighbor revealed she was gone.

Growing up, Christmas was a small but, extraordinarily special time. Mom made it that way. So, I wanted the same for my family. I wanted to be the kind of Dad my Mom was.

That first Christmas without Mom was hard. It was before our boys were born, so Kerry and I were with her family in Indiana. Gifts had been opened, hugs and laughs had been shared, when Kerry said, "there's one more present."

As she passed it to me, I could tell it had been wrapped with care. Kerry shared how she found it hanging in Mom's closet — still wrapped in the department store bag. She knew it was for Davey.

Inside was a leather jacket.

Three months after leaving, in a room full of tears of joy, I received my Mom's last Christmas gift. No longer a want – in my heart, that special jacket was a need.

Target sales decline as sex crimes increase in stores

Transgender Bathroom Policy Leads to 10 Crimes Targeting Girls

As the year's busiest shopping season begins, the American Family Association has compiled a list of 10 cases to showcase why Target's bathroom policies that allow male customers who identify as female to go into women's bathrooms and dressing rooms is a threat to women and children.

"The overwhelming evidence continues to pile up against Target's policy to allow men into women's restrooms and dressing rooms in its stores," AFA President Tim Wildmon wrote in November..

Target has defended its decision by stating: "We welcome transgender team members and guests to use the restroom or fitting room facility that corresponds with their gender identity. ... Everyone deserves to feel like they belong."

But Wildmon argued that what this means is that a man can simply state that he feels like a woman on any given day, and go in to use the women's restroom.

"Target's policy is exactly how sexual predators get access to their victims. And the proof keeps mounting," he said.

"Clearly, Target's dangerous policy poses a threat to wives and daughters. Over 1.4 million people have pledged to boycott Target stores until protecting women and children is a priority."

AFA then listed 10 headlines this past year of men found recording, taking photos, or peering into women's restrooms at Target stores nationwide:

- Man wanted for taking photos inside Target changing room
- Transgender woman caught filming in Target changing room
 - Man seen reaching under stall

with phone in Target dressing room

- 'Peeping Tom' reported in Target dressing room
- Teen girl reports dressing room peeper at Target
- Police Looking for Target Peeper
- Target peeping Tom pleads guilty
 Man Arrested for Taking
- Man Arrested for Taking Photos of Woman in Target Bathroom
- Peeping tom caught filming women in Brentwood Target dressing rooms
- 'Peeping Tom' took pics of people in Target bathroom

In one case, a transgender woman was arrested in Idaho back in July for recording an 18-year-old girl in the Idaho Falls Target store. Shaun Smith, the accused, later admitted to having recorded the videos for "the same reason men look at pornography."

AFA has said that it will not be ending its boycott until Target reverses its policies, and said that the proposed plan by the retail giant to add one unisex bathroom at each of its 300 stores in the United States that don't already have one still doesn't do anything to protect women and children.

"Unisex bathrooms are fine, but our request has always been that Target maintain the gender-specific bathrooms as well — if the company is interested in guaranteeing the safety and privacy of women and girls who patronize the retailer's stores," Wildmon previously said.

Target's same-store transactions, which is how traffic is measured, fell 2.2 percent in the second quarter of this year. Overall, sales fell 7.2 percent to \$16.2 billion.

Sixty kids find their 'forever homes'

Families across Kansas finalized their adoptions on National Adoption Day, Nov. 19. Following tradition, many judges opened their courthouse to complete adoptions and bring smiles to the faces of children and adults alike. In total this November, nonprofit KVC Kansas helped to facilitate the adoptions of nearly sixty children in the Kansas City area, Topeka and other parts of eastern Kansas.

There are more than 100,000 U.S. children in foster care waiting to find permanent, loving families. In Kansas, there are approximately 350 children who need adoptive families. In Missouri over 1,000 children were available across the state. On e happy story is that of Bob, a 17-year-old who was in foster care and wondered if he was "too old to be adopted." Thanks to a video shared on social media that showed his easygoing personality and his desire for a family, his

story reached the perfect couple. Jerry Gross and Keira Jones responded immediately and Bob became a permanent part of their family this fall. The heart-touching story of how the family surprised Bob with their desire to adopt him is online at http://bit.ly/2eHWBSR.

"For the adoptive families and especially for the children, it is the culmination of a lot of hoping, waiting and hard work," said Danielle Bartelli, President of KVC Kansas. We are thankful for the families that step up to the plate to become a permanent, loving family for children who have experienced abuse and neglect. We're also thankful to the judges throughout Kansas who bring attention to the need for more adoptive families."

Hacksaw Ridge makes us confront the brutality of war, and the redeeming work of God

[Editor's Note: Metro Voice does not make it a habit to review R-rated films. At times, though, a film is important enough to review because of its portrayal of historical events in which the atrocities and violence of the subject manner cannot be ignored. It is part of a story that must be told. We realize that if accurately told on film, most of the Old Testament would also receive a similar rating. It is rare that an A-lister Hollywood director presents faith and sacrifice in such an outstanding production, that event the most liberal of his or her peers stand in a 10-minute ovation and cheer at its premiere. Such was the case with Mel Gibson's "Hacksaw Ridge". This is not a film for the faint of heart nor for children. It is a story that shows the brutal sacrifice that our fathers (my own father Ellery Widaman served in the Pacific in WWII and re-enlisted to serve in Korea) and grandfathers gave in preserving our freedoms. For that reason, a film like this cannot be judged solely by its film rating. -Dwight Widaman

The Bible calls it a burning lake, a blazing furnace. Dante imagined it as nine circles of Sisyphean torture. Bosch colored it with our darkest nightmares. It's been called Abaddon, Gehenna, Tophet,

Perhaps those who took part in the Battle of Okinawa have another name for hell: Hacksaw Ridge.

It's the waning months of World War II. Germany has surrendered but Japan

the United States military pushes ever closer to the Japanese homeland, the fighting grows more desperate, more horrific.

The U.S. turns its guns on Okinawa, just 340 miles from Japan. It pounds the island with fire as soldiers and marines scurry ashore. Japanese soldiers hide underground, determined to push the Americans into the ocean. Hacksaw Ridge is one of the island's most contested points, and soon the ground lies smoking. Bodies litter it like autumn leaves; blood pools in foxholes and footprints; sounds of agony fill the sky. Countries may fight for this patch of land, but it's Death that rules here. Death that wins.

But into that black, blasted game board scurries one slight, skinny man. He carries no gun: Indeed, he fought the U.S. Army for the right not to. Bandages, not bullets, fill his pockets. He alone seems to walk upright in this land of crawling, screaming flesh. He alone dares all in this doomscape of the dying.

"Please Lord," he prays, his clothes soaked in the blood of others, his hands ripped open from the burn of rope. "Let me get one more."

Desmond Doss finds another man,

away, muscles ripped open, bone exposed. He gives the man a shot of morphine—American, Japanese, doesn't matter-and hoists him to his back, returning to the face of a cliff where, below, lies sanctuary. There, at the top of the ridge, he secures the man to a rope and slowly lowers him down, the rope cutting deeper into his hands as he does. Once the man is down, Desmond breathes deep and turns his head again to the smoking ruins of Hacksaw Ridge.

"Please Lord," he says again. "Let me get one more."

And into hell he goes again.

Hacksaw Ridge is based on the true story of Desmond Doss, the first conscientious objector to receive the Medal of Honor. The character that we meet here is pure, unalloyed hero.

Like many young men of the day, Desmond took the bombing of Pearl Harbor "personal" and was on fire to volunteer. Even though he could've stayed home if he wanted to, Desmond didn't think it was right to stay behind while others fought in his place.

But Desmond also promised God that he'd never carry a weapon or kill another human being. And as you might expect, that creates a few problems once he and his squad move to the shooting range, preparing for war. Desmond explains to his superiors that he volunteered to save lives as a medic, not take them.

And even under threat of a court martial, and despite the pleas of those closest to him, Desmond refuses to violate those

apart, it don't seem like such a bad thing to me to put a little bit of it back togeth-

Desmond's commander, sergeant and the rest of his company find the pacifist soldier's stance to be peculiar at best, cowardly at worst. But Desmond proves, through his actions at Hacksaw Ridge,

Desmond's stance on killing people stems from his deep religious convictions. As a fervent Seventh Day Adventist, he keeps his Saturday Sabbath. He reads his Bible constantly, even asking someone to retrieve it for him from a battlefield. His fellow soldiers sometimes mock him



for his piety-sometimes it's friendly teasing, sometimes more serious—but he never wavers. The closest Desmond comes to a spiritual crisis is amid the battle on Hacksaw Ridge after seeing a close friend die.

"What is it You want from me?" he asks of God. "I don't understand. I can't hear You.'

And then he hears the cry of "Medic!" and Desmond knows what he has to do.

Desmond's convictions took root early. A poster featuring the Lord's Prayer and the Ten Commandments adorns the family home. And as a boy, Desmond is particularly drawn to the commandment Thou shalt not kill," which his mother tells him is the worst sin.

But it's also clear that other deeply faithful people have come to different conclusions about that commandment. One tells Desmond, "I believe in [the Bible as much as any man."

Desmond's brother volunteers for the Army and, apparently, has no such antiweaponry qualms. Dorothy, his love interest back home, cautions Desmond about his stubborn streak: "Don't confuse your will with the Lord's," she says.

Desmond's mother sings in a church choir. Desmond compares the choir to angels ... though not necessarily musical ones. A bombed-out church stands on a bleached battlefield. Someone wears a cross, putting it in his mouth during battle. Desmond recites a portion of Isaiah

And then there's the gore. Hacksaw Ridge features some of the most brutal depictions of war ever put to screen. It's impossible to overstate the level to which we see men turned to meat.

Okinawa's battlefield provides a fitting stage for director Mel Gibson, given his proclivity for violence in his movies. From Braveheart to The Passion of the Christ to Apocalypto, Gibson bathes the screen in blood, often using pain and destruction as a catalyst for stories about freedom and redemption. Gibson, a longtime Catholic, seems to believe quite literally in the saving power of blood.

Which makes Gibson's selection of his newest on-screen hero-the conscientious objector Desmond Doss-an interesting one.

A director long fascinated by violence tells the story of a man who eschews it. Instead of giving us a hero who would die for his people, he gives us a hero who lives—and lives to save others.

Hacksaw Ridge is riveting cinema. But it's also bloody—as bloody as we've seen on screen for a long, long time. And while the horror and gore we see may impress upon us the depth Desmond's heroism, these images nevertheless assault us with their unblinking depiction of this hellish battle's carnage.



Lecrae suggests books for white Americans to read in effort to heal racial divide

Since the killings of Philando Castile and Alton Sterling by police officers, Lecrae has openly become an advocate for racial reconciliation and has used his voice and gifts to spread awareness. Despite his efforts, the Texas native says he's often misunderstood for his position even by fellow Christians, as can be seen by responses to his book suggestions.

"Not sure why as a Christian, you continue to let race define you," one Facebook user wrote on his post.

Another defended Lecrae and responded, "It impacts him, his children and brothers and sisters in Christ in very practical ways....race defines him partially because others including the system have defined him by race...being a Christian doesn't automatically take that away".

Can I complete business with Social Security online?

Answer:

There are many things you can do on Social Security's website. You can conduct most of your Social Security business with us online at www.socialsecurity.gov/onlineservices. You can get an estimate of future

benefits, find out if you qualify for benefits now, and even apply for benefits. You can complete a number of other tasks online, too. You can estimate your retirement benefit using our Retirement Estimator, which allows you to get an instant, personalized estimate of your future benefit based on different retirement ages and scenarios. You can even open your own my Social



Security account to plan for and manage your benefits. In some areas, you can even request a replacement Social Security card using your my Social Security account. Open or access your my Social Security account today at www.socialsecurity.gov/myaccount.

I am receiving Social Security retirement benefits and I recently went back to work. Do I have to pay Social Security (FICA) taxes on my income?

Answer:

Yes. By law, your employer must withhold FICA taxes from your paycheck. Although you are retired, you do receive credit for those new earnings. Each year Social Security automatically credits the new earnings and, if


Question:

I am expecting a child and will be out of work for six months. Can I qualify for short-term disability?

Answer:

No. Social Security pays only for total disability - conditions that render you unable to work and are expected to last for at least a year or end in death. No benefits are payable for partial disability or short-term disability, including benefits while on maternity leave.

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

World Series MVP Ben Zobrist:

'God Doesn't Measure **Us by What We Do'**

Even though Chicago Cubs all-star Ben Zobrist has won two World Series in the last two seasons and even earned the title of World Series MVP last Thursday, he knows that God does not measure his success by the number of championship rings on his fin-

After the Cubs won the World Series last Thursday, the evangelical nonprofit organization Awana published an audio interview with Zobrist that was conducted before the end of the regular season in which Zobrist talked

about his Christian upbringing and what it is like to be a famous and devout Christian athlete.

The 35-year-old Zobrist, who also won the World Series in 2015 as a member of the Kansas City Royals and is a three-time all-star, explained that even though he has earned much suc-

cess in his 13-season MLB career, he does not place his hope solely in baseball.

"As a ballplayer, there is no Christian way to swing a bat. There is no Christian way to swing or throw," Zobrist

explained. "You are either good or you're not at whatever your job is. And it is more important that you understand the grace and love and peace you have in Christ, whether you are good or bad at whatever you are doing every

"We are just so thankful that Christ does not measure us by what we do. God is not measuring us by that, He is measuring us by our faith in Christ," Zobrist added. "We are perfect. According to God, we are perfect, yet we know that we are sinners. We believe in the fact that we are both saints and sinners at the same time as we live in this world.'

Even though Zobrist is the son of a pastor and has a national platform as a major league baseball player, he said he doesn't feel like he needs to always walk around proclaiming his faith in Christ, saying that "if you are walking with Christ, they can tell."

"My hope is not in how well I am living or how glorifying I am being to the Lord," he continued. "[My hope] is in what Christ has already accomplished for me. If that is my hope, then I will worship the Lord and I will want to live the life that He wants me to live."

As many parents strive to groom their children to become successful athletes, lawyers, doctors or business professionals, Zobrist warns that people shouldn't be so willing to sacrifice their families and even their faith just to achieve their own personal dreams.

"I think the goal for us is to be faithful, not

famous," Zobrist said. "Our culture wants us to be famous. Everybody wants to be famous. You want to be the best you can possibly be and I want to be the best I can possibly be but only within what makes sense for a believ-

"I think people sacrifice for their

job. They sacrifice their family, they sacrifice their faith, they sacrieverything fice that should be near and dear to them for their success in this life, and for money and fame and whatever else they

are seeking after," Zobrist added. "That is a tragedy. I think we have to remember that we do want to give our kids privileges and pursue something but remind them that more than anything, success is what God says it is.'

Zobrist reminded listeners that the biblical definition of success is sacrificing one's self for the benefit of others.

'According to the Lord, the most glorified person in the Bible is Jesus. What did He come to do? He came to sacrifice and suffer for our sake," Zobrist said. "Success is really not about us rising to the occasion as much as it is about us dying to the occasion and giving to someone else."

"To me, if I play baseball and I become a great athlete and I win World Series and I'm an all-star and all this stuff that I have accomplished, and yet I sacrificed other people or I sacrifice my family on the altar of my own personal success, then I have just really

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

iust two counties.

Trump's triumph was an emphatic exclamation point at the end of nearly 600 days of a brutal presidential campaign that divided family, friends, and countrymen, and upended every notion of a traditional political campaign.

There have been questions about how pollsters define "evangelical." In this case, it appears they allowed voters simply to self-identify as evangelicals or say they'd been born again. It is possible that the support among Evangelicals is even higher since the term, as used in the media, is often derogatory and some voters may not have self-identified as such just as many pundits now say Trump supporters kept their support private until they voted.

Still, it's likely that plenty of true evangelicals joined the Trump constituency, whether reluctantly or enthusiastically. It's an issue that has deeply divided many evangelicals grappling with whether they should support a candidate with a deeply compromised moral character. Even as Trump considers how to build coalitions in a fractured Republican Party, many Christians face breaches to repair among themselves.

For those wondering whether the thousands of Trump supporters showing up at rallies would show up at polls, the answer appeared to be a resounding ves.

Among Trump's many challenges now: balancing his populist vision that captured many blue-collar workers with the more traditionally conservative

- including those who distanced themselves from him during his campaign.

In an acceptance speech, Trump struck a conciliatory note, even with approach of some Republican lawmakers Clinton, saying, "We owe her a major

debt of gratitude to our country." He appealed to voters who hadn't supported him in the past: "I am reaching out to you for your guidance and help so we can work together and unify our great coun-

And he ended his speech with the kind of lofty promise he began his presidential bid with last year: "America will no longer settle for anything less than the best."
