

City of Topeka to give away laptops



The City of Topeka is giving away 375 laptop computers to qualifying Topeka residents who are between the ages of 18 and 59 years old.

The program is part of the city's digital equity initiative, TSC – Get Digital, that aims to connect Topeka neighbors.

To qualify, Topeka residents must receive SNAP, Medicaid, SSI, Federal Public Housing Assistance, Veterans Pension Benefit Program, or have an annual household income that is less than 200% of federal poverty

Can we get back to our roots before it's too late?

America had a humble and desperate beginning. Our nation's Declaration of Independence reveals this. Thomas Jefferson, who carefully crafted the historic document wrote, "The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct

object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States." Then Jefferson goes on to list 27 examples of the king's oppressive governmental rule over America's 13 colonies. All the signers knew how bold of a statement the declaration was. They knew its implications, and how it would bring upon them the wrath of the king and the full power of his military,

unlike what they had seen up to that point.

Understanding what they were to embark on, Jefferson wrote, "We, therefore, the Representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions..." Jefferson and the



signers knew they would need the help of the Almighty to withstand the forces of the powerful British Army and Navy. Today, we know the result of America's Revolutionary War, but on July 4, 1776, when the 56 men signed their names, the future was uncertain. This is why Jefferson concluded with these solemn words, "And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor." Though they believed victory was possible, they also knew defeat was too. And they knew both the price of victory or defeat could be their very lives. Therefore, with humble hearts they cited the urgent need for the Lord God's shield of protection about them.

Without question, America's founders and their colonies were desperate and dependent on God.

How is America today? We have gone from 13 colonies to 50 states, from a population of 2,000,000 to 330,000,000, from a ragtag Continental Army to the world's most powerful military, from small agriculture beginnings to the wealthiest of all nations.

God once spoke these words to the nation of Tyre from centuries past,"... by your wisdom and your understanding you have made wealth for yourself, and have gathered gold and



Local Students Honored at Annual SkillsUSA Event

Several local career and technical students were recognized for excellence at the 2023 Skill-sUSA Championships, held in Atlanta, on June 21-22. More than 6,000 students competed at the national showcase of career and technical education. The SkillsUSA Championships is the largest skill competition in the world and covers 1.79 million square

world and covers 1.79 million square feet, equivalent to 31 football fields or 41 acres. Skill Point Certificates were

awarded to all national contestants who met a threshold contest score. The Skill Point Certificate represents workplace readiness in the occupational specialty and students can add the certificate to their employment portfolio as an indicator of proficiency.

Students were invited to the event to demonstrate their technical skills. workplace skills and personal skills in 110 hands-on competitions including robotics, automotive technology, drafting, criminal justice, aviation maintenance and public speaking. Industry leaders from 650 businesses, corporations, trade associations and unions planned and evaluated the contestants against their standards for entry-level workers. Industry support of the SkillsUSA Championships is valued at over \$36 million in donated time, equipment, cash and material. More than 1,200 industry judges and



technical committee members participated this year.

Washburn Tech said five postsecondary students earned silver medals by placing second in the quiz bowl event. Earning honors and their programs of study were Marissa Boyce, Osage City, practical nursing; Zevin Para-Cremer and Ethan Stookey,

Topeka, cabinet/millwork; Corey York, Silver Lake, information systems technology; and Taylor Zwygart, Meriden, practical nursing.

"More than 6,000 students from every state in the nation participated in the 2023 SkillsUSA Championships," said SkillsUSA Executive Director Chelle Travis. "This showcase of career and technical education demonstrates SkillsUSA at its finest. Our students, instructors and industry partners work together to ensure that every student excels. This program expands learning and career opportunities for our members."

After 36 years of practice, I get all the clients I need and do not want anyone to think I'm trying to exploit a client for any gain on my part! As I saw how writing was so healing for Daisy, I believe God has prompted me to help facilitate her being able to share her journey with you. I believe it will not only be healing for her, but also for many of those who read what she has to say. I started going to church close to a year ago. I knew I was looking for something but wasn't sure what. I'd only read the bible once and felt like a fish out of water. But I told myself, "I'm going to give it a chance." That was just what I needed to hear... A chance.

I reluctantly went as I was very unsure about my religious beliefs. I knew that Jesus had died on the cross for



our sin, but I didn't know if I was good enough for his sacrifice. I always have a Bible nearby; however, I need to open it a lot more than I do. I'm ashamed of that and my lack of praying, and when I do pray its usually for someone else. I believe everyone deserves to have a chance. I've had plenty of chances, I just screwed them up. I'll give you a quick rundown on who I am and give more details in later articles.

My name is Daisy. I'm 42 years old and don't have much to show for it. I am a high school graduate. I tried the college thing, but it wasn't for me. So, I have no degrees, I am an expert in none. I've just done the best I could.

I've been through a lot and struggled much, but I haven't given in yet. I have had my fair share of trauma and abuse at the hands of my family and others.

Of all the people who have abused me I was my worst abuser. I began self-injuring when I was in the first grade, and it has gone on ever since.

The past year has been especially rough. I went on a cutting streak and totally ravished my body. I am happy to say I have not cut myself in 3 months! That's like 3 years to a cutter!

I've been in therapy most of my life and had roughly around 10 therapists. I began therapy at the age of 8 and was put on medication at age 9. I've probably been on 50 different medications, and currently I am taking 25 pills a day.

I know you are probably thinking, "If she takes all those pills, she should have some diagnoses?" The self-injury and generalized anxiety are the areas I struggle with the most. I've also battled depression, obsessive compulsive disorder, and at my worst times, I had three series of Electroconvulsive treatments, which are basically shock treatments. There have been times I wanted to give up. Let me tell you, there were times I almost DID give up. But what doesn't kill you will make you stronger.

I was looking for something, and after what I've been through, I didn't honestly think that anything could bring me back. With the help of a great friend and a very tiny church, I've at least got my head up.

Don't get me wrong I have my bad days as does everyone (at least I sure do). But if you'd like to follow along, I'll delve into my journey and share more of my story with you.

I've been struggling for about a year, ever since I made a stupid newcollege-graduate decision to finance a car. It's a 2018 Jeep Compass, and I owe \$21,000 on it. The trade-in value is about \$11,000, so I really got stung on the sticker price and everything else. I also have \$85,000 in student loan debt and around \$7,500 on credit cards. The good news is, I make \$63,000 at my job, and that should increase to \$75,000 by January of next year. My girlfriend and I are renting an apartment and engaged to be married in 2025. How do I clean all this up before then? — Austin

Dear Austin:

Well, the good news is, you have the rest of your life to never make this kind of mistake again. I'm really sorry you're going through all this, son. What a horrible thing to experience right after college.

So, you're \$10,000 upside down on a vehicle you owe \$21,000 on, right? The truth is, you're kind of stuck. If you're serious about getting out of this mess and not repeating the same mistakes twice, you're going to be working like a dog for the next year or two. Right now, you need a serious side job nights and weekends-maybe two. And I'm talking bare-bones living. No vacations, and no eating out for a while. You don't need to see the inside of a restaurant unless you're working there. Get what I'm saying? No unnecessary spending. Period. On top of all this, you've got to start living on a strict, written monthly budget.

Now, about your fiancée. I get the desire to fix things before you get married. But married people work together on this kind of stuff all the time. Believe it or not, there's no perfect time to get married. I mean, it sounds like you two have already decided to go there and figured out neither one of you are perfect. That's just called being human. So, there's really no reason to wait on tying the knot at this point. And the truth is, the two of you can whip your finances into shape faster and much more efficiently working on it together—as a married counle

Is Gold the Golden Ticket to Beating Inflation?

If your goal in retirement is to have an

increasing income in order to offset ever increasing prices, gold is one of the worst possible investments you could make. In fact, gold is the second worst major investment class an investor could buy if the goal is to beat inflation over a 5, 10, 15, or 20 year time period. Only about 40% of the time has gold beaten inflation over either a 5 year or 10 year time period and at 15-20 years it is about a coin toss; not exactly great odds. Commodities are actually the very worst over longer time periods with gold being bottom of the barrel over shorter time frames, according to recent research published by Goldman

The last time inflation was sky high and peaking like today was in 1980. Since then, gold has failed to outpace inflation and has gone from being worth roughly \$800 an ounce to a little over \$1,900 an ounce. Had one invested \$100,000 in gold and not paid any transaction costs (which can be obscenely high) that gold would be worth about \$225,000 today. The problem is that something that cost \$100,000 in 1980 now costs over \$390,000 today due to inflation. So although the price of gold went up, it'd only be able to buy about 57% today of what it could in 1980.

So the long term track record after we've had high inflation isn't great, but what about the last couple of years that featured the highest levels of inflation in four decades? In the last 3 years, gold has actually lost value. In fact, it's still worth less than when it hit its peak al-

most 12 years ago in August of 2011. While the prices of most goods and services have gone up, many dramatically, over the last decade plus, the price of gold has gone down. Even worse is silver, which has lost over half its value during this time period.

Not only have these precious metals had very bad returns and done a very poor job of keeping up with inflation, they are also quite volatile; even more volatile than the stock market. Think gold is safe and secure?

Think again. Research done by State Street Securities (who run the world's largest gold fund) shows that over the last 30 years the price of gold has fluctuated in value nearly 8% more during the average year than the stock market.

Speaking of the stock market, the Dow Jones in 1980 was, like gold, also worth about 800. Today? Over 34,000. Had one invested \$100,000 in the Dow in 1980 and reinvested all dividends, they'd have over \$11.2 million today. So while gold can only buy 57% of what it could 43 years ago, the Dow can buy over 28 times more than what it could then!

US stocks are the only major investment to beat inflation over every single time period that the average retirement lasts. The ONLY one. There is no time period where any other has beaten inflation more frequently. Why? Because businesses can do things a piece of metal cannot, like create new products/services or more efficient ways to produce things and they also have the ability to raise prices. You may have heard that 'greedy companies are the reason prices are high right now.' Assuming that is true, wouldn't it be nice to be the one making all those profits? If so, consider owning stocks, because stocks are ownership in a company!

Who do you know that has gotten rich off of putting a substantial amount in gold? Anyone? Who do you know or have heard of that has done so with being a company owner? Warren Buffet? Bill Gates? Jeff Bezos? Do any of those names ring a bell? Guess what? All of them became billionaires based on the values of stock they owned.

During times of uncertainty it can be easy to get drawn into unscrupulous advertising designed to prey on fear. Gold is a completely unregulated mar-

ket and as such is one where this type of advertising runs rampant along with other predatory behavior. Metals.com, for instance, has seen so many lawsuits against it for selling precious metals for on average 148% more than their actual worth that they are now in receivership. Don't think they are the only ones out there that are engaged in this kind of business practice.

Rather than listening to deceptive advertising to purchase an asset at a huge markup (like gold or silver) that is more volatile than stocks and has done a very poor job of keeping up with inflation, consider speaking with a fiduciary advisor. A fiduciary advisor must by law give you advice that is in your best interest and is usually compensated in a way so that when your assets grow and beat inflation they get paid more and when they don't, they get paid less. This is the type of compensation structure we use at the Retirement Team as it puts us financially on the same side of the table as our clients. We can purchase gold in client accounts just as easily as stocks, real estate, or any of the other assets shown in the above chart. We typically don't buy gold in client accounts, though, as we're well aware of the data that chart shows and want both our clients and us to prosper financially and beat inflation.



Baby on the Way? How to Prepare Financially

Welcoming a new baby can be incredibly exciting – but there's a lot to prepare for. In addition to assembling the crib and en-

One of the most popular options is a 529 plan, which is specifically designed to help families save for education expenses.

4. Reassess your financial position. With a baby on the way, it's critical to

keep in mind that unexpected events can affect your finances at any time. Resolve to build or maintain an emergency fund that could cover three to six months of expenses, in addition to prioritizing your retirement savings. After your baby arrives, up-

date your estate plan and insurance coverage (e.g., medical, life, disability policies) as necessary.

Taxpayers missing refunds for 2019 must file by July 17

The IRS is encouraging nearly 1.5 million people across the nation to submit a tax return to claim their refunds for tax year 2019 by the July 17, 2023, deadline.



The IRS estimates almost \$1.5 billion in refunds remain unclaimed because people haven't filed their 2019 tax returns yet. The average median refund for tax year 2019 was \$893.

Taxpayers could lose more than just their refund of taxes withheld or paid during 2019. Many low- and moderate-income workers may be eligible for the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC). For 2019, the credit was worth as much as \$6,557. The EITC helps individuals and families whose incomes were below certain thresholds in 2019. Those who are potentially eligible for EITC in 2019 had incomes below \$15,570, or \$50,162, depending on how many children they have

The IRS reminds taxpayers seeking a 2019 tax refund that their checks may be held if they have not filed tax returns for 2020 and 2021.

Current and prior-year tax forms (such as the tax year 2019 Forms 1040 and 1040-SR) and instructions are available online on the IRS Forms, Instructions and Publications page or by calling toll-free 800-TAX-FORM (800-829-3676).

Taxpayers who are missing Forms W-2, 1098, 1099 or 5498 for the years 2019, 2020 or 2021 can request copies from their employer, bank or other payers. Taxpayers who are unable to get those missing forms from their employer or other payers can order a free wage and income transcript at IRS.gov using the Get Transcript Online tool. For many taxpayers, this is by far the quickest and easiest option.

Why Are So Many Young Americans Irreligious

Fewer young Americans affiliate with any organized religion than ever before in American history.

This means, therefore, that the children — and certainly the grandchildren — of millions of faithful Christians have abandoned Christianity. The same holds true for Jews, but that decline began somewhat earlier. Until the 20th century, nearly all Jews were religious (which nearly always meant Orthodox). Today about 15% of Jews are Orthodox, while most Conservative and Reform Jews have the same values as the secular Left, and very few of their children attend synagogue.

Why have so many Jews and Christians abandoned religious commitment and even a religious identity?

Two reasons predominate: the dominant secular culture and the failure of religious Jews and Christians to explain their respective religions.

Contemporary Western countries (and countries such as Japan whose identities are not Western, but which are culturally part of the West) are the most secular societies in recorded history.

In America, every public institution has been rendered God-free, that is, devoid of God. From the age of 5, and sometimes before that, children attend schools that make no reference to God or the Bible. Indeed, schools generally hold God and the Bible in intellectual and

moral contempt.

American children are told at school that neither God, nor the Bible, nor religion is necessary — in fact, these are held to be impediments to moral progress. For example, virtually every student is taught the secular mantra that "more people have been killed by religion — or 'in the name of God' — than by anything else." The implied reference is, of course, to Christians alone. (Examples of historic Islamic violence are ignored, and mention of them is deemed bigotry, and the same holds true of Native American and non-Western violence.)

This secular doctrine regarding more violence by Christians than by anyone else is intellectually dishonest and, with regard to the 20th century, patently false.

It is intellectually dishonest insofar as it ignores the fact that prior to the Enlightenment, virtually everyone in the West was Christian. Therefore, by definition, virtually all violence was committed by Christians. Who else in the West could commit violence? The tiny number of Jews? The tiny number of atheists?

It is also intellectually dishonest in that only evils committed in the Christian world are mentioned — evils, such as slavery, which were nearly all universal. But the moral achievements of the Christian world — all unique to the Christian West — are ignored. Where else were countries committed to universal human rights — i.e., equal rights for every individual of every ethnicity, race and reli-

gion? Where else was the status of women elevated to the status of men? Where else was liberty achieved to anywhere near the extent it has been in the Western world? What other civilization figured out ways to elevate billions from poverty or to eradicate diseases?

And the charge is patently false in that the bloodiest century in history was the 20th century and nearly every one of the more than 100 million civilians — that is, noncombatants — who were murdered were killed by non-Christian, usually anti-Christian, secular regimes. Assuming your secular child or grandchild even knows about the genocides of the 20th century, ask him or her this question: "Who is responsible for the genocides of the 20th century — religious or secular regimes?"

In American life, the only national holiday with religious meaning is Christmas, and that has not only been largely secularized, but even in its secular form has increasingly been removed from the national vocabulary. Americans are expected to say the word "Christmas" as rarely as possible. No more "Merry Christmas," but "Happy Holidays." Companies no longer have "Christmas parties," but "holiday parties." Schools no longer have "Christmas vacations" or a "Christmas break," but "winter vacations" or a "winter break."

Anyone who derives his moral values from the Bible is essentially forbidden from using those values to shape societal



norms. You can cite Ibram X. Kendi or "White Fragility" or your heart as the source of your social values, but if you cite a biblical book, you are told that violates the alleged "separation of church and state."

So, then, for about 60 years, the entire world outside of the home (and increasingly inside the home) of most young Americans has been secular and anti-religious.

That the post-Christian age has been the bloodiest in history, that the French and Russian Revolutions, both fiercely anti-religious, produced bloody despotic regimes, while the pro-religion, Godbased American Revolution produced the freest country in the world — both these facts are unknown to most young Americans. So, too, young people don't know that religious Americans are happier, commit less suicide, give more charity and volunteer more time than irreligious Americans.

Swimming in a secular sea and ignorance of the disparate moral records of secular and Judeo-Christian regimes and institutions constitute one of the two reasons for the religious apathy among young Americans. The other has been the failure of religious institutions to explain themselves.

Biological Differences


Nearly half the state legislatures have passed laws requiring that only females can participate in girls' and women's sports. Some of these laws are being challenged in court along with court challenges in states that allow biological males to compete with biological females

Gregory Brown is an exercise physiologist who documents the biological differences between men and women in sports. Many biological factors influence human performance, but "one of the most important factors that influences adaptations to training and performance in sports is sex, because sex influences every system and every cell in our body."


A fair comparison between male and female differences in anatomy and physiology give males athletic advantages when compared to gifted and trained females of the same age. It is also true that puberty magnifies those sex-based differences. He lists those increased percentages in his article, and they are significant.

He also addresses the argument that hormone therapy decreases the biological advantages. For example, men have 30-60 percent higher muscle strength than women. Even after "undergoing testosterone suppression" the decrease in strength is less then 9 percent.

Sure, some women are taller than



some men. Some women can run faster than some men. But the tallest women are shorter than the tallest men. The fastest men are faster than the fastest women. A blood test or a genetic test cannot determine a transgender identity. Biological sex is still present, and it is log-



ical to assume the inherent male athletic advantages are still present.

This is the science that lawmakers, judges, coaches, and parents must accept. There are clear differences between men and women when competing in sports.

Celebrating July 4 is Hollow Without Restoring Freedom and Rights

Too many Americans underappreciate the meaning of holidays such as July 4th, also known as Independence Day. While some connect fireworks with the firing of cannons in the Revolutionary War, most forget that when the 56 members of the Continental Congress agreed to the put pen to parchment and affirm the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776, all knew that being a signatory put a death threat on their heads as traitors to Britain.

The War of Independence was in its second year by July 1776, and George Washington's rag-tag colonial army was about half the size of the highly trained professional British army and the German Hessian mercenary troops fighting for the English. Additionally, Washington's army was undertrained, underequipped, and underfunded. The naval mismatch was even greater at the outset of the war. In the first year of the war, the Continental Navy had less than ten converted merchant ships while the British amassed 250 dedicated warships, concentrated along the coastline and in ports between the Delaware Bay and Boston.



Indeed, things appeared grim for the pa-

The last sentence of the Declaration of Independence before the space allotted for signatures reads, "...for the support of this Declaration, with a firm Reliance on the Protections of divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor. Indeed, July 4 for those Founders was a serious and somber occasion.

As we think about July 4th, we should remember that America was first in human history to establish a free and independent constitutional republic based on two political and moral principles. First, the government was required to protect its subjects' unalienable Godgiven freedom and rights, which would be later formalized in the Constitution's

Bill of Rights. Second, it was the first country to establish that the legitimacy for government resides exclusively in the people, who would elect their leaders.

Recommended We must never

forget the courage, determination and Godly principles that were necessary to establish the United States. General George Washington was in New York, preparing its

defense, when on July 6, 1776 a courier from Philadelphia arrived to deliver a copy of the Declaration of Independence that had been agreed upon by delegates of the Continental Congress just two days before. There were just two signatures on that document: John Hancock, President of the Continental Congress, and Secretary Charles Thomson. Because the odds of prevailing against British were so low and the penalty for treason was death, it had been decided not to reveal the identities of the other fifty-four who had voted for the Declaration.

Washington would encounter defeat and retreat after losing all three major battle campaigns in New York, at the cost of some 4,100 men.

Less than six months later, however, after Washington had two successive victories, defeating a Hessian garrison in Trenton, New Jersey the day after Christmas 1776, and then routing the British in nearby Princeton eight days later, the Continental Congress perceived these back-to-back wins as harbingers of ultimate victory and released the 56-signature Declaration to be distributed throughout the colonies.

As it turned out, Washington would lose more battles that he won, but he persisted five more years, with unwavering faith in God and the patriot cause. A myriad of developments that only Providence could have arranged made Washington's 1781 victory at Yorktown possible—bringing final and total sur-

render by the British. In retrospect, what was more remarkable than the reversal of odds resulting in the American military victory, was the spiritual power of the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution that followed, which established that the rights of the people come from God and not the state and that the sovereign powers of the state would be shaped and limited by those unalienable rights of the citizens.

When God was progressively driven out of American culture starting sixtyodd years ago, that void became filled with false idols and divisive spiritual influences such as cultural Marxism and critical race theory. Little wonder that average Americans today feel demoralized and confused about the self-destructive direction of the country. A corrupt ruling elite in America seems to have neither respect for the people's welfare nor for the Constitution that served previous generations of Americans so well.

Happy Birthday, Dobbs - Tens of Thousands of Babies Saved

A year ago today, the Supreme Court's ruling in Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization changed

With the 1973 decision of Roe v. Wade, the slaughter of preborn children had been deemed a constitutional right. This made the U.S. one of the world leaders in liberalizing abortion at the time, according to PBS.

Nearly 50 years later, the Dobbs decision overturned this precedent, returning the decision to legalize or ban abortion to the state level, allowing the U.S.'s more conservative states to enshrine into law protections for children in the womb.

Some States Save the Unborn, While Others Kill Even More

Thirteen states even had "trigger laws" in place long before the Dobbs ruling, creating abortion restrictions and bans set to go into effect after the overturning of Roe. According to an Associated Press report from Thursday, over the past year, half of all U.S. states passed laws either banning or restricting abortion access.

But were those efforts successful? Did the Dobbs decision actually save lives?

The answer is complicated because, while conservative states have gone far toward protecting preborn life, proabortion lawmakers in Democrat-run states have been doing their best to even things out.

As revealed in the Associated Press's Thursday report, "as some states restricted abortion, others locked in access." While 25 states enacted restrictions and bans, 20 others passed abortion protections via various constitutional amendments and new laws.

Many women crossed state lines in order to access abortions. In some cases, funds were set up via employers and other pro-abortion organizations in order to help pay for the travel expenses of such women.

So, then, how do the final numbers shake out?

How Many Lives Were Saved by Dobbs?

Though the Associated Press notes that such numbers are hard to come by, the Society of Family Planning (a proabortion organization) has been tracking the rate of abortions since Dobbs via the #WeCount project.

According to the Kaiser Family Foundation, a self-described "independent source for health" issues, SFP is one of three reliable "major data sources on



abortion incidence" and the only one of the three with data from 2023.

#WeCount uses self-reported data from abortion providers across the country in order to zero in on how many abortions have occurred per month across the country since Dobbs.

On June 15, 2023, the project's most current data — comparing the average monthly rate of abortions in the two months before the court's decision with March 2023 — was released.

According to that report, Dobbs has without a doubt been a resounding victory for the pro-life movement.

Between April and May 2022, the av-

erage number of abortions was 81,730. As state-level pro-life laws continued to roll out over the next nine months, the number of abortions dropped by an average of 2,849 per month.

From July 2022 to March 2023, according to the report, 25,640 pre-born lives were saved.

"Even nine months after the Court's decision, the increase in numbers of abortions in states where abortion was permitted did not compensate for the reductions in states where abortion was banned," the report said.

In states with total abortion bans, 65,920 fewer abortions occurred over those months.

The Next Abortion Battleground

Now, there is a shocking trend that may shift the tide in the coming years: selfmanaged abortions. These abortions occur outside the health system and are now easier than ever to conduct, due to abortion medication that can be sent in the mail.

Given the nature of these abortions, they are nearly impossible to trace. Presumably, a woman could order a pill and conduct a self-managed abortion without anyone ever finding out she was pregnant in

the first place.

Even before Dobbs, self-managed abortions were on the rise, though as of 2019 they were "probably not a significant driver of the overall decline" in the number of reported abortions as reported by the Guttmacher Institute.

The non-profit group Aid Access was created in 2018 for the sole purpose of mailing abortion medication to individuals across the U.S. and even the world.

"Aid Access works with doctors overseas and in states with shield laws, which are intended to bar abortion-related investigations by other states. Those doctors prescribe the medications and Aid Access ships them," the Associated Press reported.

"It saw requests in a sample of 30 states more than double from before a draft of the Dobbs ruling was leaked last year until it became official and bans started taking effect."

According to the #WeCount report, Aid Access has received roughly 6,500 abortion medication requests per month since the Dobbs decision, though it remains completely unknown how many requests were fulfilled.


Some women could be ordering pills ahead of time as a precaution, while others may receive their pills and decide not to follow through with taking them. There is simply no way to know how many abortions are taking place from only that one number of requests.

Nevertheless, self-managed and illegal abortions appear to be a growing problem, and one that's not going away anytime soon.

In April, the Supreme Court rejected a lower court's decision to restrict one of the drugs used for such abortions.

Now that Roe v. Wade is out of the way, thousands of lives are being saved. If the pro-life movement hopes for this trend to continue, this emerging crisis will need to be addressed.

Passwords keep your online accounts protected from hackers ... but not if they're easy to guess. Cybercriminals know what's overused and will use that against you.

Curious as to how your passwords measure up? Read on to see if yours made the naughty list and get my smart tips to protect yourself from hackers.

Spill the tea

A recent study examined over 6 million breached passwords to find the worst offenders. No, it's not just things like "password" and "123456" — but those are bad, and if you use 'em, change 'em.

Over 1.5 million of those crappy passwords were eight characters or less. Almost 30% used fewer than 12 characters. The most popular



hacked passwords used all-lowercase letters.

Take a look at the top 10 mosthacked password categories:

1. Nicknames/terms of endear-

- 2. TV show characters
- 3. TV show names
- 4. Colors
- 5. Fashion brands
- 6. Cities
- 7. Countries

- 8. Movie titles
- 9. Body parts
- 10. Car brands

Don't call me 'sweetie'

If your online banking password shares your spouse's nickname, it's not strong enough (unless you call them something really weird). Terms of endearment like "king," "rose," "boo" and "love" were high on the easily breached list.

Pets' names, swear words and video game characters (Joel, Mario and Link) weren't far behind. Sports, football teams and superheroes were in the top 20, too.

Keep it locked down

Passwords are a royal pain in the rear, but you need to take them seriously. Here are some tips:

- Create a password with 12 to 16 characters. The longer, the better! An 8-character password can be cracked in less than an hour.
- Use a mix of letters, numbers and special characters or symbols. Don't just add a "1" or an exclamation point at the end.
- Use a password manager to keep track of all those complex logins for
- If you think your password has been compromised, change it ASAP. This is especially true if you keep getting texts or emails that someone requested a change and it wasn't you. Lock it down.

Kansas sees its largest increase in abortions ever recorded

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) has released its preliminary report on abortions in Kansas in 2022.

For the fourth year in a row, abortions have increased in the state after having fallen nearly 50% in the years prior to the 2019 Kansas Supreme Court's 2019 Hodes & Nauser v. Schmidt ruling.

According to KDHE's report, Abortions in Kansas, 2022, last year's statistics showed the largest increase on record since the inception of the report. There were 12,318 total abortions in 2022, including 616 live dismemberabortions, abortions on non-Kansas residents, and 7,339 chemical abortions.

The latest state abortion statistics show the following shocking impacts:

- 57% increase in the overall annual number of abortions the largest year-over-year increase since statistics have been
- 29% increase in painful, live dismemberment abortions



- 117% increase in abortions performed on out-of-state residents, with two abortions being performed on out-of-state residents for every one performed on a Kansas resident
- 38% increase in the number of chemical pill abortions
- 48.5% increase in the number of abortions performed on minor girls

"As we predicted, Kansas has seen a massive increase in the number vulnerable women being intentionally funneled to abortion facilities in Kansas," said Danielle Underwood, KFL Director of Communications. "Behind each of these statistics is an industry eager to pad its bottom line, a woman who has been pushed to feel she has no other never blow out her first birthday candle."

In 2022, Kansas recorded increases in all of the following:

Overall number of abortions

— Immediately following the Hodes ruling, KFL predicted significant increases in abortion numbers. The ruling ushered in a new legal framework in which broadly supported, commonsense limits on the abortion industry became vulnerable to any legal challenge. Under this framework, two laws have already been struck down by our state courts and more are expected, paving the way for an unregulated abortion industry in Kansas.

Live dismemberment abortions — Painful dismemberment abortions are on the rise in Kansas, as evidenced by today's statistics. While difficult to imagine, preborn babies are currently unprotected from this brutal abortion method in Kansas.

Women coming from out of state — The profit-driven abortion industry markets their abor-

option, and a child who will tion procedures to women across the country in Kansas tourist publications. KFL has continuously warned of Kansas becoming an abortion destination, and today's numbers only prove that.

> Use of dangerous abortion **chemicals** — For years, the number of chemical abortions in Kansas has been higher than the national average. Unlike surgical abortions, in a chemical abortion the burden is on women to complete their own abortions at home. These dangerous do-ityourself abortions increase the abortion industry's profits but not the health and safety of women.

In 2023, the Kansas legislature passed Abortion Pill Reversal informed consent requirements to ensure pregnant women will be informed of the Abortion Pill Reversal protocol and where to get timely medical help to save their babies if they do not want to complete the abortion. This law is currently on hold pending a recent abortion industry lawsuit to prevent its enforcement, denying women this potentially life-saying information.

Former trans teen sues hospital after breasts removed at age 13

As Europe bans so-called "gender-affirming" surgeries and hormones for children, U.S. hospitals continue to plunge into the controversial practice that many call abuse. Now, a California medical center is facing a lawsuit after it removed the breasts of a 13-year-old girl who said she identified as a boy.

The patient, Layla Jane, and her lawyer, are not holding back in her description of Kaiser Permanete's actions, saying the doctors carried out "ideological and profit-driven medical abuse" when they prescribed her puberty blockers and hormones and, later, performed a double mastectomy, Charles LiMandri, one of the lawyers representing the plaintiff, Layla Jane, said in a statement.

Jane, now 18, was influenced by people online when she was just 11 and told her parents that she was a boy, prompting them to ask for guidance from doctors.

While three doctors said Jane was too young for cross-sex hormones, she was eventually referred to several other doctors who prescribed her puberty blockers and hormones. Within six months, they removed her breasts.

The hormones and puberty blockers were given based on a single, 75-minute session with Susanne Watson, a psychologist, according to the suit. Dr. Winnie Tong, a plastic surgeon,

concluded after a 30-minute session that Jane could have her breasts removed.

"Defendants did not question, elicit, or attempt to understand the psychological events that led Kayla to the mistaken belief that she was transgender, nor did they evaluate, appreciate, or treat her multi-faceted presentation of co-morbid symptoms," the suit reads.

"Instead, Defendants assumed that Kayla, a twelve-year-old emotionally troubled girl, knew best what she needed to improve her mental health and figuratively handed her the prescription pad. There is no other area of medicine where doctors will surgically remove a perfectly healthy body part and intentionally induce a diseased state of the pituitary gland misfunction based simply on the young adolescent patient's wishes."

Doreen Samelson, a psychologist not named as a defendant, by contrast, told Jane and her parents that she couldn't receive puberty blockers or cross-sex hormones due to factors such as her age.

Jane, whose given name is Kayla Lovdahl, has since "detransitioned," or resumed identifying as a girl.

She's currently receiving psychotherapy for mental health issues such as social anxiety disorder. That kind of treatment should have been offered instead of the drastic steps the defendants took, the suit states, noting



that, per a number of studies, youth who experience gender dysphoria often ultimately become comfortable with their birth sex.

Other papers have found that people who underwent chemical or surgical procedures to "transition" experience mental health issues and higher suicide rates. And some countries have restricted the usage of puberty blockers to certain settings due to a dearth of clinical research on using them on youth wanting to transition.

The lack of therapy and outlining of possible side effects from the surgery means the doctors didn't provide Jane with informed consent, according to the suit. Instead, the defendants claimed that the dysphoria wouldn't resolve unless she underwent the procedure.

At one point, one allegedly told her parents, "Would you rather have a live

son or a dead daughter?"

"Nobody—none of my doctors—tried anything to make me comfortable in my body, or meaningfully pushed back or asked questions; they only affirmed," Jane remarked...

Jane said she didn't feel better after her surgery. She suffered nerve damage and other issues. She says she's happier since she detransitioned.

"The law says children aren't mature enough to make serious decisions that could have long lasting consequences like getting a tattoo, driving with friends, drinking alcohol, smoking cigarettes, or even voting," Jane said in a statement. "So why is it acceptable for 13-year-olds to decide to mutilate their body?"

The defendants are Kaiser Foundation Hospitals and the Permanente Medical groups, both part of the nonprofit Kaiser Permanente; Watson; and doctors who work for or are affiliated with Kaiser Permanente.

Kaiser Permanente and Watson didn't respond to requests for comment.

The suit was filed in the Superior Court of the state of California.

Jane is seeking damages for her pain and suffering, additional money for medical expenses, and costs of the suit covered.

"Kaiser continues to engage in the quackery of subjecting innocent children to irreversible sex mimicry treatment, including drugs and surgery, without informed consent," Harmeet Dhillon, CEO of the Center for American Liberty, which is also representing Jane, said in a statement.

"The medical providers responsible for Layla's case, along with countless others, have substituted woke ideology for medically accepted standards of care, including lying to and manipulating vulnerable patients and families.

"We are committed to holding them accountable for the harm inflicted upon Layla, and together we intend to strongly deter Kaiser's factory-line approach that permanently mutilates an unknown number of American children, subjecting them to a lifetime of harm, regret, and medical consequences."

A similar lawsuit was filed by Chloe Cole, whose breasts were removed when she was 15, earlier this year.

"Queen Esther" is wowing audiences this summer at Sight & Sound Theatre

Sight & Sound's "Queen Esther" musical production is a breathtaking and emotionally stirring masterpiece that brings to life one of the most significant stories of the Old Testament.

Currently on stage at the production company's vast Branson, Missouri theater, it retells the saga of Queen Esther, who risks her life to save her people from genocide.

Audiences have previously been awed by major productions like Noah and Samson but nothing may prepare them for the newest show that opened to soldout crowds this spring.

Metro Voiced interviewed several key actors and staff and share the videos below as part of our "Summer, Faith, and Fun Series."

It is a stunning combination of storytelling, music, and stagecraft that immerses the audience in a world of ancient Persia brought to life by by Producer and Director, Dan Deal and Assistant Producer/writer Kristen Brewer.

But while the biblical storyline is resonating with audiences, it also has a profound impact on the actors.

"It has grown my faith so much," Emily Baker, who plays Esther, told Metro Voice. "This role is one that you can't tell it truthfully and honestly unless it's true to you as a person."

Baker told Metro Voice that she gets her peace from knowing she's not in the driver's seat. "Learning what it means to be still and trust that God is the one in control is important and that the pressure is off of me," she says. Baker says being a Christian performer is about telling His story."

The story of Esther needed a grand stage and production to match the importance of the message. Production values of "Esther" are nothing short of exceptional.

Luke Bates is the technical director and says this is the largest set ever used by a Sight and Sound production and comes in at a whopping 120,000 pounds. "This is a much larger set than any production currently running in the U.S." he told Metro Voice.

That fact doesn't go unnoticed by himself or audiences. It took a set of this size and detail to effectively transport au-



diences back 2,700 years to the height of the Persian Empire.

Bates says that the "wow!" moment for him is when the set opens up and Persia is revealed. That's followed closely for him personally by the final song dealing with not being alone.

He had a major role in the set design, which wraps around the audience on three sides, is finely detailed, and boasts intricate Persian architecture and a towering palace backdrop.

Audiences are also amazed with the pyrotechnics and projections that are used effectively to create dramatic moments throughout the show.

Bates says that timing is crucial with so much unfolding on stage. "Timing and cuing the actors is repeatedly rehearsed-even up to show time."

The performances by the cast are outstanding, with each member bringing their character to life with passion and conviction, as evidenced by Baker.

The music is also a standout feature, with powerful vocals by Baker, Dan Culleny (who plays Xerxes), and Jeremy Johnson as Mordecai.

They each add significantly to a moving score that complements the story perfectly.

"It's easy to relate to Mordecai," he says. "The story is easy to relate to in the responsibility parents or guardians have for their children. It brings home how I'm raising my own kids."

Dan Culleny told Metro Voice he hopes his honesty as an actor and Christian comes through in the role.

"Spiritually, it's a role you cannot tell truthfully if you are not applying all the lessons to yourself in your personal life," he says. "Like in the powerful songs Emily sings. You can't fake your way through the spiritual message."

Culleny says for him, to be still and know He is God is a central message. "God is big and vast and we need to be ready to move when He asks us to."

Overall, "Sight and Sound's 'Esther' musical production" is a must-see for anyone interested in biblical stories and theatrical performances. The show is a testament to the power of live theatre and the enduring appeal of ancient tales. Even the seating is designed to provide optimal views of the stage, ensuring that every seat in the house is a great one.

As a production produced by Sight and Sound, there's no better place for such epic stories to come to life on stage.

Asked what a person will walk away with after seeing the production, Baker had some encouragement. "That they are not alone, that God has always been there for them – always will be there and if they want to look for the details they will find them."

Documentary on the Duggar family should be warning to the church



I found myself both frustrated and mesmerized by the new Amazon Prime documentary "Shiny Happy People: Duggar Family Secrets."

As the title suggests, it purports to be the behind-the-scenes story of Jim Bob and Michelle Duggar and their children, the stars of the TLC hit television series "19 and Counting" and a number of spin-offs. The original show ran for 229 episodes over seven years, and was a ratings juggernaut for TLC, elevating it from a fringe cable television network into the mainstream. The show was TLC's most popular, averaging 2.3 million viewers per new episode in Season 10 and scoring in the "Cable Top 25," according to Nielsen.

But all was not well in DuggarWorld. In 2015, Josh Duggar publicly apologized for having "acted inexcusably" following reports he molested five girls, including some of his sisters, by fondling them. TLC announced that the show was officially canceled and would not resume production. A spin off show, "Counting On," aired in December 2015 and was cancelled in 2021, due to Josh Duggar's arrest for child pornography. He was sentenced to 12 years in prison for his crimes.

All of this has, of course, been tabloid fodder for the past dozen years. In the beginning it was a "feel-good" story of a large and happy family, and more recently it was a train wreck from which we could not avert our eyes.

The problem with treating the story as tabloid fodder, which this new documentary continues to do, is that it will likely prevent the church from dealing with important issues.

For example, "Shiny Happy People" either ignored or edited out reasonable voices that could have added much insight and nuance to this story. The very subtitle, "Duggar Family Secrets," suggests that what was in the documentary was previously not known, or had been somehow silenced by a powerful funda-

mentalist or evangelical cabal.

That impression ignores the work I did for WORLD Magazine covering Bill Gothard (who ends up being the real "star" of "Shiny Happy People") in 2014 and 2015. (Examples of which you can find here and here.) Christianity Today deserves even more credit. It was doing important and appropriately critical coverage of Gothard as early as the 1980s. (You can read the nearly 100 articles CT did on Gothard over the years here.)

I don't know if the reporters for Christianity Today received calls from the producers of "Shiny Happy People" to add perspective and journalistic gravitas to the series. I know I did not. This failure is a huge hole in the credibility of "Shiny Happy People," especially since Gothard himself was represented only in archive footage. I, on the other hand, actually interviewed Gothard during the era covered by the documentary. (You can read a portion of that interview here.)

Perhaps most conspicuous in her absence was Jinger Duggar, who has written an excellent and nuanced book about her time in DuggarWorld, and about the influence of Bill Gothard and the Institute for Basic Life Principles on her family. Her book is Becoming Free Indeed and I recommend both the book and this excellent interview she did with my friend and former Colson Center colleague Shane Morris.

In fairness to the producers, they apparently did try to get Jinger Duggar in the series. Jinger released a statement to that effect:

"I was actually approached and asked to participate in the docuseries, but I thought that from my perspective, I really wanted to make sure that I was able to share my story in my own words and in my own timing.... I wanted to be able to share it in a way that was God-hon-

Pastor warns about new Disney+ program in which teen falls in love with the devil

"Pauline," a new Disney+ show about a teenager who falls in love with the devil, is causing concern among Christian leaders.

"My reaction was: Satan always comes masquerading as an angel of light, and so he's going to portray himself in the form that people are most readily able to accept," Mike Signorelli, pastor of V1 Church in New York City said. "Because he wants to appeal to the masses, we're seeing this over and over and over again."

Much is still unknown about the German-produced "Pauline," although a " Deadline "report gives a glimpse into what can be expected: "Pauline follows the eponymous protagonist, an 18-year-old who accidentally becomes pregnant from a one-night stand supposedly with satan. With school stress, the climate crisis and the downfall of society weighing heavily on her mind, something she doesn't need at all right now is catching feelings, especially not for her one-night stand Lukas, who, as it turns out, is the devil himself."

Whether it's shows like this or cartoons such as "Little Demon," Signorelli encourages parents to be engaged and aware of what is unfolding. This is particularly true for cartoons featuring evil, demonic or satanic sub-

"If you are a parent watching this video right now, I just want to make it as clear and plain as possible: These cartoons are not for adults," he said. "They can say they're for adults. They can have an adult rating, but we know • that cartoons appeal to children. And • the product. The more the faith audience somebody has to be bold enough to say

Signorelli said Christians also have to be well aware that Ephesians 6 is real and believers are engaged in an intense spiritual battle.

"We're fighting a spiritual battle, and we wrestle not against flesh and blood, and so we're not fighting against producers and directors and cartoonists and illustrators," he said. "We are fighting a spiritual battle, and so we have to be aware of that so that Satan will not outwit us."

Signorelli isn't alone in his "Pauline" critique. Movieguide also slammed the show and urged people to take action. The protest effort is seeking 150,000 • signatures.



Box office success of "Jesus Revolution" propels movie into international markets

After exceeding box office expectations in the United States, the "Jesus Revolution" movie now is being shown internationally.

Codirector John Erwin says that the hit movie has been released in Singapore, Indonesia, Australia and New Zealand and is launching June 23 in the United Kingdom, followed by Latin America. The international market opened up, he said, because of its domestic success. The film grossed more than \$52 million domestically and remained in the Top 10 for

"Entertainment is America's secondlargest export behind agriculture," he said. "So when you make something popular in the U.S. and when an audience really champions it, they send it around the world. A lot of Christians might not realize that as we support a film here, it enables a global release."

Faith-based movies can be a powerful vehicle for spreading the gospel, Erwin

"A lot of people ask, 'are we just preaching to the choir?" he said. "We found it's actually the choir that launches champions something, whether it's our movie or 'The Chosen,' they send it out. So really, if a big movie becomes successful and you saw it in America, 10 other people are going to see it around the



world because of you."

"Jesus Revolution" tells the story of a hippie-led revival in that launched in California and spread nationwide.

"The whole reason we made the movie was if God did it before it, God can do it again," Erwin said. "The world needs a Jesus revolution, perhaps now more than any other time in my lifetime."

It stars Jonathan Roumie ("The Chosen") as Lonnie Frisbee, Kelsey Grammer ("Cheers," "Frasier") as Chuck Smith, Joel Courtney as Greg Laurie, Kimberly Williams-Paisley ("Father of the Bride") as Laurie's mother and Anna Grace Barlow as Laurie's girlfriend and future wife Cathe. Brent McCorkle codirected it alongside Erwin.

Across the United Kingdom prior to

the movie's release, Christian organizations and churches have informed their members and organized group outings.

The group KOVA says it wants to promote the film. "In America, Jesus Revolution doubled box office estimates - let's show UK and Irish cinemas that the church is up for the challenge!" it said on

"We are passionate about meaningful stories provoking meaningful conversations, and we believe that the key message of this film, that church is a place where everyone is welcome, is a great place to start! CPO cares about providing churches with high-quality resources to serve them in their ministries, and they love that this historical film speaks to us in our lives today," it states.

oring and hopefully sharing my story in a balanced way."

I respect her decision. Perhaps she could tell that the filmmakers were interested in eyeballs and outrage, not introspection and solutions. Still, her voice — and other voices like hers — were sorely missed in this documentary.

Another problem with the series was the producers' inability to differentiate between various tribes within evangelicalism and fundamentalism. The documentary tried to suggest that the Duggars and Gothard were at the center of a vast network of organizations that included TeenPact, Patrick Henry College, the Family Research Council, Generation Joshua and the Home School Legal Defense Association, and others. The documentary did not include interviews or statements from any of these organizations, though their critics - including Alex Harris, Josh Pease, and Kristin du Mez — were on full display.

So what should Christians learn from

this docuseries aside from the basic facts about the Duggars and Gothard, facts which were already well-known? I think there are some important lessons.

First, the popularity of this series should not be a surprise. "The Rise and Fall of Mars Hill" had similar popularity (and was much more knowing about the Christian sub-culture). The recent Hillsong documentaries also generated considerable attention. They suggest that not just evangelicals, but all Americans, are interested in these stories.

Secondly, and closely following on the first, is the hard reality that if Christians do not tell these stories in redemptive ways, others will tell them in ways that are not so redemptive. The story told in "Shiny Happy People" needs to be told. Unfortunately, it still needs to be told.

Thirdly, just because "Shiny Happy People" told the story of Gothard and the Duggars imperfectly and sensationally, that doesn't mean we shouldn't be humble and sober about the lessons this story can teach us. Russell Moore, in his reflections on "Shiny Happy People,"

points out that there is a difference between the "power of the gospel, and the gospel of power." He's right. "Shiny Happy People" is not so concerned about the power of the gospel (alas), but it does lay bare the gospel of power, and we should not look away.

That's why, for all its flaws, I still recommend "Shiny Happy People." For all that it gets wrong about American Christianity, it gets enough right to merit our time and attention. It's my prayer that it moves us to lament, repentance, and resolve to do better.

Pro-life tie worn by Chiefs kicker Harrison Butker at White House



The pro-life tie worn by Harrison Butker when he visited the White House with his teammates recently, has become quite popular.

The athlete, who kicked the gamewinning field goal for the Kansas City Chiefs in this year's Super Bowl, used the occasion to share a subtle pro-life message in view of the pro-abortion Biden administration.

Butker was seen wearing a tie that had "Vulnerari Praesidio" in cursive writing all over it, which is a Latin term that translates as "Protect the most vulnerable." Butker played a key role in the Chiefs winning it all this past season, and it came before the Super Bowl when he was needed to kick the game-winning field goal in the AFC Championship Game against the Cincinnati Bengals. Then Butker was called on again after his team got perfect field position late in the fourth quarter of Super Bowl LVII against the Philadelphia Eagles, where he chipped in a field goal down the middle to win the game,

Butker has been in the NFL since 2017 after the Carolina Panthers took him in the seventh round of

the NFL Draft out of Georgia Tech. He later joined the Chiefs and has made field goals out of 186 attempts in more than 90 regular-season games.

Basketball star who refused to kneel hopes new clothing line will help promote unity



Basketball star Jordan Isaac of the Orlando Magic made headlines when he refused to kneel for the national anthem. Now he is set to release UNITUS, a new clothing line focused on stellar sports apparel and celebrating freedom.

"UNITUS is desperately needed today, because more and more brands in the sports and leisure wear space are abandoning the consumers' desire for them to be impartial on matters of culture, spirituality and politics," he says. "Many brands have overtly endorsed harmful and divisive ideologies that have left consumers looking for alternatives."

Isaac said there's a profound need for a "hopeful brand bolstered by values of faith in Christ, American freedom and family building. We also have freedom to create what we want to create. The hope is to be able to sign athletes across sports."

In the end, Isaac wants to create a "real infrastructure of people" across the spectrum who want to "give their money to a company they know is going to work toward bolstering their values."

And with cultural trends continuing to become more chaotic, Isaac believes people must decide to live out their faith values fully. "As the day continues to get darker and darker and crazier and crazier, you standing

up for what you believe in is only going to get harder," he said. "But is only going to become more necessary."

Isaac, author of the book "Why I Stand," said fellow NBA players decided in 2020 to kneel during the National Anthem amid the sea of protest that followed footage of George Floyd's death. But he decided to chart a different

"I was watching what happened to George Floyd and, as tragic as it was, trying to work through what is the best way to respond or if I need to respond at all," he said. "I was almost forced to because, once we get into the bubble, there is this immense pressure on NBA players to have to kneel for the National Anthem and wear a Black Lives Matter T-shirt."

Rather than embrace any narrative outside of biblical truth, Isaac said he chose to cling to the gospel and opted not to kneel or wear the BLM shirt. His decision wasn't rooted in protesting or throwing hate or shade at Black Lives Matter. Instead, he said he wanted to show "the love of Christ."



More important than living in KANSAS is vhere you will live forever. Just as you would look at a map of KANSAS to find your way, so you must look at the Bible to find your way, so you must look at the Bible to find your way to heaven. The Bible says, "Narrow is the way, which leadeth unto life, and few there be that find it." (Matt. 7:14).
