# Study links neurosis and smartphones in teenagers

(WNS)--A Colorado research professor this week proposed a hypothesis to explain the unprecedented rates of depression and anxiety in the post-millennial generation: dwindling social cues.

Scott Stanley, a researcher at the University of Denver and a fellow at the Institute for Family Studies, said decreases in the reliability of information about relationships (for example, an emoji response to a heartfelt question) may be exacerbating mental and emotional issues in today's teens and young adults.



Ambiguity leads to neurosis, according to Stanley. Ivan Pavlov found that when dogs could not discriminate between stimuli, they had a mental breakdown. Stanley argues today's young people are left in the same state, asking questions like, "Why didn't she 'like' my

# Museum of the Bible opens as a celebration of Scripture

When visitors to Washington, D.C., tour the capital's historic museums and monuments in the future, they'll have more than just American history to learn. They'll also have the opportunity to explore the history of the best-selling book of all time – the Bible.

The \$500 million, 430,000-square-foot Museum of the Bible opened Nov. 17 in the heart of the nation's capital, within walking distance for visitors and just two blocks from the National Mall and National Air and Space Museum and three blocks from the Capitol building.

With cutting-edge technology spread out across eight floors, it is the largest museum in the world dedicated to the history, narrative and impact of Scripture.

It will open seven years after a Museum of the Bible non-profit was established

and five years after the site was purchased. It formerly was the Washington Design Center. Construction began in December 2014.

The museum's founder is Hobby Lobby president Steve Green, who said public opinion surveys were conducted to determine if people would visit the museum.

"The question was: If we built it, would they come? The answer was overwhelmingly



yes -- if it was done well and done right," Green said. "[The survey] also showed that it would be best attended in Washington, D.C. ... That is where museum-goers go. To be right there with all the museums would be the best place for us to be."

Each visitor to the museum will receive

a hand-held tablet known as a "Digital Guide," which will take advantage of 500 wireless access points to give guests a one-of-a kind personalized guide. It can adjust the tour when a guest deviates from the pre-planned tour and even can re-route a tour when certain rooms are packed with

visitors. The Digital Guide has three age levels: adults and teens; 9-12, and 8-and- under.

The museum will be a "celebration of the Bible" to be enjoyed by all people – Christians and non-Christians alike, Green said.

Forming the core of the museum's eight floors are three permanent exhibits:

"History of the Bible": Visitors will follow the humble origins of the Bible and learn how it became the most widely read text in history.

"Narratives of the Bible":

Visitors will discover the stories of Scripture, from Genesis to the New Testament.

"Impact of the Bible": Visitors will learn how the Bible has impacted history and modern-day life, including science, government and the arts.

"The average person has no clue the degree that this book has impacted their life," Green said. "We want to show that, whether it be in science or art or literature or government or compassion ministries."

A restaurant serving foods of the Bible will reside on the top floor. The museum also will house a 500-seat performance arts theater.

Green said his passion for the Bible came from his father, Hobby Lobby founder David Green.

"God has blessed us tremendously, and we do strive to operate our business according to biblical principles," Steve Green said. "[My love for Scripture] goes back to the love that our family has passed down to us — my parents and my parents' parents, and it goes even further back than that. It's a love for God's Word. ... We want to celebrate and highlight this Book, and encourage all people to engage with it. That is the bottom-line goal for the Bible museum.

"... The way I look at it, we have the best material of any museum in the country. We have a book that has changed our world like nothing else has."

# NO STRINGS Attached - Part 2

Fast forward a couple of months from our last story when Zechariah had given a new friend his prized trophy for no reason other than to help a child feel some value and worth (see November 2017 Metro Voice). We hadn't seen the new friend since the gift had been given when, months later, he came by our house. The boys were playing nicely outside when I thought of the trophy and innocently asked the child where he had it displayed. I secretly wondered if he had treasured it in the same way that Zechariah had and I envisioned it proudly displayed on a shelf somewhere for all to see. The boy hesitated and abruptly shared that he had to leave. His face grew somber as he told us goodbye. Again, I asked about the trophy and my heart sank as he put his head down and solemnly shared that one of his caregivers had made him throw it away. He apologized sincerely and turned and ran away.

My heart honestly felt sick. I knew what that trophy had meant to my son and was personally crushed and offended that someone would abuse such a precious and heartfelt gift. But, while my son asked me why that would occur, he didn't let it bother him. He shrugged his shoulders and remained grateful that he was able to provide some joy to the friend, even if only temporarily.

Many times, we give because we subconsciously want something in return... a reciprocation, a word of thanks or at least an acknowledgement of the time and thought we put into giving. It's hard to admit that would ever be our motivation for giving but, if we get offended when those anticipated thanks are not received, our motive should definitely be something to consider.

Gifts will be given and received over

the next few weeks. When we give someone a gift, we are giving the recipient the opportunity to do with that gift as he or she



chooses. That means we relinquish control of what happens to that gift when it's placed into another's hands. Some will treasure our gifts, some will trash them. Does the Lord call us to give only when we know our gift will be used the way we hoped? Or does He call us to give unselfishly as He leads, regardless of the outcome?

My son was willing to give of a treasure that was later, quite literally, trashed. It hurt his momma's heart, but he didn't allow it to cause bitterness or pain in his. What's the difference between me and him in this instance? He gave without an expectation of anything in return. I watched him give but yearned for a respect and treasuring of the gift and gesture given in return. While some may say that is perfectly normal, I don't believe God would want us to allow frustration a foothold if our kindness isn't received or reciprocated the way we had hoped. The Bible is filled with passages that tell us to love when persecuted; continue to bless others even when there is no kindness received in return.

Give freely without reservation. Give freely with no strings attached. The recipient may not recognize the depth of your gift, or perhaps the sacrifice that went along with it, but God does. He smiles down on you. Is that not what this season is about? We give gifts to represent the great gift of Jesus that was given to us. We do so to honor God, not ourselves. As that becomes our sole motivation this Christmas, may we receive an even greater joy in knowing the One who really matters is looking down on us with satisfaction and love. He is our motivation and joy. As He has so freely given, may we now freely give... with no strings attached.

# Which companies made the naughty list this Christmas?

Have you grown sick and tired of national retail chains bowing to the very small anti-Christmas minority?

If so, then take a good look at the list below, and use it to fight back when you do your Christmas shopping!

The American Family Association and Liberty Council have each released their annual "Naughty-or-Nice" list that categorizes retailers and how they approach the Christmas season.

Some of the names that made the "nice" list are well known companies such as Walmart, JCPenney, Kmart, and Lowe's. Others fell into a "marginal" list, meaning that they rarely or infrequently referred to Christmas.

The two organizations reviewed up to four areas to determine if a company was "Christmas-friendly" in their advertising: print media (newspaper inserts), broadcast media (radio/television), website and/or personal visits to the store. If a company's ad has references to items associated with Christmas (trees, wreaths, lights, etc.), it was considered as an attempt to reach "Christmas" shop-

If a company has items associated with Christmas, but did not use the word "Christmas," then the company is considered as censoring "Christmas."

AFA continually updates the list, so check afa.net for updates. Want to report a company? Send your detailed report to christmas@afa.net.

AFA has also begun its "Keep Christ in Christmas" campaign. AFA President Tim Wildmon announced that his group is offering wristbands with messages about the battle against "secular liberals." There are also yard signs and buttons featuring the "Merry Christmas" message available at www.afa.net



"You might ask why we think this is an important battle. Well, secular liberals in our nation are bent on minimizing and even removing any mention of Christianity from the public square. And no other time of the year reminds people of Jesus Christ and America's Christian heritage more than the Christmas season," Wildmon explained.

Liberty Counsel also monitors cases across the U.S. where there is intimidation by officials and groups to remove the celebration of Christmas in public and private spaces.

These threats include atheist groups prohibit residents from singing

Christmas carols, public schools that ban students from wearing the Christmas colors of red and green, school officials who censor religious words from Christmas carols, and retailers which profit from Christmas while pretending it does not exist, according to the group's statement.

Liberty Counsel provides a memorandum to offer guidance regarding publicly and privately sponsored religious holiday displays, religious holidays in public schools and the rights of public school students in the context of religious holidays. For example, publicly sponsored nativity scenes on public property are constitutional so long as there is a secular symbol of the holiday in the general context. Privately sponsored nativity scenes or religious symbols are also permissible on public property that has been opened to the general public for expressive activity. No secular symbol is necessary.

"Celebrating Christmas is legal in public schools and in public venues. In the private retail market, consumers can choose to patronize stores that recognize Christmas and refuse to buy from those that pretend it does not exist," said Mat Staver, founder and chairman of Liberty Counsel.


#### 9. Have some fun

# **Separate Accounts?**

#### Dear Dave,

I have a full-time job, but I also have a small Etsy business on the side selling 10 products that makes about \$200 a month. I don't see the money from this part-time work getting any bigger in the future. Should I keep a separate account for this business, or just roll it into our regular checking account? Sydney

#### Dear Sydney,

It's very important to have a separate account, or accounts, for small businesses for two reasons. One, it's a huge help when it comes to taxes and tax season. It will also give you a much clearer picture of how your business is actually doing. Whether you're talking about revenue or tracking expenses, it will give you an

easy-to-read report card.

Even if the business is small and is going to stay small, I would want to know – almost as an intellectual exercise - which of my products were winning in the marketplace. This would help you concentrate on the ones that are making you money, and allow you to focus less on the ones that aren't doing so well.

So yeah, you need to keep a separate business account, and preferably a separate checking account on your business. Make sure all of the income from the business goes into those accounts, and only expenses associated with the business come out of those accounts. With small side businesses, a checkbook register can almost become a simplified profit & loss statement.

#### Balance rebuilding and repaying Dear Dave.

My wife and I have had marriage problems, and a lot of them were related to money. We're working through those issues and are on Baby Step 1 of your plan. In the process, we're talking more and things are getting better. We have \$40,000 in credit card debt, along with a combined income of around \$70,000, so

I talked to her about taking an extra job or two. She said she would rather I be at home so we can spend more time together in working on our marriage. What should I do?

#### Dear James.

First and foremost, I would urge you two to begin seeing a good marriage counselor together. Money problems and fights over money are the number one cause of divorce in our country today. Continuing to deal with these issues, with the help of a good counselor, will create more communication.

I think you've both realized you're going to be in a mess if you don't address your income and money management issues. However, her concern about spending more time together and becoming closer is valid. Since you've just started the rebuilding process, maybe you could put off the extra jobs for a month or two - but no longer. That should give you both time to talk, hug on each other a lot, and start developing a solid plan together for the future!

#### You still need one

#### Dear Dave.

I'm debt-free except for my home, and I'm about to start Baby Step 3 of your plan. I will be will back on active duty in the Navy soon, and they provide certain types of relief funds for its members depending on where you're based and other factors. With this in mind, how should I approach Baby Step 3?

#### Dear Brad.

For Baby Step 3, I tell folks to have three to six months of expenses set aside in an emergency fund. You have incredibly stable employment, so you would probably be okay on the three-month side of that equation. And you wouldn't need as much emergency fund money as if you were on straight commission sales.

However, my guess is you'll still have emergencies that will be your responsibility to cover. Everyone needs an emergency fund. But you'll probably be okay with one that's closer to three months of expenses rather than six months.

# **Five Facts about Charitable Contributions**

With the holidays around the corner, many people will be making donations to benefit charitable organizations. However, come tax time, the person who made the donation might also benefit. That's because taxpayers who donate to a charity may be able to claim a deduction for the donation on their

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federal tax return.

Here are five facts about charitable donations:

Qualified Charities. A taxpayer must donate to a qualified charity to deduct their contributions. Gifts to individuals, political organizations, or candidates are not deductible. To check the status of a charity, taxpayers can use Exempt Organizations Select Check on IRS.gov.

Itemize Deductions. To deduct charitable contributions, taxpayers

must file Form 1040 and itemize their deductions. To do this, taxpayers complete Schedule A, Itemized Deductions. They file this form with their tax return.

Getting Something in Return. Taxpayers may receive something in return for their donation. This includes things such as merchandise, meals, and event tickets. Taxpayers can only deduct the amount of the donation that's more than the fair market value of the item they received. To figure their deduction, a taxpayer would subtract the value of the item received from the amount of their donation.

Type of Donation. For donations of property instead of cash, a taxpayer can only deduct the fair market value of the donated item. Fair market value is generally the price they would get if they sold the item on the open market. If they donate used clothing and household items, those items generally must be in good condition. Special rules apply to certain types of property donations, such as cars and boats.

Donations of \$250 or More. If a taxpayer donates \$250 or more in cash or goods, they must have a written receipt from the charity. The statement must show: • The amount of the donation. • A description of any property given. • Whether the taxpayer received any goods or services in exchange for their

gift, and, if so, must provide a description and good faith estimate of the value of those goods or services.

Taxpayers can also use the Interactive Tax Assistant, Can I Deduct Charitable Contributions? This tool helps determine if charitable contribution is deductible.

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# THE DEATH OF "COMEDY" IN LATE NIGHT COMEDY

Ignoring the advice of Johnny Carson, today's comedians peddle hate

Late night comedy shows are no longer funny. They've turned into crude political attacks. There is nothing funny about watching a solid hour of the left spewing out hate speech against everything they disagree with. There are no conservative major late night comedy hosts.

People tune in to comedy shows in order to escape the endless political infighting. They want humor, not biting partisanship. Conservatives especially don't want to be subjected to nonstop attacks. Hate speech is defined by the Merriam-Webster dictionary as "speech expressing hatred of a particular group of people." Late night comedy has evolved into hatred toward conservatives.

Stephen Colbert is the most partisan of today's big three late night comedians. He took over "The Late Show," which was originally hosted by David Letterman from 1993 until 2015. Under Letterman, there was a semblance of balance between

political jokes aimed at the right and the left, and much of the show wasn't political. The replacement of Letterman with Colbert changed all of that. CBS gave him nearly full control over the show. With an annoying, smug demeanor, Colbert

turned the show into incessant, savage attacks on the right. As a result, only 17 percent of his viewers identify as Republicans.

Colbert's show isn't just partisan but downright disgusting. In May, Colbert made a crude sexual joke about President Trump and Russian President Vladimir Putin. Even those on the left accused it of being homophobic. In September, Colbert made a Nazi salute in reference to the president. This is offensive to Jews who suffered from the real Holocaust.

Colbert says things that are flat out false. During a September show, he claimed that Trump "didn't meet a single storm victim, see an inch of rain or get near a flooded street" while surveying Hurricane Harvey damage. In reality, plenty of Americans watched footage on TV of Trump meeting with victims in shelters and elsewhere. In fact, ironically, the left wrongly condemned Melania Trump for wearing heels while touring the damage.

Colbert is a hypocritical liberal. He has a staff of 19 that write his material for him. Only two are women and 17 are white men. Yet he is one of the first comedians who will attack others for being sexist or racist.

# **Celebrating the King of the Jews**

I grew up a nice Jewish boy in Brooklyn, N.Y. When late December arrived it brought some interesting challenges. Why? My family owned a toy store! I knew little about Christmas, but what I knew was that it was "all hands on deck"!

Christmas was a celebrant and frantic time with exciting expectations for the "others," but not for Jews. To me, whatever Christmas was, one thing I knew was that it was not Jewish. Besides, we celebrated Hanukkah. So, the fact that my father owned a toy store was a win-win for "them" and me!

Unknown to many is that gift giving on Hanukkah is an essentially American invention. So many Christians and too few Jews placed cultural pressure to accommodate the new Jewish immigrants and their kids from being left out. So, Hanukkah assimilated itself seemingly into the "Jewish" Christmas.

For too many Christians therefore, Hanukkah has as much meaning as Christmas has conversely for Jews. Yet little known by both communities is the historical connection that makes one not possible without the other.

In 168 B.C.E., a Syrian Seleucid king name Antiochus Epiphanes IV subsumed and decimated Jewish life in the land of Israel.

Most noted was the desecration of Jewish worship and the Holy Temple by replacing it with the worship of pagan idols, including the killing of a pig on the altar.

This event came to be infamously known as the "Abomination of Desolation." The story continues through the heroic efforts of Judah Macabbee resulting in the rededication of Jewish worship through military victory and ritual cleansing three years to the day, the "25th Day" (any coincidence) of the Hebrew month of Kislev. Hanukkah is the Hebrew word translated 'dedication." It is remembered yearly by the lighting of the Menorah, commemorative of the original rekindling and the story of how with just enough oil for one day it remained lit for eight days until additional oil could be prepared.

The prophet Malachi prophesied 250 years earlier that the "Lord would suddenly come to His Temple." Did he come when under Zechariah, 150 years before him, the Temple was rebuilt as he spoke of a priest named "Joshua" (3:8-9) who would be the agency for the forgiveness of sins in a single day, speaking of the anticipated Messianic age ('Branch' is a

reference to the seed of David) as a Day of Atonement?

No. Did he come to His Temple at the conclusion of the Temple's rededication eventually known as Hanukkah? No.

Neither experienced the witness of the Spirit presence of God.

In the Gospel of Luke (1:67-80) we read about another Zechariah who prophecies identically of what is to come. Filled with the Spirit, he declares the salvation of the Lord is coming and already in motion with the announcement of his son in the spirit of Elijah, Messiah's herald. He is coming, the Messiah, the seed of David, the one who forgives sins and reveals the light of God.

So it was. Simeon held these prophecies in his hands officiating at a Pidyan Haben (the redemption ceremony) 30 days after the birth of a first born son.

Which son? He was the one that was anticipated (Lk 1:31-33). Yes, "his name shall be 'Jesus' for he shall redeem his people". His Hebrew name is "Yeshua", a

form of the name Yehoshua, or "Joshua". The Lord fulfills His promises to Zechariah and Malachi.

It should be noted that Yeshua celebrates Hanukkah in John 10:22ff., or didn't you notice! Perhaps Hanukkah is a Christian holiday?

If it were not for Hanukkah, there would have been no Temple for the Lord to return. If it were not for Chanukah, there would be no revealing of the light of the world. Historically, if it were not for Chanukah, there would be no Christmas!

If it were not for the Jewish Messiah there would be no salvation for the Gentiles. Christmas celebrates Israel's Messiah "a light for salvation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel." What happened is "The Late Show" basically became the left-leaning, partisan "The Daily Show" reincarnated as late night comedy. Colbert got his start on the latter as a regular guest when it was hosted by Jon Stewart. Meanwhile, "The Daily Show" continues on with a new lefty host, Trevor Noah. "The Daily Show" is very clever; it is a leftwing political show masquerading as comedy. Under Noah, it has become even more vicious against the right than under Stewart.

"Jimmy Kimmel Live!" debuted on ABC in 2003, becoming a second major late night comedy show. After Trump took office, Kimmel's attacks on conservatives increased. While talking about his son's health condition during a show, Kimmel went on a rant against opponents of Obamacare, cruelly implying that if they had their way, his son wouldn't have been eligible for health insurance to cover his urgent heart operation.

A day after the Las Vegas massacre, Kimmel exploded in a rant against Republicans. As a result a media outlet asked Kimmel if the days of apolitical late night comedians are over. Kimmel responded, "Maybe we'll never go back. Maybe the days of fun are over" — brazenly admitting the comedic aspect of late night comedy has been taken out. He criticized Trump, "Everything Donald Trump is doing and undoing is bad, bad, bad, and it seems so obvious, and it's happening anyway."

Kimmel doesn't care that he's losing Republican viewers. During an interview with CBS last month, he said, "if they're so turned off by my opinion on health care and gun violence then I don't know, I probably wouldn't want to have a conversation with them anyway. Not good riddance, but rid-

Jimmy Fallon, who replaced Jay Leno on "The Tonight Show," has kept that show a little classier. When asked by NBC's "Sunday Today" why he features less Trump bashing than the other two late night shows, he responded, "It's just not what I do, I think it would be weird for me to start doing it now. ... A lot of [his] stuff is hard to make a joke about. It's just too

Previous late night comedy hosts were never this partisan. Johnny Carson wisely told Barbara Walters in 1984, "I think one of the dangers if you are a comedian, which basically I am, is that if you start to take yourself too seriously and start to comment on social issues, your sense of humor suffers somewhere.'

Today's comedians are turning comedy into partisan talk shows. We don't need anymore — especially on the left, where there is a glut of them due to the left-leaning slant of almost all news networks. These new late night comedians aren't funnythey're downright rude. Considering a large proportion of the population that watches late night comedy are conservative, they are making a big mistake.

"I would hope that people would stand back, look at what's happening with the economy, look at what's happening internationally."

Strang says that he believed Trump "has the makings to be a great leader" and "a great president," then added the caveat that he still has to "definitely grow into the

"But I believe that God raises up people in times of crisis and I believe our country is in a time of crisis," said Strang, who believed that

Trump seemed fit for the job due to his apparent ability to be unphased by the "onslaught" of criticism he gets.

#### An unexpected candidate

In his book, Strang noted the gradual

rising support for Trump among evangelical leaders, saying that during the Republican primary he had originally endorsed Senator Ted Cruz of Texas.

"I supported [Cruz] up until the day he dropped out," explained Strang, noting that once Sen. Cruz dropped out he "immediately endorsed Trump."

"I was not a Trump supporter to start with. My image of him was, you know, what I picked up in the media. I rather expected, as a lot of evangelical leaders did, that his campaign would implode at some point."

Strang said that his support for Trump came in part because "some Christian leaders that I respected were meeting with him, they were praying with him."

#### A flawed, yet changing president

Strang referenced the Rev. Franklin Graham when speaking about his ultimate conclusion that evangelical voters had no better option when it came to the 2016 general election.

"Like Franklin Graham said, we're not electing a pastor-in-chief,

we're electing a commanderin-chief," said Strang, noting that many past presidents were "absolutely imperfect."

Strang believed that a decade ago "Trump cleaned up his act" and has been "certainly moving in our direction" when it comes to both public policy and personal practices.

"He seems to have changed a lot. He enjoys being around Christians, he enjoys being prayed for," continued Strang.

Strang felt that "beyond the fact that somebody might not like his latest tweet," Trump "has matured" and "is acting more presidential."

When it came to evangelical outreach by the Trump Administration, Strang echoed the sentiments of other conservative Christian leaders that the president has given evangelicals unprecedented access to the White House.

As with others, Strang believed that this access and influence was even greater than times when devout evangelicals like George W. Bush or Jimmy Carter were in office.

Strang says that he felt a part of it was seen in the personality of Trump, contrasting his experience of interviewing Bush with his interviewing Trump.

"I had the opportunity to interview

"People who were there said they expected Trump to say something nice and then leave, but he sat there the whole evening, because he seemed to enjoy it, he seemed to be comfortable with it,' explained Strang.







More important than living in KANSAS is where you will live forever. Just as you would look at a map of KANSAS to find your way, so you must look at the Bible to find your way to heaven. Śince Jesus, God's Son, was the only One who could pay for our sin, He is the only Way to Heaven.

3. Repent of your sin and receive Jesus as your Savior. In order to go to Heaven from KANSAS, or anywhere else, you must accept Christ by calling on Him in prayer. He tells us in Romans 10:13, "For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved." Use the following prayer, or one similar to it, to receive Him now

Dear Lord Jesus, I know I am a sinner. I believe that you died and rose again for me. Please forgive me of my sin, become Lord of my life, and take me to heaven when I die. I am trusting you completely, and in nothing I can do. Thank you Jesus! Amen.



# The Star breaks faith-based animated drought

In the dozen so years since The Passion of The Christ sparked the modern faith-based film wave, there have been dozens of Christian movies at the box office.

We've seen movies about police and firefighters (Fireproof, Courageous), movies about glimpses of the afterlife (Miracles From Heaven, Heaven Is For Real), movies about football and surfing (Woodlawn, Soul Surfer), and movies about kidnappings and murders (Captive, End of the Spear).

We've even had a couple of comedies (Mom's Night Out, The Resurrection of Gavin Stone).

But there has been a shortage of animated films geared toward children – the last wide one being The Pirates Who Don't Do Anything: A Veggie Tales Movie, which was released in 2008.

That changed Nov. 17, when Sony's Affirm Films released The Star, which follows a donkey named Bo (voiced by Steven Yeun), a dove named Dave (Keegan-Michael Key), a sheep named

Ruth (Aidy Bryant) and a host of other animals as they accompany Mary and Joseph from Nazareth to Bethlehem and experience the nativi-

ty story.

An embargo prevents me from saying too much about The Star, but I am free to say this: It's very good, and it's genuinely funny – for both children and parents.

Also, it's much better than the trailer. It will have you and your children laughing as the animals witness the greatest story ever told.

DeVon Franklin, who was once named one of the "most influential Christians under 40 by Beliefnet, serves as the executive producer, while Academy Award nominee Timothy Reckart is the director.

Faith-based animated films at the box office are rare. In fact, among the Top 50 grossing Christian films of all time, only three – The Pirates Who Don't Do Anything (2008), Jonah: A Veggie Tales Movie (2002) and The Prince of Egypt

(1998) - were animated.

Ash Greyson, the founder of Ribbow Media, told the Metro Voice News that

the dearth of animated faith films can be attributed to a lack of funds.

"The last few animated faith films have not done very well," Greyson said. "They are expensive to produce, and I

suspect that is why we haven't seen many. Most people of faith have no issues with Pixar or Disney, so you can't just pitch a faith animated movie as an alternative to Hollywood.

"I think this is a space where Hollywood can win. Look at what The Prince of Egypt did."

Released in 1998, The Prince of Egypt opened in second place and stayed in the Top 10 for six weeks. It finished with a total gross of \$101 million.

Time will tell whether The Star approaches those numbers. But Christian families at least have another option at the box office.

# An interview with the author of Thirty Days to Glory

If you're looking for a heart-warming book with a heaping helping of Christmas, check out Thirty Days to Glory by Kathy Nickerson. Kathy lives in rural Missouri but sold her book to her

publisher when she attended a Heart of America Christian Writers Network (www.HACWN.org) conference several years ago.

Besides being an author, speaker, and grandmother of 14, Kathy admits that she's an eternal optimist because she has a deep faith in the God who

made Light to shine from darkness. Kathy's articles have appeared in several magazines and she is the author of three novels, including Thirty Days to Glory, which won the Christian Small Publisher Book of the Year award for fiction.

#### Q:What is Thirty Days to Glory about?

A:This is the story of Catherine Benson, an elderly widow who wants to do one great thing before she dies. And about Elmer Grigsby, a WWII vet who just wants to stay seriously drunk and slip out of the world unnoticed. Inside their stories are universal questions about purpose, destiny, relationships, and the things that ultimately matter in life. Plus some quirky friends, a few difficult relatives, and a cat.

Q:What led you to write Thirty Days to Glory?

A:I actually drew Elmer Grigsby's name in a prayer challenge like Catherine's. (Although I've changed his name.) He stuck with me for years, and I wondered if my prayers had made any difference. Then I met a sweet lady in the nursing home who felt her life was useless. My husband reminded her the most important thing she could do was pray. The story grew from there.

#### Q:What was the hardest thing about writing the book?


A: Honestly, I was surprised by the emotions I encountered

with the characters. They feel almost as real as my f a m i l y sometimes.

I've read and revised the book about a zillion times, but some places still make me laugh. Or cry.

# Q: Do you hear from readers about Thirty Days to Glory?

A: Responses have been amazing and humbling. One teenager told me a scene with Catherine's nativity set made her realize she needed to read the Bible for herself, not just rely on what people had told her. A reader admitted she had never felt permission to pray because she isn't part of organized religion; now she prays every morning. Another woman who read the book helped her alcoholic brother find a treatment center instead of slamming the door in his face because he suddenly reminded her of Elmer Grigsby.





# Don't let winter curb your exercise

Many people who spend the bulk of the year happily jogging, biking and hiking outdoors begin to curb their activity at the first sign of frost. But even if you workout indoors during winter months, it pays to find some snowy activities that can bring you outside. Not only do most wintertime sports slaughter calories, the double whammy of physical exercise and sun exposure helps improve mood, boost the immune system and may even play a hand in preventing long-term chronic illness.

Exercise, whether indoors or out, boosts serotonin levels — the brain hormone associated with improved mood, the absence of which is related to depression. But that's not all: improved blood circulation from moderate exercise can also jumpstart the immune system. In fact, a study from the American Journal of Medicine found that older women who walked for 30 minutes each day for an entire year reported half the number of seasonal colds as did women who didn't exercise during the same period. Researchers theorized that the increased circulation of infection-fighting white blood cells helped the active group retain their health throughout the year.

Sun exposure also helps, in small doses. We often neglect time spent in daylight during the winter months, but the sun's rays also work to boost our mood and immunity. You only need 15 minutes of sun exposure per day to get a sufficient amount of vitamin D, which improves immune system health and helps the body properly absorb calcium, building strong bones (the National Osteoporosis recommends 400 to 800 IU of vitamin D for adults under age 50 - and 800 to 1,000 IU for those over 50 — as a central part of its prevention strategy).

What's more, sun exposure is associated with other hormones (despite its name, vitamin D is actu-

# FOUR BOXES HELP ESTATE PLANNING

As the end of the year approaches, people tend to look for ways to cut their taxes by making charitable contributions and putting more cash in tax-deferred retirement plans. It's also a great time to consider a smart estate-planning move: helping your elderly parents inventory their possessions through a "four boxes" system.

A family inventory will not only tidy up their home, it can help your mom and dad get their financial house in order,

#### What Estate Planning Is Really About

Estate planning is about much more than wills and trusts. It is also about preserving and understanding the life of a person, in part through his or her possessions.

There's no question that cleaning house can be a tricky project, especially if there is no move or downsize to prompt it.

Your elderly parents may question your motives, so make it clear that the exercise is not about contemplating their deaths or trying to get their assets. It's about hearing the stories and memories that go along with the possessions they've collected over a lifetime, so you won't have to play a guessing game later about what is valuable, emotionally and financially.

#### The 4 Boxes Inventory System

Here's how the "four boxes" organizing approach works:

boxes in each room of your parent's house:

"Keep 1) Until I Die" For items with sentimental value. such as family heirlooms, personal letters,



wedding china and photo albums.

- 2) "Appraise and Sell" For unwanted items of value.
- 3) "Keep with Me" For unsentimental items, such as furniture and art.
  - 4) "Garage Sale/Donate" For unwanted items.

Then, go room by room with your parents, sorting their possessions.

For bigger items that won't fit in boxes — like furniture, pianos and workout equipment — consider putting pictures of them on index cards and then dropping the cards in the appropriate boxes.

#### My Mother and the 4 Boxes

I went through this exercise with my mother two years ago when, at age 89, she realized it was time to downsize from two homes to one. The 10-hour drive between her places in Delaware and South Carolina had become too much.

In addition to dealing with the logistics involved in moving everything to her South Carolina home, we reviewed key financial information, including her will, power of attorney,

living will, beneficiaries, retirement savings, budget and her new cost of living. Then, we inventoried her possessions.

Using the four boxes approach, it was amazing to unleash the stories behind her acquisitions.

"Tell me about this piece," I would say to her, sparking tales about how she got certain pieces and the role each one played in her life. Without going through this process, I would have missed out on hearing the stories that will now become part of my family's

The final step was selling my mother's home. The proceeds from the sale helped supplement her retirement income, providing comfort that — at nearly 90 years old — her cash flow would continue.

I encourage you to consider how a four boxes inventory might be helpful to your family. The process can actually be a bonding experience and help prompt a re-assessment of savings during the later years of a parent's retire-

or SAD — a season-specific episode of depression-like symptoms. The added time in the sunlight even helps improve sleep, by regulating the body's melatonin production, which controls its circadian rhythm. Just be sure to wear adequate sun protection, including sunscreen and sunglasses; not only are winter rays strong enough to burn, their reflection in white snow actually compounds the strength, putting snowbirds at even greater risk of damage.

None of this sounds like an improvement over the balmy jogs and swims of summer, but it turns out that from a weight management and fitness standpoint, there are few exercises more effective than regular walks or jogs in the winter sun.



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# Myth About Losing Your Medicare Supplement Plan F


If you have been approached by an insurance agent or company stating Plan F is going away in 2020 and not to purchase one now or to change your existing coverage BEWARE. Medicare Access CHIP Reauthorization Act (MACRA) of 2015 prohibits the sale of Medigap Plan F and C beginning in 2020. That prohibition only applies to newly eligible Medicare beneficiaries. Congress did not prohibit the sale of these policies to people who were already eligible or enrolled in Medicare before 2020.

Many seniors like Plan F because it pays the Part A and B deductibles of Medicare. All they need to remember is to pay their premium and make sure the claim is an approved claim from Medicare. Marketing of other supplement plans like Plan G is being done heavily because, for some insurance

companies, Plan F premiums are too expensive in the marketplace. Only their Plan G premium can compete. Or, maybe a sales representative only sells price and not benefits. Remember, saving a penny today could cost you a dollar at some point.

Again, beware, only people who become eligible for Medicare on or after 1/1/2020 are affected by the change. If you have Plan C or F, you can keep it.

# PASSIONATE PURSUIT

FCA Magazine Q&A with Mason Rudolph, Oklahoma State



The motivation behind the pursuit — and the corresponding journey — usually begins at an early age. It starts with a dream; young children envision reaching their goal. Soon enough, they're sweating through drills under the scorching sun, examining how older players are doing it, how they prepare and train to become accomplished football stars.

Every college football player takes their own path before arriving on campus to play on Saturdays in front of thousands, but there's one common theme: They worked incredibly hard to get there.

For Christian athletes, that effort and

energy is simply a form of worship — a way to glorify their Creator, giving Him praise and honor for the abilities He blessed them with to compete. The lessons learned in passionately pursuing their gridiron goals also apply directly to their relationship with Christ. Time spent with the Lord in prayer and in His Word develop a longing to

know Him more—and it forges a closer bond and deeper devotion to their relationship with Him.

It's in that vein, in the game or out, that Colossians 3:23 remains the highest calling upon their lives: "Work willingly at whatever you do, as though you were working for the Lord rather than for people."

That verse was the inspiration behind FCA Magazine's theme of "passionately pursuing God" for its eighth-annual college football player profiles. This year's edition features Oklahoma State quarterback Mason Rudolph and 40 other Christ-following student-athletes from around the country. They all shared why and how they pursue a relationship with Jesus, and the impact He has had on their lives and football careers.

"In fact, they got worse," Rudolph said. "But I had this peace and this hope for a better future that I never had. My spirit changed, my attitude changed, the

way I perceived things changed. I was certainly a long way from perfect, but I knew there was a purpose for my life because I met the Creator of my life."

#### FCA Magazine Q&A with Mason Rudolph, Oklahoma State; #2 – Sr./ QB / Rock Hill, South Carolina

**FCA:** Why do you passionately pursue a relationship with Jesus Christ?

**MR**: Growing up with my family, my grandfather being a minister, I was always around the gospel. Once I made it to college, my faith had to become my

own. The distance away from my family actually strengthened my relationship with Christ. I passionately pursue Christ because I want to be a witness for Him and use this platform to impact our community. I think my faith has grown in every chapter of my life, especially in college.

FCA: How does your relationship with God impact your approach to football?

MR: It seems like during the season you just naturally become more emotional and closer to God because you're thinking about Him, you're more anxious, you're more nervous. You have to turn to Him with those nerves and emotions and just lean on Him and trust that He's going to protect you and keep you safe.

Christ is at the center of it. It's Christ who will always be there for you; He's your foundation. So just getting in the Word and leaning on a few of my life verses throughout the week, as well as constant communication with my parents, my grandparents — that's my secret to success.

**FCA:** In your role on the team, how do you balance encouraging unity while also using your voice for leadership?

MR: It's important to have individual connections with every position group on the team. We compete every single

**FCA:** Why do you feel God put you in this specific position in sports?

MR: I was blessed with talent, but my parents taught me at a young age that it takes a lot more than just talent to get where you want to go. It's just a blessing from God, and I've tried to use that to the best of my ability. I try to be a witness and do things off the field, because it's more about how we can affect other people's lives.

God is not predictable. In Mark Batterson's book, In a Pit with a Lion on a Snowy Day, he says, "You can bank on God to bring the unpredictable." We try to diligently lay out a plan for our lives — for the day or the month or the year — and a lot of times He kind of just laughs at us because it's His plan for our lives, not ours. The way He's orchestrated my career in football, as well as my life off the field, I don't think I would've dreamed it would've gone this way.

**FCA:** Why do you feel the ministry of FCA is important?

**MR:** It's big because people look up to athletes. Those guys in leadership roles can show there's more to life than just football; they can be a witness for Christ.

That was big with me with Tim Tebow. I thought Tim Tebow hung the moon when I was in high school and middle school. The way he used his platform to reach kids and reach people all across the world with his ministry, the way he carried himself — that made an impact on me. I always told myself, that's what I want to be.

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

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
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
