## Greater Kansas City area preparing for hundreds of thousands of World Cup fans



Ready or not, the world is coming to the Kansas City area this summer. Arrowhead Stadium will be one of the North American sites for soccer's FIFA World Cup, which Fox News said is comparable to playing 104 Super Bowls in one month.

Finding places to house all of the expected visitors will be a challenge. Tourism officials estimate hundreds of thousands of visitors could pass through the metro during the tournament, while the city has roughly 36,000 hotel rooms. Some rooms are under

## USPS: Postmarks Not Guaranteed on Same Day



The US Postal Service (USPS) has changed how it handles postmarks, and it could cost you big time.

Under the new procedure, instead of receiving a postmark on the day you put it in the box or hand-deliver it to the Post Office, the postmark will now reflect when they got around to handling your piece of mail.

USPS says it could be days before the official postmark is added. This could cost you in terms of late taxes, bills, legal documents, election ballots and numerous other important business in which a postmark matters. You'll now need to go to the window and request

## Faith, Family and Chicken Sandwiches: Chick-fil-A celebrates 80 years with new menu items, contests

Chick-fil-A is having a milestone birthday this year. The restaurant chain founded by S. Truett Cathy is celebrating 80 years of faith, family and chicken sandwiches.

A yearlong nationwide celebration called “Newstalgia” will combine new menu items with a vintage twist designed to honor Chick-fil-A’s past. The campaign includes a line of collectible retro cups available for \$3.99 each. Three thousand of them are golden fan cups, redeemable for a prize of free Chick-fil-A for a year. Each cup includes a hidden QR code and instructions for claiming the prize, which totals 52 entrées over 12 months. The contest is running nationwide through July 1, and the specialty cups are being randomly



distributed across participating locations.

“This year marks more than an anniversary,” said Khalilah Cooper, vice president of brand strategy,

advertising and media. “It’s a celebration of the memories, meals and meaningful moments that have brought people together at Chick-fil-A for generations. We

have so much in store this year, firmly rooted in Chick-fil-A’s renowned quality, care, generosity and hospitality.”

Cathy opened The Dwarf Grill in Hapeville, Ga., in 1946. It was there that the now-famous chicken sandwich was conceived, ultimately leading to the opening of the first Chick-fil-A restaurant in Atlanta in 1967. From a single diner to more than 3,000 restaurant locations across the United States, Canada, Puerto Rico, the United Kingdom and Singapore, the company has become one of the most successful family owned restaurant chains in the world.

The anniversary celebration will also bring new frosted sodas and floats to Chick-fil-A’s permanent

menu, inspired by old-fashioned soda fountain drinks and made with the company’s signature frozen dairy dessert. For a limited time, the original Chick-fil-A sandwich will be served in retro packaging featuring vintage-style graphics pulled from the brand archives in another nod to the company’s roots.

Cathy, a devout Southern Baptist, built the company on biblical principles, including closing on Sundays to honor the sabbath. Over the years, the chain has weathered cultural backlash for its stance on traditional family values, but it remains one of the most loved -- and most profitable -- fast-food brands in the nation.

a hand stamp on your mail.

The changes are part of its Delivering For America initiative that in-

cludes closures of many post office branches and modernizing infrastructure. While they say it is to respond to the decreasing volume of mail and increasing packages, some say it only adds to the hassle of everyday Americans.

The USPS which has faced bankruptcy for over a decade, is again increasing priority mail rates.

The increase in USPS shipping rates goes into effect Jan. 18. Prices are based on the package’s weight and the distance it is being shipped.

First Class mail will remain at 78 cents per ounce.

Priority Mail prices start at \$10.45 per package and \$11.90 for a flat-rate Priority Mail envelope. They are expected to increase 6.6%.

Priority Mail Express packages

start at \$32.50 and flat-rate envelopes start at \$33.40. They are expected to increase by 5.1%.

USPS Ground Advantage starts at \$7.20 and is expected to increase by 7.8%. Parcel Select is expected to increase by 6%.



# Bleeding Kansas program returns

Historic Lecompton is presenting six weeks of programs to help get you in touch with the territorial war and Civil War-era history of the area.

The 2026 Bleeding Kansas program series features six weeks of talks and dramatic interpretations focusing on the area's history from 1854-1865. Bleeding Kansas describes that time in Kansas Territory, during the struggle to determine whether the new state would be free or slave. Each program explores aspects of the state's unique history. What happened in Kansas during this time-frame was critical to the nation's history.

The programs begin at 2 p.m. each Sunday, from January 25 through March 1. They're held at Constitution Hall State Historic Site, 319 Elmore St. in Lecompton. A donation of \$5 is requested.



Constitution Hall is one of the oldest, wood frame structures left standing in the state. Audiences love to sit inside this historic old structure and listen to modern day historians and authors talk about issues that were discussed over 160 years ago inside this very building. It was the location of some of the most signif-

icant events in territorial Kansas political history, namely the writing of the 1857 Lecompton Constitution. This document would divide the National Democratic Party in the 1860 presidential election and ensure the election of Abraham Lincoln and the civil war.

## Hobby Lobby Founder on Secret to Lasting Success

David Green has been highly successful as founder of Hobby Lobby and Mardel Christian & Education stores. But at age 84, he is convinced that true success is measured not by what people get but what they give to others.

"The Bible talks about our life being nothing but a vapor," Green told "The Christian Post." "That helps us decide what we're going to do with our lives. We're here for a short time, so what are we going to do with it?"

Green shares his story in the new book "The Legacy Life," which he wrote with Bill High, a longtime leader in the Christian giving community, both in Kansas City and nationally. He learned the importance of serving others from an early age.

"I think what helped us shift was



our parents," Green said. "We knew what was important to them. My mother loved the Lord, had children who served the Lord and had a strong marriage. On her dying bed, she said, 'Do you see them? Do you see them?' And she was seeing angels."

That moment, he said, clarified what truly lasts. "Just acquiring a lot of stuff is not what makes someone

happy," he said. "God's been very good to us in business, but we want to do it for a reason bigger than this vapor life."

For young entrepreneurs hoping to honor God while building successful businesses, Green offered the reminder that everything belongs to God. "We see ourselves as stewards," he said. "We say God owns it, but then we treat it like we own it. If he owns everything, then we don't own it. We're stewards."

Green's ultimate vision remains centered on faith rather than fortune. "My greatest aspiration isn't financial," he said. "It's using what we have to tell as many people as possible about Jesus. We don't have this set up so we can sell it and sit on the beach. It's his, and we just want to be good stewards as long as we can."

multiple properties in the Kansas City area, said he plans to even rent out his own home during the World Cup and move in with his parents. "I will actually be moving back into my parents' basement," he told Fox. "The opportunity is just so large here that it would be silly not to take advantage of it."

Across the region, property managers are fielding inquiries from everyday homeowners curious about hosting. Heather Autry, a short-term rental property manager in Johnson County, said she's been swamped with meetings. "I've talked to so many folks who never even considered renting before — now they want to know what to do," she told KSHB.

Kathy Nelson, president and CEO of the Kansas City Sports Commission, said the city has been preparing for the

World Cup for years. "The energy, the excitement, the anticipation is unbelievable," she said. "Everyone's about to show up on our doorstep."

Kansas City is one of the smallest host cities in the World Cup lineup, alongside major destinations such as New York, Los Angeles and Miami, but officials are confident visitors will spread out across the region to find places to stay.

Area restaurant and business owners are likewise preparing for the surge. "I think Kansas City doesn't understand how big it's going to be for them to come here," said Matthew Hill, owner of AJ's in downtown Kansas City. "All of our teams are going to be working double time."

contract with FIFA and unavailable to the general public, adding pressure to an already competitive lodging market.

Local reports show hotel occupancy rates spiking and that rooms across the metro are filling fast as bookings surge.

Short-term rental markets are also frenzied, with listings skyrocketing in price and availability. According to The Kansas City Star, some Airbnbs in the area have reached astronomical nightly rates, raising concerns about affordability even as demand explodes.

This demand is pushing some locals to take unusual steps. Adam Kinner, a short-term rental host who owns mul-

## News Briefs: Buick production to KCKS, new motorpark owners; police raid documentary; KS reading skills

### GM to move some Buick production to Kansas City, Kansas

General Motors announced a plan to move production of the next-generation Buick from China to the Fairfax Assembly Plant in Kansas City, Kansas, for domestic sales.

Production of the Buick compact SUV at the GM Fairfax plant is set to begin in 2028. The facility currently produces the limited-run Chevy Bolt EV, and will start production on the gas-powered Chevy Equinox in 2027.

In a press release, the United Auto Workers Local 31 said it is excited at the prospect of more manufacturing work and careers stemming from this move.

The union said the decision is a testament to the hardworking people at the plant, and the union "looks forward to continuing the growth of the American working class in the KC-Metro for generations to come."

This move comes as U.S. President Donald Trump has been pressuring major automakers to expand vehicle production in the U.S. (KSHB)



### IHRA Acquires Heartland Motorsports Park

The International Hot Rod Association (IHRA) has acquired Heartland Motorsports Park in Topeka. Originally opened in 1963, the park has hosted major national drag racing events, road racing, karting, motocross and grassroots competitions.

Planned restoration and redevelopment efforts will focus on creating a year-round destination that blends motorsports with live entertainment and community engagement. Specifically,

plans call for: revitalized drag racing operations with improved racer and fan amenities; expanded motorsports and special event programming; live music, concerts and festival experiences; enhanced hospitality, vendor and fan experience areas; community-focused events designed to drive tourism and economic impact.

Renovation planning will begin immediately, with additional announcements regarding redevelopment phases, event schedules and community partnerships expected in the coming months. ([rebusinonline.com](http://rebusinonline.com))

### Documentary about police raid on Kansas newspaper to premiere

A documentary about the police raid of the Marion County Record is set to premiere at the Sundance Film Festival in early 2026, more than two years after law enforcement stormed the newspa-

per office, the publisher's home and a city councilwoman's home.

Director and producer Sharon Liese says the film looks beyond the First Amendment implications of the raids and dives deeper into the small town of Marion in a way the public hasn't seen before. She called it "a canary in a coal mine" type of story.

"The story that we eventually told is not what you would expect," Liese said. "It's not all about the First Amendment. It's about what happens between a newspaper and its community in a small town. It'll make people think about what journalism really is and what people really want journalism to be."

"Seized" will premiere at the Sundance Film Festival Jan. 22 through Feb. 1. It is one of 10 documentary films chosen to compete in the U.S. documentary category and was chosen out of thousands of submitted films.

### Blueprint for Literacy director seeks to polish Kansas' reading skills

The Kansas Legislature directed the

Kansas State Board of Education and Kansas Board of Regents to implement separate laws enacted during the past four years to elevate reading skills of public school students.

Both the 2022 Every Child Can Read Act in the hands of the K-12 Board of Education and the 2024 Blueprint for Literacy organized by higher education's Board of Regents recognized the threat of failing a majority of 450,000 students enrolled in Kansas classrooms.

"Reading and literacy, reading and writing, are the fundamental skills in which all other learning is built," said Cynthia Lane, director of the Blueprint for Literacy. "Literacy is directly related to health outcomes and the ability to secure high quality jobs."

Evidence for urgency to the state's work on child literacy wasn't difficult to find. Testing showed 55% of Kansas students in third through 10th grades read at the limited or basic levels, which meant they couldn't handle the content independently. Put another way, state exams revealed less than half read at the proficient or advanced levels.



# Topeka Church with History and Heart Goes Up For Sale

Nestled in a quiet corner of Topeka at 2516 SW Huntoon, a warm, inviting brick church built in 1960 is ready for a new chapter. Originally constructed by the Reformed Latter Day Saints, the building later became home to Saints Peter and Paul Orthodox Church. Now, as the congregation prepares to move to a larger space to accommodate its growing membership, this 1,775-square-foot sanctuary offers a rich history, striking architectural features, and a welcoming atmosphere for the next owners.

## A Legacy of Community

Over the past three decades, the building has been more than a place of worship – it has been a cornerstone for generations of families. “There’s been over 30 years of history here. For some people, this is where they grew up... three generations have had their spiritual life formed and strengthened in this building,” said Fr. Nikolai Meyers.

From baptisms to Holy Week celebrations, the space has hosted countless cer-



emonies and gatherings that have shaped the spiritual lives of its parishioners.

## Architecture That Invites

The church’s exterior, with its attractive brickwork and welcoming entryway, is just the beginning. Inside, sunlight pours through updated windows, high-

lighting rich wood paneling and trim. Walls painted in golden tones complement the wood, creating a warm, comfortable atmosphere.

“The building’s southern light and wood trim create a warm, inviting atmosphere, which is very characteristic of Orthodox churches,” said Fr. Nikolai

Meyers. These features make the space both personal and welcoming – qualities that have helped define the congregation’s identity over the years.

## Flexible Space for Worship and Beyond

The sanctuary comfortably accommodates 80–90 people, though it has hosted over 100 for special occasions. The adjoining fellowship hall provides additional space for gatherings, making the property ideal for a small to mid-sized congregation.

“The building itself is flexible. For us, over 100 people on a Sunday is our norm, but the space could be adjusted for another congregation’s needs,” said Fr. Nikolai Meyers.

## A Church at the Heart of Its Neighborhood

For years, the church has been a visible presence in its community. Annual events, including a Greek Festival in the fall, and summer programs for children and teens, bring neighbors together and extend the church’s mission beyond its

walls.

“We’ve been a part of this community for decades... people walking down neighborhood streets, kids playing nearby – it’s a neighborhood church in every sense,” said Fr. Nikolai Meyers.

## A Space Ready for Its Next Chapter

With its rich history, inviting design, and strong connection to the local community, this church building offers a unique opportunity. The congregation’s decision to move reflects its growth and need for a larger space, but the property has been priced so a smaller congregation can take the next step in their growth. For the next owners – whether a new congregation or someone with a vision to repurpose it – the building carries the potential for a vibrant next chapter.

“It’s been a good place for us for 30 years to grow and just be a community,” said Fr. Nikolai Meyers.

A. When it came to making these kinds

## It's Not Too Late: You Still Have Time to Contribute to an IRA Until April 2026

The year 2025 has come to an end, and if you think that you've missed your chance to boost your retirement savings, here's some good news: it's NOT too late. You still have time to contribute to an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) for the 2025 tax year all the way up until **April 15, 2026**. That extra window can make a meaningful difference for your long-term financial future.

### Understanding the IRA Contribution Deadline

One of the most helpful (and often misunderstood) features of IRAs is their contribution deadline. Unlike many financial goals that reset on December 31, IRA contributions for a given year can usually be made up until the federal filing deadline of the following year.

## The Mississippi Synagogue Fire and the Virus of 'Christian' Antisemitism

What prompts a 19-year-old college student to set a historic synagogue on fire in Jackson, Mississippi? (This happened on January 10, 2026.) What prompts another 19-year-old college student to carry a rifle into a synagogue in Poway, California and begin shooting at random, seeking to kill as many Jews as possible? (This happened on April 27, 2019.)

It appears that both of these young men were infected by a deadly virus, a virus known as antisemitism, a virus that affects

one's ability to think rationally.

But in both these cases, it was an especially insidious strain of antisemitism that affected them, one that is completely oxymoronic: "Christian" antisemitism.

This is an antisemitism that cloaks itself in Christianese, often citing biblical verses in support.

It is an antisemitism that parrots the standard (or latest) antisemitic tropes but adds in alleged theological support.

Yet the Christian faith is based on the teachings of a Jewish rabbi named Yeshua and grounded in documents written almost en-

tirely by Jews/Israelites. This makes it all the more tragic when the tenets of this faith are used to kill Jews or destroy places of Jewish worship. It is an absolute perversion of the gospel of love and kindness and compassion and forgiveness.

Stephen Spencer Pittman, the alleged arsonist of the Beth Israel synagogue in Jackson, Mississippi, grew up in a practicing Catholic home and

claimed to be a "follower of Christ" in his Instagram bio. He was on the honor roll of his

## Speaking Truth

Olivia left home for college during the summer to pursue her dreams. It was hard for her parents to say goodbye. It was tough for her too, because she loved her dad and mom a lot. She also said goodbye to her youth pastor that had been such a big help through so many things.

Within a few days after classes began, she met Lucas. They hit it off right away and things moved fast. Too fast, as they were spending a lot of time alone together. A few weeks after dating, she started feeling like something was not right. She panicked about what it might be. After several days of wrestling with the idea, she took "the test."

"Oh no!," she gasped. "This was not supposed to happen!" Oliva's mind raced, thinking what her parents, her church and others might think. She

grabbed her phone and started searching for answers. Soon she found herself staring at a screen that provided an option that would take care of everything. "No way!" she thought, "This goes against everything I have been taught." But as she sat there, she told herself, "I have to do this. There is no other option." Oliva filled out the online form in her dorm room, and days later she received a package in the mail. Nervously she opened it, pulled out the pills and held them in her hand while she read the instructions in how to end her pregnancy.

Last year over 1 million women like Oliva made that decision, and over 60% chose getting pills by mail, instead of driving to a clinic. Upwards of 30% of women will suffer an injury because of their choice. And college age women, like Olive, make up 66% of those ending their pregnancy.

Why do they do it? Some are not ready for parenthood, seeing how a baby would interfere with college studies, work or other pursuits. Other women are already single moms and cannot afford another child and others know they are carrying a baby who would have life-long disabilities.

For those who are pregnant and facing the same decision as Oliva, there is a better way, there is hope. The first

step on this path is a woman recognizing she is carrying another life inside her. It is not just a "fetus" or a "blob of tissue", but another human life. Pursuing an ultrasound will show her viability, like a detectable heartbeat, a sign of life. It will also reveal the gestational age of the baby, to see how far along the preg-



nancy is, and will show the location of the baby, to see if it is developing inside or outside the uterus.

Hope is also found in adoption. There are between 1 to 2 million couples waiting to adopt. When a woman chooses not to raise her baby for whatever reason, there are numerous loving parents who stand ready to help. Have hope for yourself and hope for that little life inside you.

What about God? What does He want? God says to you, "Before I formed you in the womb I knew

you..." (Jer. 1:5) The Bible also declares, "For you formed my inward parts; you knitted me together in my mother's womb. I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made. (Psalm 139:13-14). Since God is the Creator of all life, why would He want a doctor, mother or father to end what He created?

When a woman is facing a crisis pregnancy, it is an overwhelming experience. Yet, God tells her, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding." (Proverbs 3:5) Why? Because when you trust Him, He promises to be with you. Choose Jesus, choose life and He will provide for all your needs. Catholic high school, was described as an “all-American boy,” and some of his social media posts were overtly and unashamedly Christian.

Some of his friends pointed to changes in his behavior in recent years, “But it wasn’t until around a week before the arson that Pittman began making antisemitic comments, according to FBI Special Agent Ariel Williams, who testified at a court hearing Tuesday during which Pittman

8-year-old girl and the synagogue rabbi. (Had his gun not jammed, the numbers would have been much higher.)

In the manifesto he left behind, Earnest wrote, “I did not choose to be a Christian. The Father chose me. The Son saved me. And the Spirit keeps me. Why me? I do not know.”

But for Earnest, that Christian faith required him to hate God’s alleged enemies: “There is no love without hatred. You cannot love God if you do not hate

pressed.

Yet there is no denying that the very ancient virus of “Christian” antisemitism is spreading rapidly again today, perhaps affecting young white males more than any other group.

It behooves us to continue to call it out, expose it, and denounce it, doing our best to understand why it is becoming so popular again and uprooting its faulty ideological, theological, and intellectual foundations.

After Earnest was sentenced, the daughter of the slain woman in Poway, Hannah Kaye, told a local Los Angeles radio station “that it was ‘beyond comprehension’ how Earnest — reputed to be an accomplished student, athlete and musician who was studying to be a nurse at California

State University, San Marcos — had ‘traveled down the rabbit hole’ of violent antisemitism.”

We do best to comprehend the nature of this rabbit hole and why it is so appealing before more lives are destroyed.



pleaded not guilty to the arson.”

For Pittman, this synagogue was “the synagogue of Satan” (based on a misuse of Revelation 2:9 and 3:9) and it needed to be set on fire because of its “Jewish ties.”

According to an affidavit, “once Pittman was confronted by his father about what happened Saturday morning, Pittman confessed to the crime. Pittman also allegedly ‘laughed as he told his father what he did and said he finally got them.’”

When asked by the court if he understood his rights, he replied, “Jesus Christ is Lord.”

As for John Earnest, the Poway synagogue shooter in 2019, he attended an Orthodox Presbyterian Church and spoke plainly about his Christian faith in his 6-page manifesto. This was his justification for murdering Lori Gilbert-Kaye, a 60-year-old Jewish woman, as well as wounding an

Satan. You cannot love righteousness if you do not also hate sin. You cannot love your own race if you do not hate those who wish to destroy it. Love and hate are two sides of the same coin.”

And for “Christian” antisemites, no enemy is more hateful or vile than the Jew.

As expressed by the Jewish philosopher Eliezer Berkovitz,

“A straight line leads from the first act of oppression against the Jews and Judaism in the fourth century to the holocaust in the twentieth.”

Of course, there are always other factors at work when a seemingly normal, well-adjusted 19-year-old commits an act of arson or murder, and God alone knows the full motives of the heart.

And the churches associated with Pittman and Earnest categorically denounced their actions and the antisemitism they ex-

some are beginning to worry. While history doesn’t always fully repeat itself, it does often rhyme. The prices of these AI stocks relative to how much the companies are actually earning in profits are at levels not seen since right before the dot com boom went bust.

Two big differences between AI stocks now and dot com stocks then is that AI stocks have minimal debt compared to many dot coms, and also have large and impressive profitability. Most dot coms had zero profits and investors were just hoping they would eventually become profitable. Still, the assumption that the large AI stocks will continue to see record profits, when a recent report by Nanda of MIT’s Media Lab showed that 95% of organizations are getting zero return on AI investment thus far, is far from a sure thing.

So what should someone saving for, near, or in retirement do with their nest egg now given all this?

1) Consider diversifying out of index funds, like the S&P 500 that are not so diversified anymore. Many ‘target date’ retirement funds found in 401ks have the same problem of too much exposure to a handful of large AI related companies and thus too much risk. While many of these businesses are solid companies that are likely to succeed over the long term, having too many eggs in a single or similar baskets is rarely a good idea.

2) When looking at where to diver-

sify elsewhere, consider the secondary benefactors that will do well if the AI hype does come to fruition, but won’t fall apart if they don’t, such as utilities. AI uses a lot of power and will use a lot more if the boom continues. The average utility company won’t go bust, though, if history does end up rhyming with AI stocks going the way of the dot coms in the early 00’s.

3) Have a plan. Don’t get caught up in the hype. More wealth is lost to fear and greed in financial markets than to anything else. Retirement plans shouldn’t be built on hoping you correctly guess what any one stock, one type of stock, or even the stock market as a whole may do in any given short term time period. Instead, a retirement plan should be designed to succeed and provide ever increasing income over the long term regardless of what happens in the short term. February is known for cold weather, presidents' birthdays and Cupid's delight. As Valentine's Day approaches, hearts flutter, lovers sigh and Charlie Brown hopes that little red-haired girl will like the card he's been gathering up the courage to give her.

Not every culture is as comfortable as ours with public displays of affection. In one Malaysian state, laws ban total darkness in movie theaters "to prevent immoral acts like kissing, cuddling and other activities," as one official explained it. Public kissing there usually rates a \$70 fine.

## Smooch Cops

In Venezuela, extended public kissing and embracing can get you arrested. "If you kiss for more than five seconds, the police will grab you," complained one young woman whose friends were jailed. "It's ridiculous," grouched a 24-year-old man. "Whoever invented this law must not have a girlfriend."

Defining immoral kisses can be difficult admitted one policeman, but "when you see it, you should know it."

## Kids on Love, Dating and Marriage

Kids often have unique insights into adults' urge to merge. A friend passed along from the Internet children's answers to questions about love. What do people do on a date? Lynnette (age 8): "Dates are for having fun, and people should use them to get to know each other. Even boys have something to say if you listen long enough."

## Do You Love Me?

This season pundits ponder, "What is genuine love?" Popular speaker Josh McDowell delineates three kinds of love that can inform kids' (and adults') attitudes: love if, love because of, and love period. Love if and because of are based on personality or performance: "I love you if you go out with me, if you have a good sense of humor, if you sleep with me. I love you because you're attractive, intelligent or athletic."

But the best kind of love says, "I love you period: even with your weaknesses, even if you change, even if someone better looking comes along. Even if you have zoo-breath in the morning. I want to give myself to you."

## What is Real Love?

Paul, an early Christian writer, eloquently described this unconditional love: "Love is patient and kind. Love is not jealous or boastful or proud or rude. It does not demand its own way. It is not irritable, and it keeps no record of being wronged. ...Love never gives up, never loses faith, is always hopeful, and endures through

every circumstance. ... [Love] will last forever...."

Committed unconditional love could probably heal many romantic rifts. Solid spiritual roots that help produce it can help undergird stable relationships. And the children have noticed that families and adult relationships can use some strengthening.

How can a stranger tell if two people are married? Derrick (8): By

"whether they seem to be yelling at the same kids." And how would the world be different if people didn't get married? Kelvin (8): "There sure would be a lot of kids to explain, wouldn't there?"

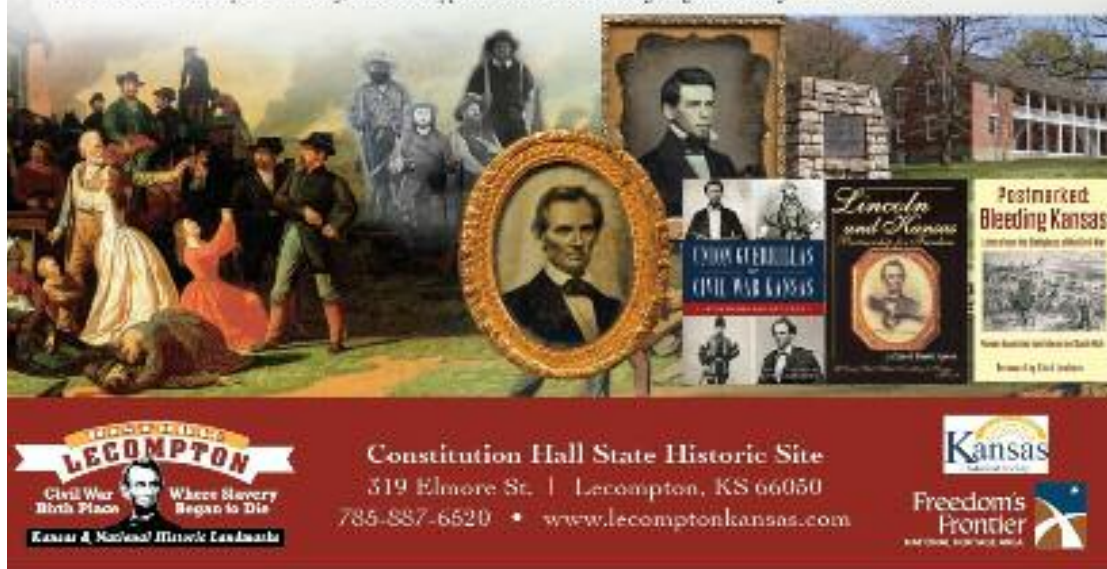
**FEB 1 Postmarked: Bleeding Kansas, by Chad Lawhorn, Editor and Publisher Lawrence Journal-World** Chad Lawhorn discusses his 2013 book that republished the Bleeding Kansas era correspondence between early Lawrence settler and Free State supporter Edward Firth, and his wife, Sarah Firth. Culminating at the 1865 Lawrence massacre, the Firth letters offer a frontline view of the border conflict in Kansas before and during the Civil War as it was seen by those who lived it.

**FEB 8 Jayhawkers and Red Legs: Union Guerillas of Civil War Kansas by Paul A. Thomas and Matt M. Matthews, authors.** Before and during the American Civil War, Kansas anti-slavery militants patrolled the Kansas-Missouri border. Known as "Jayhawkers" and later "Red Legs," they raided anyone they believed sympathetic to the pro-slavery cause and southern secession. For many, these irregular warriors were heroes fighting for a Free Kansas and the preservation of the Union; for their victims, these men were little more than opportunistic thieves. Authors Paul A. Thomas and Matt M. Matthews seek to find out who these men really were in their new book.

**FEB 15 Bogus Legislature and Border War: The Politics of the Shawnee Indian Mission and Thomas Johnson, by Jennifer Laughlin, Site Administrator of Shawnee Indian Mission State Historic Site.** The Shawnee Indian Mission, built in 1839, served as a trade school near the Missouri border on the Shawnee Reservation. In the 1850's, it became a major epicenter of Kansas territorial politics. Thomas Johnson, the Methodist Minister and Superintendent of the School, was himself a leader of the pro-slavery movement during Bleeding Kansas, fueled by his own personal ideologies and close proximity to Westport. Business, culture, assimilation, religion, politics and controversy all found a place on this two-thousand acres until Johnson's death in 1865.

**FEB 22 "Suffer and Be Strong". The Wakarusa War of 1855, by Eric Smallwood, Site Administrator of Constitution Hall State Historic Site.** Five years before South Carolina seceded from the Union, military units of northern and southern Americans faced off against one another on the field of battle over the political issue of slavery for the first time, in the opening act of what we now call "Bleeding Kansas". Though it was nearly bloodless, the "Wakarusa War", as it would come to be known, was a dark omen of things to come for the next decade of American history, and was where many of the leading figures of Bleeding Kansas began to gain their fame.

**MAR 1 Lincoln in Kansas, by Carol D. Ayers, M.L.S., M.A., and author.** In December 1869, Abraham Lincoln traveled to Kansas to give his first campaign speech for the presidency and to help Republican candidates vie successfully in the upcoming election. Though often overlooked, this visit held important historical significance. Lincoln was very connected to Kansas as it formed its first Republican Party, and was supportive of its victorious fight against slavery within its borders.

## Why Faith Took Center Stage in American Idol



AMERICAN IDOL Season 23 saw the popular singing competition show put faith on full display, especially with its SONGS OF FAITH Easter special.

"It was a discussion that started at a dinner with the judges, some people from ABC, and myself," AMERICAN IDOL showrunner and executive producer, Megan Michaels Wolflick, told The Rolling Stone of the special. It featured the three judges — Carrie Underwood, Luke Bryan and Lionel Richie — along with all 20 contestants and some special guests.

"We watch myriad Christmas specials. We don't ever see a faith-based spring Easter-style show. So we kind of embraced that. It was a special show, and people loved it; the ratings were pretty amazing," she continued.

Jamal Roberts, who won the season, grew up singing in church and released a faith-filled song titled "Still" in October last year.

Meanwhile, Breanna Nix, who took third place, traveled the country and played in churches before auditioning for AMERICAN IDOL. While on the show, she sang Underwood's "Jesus Take the Wheel" and Lauren Daigle's "You Say." For the finale, Nix performed with Brandon Lake, a top Grammy Award-winning Christian artist.

So, why has AMERICAN IDOL leaned into faith?

"When we open our floodgates for auditions every spring, we don't know what's coming," Wolflick explained. "We follow the lead of who comes through our doors. What is happening in music today? And that, organically, in the last couple years, has been more and more faith-based music. Not intentional, but it was resonating with the public."

The judges and Wolflick look for contestants they want to hear again and again.

"We've been doing auditions for six hours. Everyone is tired. When this person walks into the room, are you going to be like, 'yes?'" she told TV Insider. "It's a real instinctual process. We are looking for true artists. We are a television show, but I really do feel it's the big leagues of the music. This is a way to break into the music industry. Take Jamal for instance, who clicked a link last year and now he is going on tour with Brandy and Monica. How would he ever have access to that in less than a year if it weren't for IDOL and auditioning?"

# Country Artist Reveals Heart Behind Her Hit Song About Letting Jesus Carry You

Christian country artist Anne Wilson recently opened up about why she chose to write her hit track, “Carry Me.”

“We all know what it feels like to carry the weight of the world. Whether it’s grief, pressure, or just the heaviness of life, it can feel impossible to hold it all together,” she shared on Facebook. “This song is a reminder that we were never meant to carry it alone. My prayer is that this song gives you hope and rest right where you are.”

The song debuted on Oct. 3, 2025, as part of her third album, Stars.

The lyrics read:

*I went to bed 15*

*I woke up 23*

*And now it all just feels like*

*Some kind of crazy tragic dream*

*Truth is I’m way too young*

*To feel as old as I do*

*It ain’t easy being strong*

*When they’re all counting on you*

*So girl pull yourself together*

*Don’t you dare lose your composure*

*So much for closure*

*Where is that little girl?*

*That one I used to be*

*I can’t remember the last time*

*That I felt young and free*

*How much can one heart take*

*When it’s taking on everything*

*I carry the weight of the world*

*Can someone carry me?*

“I wrote ‘Carry Me’ in a season when I didn’t have the strength to keep pre-



tending I was okay. This song is my prayer for anyone who’s tired of holding it all together and just needs Jesus to meet them right where they are,” Wilson added in an Instagram post.

In an interview with The Music Universe, she called the song as “one of the most personal songs I’ve ever written.”

“When my brother Jacob passed away, I was forced to grow up fast,” Wilson explained. “Not long after, I signed a record deal and felt the heavy pressures that came with it. In the middle of all of that, I realized I was never meant to carry the weight of the world on my own – Jesus is the One who carries me.”

Wilson’s brother died in a tragic car accident on June 6, 2017. She sang in public for the first time at his funeral, and that moment ended up launching her career.

“Even now, when I look around at

the brokenness and pain in our world, that same heaviness creeps in,” she continued, speaking with The Music Universe. “It’s easy to wonder how we’ll ever make it through. But this song is my reminder that the same God who carried me in my darkest season is the same God carrying us today. He promises to lift our burdens and give us rest, and that’s where my hope will always be.”

She hopes the song reminds her listeners to turn to Jesus.

“Some seasons you have the strength to walk through, and other seasons you need to be carried. Let this be your reminder today that you’re not alone. Jesus will carry you,” Wilson said.

If you’re feeling the weight of the world, take Wilson’s reminder to heart, and let Jesus carry you.

# Latest Family-Friendly Flick Just Smashed Oscar Winner’s Record



ZOOTOPIA 2 just achieved another major milestone: it surpassed the \$1 billion mark at the worldwide box office, thanks to an unexpected lead in China.

The sequel has now achieved a milestone not seen since James Cameron’s 1997 classic TITANIC, becoming the first Hollywood movie in nearly three decades to sell more than 100 million tickets in China alone. Reports say that it has earned \$560 million in China, nearly double that of its US take at \$321 million.

The movie will now need to surpass INSIDE OUT 2’s worldwide box office take of \$1,698,863,816 to become the highest grossing animated movie of all time, a feat that at this time seems attainable.

Forbes reported, “In less than three weeks, Disney’s ZOOTOPIA 2 smashed the global box office and joined the \$1 billion club.”

The movie follows “Judy Hopps (voiced by Ginnifer Goodwin) and Nick Wilde (Jason Bateman) as they track down a snake that arrives in Zootopia.”

“Byron and I really enjoy exploring and playing with a lot of creative ideas,” Bush said. “And obviously we secretly put a lot of things in the ending of ZOOTOPIA 2, like the bird feather we saw, which we’re happy to think about, and it’s also exciting to think about what will happen to Judy and Nick next.”

He added, “It typically takes us 4–5 years to make an animated film, but the first 2–3 years are spent exploring creative ideas. So, it takes about 3 years for a project to reach the stage where the script we’re working on is ready. Therefore, without specifying what we’re currently exploring, I would say: exploration itself is a wonderful thing because you can surprise yourself, and that’s important.”

When Hollywood creates a family-focused movie, it’s sure to succeed.

# Does Science Support God? Examining New Evidence

“God is dead,” the German philosopher Friedrich Nietzsche famously declared in 1882. Not so fast, two acclaimed scientists respond in a compelling new book now available in the United States after impressive sales figures in Europe.

## A Metro Voice Book Review

“God, The Science, The Evidence” by Michel-Yves Bolloré and Olivier Bonnassies has sold more than 400,000 copies worldwide. The book presents commentary and research drawn from hundreds of scientists and scholars, including 63 Nobel Prize winners, and presents what the authors describe as a “180-degree panorama” of the evidence.

For much of the 20th century, mainstream culture treated scientific progress as incompatible with belief in God. The authors argue that this narrative has been challenged by modern developments in cosmology, physics and biology, includ-

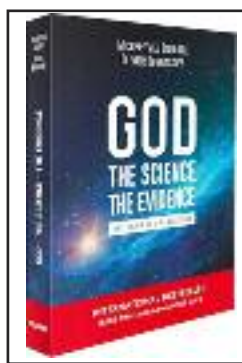
ing the Big Bang, the fine-tuning debate and the information-rich complexity of DNA.

“Many people live with an unresolved tension between what they were taught about science and what they feel drawn to spiritually,” Bolloré said. “One of the great reliefs readers report is discovering that this conflict is not inevitable and may no longer be justified.”

The consensus before the 20th century was that both time and space had no beginning and no end, so there was no need for a creator God. Recent scientific advances called this long-held assumption into question. “Never have so many spectacular scientific discoveries emerged in

such a short period of time,” the book said. “These discoveries have overturned our view of the cosmos and forcefully put the question of the existence of a creator God back on the table.”

If science confirms that time, space and matter had an absolute beginning, it becomes clearer that the universe proceeds from a cause that is not temporal, spatial or material. “The Big Bang forces us into a corner,” the authors said. “To put it bluntly, it brings us face to face with the idea of God. We dare to say that the picture painted by the Big Bang is remarkably consistent with the idea of the creation of the universe by God.”

## Patriots QB Eyes NFL Games as Opportunity to Share the Gospel



New England Patriots quarterback Drake Maye is ready for the Super bowl, but more importantly, he's ready to share the gospel through the platform God's given him.

"I think the biggest thing is using my platform to spread the word and spread the good news," Maye said on the WEEI show in Boston. "That's one of the biggest things that I've tried to work on in my career is using my platform to inspire young kids or inspire even older people that may not be into their faith as much just to know that it's out there for everybody."

"One of the biggest things in my life that I've learned is that there's purpose and there's passion. My passion is football and my purpose is [being] a believer and being strong in my faith," the athlete emphasized.

Maye also spoke about his relationship with the Broncos' injured quarterback Bo Nix. Nix broke his ankle at the end of the Divisional game against the Buffalo Bills.

According to Sports Spectrum, both Nix and Maye were "drafted in the first round of the 2024 NFL Draft...[and] developed a friendship during their pre-draft process, training together and spending time with one another's families. Their friendship developed over their shared faith in God."

"I got to train with Bo [during] the pre-draft and got to know him well; him and his family and his wife," Maye said. "First off, they're just great people. Great Christians. I've really enjoyed being around Bo Nix and his family. Obviously, the news was heartbreaking

for the player he is, the guy he is. I'm just praying for Bo, and I know he's going to bounce back. He's a great player in this league. I look forward to matching up with him."

Maye used his platform in the past to talk about his faith in God. When the Patriots beat the Baltimore Ravens on Dec. 21, the quarterback focused all his attention back on his team and his faith.

"I'm looking forward to celebrating with these guys," he shared after the game. "Just props to them, and I just thank the good Lord — what a position I'm in in my life. Just stay strong in my faith and good things happen."

## QB Mendoza thanks God after Improbable Indiana win

The Indiana Hoosiers, traditionally one of the worst teams in college football history, capped a record-breaking season on Monday by defeating the University of Miami to win the national championship. Fernando Mendoza, their Heisman Trophy-winning quarterback, led the way.

In December, during his Heisman acceptance speech, he thanked God for "the opportunity to chase a dream that once felt a world away," as the Deseret News previously reported.

"I want to give all the glory and thanks to God," Mendoza said after the game. "My offensive lineman blocked perfectly, and we were able to execute the team toward a common goal."

He later thanked his friends, family and coaches "for taking a chance on me," reiterating how he wanted to "give all the glory to God." As the Hoosiers were presented with the national championship trophy, Mendoza pointed to God first and said, "I first want to give all the glory to God" and called it "the most special moment of my life."



Sports Center posted video showing Mendoza and Miami quarterback Carson Beck kneeling in prayer on the field ahead of the game. Mendoza often publicly displayed his Catholic faith throughout the past season. Before the Heisman Trophy awards ceremony last month, he said he was happy that God had put "bumps and challenges in my life," such as finding a college team that wanted him and earning a starting job.

"Evidently, those have been blessings, because they've lit a fire underneath myself in order to make myself work harder

and get to the point that I am today," he said. "I believe that I would not be here without the path that my Lord Jesus Christ has put me on today. And so that's why I always try to give him the glory and always give him the thanks, as I know he has a plan for me."

It's not the first time, or the last, in which the star player points to God. "The only reason I've gotten to this point is because there's so many different people helping me in my journey, and (the Saint Paul priests) have been one," Mendoza told Sports Illustrated. "They've done so

Tim Tebow wants you to understand the importance of taking care of your body.

"Taking care of your body and being a good steward of it in every way, form and fashion is so important," the former Heisman trophy winner said on an episode of the "Post Run High" podcast. "There's a lot of people that they want to be their best, but maybe they're so fo-

cused on business or their career or something, but actually the right movement, the right sleep, the right fuel, all of that is just going to make you better with more clarity, with more energy, with more drive for that thing that you're striving for."

"A lot of people say, 'Well, because you're done playing, you'll take it easy now.' And I say no, because a lot of it wasn't just for a game. I want to be my best at everything that I get to do, you know, especially when I'm doing things that are more important than a game," he continued. "And so if I would give all that effort and and diet and nutrition and everything to a game. Why would I give less for things that are more important?"

Tebow explained that when you workout with the right people around — for him, it's his wife Demi — the experience becomes even better.

"If we're around the right people, it becomes contagious, and we want to do it," he said. "It's really about trying to be your best, but then it's also about how the right people around you can inspire you, which just means to be filled with the urge to do something right. And so that inspiration when you're around the right people, it does fill you with the urge to do more, to be healthier, to go a little bit further, to train a little bit more, because you want to be your best for what



you're pursuing, but you want to be your best for them too."

## A Guide to Enjoying Life in the Best Years

### 5 Advances in Alzheimer's Treatment

For the millions of Americans touched by Alzheimer's disease, 2025 brought major advances in understanding of brain health and progress in diagnosis and treatment. Here are the year's biggest advances:

#### 1) A structured plan can sharpen brain health.

In a major U.S. clinical trial of older adults at risk for cognitive decline, two healthy lifestyle plans in the Alzheimer's Association's U.S.

POINTER study improved memory and thinking skills over two years. Both interventions included exercise, brain-healthy nutrition, cognitive training and heart health monitoring. However, participants in a highly structured program that also included regular coaching and peer support showed significantly greater brain health gains, demonstrating that when brain-healthy habits are organized and supported, people stick with them and

thinking skills benefit.

Next steps for families: Start small but structured: aim for 150 minutes of weekly exercise of at least moderate intensity, Mediterranean-style meals, 7–8 hours of sleep per night, and 2–3 short brain-training sessions each week. Put goals on a shared calendar, find an exercise or brain-health buddy, and schedule regular check-ins with your healthcare professional.

#### 2) Simple blood tests can help spot changes earlier.

In 2025, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration cleared two blood tests that detect Alzheimer's-related brain changes, offering a less invasive, less expensive option for those experiencing memory changes to support diagnosis and potentially reduce the need for PET scans or spinal taps. Blood tests are not stand-alone diagnostic tools, but their use can help guide next steps for testing, treatment and planning. The Alzheimer's Association has developed clinical guidelines to help specialists determine when to use blood tests alongside established "gold standard" tests.

Next step for families: Ask your health care team whether an Alzheimer's blood test makes sense for you or a loved one, and how your results would affect lifestyle and health care plans. If they recommend testing, ask them to refer you to a specialist who can explain the results.

#### 3) Americans want to know sooner.

A recent Alzheimer's Association survey of adults 45 and older found most want to learn early if they have Alzheimer's before symptoms impact their lives, and 9 out of 10 would take a simple test, if available, to clarify next steps. Nearly 3 in 5 respondents said they would accept a moderate or high level of risk to take medication that could slow the disease's progression.

Early awareness unlocks time to live healthfully, organize support, consider treatment options, and plan finances and care preferences.

Next step for families: Bring your top concerns, what's changed (mem-



ory, mood, function), and goals for the next 3 months to your appointment.

#### 4) Treatment can be easier to take.

The August 2025 FDA approval of Leqembi for delivery via weekly subcutaneous injections may ease treatment for some patients. Those who complete initial infusion treatments as directed for 18 months can now receive their subsequent weekly treatment using at-home autoinjectors.

Fewer infusion clinic visits can mean less travel and lower caregiver burden, making it easier to stick to treatments for eligible patients. Decisions depend on eligibility, monitoring requirements, side-effect profile, and your clinician's judgment.

The Alzheimer's Association encourages clinician participation in ALZ-NET, a nationwide program col-

lecting real-world data on Alzheimer's.

Next step for families: If treatment is on the table, ask whether at-home injections might be an option after the initial phase.

#### 5) A new clinician hub helps care teams stay current.

When clinicians have fast access to evidence-based resources, patients get clearer answers and more consistent care. The new centralized professional portal, ALZPro, now curates practice guidelines, professional training, and point-of-care tools for earlier detection, appropriate test use, treatment, etc.

# How to Live to Be 100 Years Old

Living to 100 may sound extraordinary, but research suggests it's more achievable—and enjoyable—than many people think. Studies show the majority of centenarians rate their health as good, and large numbers of people in this age group are mobile, active and optimistic.

According to the American Medical Association, adopting these seven habits can improve longevity and quality of life:

1. Eat healthy. Think of food as medicine. Choose nutritious, whole foods. Eat more fruits that are dark in color — blue, purple and red — to get the most nutrients, as well as fiber-rich vegetables, especially non-starchy vegetables such as broccoli, carrots and leafy greens. Incorporate whole grains, nuts, seeds, lean meats and fish. Drink more water, or as an alternative, flavored or sparkling water with no added sugar.

Reduce your intake of sugar-sweetened beverages and unhealthy ultra-processed foods, especially those with added sodium and sugar. Drinking sug-

ary beverages, even 100% fruit juices, is associated with a higher mortality risk, according to a study published in JAMA Network Open. Eat fewer processed meats, which tend to be high in fat and heavy on added salt and preservatives. Limit your intake of refined grains, such as breads, crackers, baked goods and white rice. Drink less alcohol.

2. Exercise. Adults should aim for at least 150 minutes of moderate-intensity activity or 75 minutes of vigorous-intensity activity weekly. A recent study published in JAMA found that putting down the television remote and walking can improve healthy aging — highlighting the importance of small everyday habits.

3. Get enough sleep. Adequate sleep improves memory, reduces stress, improves mood, and primes the body's natural defenses against disease. But sleep quality decreases with age. Improve your sleep quality by setting a regular bedtime and wake-up time, insulating your bedroom against noise, avoiding

exercise within an hour of bedtime, maintaining a cool and dark bedroom, and limiting fluids within two hours of bedtime. Also avoid alcohol before bedtime and make your bedroom a tech-free zone as screen-time can impact your ability to fall asleep and stay asleep.

4. Live with purpose. A sense of purpose can lead to increased energy, motivation, emotional stability and resilience. Take time for self-reflection and try meditation or yoga. Prioritize your values and beliefs and put them into action toward a goal that's meaningful to you and benefits others.

5. Stay positive. To bust stress, take a break from decisions, connect with others, pet your dog or cat, write a to-do list (stick to three items), take time to recharge, laugh, sing, curb clutter, set boundaries, perform mindfulness exercises, practice gratitude, and seek help from a professional when stress becomes overwhelming.

6. Stay connected. Research shows that having social connections is a significant predictor of longevity and better physical, cognitive and mental health, while social isolation and loneliness are significant predictors of premature death and poor health. Unfortunately, there is a



nationwide loneliness epidemic that medical experts consider a major public health concern. Combat loneliness with social clubs and community groups, or by taking up a hobby, learning something new or volunteering. If you're struggling with loneliness, reach out to a professional, your doctor, family member or friend. You can also call the 988 crisis helpline for support

7. Get screened. Schedule preventive care, tests and health screenings to help your doctor spot certain conditions before they become more serious. Your doctor can recommend needed tests based on your age, gender and health conditions — including colonoscopies, mammograms, gynecological and prostate exams, and vision screenings.

Today, there are many at-home screening options available. Some are more effective than others, and all work best — and minimize stress around results — when taken in consultation with a doctor.
