

### Survey: Good deeds by Christian Churches often go unnoticed

(BP) -- Many Americans are unaware of various efforts by local Christians or churches to serve their neighbors, according to a new study Nashville-based LifeWay from Research.

In a survey of 1,000 Americans, LifeWay Research looked at 13 service programs conducted by churches -from tutoring kids to teaching job skills. They asked Americans if they'd heard of churches or church members being involved in those activities in the past six months.

Six in 10 say they know churches feed the hungry. Half say they know churches give clothing to the poor.

Beyond that, acts of service by churches often appear to go unnoticed, said Scott McConnell, executive director of LifeWay Research.

"Unless you've received help from a church -- or been involved in serving others -- these kinds of programs may fly under the radar," McConnell said.

Few Americans were aware that churches help people prepare their taxes (8 percent), provide foster care (12 percent), teach English to immigrants (13 percent) or teach job skills (13 percent).

A few more know churches tutor kids (16 percent), provide aid to new moms (19 percent), support local schools (21 percent), offer after-school programs (24 percent) or visit people in prison (25 percent).

About a third of Americans know

# Year 500: What Has Become of Luther's Reformation?

WITTENBERG, Germany -- This year marks the 500th anniversary of one of the most important events in history, the Protestant Reformation.

On Oct. 31, 1517, Martin Luther, a local professor of moral theology, nailed his 95 theses to the door of All Saints' Church in Wittenberg, Germany, spelling out theological disputes he had developed regarding teachings in the Roman Catholic Church, to which he belonged at the

Little did he know how much that single act would change the world.

Germany is now in the middle of a yearlong national celebration of Luther's Reformation. But Luther's time was rarely this colorful and tidy as in re-enactments today. The 1500s i n Germany were cold, muddy, bleak and

#### **Luther's Time: Back to the Future**

There are interesting similarities between Luther's time and today. In

1517, the Holy Roman Empire, like the European Union, was beginning to disintegrate. New technology - the printing press – was as revolutionary as social media, and pushing into the borders of Europe: the armies of Islam.

Even though he was an adopter of new technology, Luther would probably try to destroy one piece of new technology, just installed last week in Wittenberg: a robot that dispenses a blessing in seven languages.

It's interesting to watch a nation that has in many ways turned away from God - or at least away from biblical Christianity – celebrate Luther, a man of the Bible, so enthusiastically.

#### The Secular Celebrate the Sacred

But how would Martin Luther feel about today's secular Germany?

Famous German Lutheran pastor Dr. Theo Lehmann says Luther would "turn over in his grave."

One of the world's leading authorities on the reformation, Yale professor Dr. Carlos Eire, says the number one reason Luther would be surprised by the celebration is that he didn't expect there to be a world in 2017.

"Luther expected the world to end in his lifetime or soon thereafter," Eire says, "If Luther could time travel, he would just be shocked about what has become of the Christian world, the fact that so few Europeans now attend church.'

#### **Loud, Smelly and Rude**

Despite the sophisticated looking busts and sculptures of his appearance, Luther was not genteel. He liked to argue, and he did not like to be disagreed with. He was a product of his times, says Dr. Benjamin Hasselhorn, curator of the National Luther Exhibition at the Lutherhaus Museum in Wittenberg.

Hasselhorn says Luther's times were loud and rude.

"In central Germany in that time people were not polite. They were not quiet," says Hasselhorn. They were loud and they drank beer and they ate a lot of meat and they were rude, and so Luther was one of them.'



#### God's Agent of Change

Luther was an imperfect vessel that God used to bring Christianity back to the authority of scripture.

He also changed the way we worship. Eire says Luther made Christianity a faith about the living, by doing away with purgatory.

still involved in crime.

'It came to a point where I was involved with the Columbian drug cartel," he admits.

Once during a drug deal, they thought he was going to steal the drugs so they stabbed him in the stomach and held him at gun point. "I heard an audible voice say, You live by the sword, you die by the sword," says Ierullo. He walked right up to the guy with the gun and tried to convince him he wasn't stealing the drugs. "They just ran from me!" Ierullo was amazed.

After his encounter, Ierullo told his mom he wanted to serve God and enrolled at a Christian university. There he accepted Christ as his savior and began his journey as a Christian.

"I had a vision of Jesus rescuing

me from the darkness," says Bruno. He shares how he wanted to know more about Jesus so he read the Bible from cover to cover. "I was on fire for the Lord," he says.

So began a lifetime journey of serving God and bringing that message of saving grace to others. But there's another issue close to his heartunity among believers.

"There is nothing more powerful than unity," he says. "Jesus is coming back for one bride."

Ierullo is one of the organizers behind an effort to bring Protestant, Evangelical, Charismatic, Messianic, Catholic and Orthodox leaders from around the world together in Kansas City Oct. 24-26 for round table discussions, worship, and prayer. Christians who share their heart for John 17 unity are invited to join them in celebrating a year of destiny, as they come together for a historic, three-day meeting and then carry the blessing of unity back to their respective communities.

"God is calling His people to unity in Christ, as Jesus prayed in John 17. ...so the world would believe that God sent His Son," says Matteo Calisi, Founder of United in Christ and Host Ambassador for Kairos 2017. "This other Christian traditions, to focus on our faith in Jesus, to celebrate our diversity and to help heal the wounds of the past," says Calisi.

Keynote speakers include Cardinal Daniel DiNardo, Kenneth Copeland, and over two dozen other Christian leaders. Worship will be led by Catch the Fire Music, Misty Edwards, Laura Hackett Park and Jave Thomas.

The conference, which will take place at the Forerunner School of Ministry, 12418 Grandview Road in Grandview, will include panel discussions and dialogue promoting understanding and respect between Christian traditions as well as discussions of ways to work together with large group prayer, worship, prophetic intercession focused on God's presence, repentance, the unity of Christians, and revival. The meeting will close with a challenge by national leaders to carry the torch of Christian unity and revival back to their communities.


"Before Luther, Christians used to spend a lot of their time, a lot of effort and sometimes a lot of their money, on masses for the dead, to get their relatives released from purgatory. And that changed completely."

Luther is a key reason we have so many protestant denominations today.

Eire says, "When he was born, everyone in Europe belonged to the same church. And when he died, there wasn't one church. There were various

churches, all competing with one another.'

There were many reformers before and after Luther. But Eire

# **IMPERFECT KIDS**

"I want to do what is good, but I don't. I don't want to do what is wrong, but I do it anyway." - Romans 7:19

We've all been there... remorseful for wrong said, incredulous that we made the same dumb decision again, perplexed with "what's wrong with me?!" It's a struggle that Paul had and that adults can relate to more often than we'd probably like to admit. It's easy to set ourselves down the road of condemnation and wallow in our assumed unworthiness of grace, replaying and tormenting ourselves with thoughts of our mistake over and over again. For some of us, it might take days of being angry at ourselves before we feel like we can even approach God as if somehow we deserve to beat ourselves up. We know the wrong we did and how mad we are at ourselves. Surely, He must feel the same way, right?

My son came to me the other day and asked the age-old question: why do I keep doing things I don't want to do? "I love you so much, Mommy. But sometimes I'm so mean to you and I don't want to be. # US Catholics and Protestants agree: 500 years after Reformation, they have more in common than not

The theological differences that led to the Protestant Reformation 500 years ago have dwindled since in both the United States and Western Europe.

That's the finding of a Pew Research Center survey released Thursday (Aug. 31), weeks before late October's 500th anniversary of the schism in western Christianity.

Among U.S. Protestants, many seem unaware of the differences, voicing beliefs today that are more traditionally Catholic than they are Protestant.

"I think it's fair to say the differences between the two groups have diminished to a degree that might have shocked Christians of earlier centuries," said Greg Smith, associate director of research at Pew Research Center.

"Maybe it's not a huge surprise in the context of modern-day United States, but if you look back at the longer term — at the 500th anniversary of the Reformation — that would be quite surprising to a Christian of 300, 400, 500 years ago."

Of course, Smith noted, no survey data exists to measure responses to the same questions in the 1500s.

According to the survey, more Protestants reported they believe salvation comes through a mix of faith and good works (52 percent) — the traditionally Catholic position — than through "faith alone" (46 percent). That belief — "sola fide" in Latin — is one of five "solas" that form the backbone of Protestant Reformers' beliefs.

The same shares of Protestants also reported they believe Christians should look to the Bible, church teachings and tradition for guidance — the Catholic position — rather than the "Bible alone," or the Protestant belief in "sola scriptura."

Only 30 percent of U.S. Protestants affirmed both sola fide and sola scriptura. Belief in both doctrines was

higher among white evangelical Protestants (44 percent) than white mainline Protestants (20 percent) or black Protestants (19 percent) and jumped even higher (59 percent) among white evangelicals who reported they attend church at least once a week.

U.S. Catholics, in contrast to Protestants, voiced beliefs more in line with the teachings of their church: 81 percent reported both good deeds and faith were needed to get into heaven, and 75 percent reported Christians should look to the Bible, church teaching and tradition for guidance.

And while differences between Catholics and Protestants once led to wars and persecution, most U.S. Catholics (65 percent) and Protestants (59 percent) now agree they have more in common than not.

The U.S. survey of more than 2,500 adults, funded by the Pew Charitable Trusts, was conducted online from May 30 to Aug. 9. The margin of error

for results based on each sample in that survey is plus or minus 2.9 percentage points

# The Protestant Reformation's other great writer

In this 500th anniversary year of the Protestant Reformation, the spotlight naturally falls on Martin Luther (1483-1546). But his somewhat younger contemporary Jehan Cauvin (1509-1564) shouldn't be overlooked.

Better known among English-speakers as John Calvin, he was born in France. Originally educated as a lawyer, he also received superb training in both Latin and Greek, and — rather curiously, given his later history — his first published book (1532) was a commentary on the first-century pagan Roman philosopher Seneca's "De Clementia" ("On Mercy"), an indication of his strong early humanist leanings.

Calvin left the Roman Catholic Church sometime around 1530. In 1533, he experienced a powerful religious conversion and, thereafter, devoted himself more to theology than to either humanism or law.

In 1534, he went underground to avoid anti-Protestant violence in France. By 1535, he had reached Basel, Switzerland, where, in March 1536, he published the first edition of his important "Institutes of the Christian Religion," which he initially intended to serve as a catechism or basic introduction to Christian doctrine. Soon thereafter, however, the city of Geneva recruited him as a reader (offering expository lectures on the Bible) and preacher.

But when he was expelled by Geneva's governing council, he accepted an invitation—although he'd never been ordained—to serve as pastor for a church of 400-500 French refugees in the free imperial city of Strasbourg. Commencing there in 1538, he performed baptisms and weddings and led worship services.

Still in Strasbourg in 1539, he published the second edition of his "Institutes," expanding it from six to 17 chapters. He



also abandoned his plan that it be an elementary Christian primer and transformed it into a systematic statement of Christian doctrine. In March 1540, he published his "Commentary on Romans." Eventually, he would write commentaries on nearly every biblical book. (His preaching reflected his system of working methodically through the Bible: From March 1555 to July 1556, he delivered 200 sermons on the book of Deuteronomy.)

In 1541, Geneva officials invited Calvin to return, and he spent the rest of his life based there. The city's political climate had changed, and, perhaps even more important, church attendance had declined noticeably after the popular preacher's banishment.

Overcoming opposition from several powerful Genevan families, he introduced new forms of liturgy and church government. But here is one of the points at which Calvin becomes very controversial: Although he taught the separation of church and state, Calvin and his fellow pastors exercised enormous political power in Geneva, which some have called a theoryay.

Writing of Luther and Ulrich Zwingli also, but principally and most accurately

of Calvin, the 18th-century French skeptic Voltaire said: "If they condemned celibacy in the priests, and opened the gates of the convents, it was only to turn all society into a convent. Shows and entertainments were expressly forbidden by their religion; and for more than two hundred years there was not a single musical instrument allowed in the city of Geneva."

More notorious, though, is the case of Michael Servetus, an important Spanish physician and Protestant theologian who had written against infant baptism, predestination and the doctrine of the Trinity. (Servetus regarded Father, Son and Holy Spirit simply as manifestations of one God, not distinct persons.)

Both the Spanish and the French inquisitions had ordered his execution, and he ultimately came to Geneva. Why he did so is unclear. He had corresponded with Calvin, but Calvin was no fan and had been angered by the exchange. If Servetus ever came to Geneva, Calvin wrote to a friend, "as far as my authority goes, I would not let him leave alive." Servetus was arrested and, with Calvin's approval, was burned alive (standing on a pyre of his own writings) on Oct. 27, 1553. Reportedly, his last words were "Jesus, Son of the Eternal God, have mercy on me." (He would not be the last person executed at Calvin's insistence.)

During his remaining years, Calvin's authority in Geneva was largely unchallenged. Between 1558 and his death, he devoted his failing energies to a final revision of his "Institutes," expanding the work to an impressive 80 chapters. It lays out the fundamental principles of "Calvinism," which are at the heart of various Congregational, Reformed and Presbyterian churches still today. These principles include God's absolute sovereignty, predestination and an emphasis on original sin and human depravity.



# Legislators working to get hurricane relief for churches

(WNS) Four Republican U.S. senators on Sept. 18 introduced legislation to allow emergency federal funds to go to churches during natural disasters. Their efforts were supported by President Trump, who tweeted that churches should not be discriminated against.

Harvey, Irma, and Maria, hurricanes that left wide paths of destruction in Texas, Florida, and Puerto Rico, showed the resilience of communities coming together for recovery efforts. Thousands of people lost their homes during the storms and many fled to houses of worship for shelter. Republican Sens. Ted Cruz and John Cornyn of Texas, Roy Blunt of Missouri and James Lankford of Oklahoma believe churches should be eligible for emergency federal grants, just like secular organizations.

Earlier this month, three churches in Texas sued after the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) denied them access to public assistance grants, which provide nonprofit groups money to repair or replace damaged facilities.

"This policy is discriminatory and wrong," Cruz said.

"We must ensure that religious organizations are eligible for federal assistance on the same terms as other nonprofits after being damaged or destroyed during natural disasters."

It's unlikely the legislative effort will win support from across the aisle, but court precedent could be in the church's favor.

In June, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled 7-2 in favor of a Missouri church receiving a public grant to improve its playground. The justices, including two appointed by Democratic presidents, ruled the state cannot deny the church grant money, which benefitted the broader community, simply because it is a church.

churches shelter the homeless (33 percent) and provide disaster relief assistance (39 percent).

Fourteen percent of Americans haven't heard of any of these services by churches. Seventeen percent were not sure.

Churches and church members often serve anyone from their community, whether they attend services or not, said McConnell. But outsiders may not get the message, which he said is a problem: If people don't know about a church's efforts to serve others, they won't turn to a church


when they need help.

And, with better awareness, those who don't go to church might show up to help their neighbors.

A previous LifeWay Research study found that half (51 percent) of unchurched Americans -- those who haven't attended services in the past six months -- say they would be willing to help a church with a community service project.

"People who need help may be missing out," McConnell said. "And Americans who want to lend a hand might miss the chance to help out and along the way connect with the church."

I currently have student loans in deferment from earning a degree in hospitality management. My career goal is to own a mobile food vending company, so I'm putting most of the money I make from eBay and ride-hailing services — around \$1,000 a month — aside in savings for that. Should I forego my business idea for the time being, and knock out the student loan debt instead? Nicholas

#### Dear Nicholas.

You should put this business idea on hold for now, unless you can start it for less than \$1,000. The first thing you need to do is go out, and get a real job. I know you have this dream of being selfemployed, but right now you're not doing so well as an entrepreneur.

With a hospitality degree, you can make \$30,000 to \$50,000 a year within the industry, clean up your mess, and build out the eBay thing on the side. Just think about how quickly you could save up money for a jump into the food truck or mobile food business, then!

Pay your way through it, Nicholas. Don't sit around scraping by on the kind of money you're making now and call that winning. You have a real economic engine at your fingertips,

because you have the knowledge from the degree you earned. And it's a valuable degree. If you go in there and bust it, you can escalate yourself upward through that industry in a hurry.

While you're doing that, you can clean up all your student loans and save up money for your food truck. Boom! You're self-employed and you learned a lot of stuff you can use in your new business. Go make some real money, then follow your dream, man! —Dave

#### A bad move

#### Dear Dave.

I have a whole life insurance policy with zero cash value due to loans I took out per the advice of my agent. I finally realized this wasn't a smart move, as I now owe premiums plus interest every year. Am I still on the hook for the policy loans if I forfeit the policy to buy term insurance?

No, you are not. Get your term insurance in place first, then when you cancel the policy your cash value will offset your loans.

They won't loan you more than your

cash value. It's seldom that they will loan you 100 percent of cash value, so you might actually have a cash value that is above your loan amount. If they have loaned you the full amount of your cash value, it'll be an exact break even, and just canceling the policy means you cancel the interest and cancel the premiums.

It was bad advice to buy the policy, and even dumber advice to clean the whole thing out and sit there paying interest to borrow your own money and pay a premium to keep the loan open.

I recommend 10 to 12 times your income on a 15- or 20-year level term policy. During that 15 or 20 years, of course, you should be getting out of debt and building wealth so that you have a big pile of money and no need for life insurance.

#### Problem plan

#### Dear Dave.

I make \$48,000 a year, and I have \$35,000 in credit card debt. I owe \$25,000 on my home, and I was thinking about taking out a loan against my house to pay off the credit cards. Is this a good idea?

I would never advise anything like this, unless it's to avoid bankruptcy. Here's the problem with that kind of plan. Most people who do that kind of thing don't change their financial habits. In fact, they end up with a new mortgage and new credit card debt somewhere down the line.

You need to start building a track record of paying off debt. Cut up the credit cards, slash your spending, and start living on a tight, written, monthly budget. Prove to yourself that you're not going to take out a mortgage and turn around and run up a bunch of new credit cards.

> I want to see you not take on any new debt and reduce that \$35,000 credit card bill dramatically over the next six months. If you can knock out half of it in a year, you can take care of the other half in another year or less. Then, you wouldn't need a second mortgage!

#### Threaten to garnish

I got a call from a debt collector regarding \$2,000 I owe in medical bills. I'm trying to get my finances in order and pay it off, but I'm afraid they'll follow through on their threat to garnish my wages. Can you give me advice?

#### Dear Mike,

First, I want you to take a deep breath and calm down. Debt collectors like to play on your emotions because they think you'll give in and do something you can't really afford to do. Most of them don't care your situation as long as they get some money.

They won't garnish your wages because they can't. They would have to go through the formal, legal procedure of first suing you and then winning the case. They broke federal law by saying they would garnish your wages but hadn't sued vou. If I'm in vour shoes, I'd be filing a complaint against these bozos with the Federal Trade Commission.

Don't react with fear and panic in the face of debt collector threats. Talk to them and explain your situation. See if you can work out a compromise. If they get nasty, let them know you'll be filing another complaint with the FTC. You'd be surprised how reasonable these people can be when faced with the possibility of government intervention.

In the meantime, do everything you can to scrape up as much cash as possible. Then, when you get this mess cleaned up, pay off the rest of your debts and start living on a budget! —Dave

# **Looking for Work May Impact Your Taxes**

If you are looking for a job in the same line of work, you may be able to

deduct some of your job search costs. Here are some kev tax facts you should know when searching for a new job:



• Same Occupation. Your expenses must be for a job search in your current line of work . You can't deduct expenses for a job search in a new occupation.

• Resume Costs. You can deduct the cost of preparing and mailing your resume.

• Travel Expenses. If you travel to look for a new job, you may be able to deduct the cost of the trip. To deduct the cost of the travel to and from the area, the trip must be mainly to look for a new job in order to deduct all costs.

• Placement Agency. You can deduct some job placement agency fees you pay to look for a job.

• First Job. You can't deduct job search expenses if you're looking for a iob for the first time.

• Time Between Jobs. You can't

• Reimbursed Costs. Reimbursed expenses are not deductible.

• Schedule A. You normally deduct your job search expenses on Schedule A , Itemized Deductions. Claim them as a miscellaneous deduction. You can deduct the total miscellaneous deductions that are more than two percent of your adjusted gross income.

• Premium Tax Credit. If you receive advance payments of the premium tax credit, it is important that you report changes in circumstances - such as changes in your income, a change in eligibility for other coverage, or a change of address - to your Health Insurance Marketplace. Advance payments are paid directly to your insurance company and lower the out-ofpocket cost for your health insurance premiums. Reporting changes will help you get the proper type and amount of financial assistance so you can avoid getting too much or too little in advance.

I recently read about Maryam Naghash, a 36-year-old believer in Iran who was refused an extension of her medical leave from prison, where she is serving a four year sentence for witnessing to her faith.

I was moved to pray for her. Then I thought – surely God loves her infinitely more than I or anyone could? Surely God knows her needs and what is the best for this sister. So why should I pray for Maryam? What difference would it or could it make?

Reflecting on the subject, it became obvious that, in praying, we are clearly following God's commands, and the example He gave us through the life of Jesus. God intends prayer to be the means of obtaining His solutions in many situations. At SAT-7

we pray in: preparation for major decisions (Luke 6:12-13); to overcome Satan's opposition (Matthew 17:14-21); to gather workers for the spiritual harvest (Luke 10:2); to overcome temptation (Matthew 26:41); and to

obtain the means of spiritually strengthening others, including our many viewers (Ephesians 6:18-19).

God promises that our prayers are not in vain (Matthew 6:6; Romans 8:26-27). # Students serve Christ through serving foster kids

What qualities must our young people need to be equipped for the world they will face as adults? More than a degree and work skills, we all are called to have a transformed life; one which is not just about making a living but living for a higher purpose. 

#### **BEING PRO-ADOPTION WITHOUT BEING SCAMMED**

Adoption is an idea that rests in the heart of many couples but fails to come to fruition for a variety of reasons. Sometimes fear holds them back. Hearing stories of fraud causes them to avoid taking those first steps.

Recent news articles have told the stories of families who have lost significant sums of money in adoption proceedings. In some cases, the expectant mother bilked them out of funds. In others, the agencies closed down after accepting payments.

Whatever the reason, it's horribly discouraging to people who are trying their best to adopt and willing to lay out significant amounts of money to do so. The result is even more people who decide it's

not worth trying.

If you're considering adoption and want to limit your financial risk, there are a few steps you can take. Due to all the variables, it's impossible to risk-proof an adoption process, but you can put guards in place so you limit your potential loss and insure that you're being good stewards of the finances God's given you.

#### **CONTROL THE HOME STUDY PROCESS**

The first step in adoption is getting a home study. It is a written assessment of your home, history, and preparedness for adoption and will be necessary to file for adoption with the court. There is no way around this, and a good social worker will actually help prepare you for your adop-

ever families" are remembered and held in prayer by our faith communities.

adoption are all different. If you are going through a private agency, make sure you own your home study when it is over and if you choose to go to another agency, you don't need to pay for the home study to be released.

A home study will cost you up front. Someone is investing significant time in writing it for you, so they need to be paid for that - but once you pay for it, you should be able to use it elsewhere for a similar adoption rather than be locked in with one agency. Ask how many signed copies you will receive and if they insist that they don't give home studies directly to families, go elsewhere.

#### **AVOID ALA CARTE MARKETING CHARGES**

Some agencies will offer you greater visibility in front of expectant moms if you pay a substantial fee up front. That's a huge red flag - trust God to get you in the right spot rather than paying huge sums for websites or specific ads that highlight your family. Those dollars are hard to justify.

Direct marketing, Craigslist ads, even Facebook pages promoting your availability to adopt are more often invitations to being scammed rather than helpful in connecting with an expectant mother.

#### **BE CAREFUL ABOUT EARLY MATCHES**

It's not unusual to have an expectant woman approach us when she's only 8-12 weeks pregnant, asking to see family profiles so she can choose a family to adopt her child. We are happy to help care for her in the process, but we don't match expectant moms and adoptive parents until the beginning of the third trimester.

At match, most agencies charge estimated fees for the care of the expectant mom. Many states have relatively modest limits on those amounts, but some do not. A



large number of agencies match early to collect those funds up front, knowing the expectant mother may or may not choose to go forward. If she chooses not to make an adoption plan, the expectant family forfeits those funds.

#### **ASK QUESTIONS**

Once you are matched, you will most likely need to pay fees. Ask pointedly, if the expectant mother decides not to go through with her plan, what happens to those funds? Some of the fees will be unrecoverable (birth mother expenses) but your match fee should not necessarily be forfeited. Many agencies will offer you a credit on your next match. A few will offer a refund under unique circumstances.

In cases where families are not offered a cash refund, it does not mean they are been scammed. The agency has done all the work they were able to do in caring for the expectant mother, counseling, preparing you, etc. There is inherent risk in adoption that cannot be entirely mitigated, but that is true of any worthwhile pursuit.

Adoption is not easy or without pitfalls. Even so, it is a beautiful expression of the heart of God and a key part of standing for life. May the grace of God rest on those who say yes.

# The foster care crisis is ours and now is the time to save it

The decision to foster a child brings great challenge and great reward. You become the stabilizing force in a life disrupted by turbulent times. Knowing that reunification with the birth family is the goal, you open your home and heart. And you fall in love.

Several years ago, my wife and I embarked on this adventure. Today our family includes two biological sons, an adopted daughter, and a foster daughter who joined our family at three months old. She just turned two and likely will be reunited with her birth family soon. Saying good-bye will break our hearts, yet we are not called to an easy path—we are called to be faithful.

I can say unequivocally that we sense a calling on our lives to care for these little ones. Children living right in our cities and towns who have no one to hold them, take them to a park, or put a warm meal on the table—this trumps many things that command more attention. Children represent the future. They represent the hope and possibility of our communities, our churches, and our nation. All people, regardless of faith tradition, must come together to advocate for these children.

Since November is National Adoption Month, religious leaders must begin cultivating a massive interfaith movement to target not only adoption but also the need for foster care. On any given day, approximately 402,000 live in foster care in the United States, and on average, these children remain in state care for nearly two years with eight percent of children enduring five or more years. We must do better than this.

Recently, a Jewish friend, who works for a foster-adoption agency, and I discussed how our faith backgrounds shape our views on how our communities should pursue foster parenting. The Hebrew Bible (Old Testament for Christians) includes several verses about taking care of those who are parentless (Isaiah 1:17, "...learn to do good, seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, plead for the widow."). This provides very





People of faith are called to do no less, and Christians are called to do more.



### Steve McQueen's faith explored in powerful documentary

He was the "king of cool," the highest-paid actor in the world, and the idol of moviegoers from coast to coast. Some even called him the next John Wavne

But for Steve McQueen - who starred in more than 30 films and 20 TV series during the 1950s, '60s and '70s – it wasn't enough. Fame didn't satisfy him. Neither did women, motorcycles or cars.

In fact, McQueen didn't find inner peace until the final months of his life, when he accepted Christ and had plans to tell the world about his new-found faith. But that public testimony never came, as McQueen died in 1980 at the age 50, having told only a handful of people how Jesus had saved him.

A new documentary may change how we view McQueen. Called Steve McQueen: American Icon, it follows his journey from a troubled youth to Hollywood stardom and then tells us the rest of the story - that is, how McQueen converted to Christianity. It is hosted by Greg Laurie, a lifelong McQueen fan who serves as the senior pastor of Harvest Christian Fellowship in Riverside, Calif. Jon and Andrew Erwin (Woodlawn), along with Ben Smallbone (Priceless), direct it.

It is scheduled to show in theaters

only two nights (Sept. 28 and Oct. 10), and is one of the most powerful inspiring and documentaries I've ever seen. It's also one that churches easily can get behind. (There's no language or sexuali-

the author of "Steve McQueen: The Salvation of an American Icon," tells Laurie in the film.

McQueen's pastor agrees: "There was a peace. There was a calmness" in McOueen.

Laurie also interviews McQueen's (model Barbara McQueen), actor/director Mel Gibson,

stuntman Stan Barrett, and even the pilot who taught McQueen how to fly. McQueen was known for such hits

as Wanted: Dead or Alive, The Great

Escape, Bullitt, and Towering The Inferno.

But toward the end of his life he dropped out of Hollywood and turned down major acting roles, sensing something was missing. He finally found it thanks to a series of providential encounters: one with a Christian on the set of a film and the other with a pilot. During the final hours of his life he even met Billy Graham, who gave McQueen his person-

al Bible.

Steve McQueen: American Icon is Ecclesiastes on the big screen: A man obtains fame and fortune and then reaches the end of his life and proclaims: All is vanity.

McQueen's discovery is one that all of us need to hear.

### **Thought-provoking Arrival** tops October streaming lineup

Arrival (PG-13, 2016) – which begins streaming Oct. 28 on Hulu and Amazon Prime – is not one of those films. It's the most thought-provoking alien invasion movie you've ever seen and perhaps the best one, too, despite not having a single laser shot, gun battle or abduction.

So if you prefer watching your movies without Charlie and the knowing even minor spoilers, then stop read-

ing right now. But if you want to be convinced why you should watch Arrival, then stay put.

Got it? You've been warned!

Arrival tells the story of translator Louise Banks (Amy Adams), who is one of the top linguistic experts in the world and whose knowledge is needed when gigantic, egg-shaped spacecrafts touch down worldwide. On paper, Banks' task is seemingly simple: communicate with the aliens and learn why they have come to Earth.

But in reality, her job is impossible. That's because the aliens and humans have no common frame of reference. How do you communicate with a creature who has lived its entire life in another galaxy? Our language sounds like, well, English. Their language sounds like a combination of dolphin sounds and organ music.

Banks, though, isn't the only linguist on the job. Language experts worldwide are trying to communicate, and when several of them decide that the aliens are trying to say "weapon," panic ensues. Banks argues that the aliens instead were trying to say "tool," but can she convince everyone before a cosmic war ensues?

Arrival is based on the 1998 novel "Story of Your Life" by Ted Chiang, and it will challenge what you think about cultural and language barriers. The lessons, though, go much deeper than that.

At its core, Arrival is a movie about the blessings and trials of life, as it urges us to emphasize the former rather than the latter. It also poses a mind-bending question: Would you (and could you) live your life with joy if you knew what trials lay ahead. And is a life capped by a tragic death worth the pain? Arrival is



## Local Author Uses Fiction to Help Readers With Tough Facts

In the past several years, society has focused more and more on dementia and Alzheimer's disease as more individuals-and their families-face the heart-breaking diagnosis.

One local author, Rebecca (R.J.) Thesman of Olathe, has chosen an unusual-and highly effective-way to address the issue. She wrote a book. But not a book on new treatments for Alzheimer's or practical help for caregivers. She chose the unusual vehicle of fiction to bless, inspire, and encourage readers. And from her series of books has grown a ministry to Alzheimer's patients and their families...and anyone who wants a good read. One book turned into a whole series and even a non-fiction book and Facebook support group to offer those practical helps.

We asked Rebecca to tell us more: MV: Tell us about your Reverend G books. What is the premise?

Reverend G is a woman minister who is diagnosed with early onset Alzheimers. She has to leave her position and her congregation as she transitions to assisted living. Her greatest fear is the possibility of forgetting God. The trilogy takes her through the disease and shows the affects of Alzheimers on her family-but also includes some of the more humorous moments with a cast of characters. All my followers love Gabriel, the cat.

#### MV: How did you come up with the idea for this?

As a lifetime nonfiction writer, the idea took me by surprise. I woke up one day with this story in my head, and all I can say is that God gave it to me as therapy and to teach me that I could indeed write fiction. My father suffered through trauma-induced dementia for 10 years, and my mother is currently in Stage 6 of Alzheimer's.

#### MV: Why did you choose fiction as the method to share your insights?

Years ago, I heard this statement and I have found it to be the truth: Nonfiction tells the facts, but fiction shows the truth.

#### MV: Do you see any of yourself in Reverend G?

Yes, because years ago I wanted to be a minister and earn my MDiv. At the time, women were not allowed in the

seminary of my denomination unless they wanted to teach Sunday school to children or become pastors' wives. So ministry for me has become Plan Bworking in nonprofits, becoming a certified Christian coach and a biblical counselor, becoming a Stephen minister. And of course, I consider writing to be a ministry.

#### MV: What have been the results of writing this series?

I found out I could indeed write fiction. I have met people all over the world who are caregivers, and I started an encouragement group on Facebook, "Sometimes They Forget." I have blogged extensively, written articles about caregiving and I have spoken in various venues. In February 2017, on my mother's birthday, I released my nonfiction book for caregivers, "Sometimes They Forget-Finding Hope in the Alzheimer's

MV: What's been the most unexnected result?

How much fun it is to write fiction. MV: How have you grown or changed through the process of writ-

ing these? Being more aware of how stress affects caregivers and how many caregivers actually become ill because of the stress. So I am more careful about setting boundaries. Being more aware of how the brain works and the importance of nutrition and exercise, so I am more determined to take care of myself. Understanding the importance of humor-to nurture the brain but also to help relieve stress.

We read the headlines of Islamist terrorists taking over a city in Iraq. What that means for Christians in Iraq became a reality for Knapp when he began to get to know Iraqi refugees who had moved into his Leipzig neighborhood beginning in

I was shocked, as was Knapp, when he heard the stories of those having to flee Mosul. Terrorists overran the city in June of 2014. Christians were given an ultimatum, convert, pay a tax or leave. He writes, "...there is no place for Christians under ISIS's black banner."

(Loc 120/2695) Christians had flourished there for 1,600 years but were now forced to flee to Syria. There may be no Christians in the city now as it has been declared a "Christianfree" zone by the Islamic State.

I was appalled at the suffering

Christians had to experience as a result of the U.S. and British invasion of 2003.


"In response to the American invasion of Iraq, Muslim clerics called for a holy war." (Loc 189/2695) Western countries were associated with Christianity and Christians in Iraq were the ones who suffered the attacks.

The personal stories Knapp has included are heart breaking. Yet the global community has not risen to protect Christians in Islamic states. He shows that this has often been the case historically. The brutal treatment of Christians in the Middle East over the centuries has been generally ignored. Knapp spends quite some time on the Armenian genocide of 1915, a topic Turkey would like to see erased.


> I highly recommend this book. It will be shocking to those who have not paid attention to the persecution of Iraqi Christians, particularly those in Mosul. It will be enlightening to those who have opposed Syrian Christians entering the U.S. as refugees. It will bring to light the human tragedy that

has caused those Christians to seek asylum.

You will receive insight into the history of Christian persecution as well. It is not a pretty story. Body mutilations and repeated rapes do not make for easy reading. The first



hand accounts of such atrocities still happening today are difficult and shocking but they cannot be ignored. They are clear evidence of a Christian faith worth dying for.



More important than living in KANSAS is where you will live forever. Just as you would look at a map of KANSAS to find your way, so you must look at the Bible to find your way to neaven. The Bible says, "Narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it." (Matt. 7:14). Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me." (Jn. 14.6). Jesus is the only way to Heaven and He gave these directions on getting there.

1. Realize you are a sinner. Everyone starts the same place spiritually. "For all have sinned and come short of the glory of god." (Rom. 3:23). Sin's penalty keeps you out of Heaven and condemns you to Hell, separating you from God. Romans 6:23 says, "The wages of sin is death." Sin brings both physical & spiritual death. "And death and hell were cast into the lake of fire. This is the second death." (Rev. 20:14).

2. Realize Jesus paid the penalty. Jesus Christ's death, burial, and resurrection provided a way for you to go to heaven and restore your relationship with God. 3. Repent of your sin and receive Jesus as your Savior. In order to go to Heaven from KANSAS, or anywhere else, you must accept Christ by calling on Him in prayer. He tells us in Romans 10:13, "For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved." Use the following prayer, or one similar to it, to receive Him now:

Dear Lord Jesus, I know I am a sinner. believe that you died and rose again for me. Please forgive me of my sin, become Lord of my life, and take me to heaven when I die. I am trusting you completely, and in nothing can do. Thank you Jesus! Amen.



One of the many training courses that I teach in the community focuses on caring for the caregiver. I give each participant a "Caregiver First-Aid Kit" as a reminder of the special significance they have in their role as a caregiver for their loved one.

The kit includes the following items:

The **MATCH** is to strike up and rekindle friendships and call on those friends when needed. Friends can help you when you need a break from the demands of providing care to your loved one.

By touching the match to the **CANDLE**, you are able to let the light shine through in your daily role as a caregiver.

The **POST-IT PAD** is for you to be creative and draw.

The **CRAYON** is for you to use in play, to color your world and to be creative.

The **LIFESAVER** is to remind you that you are a lifesaver to your loved one by your willingness to be a caregiver and that others can be a lifesaver to you when you need it. Just ask for help, and you'll be happily surprised at the results.

The **MINT** is to remind you that you're worth a "mint" to those who know you.



The **HERSHEY'S KISS** is a reminder that you are loved and appreciated.

The **HEART-SHAPED GEMSTONE** is a symbol of how SPECIAL you are to your loved ones.

I remind each person that they **DO MAKE A DIFFER-ENCE** and **I THANK** them **FOR ALL THAT** they **DO**!

For all of you caregivers who are tirelessly providing care for your loved one every single day, you are appreciated! Remember to ask for help if you need it, even for an occasional break. Studies show that those who receive an occasional respite break come back refreshed and recharged, and are better able to cope with the demands of daily care.



# SOCIAL SECURITY QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

My brother had an accident at work last year and is now receiving Social Security disability benefits. His wife and son also receive benefits. Before his accident, he helped support another daughter by 101-40U a woman he never married. Is the second child entitled to benefits?

#### Answer:

The child may qualify for Social Security benefits even though your brother wasn't married to the second child's mother. The child's caretaker should file an application on her behalf. SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY **INCOME** 

#### Question:

What are the limits on what I can own to be eligible for Supplemental Security Income (SSI)?

#### Answer:

SSI provides payments for people with limited income and resources. We count real estate, bank accounts, cash, stocks, and



bonds toward the limits on what you can own and still receive SSI. You may be able to get SSI if your resources are worth no more than \$2,000. A couple may be able to get SSI if they have resources worth no more than \$3,000. If you own property you are trying to sell, you may be able to get SSI while trying to sell it. Social Security does not count everything you own in deciding whether you have too many resources to qualify for SSI. For example, we generally do not count: the home you live in and the land it is on; life insurance policies with a face value of \$1,500 or less; your car; burial plots for you and your immediate family; and up to \$1,500 in burial funds for you and up to \$1,500 in burial funds for your spouse. Learn more about SSI at www.socialsecurity.gov/ssi.

#### **Ouestion:**

I am a single mother and I get Supplemental Security Income (SSI). Can my daughter receive SSI benefits based on my SSI?

#### Answer:

No. SSI benefits are based on the needs of the individual and are paid only to the qualifying person. There are no spouse's, children's, or survivors benefits. However, if your daughter is disabled, she

might be eligible to receive SSI benefits. To learn more about SSI benefits, read our publication on the subject www.socialsecurity.gov/pubs/1100 0.html.

#### **MEDICARE**

#### Question:

How do I get a copy of the form, Application for Help with Medicare Prescription Drug Plan Costs?

#### Answer:



# Kurt Warner's Hall of Fame Career Defined by Faith

Kurt Warner's faith in Jesus Christ is more than a personal, off-the-field commitment that had little impact on his success as an NFL quarterback.

Warner played 12 seasons in the NFL for the St. Louis Rams, New York Giants and Cardinals, appearing in three Super Bowls and winning one.

Warner would undoubtedly agree with that analysis. In his half-hour speech at the induction ceremony, wearing the traditional gold jacket given to Hall of Fame inductees, Warner recounted his unlikely and unorthodox journey to NFL stardom after a collegiate career at Northern Iowa University. He went undrafted in 1994, and the Green Bay Packers cut him after a brief tryout. His rise from stocking shelves at a grocery store in Iowa to starring for the St. Louis Rams in 1999 has been well documented.

In the Rams' Super Bowl win in 2000, Warner connected with wide receiver Isaac Bruce for a game-winning touchdown with less than two minutes remaining. Warner won the game's MVP award after throwing for a Super Bowl-record 414 yards and made a strong statement about his faith in a post-game interview with Mike Tirico.

"Kurt, first things first, tell me about the final touchdown pass to Isaac," Tirico asked Warner.

"Well, first things first, I've got to thank my Lord and Savior up above," Warner replied. "Thank you, Jesus!"

That exchange proved to be a defining one for Warner, who referenced it at the conclusion of his induction speech.

"Many felt I was thanking Him for orchestrating a Super Bowl win, or making my passes fly straighter, or causing my opponents to make more mistakes, Warner said. "But those people had it all

Instead, Warner said, that gesture was his way of expressing gratitude for all that Jesus had done for him.

"Now, love it or hate it, that opening scene captured the imagination of the sports world, and the words became the heart of my story," Warner said. "The rest, as they say, is history, bringing us to this: The famous last words, and the only place this extraordinary journey can end.

"His final moment was for me," Warner told the crowd. "Mine is for Him. Thank you, Jesus!'



Use a water filter. Depending on where you live, different contaminants could reside in your tap water. Rather than risk consuming these contaminants or drinking bottled water, which can generate significant waste, consider purchasing a refrigerator with a fil-
